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Unwelcome Habit

IT has become a habit, by force of circumstances, for us to emphasise on this page in the last few home matches that it is essential that we should pull off a win and so improve our precarious position in the First Division.

There is no need to labour the point today. In welcoming our friends and rivals from Chelsea, we know that everyone on the ground is aware of the drama about to unfold here this afternoon.

We have had many tense matches with Chelsea in the past. History in fact records that in 1910 Spurs and Chelsea met in the last match of the season on this ground, and our 2—1 win saved our own First Division status and doomed the West Londoners to Division 2.

We bear our visitors no ill will, but the same result today would be welcomed with joy by everyone with Spurs' interests at heart.

Yet even with the encouragement of such a result, we still have a hard task ahead, and must think only in terms of victory both at Arsenal Stadium next Saturday and in our final match, at home to Leeds on the following Monday.

DISSAPPOINTMENT

Defeat by 3—2 at Burnley last Saturday came as a bitter disappointment. Admittedly we had a poor first half, and went in two goals down at half-time.

After Peter Noble had scored twice for Burnley, it was obvious we faced an uphill task. Our players deserve credit for the way they fought back in the second half.

Their rally reflected great spirit and character, and their success in pulling level through goals by Duncan (57th minute) and Steve Perryman (64th minute) encourages us to believe that we can still pull clear of the bottom three places. After a revival like that it was tough that we should have been beaten by a penalty kick converted by Leighton James in the 67th minute for an alleged offence by Perryman on Brian Flynn. CHELSEA

AST season Chelsea finished in 17th position on the First Division chart. It was a disappointing record for our West London rivals, but we know that in the light of their present situation in the League, they would be

relieved to finish as high this time!

Chelsea regained their First Division place in 1963, and prior to season 1972-73, when they finished twelfth, had not held a lower final position than ninth in any of the nine intervening seasons.

Like ourselves, Chelsea had a change of manager early this season. After Dave Sexton's departure from Stamford Bridge, Ron Suart took over and was in charge of the team by the time we visited Stamford Bridge in October.

Mr. Suart was a defender in his playing days with Blackburn Rovers and Blackpool, and he has also managed Scunthorpe United and Blackpool. When he was manager of Blackpool, his trainer-coach was Wilf Dixon, who is now our own assistant manager.

THE PLAYERS

JOHN PHILLIPS (Goalkeeper). Born Shrewsbury but a Welsh international. Started with Shrewsbury Town and joined Chelsea from Aston Villa in 1970.

GARRY LOCKE (Defender). Born London and a product of Chelsea's apprentice ranks. Made his League debut two seasons ago.

MARVIN HINTON (Defender). Born Croydon and made his name with Charlton Athletic. Moved to Chelsea

in August, 1963. MICKY DROY (Defender). Born Highbury and played for Islington Boys. Was an amateur with Slough before turning pro. for Chelsea.

RON HARRIS (Defender). Born Hackney and has been a Chelsea pro-

fessional since 1961. Former England Under-23 player. JOHN HOLLINS (Defender). English international. Born Guildford,

and developed through Chelsea's junior ranks. Has also played for the Under-23s and the Football League. STEVE KEMBER (Midfield). Born Croydon and started with Crystal

Palace. Moved from Palace to Chelsea in 1971.

PETER HOUSEMAN (Forward). Comes from Battersea. Joined Chelsea straight from school in Wandsworth. A full professional since 1962.

BILL GARNER (Forward). Born Leicester and joined Chelsea from Southend United in September, 1972. Previously played for Bedford Town.




OLD-TIMER

REFEREE FOR TODAY

President of Wolverhampton Sunday League, chairman of the Charity Cup competition and a member of the Birmingham County F.A., he serves on several committees and is a referees' examiner.

JOE KINNEAR

JOE KINNEAR has made 23 international appearances for Eire. Two more and he will qualify for the handsome trophy made of Connemara marble presented by Eire to players making 25 appearances.

In the course of his international games there have been many highlights and incidents, but the occasion that stands out most for him was last May, when he lined up against Brazil at the Maracana Stadium in Rio de Janeiro.

Eire lost the match 2-1, but for Joe it

was a great experience. He had always wanted to play against Brazil and his only regret is that Pele, although in the squad, did not play in that match.

"The ground and atmosphere of the crowd in Rio that day left a deep impression on me" says Joe. "That was Brazil's last match before the World Cup."

Joe was born in Dublin, but spent most of his boyhood in Watford. He joined Spurs as an amateur in August, 1963, and signed as a professional in February, 1965.

His League debut for us was against West Ham United on Good Friday, 1966. It was

a home match, and we lost 4-1.

When that season ended, Kinnear had made 8 League appearances. In the following season he was a member of our F.A. Cup-winning team against Chelsea, and Joe regards that occasion as the highlight of his career with Spurs. "It was tremendous to be able to come away from Wembley as Cup-winners", he says.

CUP FINALS

It is, of course, an experience that was repeated for Joe after our two Football League Cup finals in 1971 and 1973. He also had the distinction of playing in our team that won the U.E.F.A. Cup final in 1972.

Joe has known the other side of football fortune. His worst experience was breaking his right leg in two places in the home League match with Leeds United in January, 1969. That put him out of action for a long time.

Joe lives in the Woodside Park district of Finchley, but owns three houses in Watford which he has had converted into flats for letting. In the summer he plays a lot of tennis, and he also enjoys golf and squash.

In the light of our present League position, Joe puts personal ambitions aside. "All I want is Spurs to stay in the First Division", he says.

Kinnear's total of League appearances stands at 192. He has also made 62 appearances in the F.A. Cup, League Cup, European Cup-winners' Cup and E.U.F.A. Cup. His two League goals for Spurs were scored at Leicester in August, 1967, and at Newcastle in August, 1972.
