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COMMENT

THIS evening the curtain rings down on our home programme for season 1968-69. Whatever may happen on the field tonight or in our two remaining away matches with Leicester City and Sheffield Wednesday, we look back with a feeling of disappointment.

We know that our mood of disappointment is shared by our thousands of loyal supporters. We have known our triumphs in the past, and we will not be satisfied with mediocrity.

As a club, Tottenham Hotspur has to be successful, and when we fall short of the standard we set ourselves, we are concerned about it. A place in the top half of the table, and single-goal defeats in both the Semi-final of the League Cup and the Sixth Round of the F.A. Cup, could perhaps be described as a performance of some merit.

Our failure after making such good progress in the two cup competitions has only deepened our disappointment, however, and we derive no satisfaction from near-misses.

Our aim is to satisfy our supporters, and it is with this outlook that we face the future. As this programme is our last, we take this opportunity of thanking you for your support, and we offer an extra word of appreciation to those who have followed the team to away matches.

We have no wish to seek excuses, but it cannot be denied that we have been unfortunate with injuries this season. The

only good to come out of this situation is the opportunity that has been given to a number of our reserve players to prove what they can do in League football.

WELCOME, SAINTS

Southampton, to whom we extend a warm welcome this evening, look back on the most successful season of their League history. On the February evening when this fixture was postponed owing to a heavy fall of snow, the Saints stood above us in the First Division, and tonight they still have this advantage. We have, however, two more matches than Southampton still to play.

This is the Saints' third season in the First Division, and it has proved a campaign of emergence. In each of the last two seasons Southampton finished in

the lower half of the table. Now Southampton have clearly found their First Division feet, and we expect opposition as stern as anything provided by any club in the top section of the League.

We have already had two hard matches with Southampton this season. We managed to beat them by the only goal of the match in the Fifth Round of the League Cup here in October, and were defeated 1-2 in the League at Southampton in November.

Southampton have 56 League goals to their credit this season, and Ron Davies heads the list with 19. Next come Terry Paine with 9 and Mike Channon with 8. The others have been scored by Fred Kemp and Jimmy Gabriel 4 each; Bobby Stokes 3; Mick Judd 2; Frank Saul, Jimmy Melia and John Sydenham 1 each; and own goals by Jackie Charlton (Leeds United), Ron Hunt (Queen's Park Rangers) and John Hollins and David Webb, both of Chelsea. Melia has since been transferred to Aldershot.

EXTREMES

Our biggest home gate this season was 56,280 for Arsenal's League visit on the opening day. The smallest was 21,608 when Ipswich were here last month.

The biggest away crowd was 62,649 on Manchester United's ground, and the smallest to date was 14,445 at Burnley.

Work starts tomorrow morning to provide a completely new drainage system for the ground. The whole operation is expected to be completed by the end of May, enabling the new playing surface to be prepared in good time for next season.

MAN IN CHARGE

Referee for tonight is Mr. Maurice Fussey of Retford, Notts.

Mr. Fussey took up refereeing in the Scarborough district in 1951, and after Army service, progressed to the North Riding League.

Later he graduated to the Midland League, and in 1959 was appointed to the Football League List of Linesmen. A year later he was given full League status as a referee.

Mr. Fussey was a linesman in our F.A. Cup Semi-final match with Manchester United on Sheffield Wednesday's ground in March, 1962, and he refereed the League Cup Semi-final between Chelsea and Aston Villa in 1965.

Referee Fussey, who is employed as a clerical officer with the National Coal Board, was in charge of our away match with West Ham United last September, and was assigned to tonight's match when it was due to be played in February.

PEN PICTURES OF SOUTHAMPTON . . .

GERRY GURR (Goalkeeper). Has made the most of his first season as Southampton's first-choice goalkeeper. Born at Brighton, but spent most of his boyhood at Wembley, and played for both Wembley and Middlesex Boys teams. Played for Wembley, the amateur club, and had spells as an amateur with both Arsenal and Queen's Park Rangers before signing for Guildford City. Turned professional with the Saints in March, 1964.

KEN JONES (Right-back). Comes from Havercroft, near Wakefield, and played for Monkton Athletic in the West Yorkshire League before joining Bradford. Had been on trial with Arsenal, and had also interested Coventry City before Bradford offered him professional terms. Gave up his apprenticeship as an electrician for a career in football. Left Bradford for Southampton in June, 1965.

DENIS HOLLYWOOD (Left-back). Born in the Govan area of Glasgow, and gained recognition at Scottish Youth international level. Made his debut in League football for the Saints in the Second Division in season 1962-63. Has played for the Scottish Under-23 team. Conceded an own goal in the League match here last April.

FRED KEMP (Right-half). Normally fills a midfield role. Born at Salerno in Italy, but spent his boyhood at Exeter. Joined Wolverhampton Wanderers as an apprentice professional, and made his debut as a First Division player with the Midland club. Joined Southampton from Wolves in June, 1965. Is one of the Southampton players who have already played against Spurs twice this season.

JOHN McGRATH (Centre-half). Born in Manchester and started his League career with Bury. After seven years at Gigg Lane he was transferred to Newcastle United, and played regularly in the Tynesiders' League side. He gained England Under-23 honours as a Newcastle player, and last month was in the Football League XI that beat the

Scottish League. Joined Southampton from Newcastle in February, 1968.

HUGH FISHER (Wing-half). A Scot from Glasgow, who made a name for himself in youth football in the Scottish city. Crossed the border to start his League career with Blackpool, and made his First Division debut with the Lancashire club during season 1963-64. Transferred to Southampton in March, 1967. Stood by as substitute when the Saints were here in the League Cup last October.

TERRY PAINE (Winger). Gained international recognition as England's outside-right, but over the last couple of seasons has tended to play deeper. Comes from Winchester, and signed his first professional form for Southampton in February, 1957. Made his League debut for the Saints when they were in the Third Division.

BOB STOKES (Inside-forward). Born at Portsmouth, and a product of Southampton's own nursery system. Made his League debut as recently as Easter Monday, and celebrated the occasion with two goals in Southampton's 5-1 home win over Burnley. Played against Spurs in both legs of the Football Combination Cup Semi-final this season.

RON DAVIES (Centre-forward). Southampton's top scorer, and one of the outstanding forwards in English football today. A regular member of the Welsh international team, he comes from Holywell in Flintshire, and attended school with Mike England. Started his career with Chester, and later played for Luton Town and Norwich City before joining the Saints in August, 1966.

DAVID WALKER (Half-back). Born at Colne in Lancashire, and started his career with Burnley. Left Burnley for Southampton in May, 1965, and has since firmly established himself as a regular First Division player. Wore the No. 10 shirt in both matches against Spurs earlier this season.

MICK JUDD (Forward). Born in Southampton and has developed

through the club's youth system. Made his League debut against Arsenal at Highbury on Easter Monday, 1968, and scored a goal in a 3-0 win. Like Stokes, he played against Spurs in both legs of the Combination Cup Semi-final.

FRANK SAUL (Forward). Hardly needs an introduction. Saul comes from Canvey Island, and joined Spurs as a young amateur in August, 1958. Turned professional two years later, and scored one of the goals in our Cup Final victory over Chelsea in 1967. Transferred to Southampton in January of last year.

Joe Kinnear, who broke his right leg against Leeds in January, has now had the plaster removed. He sees the specialist again in just under a month's time.

Spurs' squad for the *Evening Standard* Five-a-side Championships at Wembley Pool tomorrow evening comprises Alan Mullery, Roger Morgan, Pat Jennings, Phil Beal, Jimmy Pearce and Terry Venables. We meet Queen's Park Rangers in the First Round.

OLD HEAD

Our Met. League team this season has been the youngest we have fielded, and it is gratifying that we should have done so well in the competition.

Ron Henry's has been the old head among the young ones, and his presence on the field has been of tremendous help. He has been able to coach the young players during the course of the game, and this has been when his influence has been most needed and most helpful.

Cup and League Cup matches, and has played on four occasions as substitute . . . Is engaged to Miss Sabina Kaluza, a secretary in a solicitors' office in Chelmsford . . . Drives a Ford Corsair.

Another goal by Jimmy Greaves, his 35th in League and Cup matches this season, just after half-time enabled us to take both points from West Ham here on Saturday.

With the Hammers occupying a higher position than ourselves in the First Division, it was a satisfying performance, although on the run of the play we could not have complained if we had been held to a draw.

Jimmy's goal was a disaster for young Peter Grotier in the West Ham goal. He made several fine saves, but allowed Jimmy's shot to pass through his legs. Yet the move that produced this goal was one of Spurs' best of the match.

Seconds later we nearly snatched another. Grotier dropped a hard drive by Jimmy Pearce, but Greaves turned the loose ball wide of the goal.

Early in the second half Mike England's ankle injury reassured itself, and he was replaced by Peter Collins. Mike has been under examination, and is now due for a "manipulation" which we hope will remedy the trouble.

Spurs had some narrow escapes in the later stages, but West Ham were lucky when Neil Johnson's header, from a free-kick by Cyril Knowles, struck the post.
