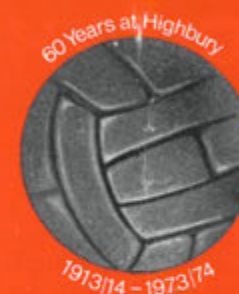

games again, but, of course, we have no idea what the National situation is likely to be by then, but we will obviously keep you posted as soon as we have any news on the subject. The world famous Cruyff, formerly of Ajax, is now a Barcelona player, and is a tremendous attraction wherever Barcelona play, so we hope we can bring him to Highbury for what should be a great night.

### Arsenal v. Tottenham

The cancellation of the match at Stoke last Saturday when we were hoping to get back on the winning path, means that we have not won since January 12—that is six games back, and it makes the visit of Spurs today all the more important to us. Whatever the position of the two teams in the table matches between Arsenal and Tottenham have produced some epic games over the years. We beat our near neighbours the only time we have ever

met in the F.A. Cup, and also the only time we have met in the Football League Cup (a two-legged Semi-Final), but, of course, our most memorable victory over them was the 1-0 which gave us the League Championship, and the momentum to go on in the same week and win the Cup—the great Double year. Over all the years—even in recent times, there have usually been a fair number of goals scored with 2, 3 and 4, to one side or the other, quite commonplace. In fact, Spurs scored 4 against us in a League match in four successive seasons from 1960-61 to 1963-64—16 goals in four matches to which we replied with 13 goals in four matches including two 4-4 draws. One team or the other has scored at least 2 for the last 27 seasons in one of the two League matches each season, so it would be a brave man who would gamble on today's score. Another 4-4 draw? . . . very unlikely!

### Your Letters

We receive over the course of the season far more letters from supporters than we can possibly publish in the programme, and this is true of the present moment, so we propose to deal with one or two in these notes. A Shareholder and Season Ticket-Holder, Mr. H. W. G. Cook, sent us a photograph of two small boys in Boston, U.S.A., wearing an Arsenal strip, saying they were great supporters of the Gunners and hoping we might include this picture in our programme. Mr. Cook, we dare not; we would be inundated with similar requests. We have keen supporters in almost every corner of the globe, and we are grateful for them, and the interest they take in the Club, but to begin using photographs would start a snowball and how could we choose one, and not another.

**PAT JENNINGS:** Northern Ireland's world-class goalkeeper and last season's "Footballer of the Year". Moved to Tottenham for a £25,000 fee from Watford in June 1964, and has made over 350 First Division appearances. Joined Watford after starring in Ireland's Youth team, and gained the first of his 48 full caps against Wales in April 1964, when 18. Born Newry.

**RAY EVANS:** Signed for Spurs as an apprentice in July 1965 and became a professional in May 1967, subsequently playing several times for the England Youth team. Made his League debut against Arsenal here in March 1969. Established at full-back this season after contesting the position with Joe Kinnear. Born Edmonton.

**TERRY NAYLOR:** Before joining Spurs he had trials with Arsenal and Millwall. Signed professional in July 1969, and made his League debut at West Bromwich at Easter 1970. Established a first-team place last season through injury to Beal, but broke a leg in a League match at Crystal Palace. Has recently played at full-back in place of the injured Cyril Knowles. Born Islington.

**JOHN PRATT:** Joined Spurs as an amateur on the recommendation of former winger Terry Medwin, and turned professional in November 1965. Made his debut in the same game as Ray Evans at Highbury in March 1969. Unluckily injured in the League Cup Final against Norwich last March, when forced to withdraw in the first half. Born Hackney.

**MIKE ENGLAND:** Tall commanding Welsh International centre-half (52 caps), signed in August 1966 for a £95,000 fee from Blackburn Rovers. Has made over 250 League appearances for Spurs. Joined Blackburn as a 15-year-old, and played in various positions for them before settling at centre-half. Born Greenfield, near Holywell, North Wales.

**PHILIP BEAL:** Longest-serving player on the Tottenham staff, he joined as an amateur in May 1960 and turned professional in January 1962. Testimonial this season. A former England Youth cap, he has played nearly 300 League games since his debut against Aston Villa in September 1963. Began as a full-back, but after breaking an arm and missing the 1967 F.A. Cup Final victory over Chelsea, settled in the centre of the defence. Born Godstone, Surrey.

**CHRIS McGRATH:** Made his League debut when we lost 2-0 at White Hart Lane last October. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in July 1970, and turned professional in January 1972. Captained Northern Ireland Boys, and in his first season of senior football is already being tipped for full international honours. Born Belfast.

**STEVE PERRYMAN:** England Under-23 captain, and club vice-captain. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in July 1967, turned professional in January 1969 and has missed few matches in the past four seasons. Made debut at Sunderland in September 1969. Hard-working midfield player, who has represented England at Youth and Under-23 (10 caps) levels. Born Ealing.

**MARTIN CHIVERS:** Tottenham's leading scorer last season with 33 League and Cup goals. This England striker (24 caps) joined Spurs in January 1968 from Southampton for a then record £125,000 fee. Powerfully built, he has made nearly 200 League appearances, and scored more than 100 first-team goals—registered his first League hat-trick for Spurs in last week's home match against Birmingham. Born Southampton.

**MARTIN PETERS:** Tottenham's captain was signed from West Ham in March 1970 for a £200,000 fee—then a record. A long-established England International with 65 caps, he also gained schoolboy honours before making his debut for West Ham in 1962. A midfield player with the uncanny ability to "ghost" in behind defences, he is particularly dangerous in the air. Born Plaistow.

**RALPH COATES:** Scored the goal that gave Tottenham victory over Norwich City in the League Cup Final last season after going on as substitute. Spurs' last expensive signing at £170,000 from Burnley in May 1971. Gained eight England Under-23 caps and four full caps. Born Hetton-le-Hole.

**MIKE DILLON:** Joined Spurs as an apprentice in May 1968, and after turning professional in December 1969 made his League debut away to Manchester United last season. Represented England at School-boy and Youth levels, and played the first month of this season at centre-half in place of the injured Mike England. Born Highgate.

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

(We are always pleased to receive your letters, and will publish as many as we can, if we think they are of general interest, doing our best to answer any questions which you may ask.)

It was with much interest that I read your Arsenal Cavalcade in the Norwich match programme, as I was at that first match at Highbury. I was taken by my father as a small lad of 9 years old to see the new team that had arrived in our district, and I have been a regular ever since, and still in my usual position just behind the goal at the North Bank end.

In those early days my father won a free season ticket for finding a misspelt word in the programme. I remember there was only one other winner.

One of my earliest memories was of recruiting Sergeants mingling with the crowds during the 1914-18 War. Some of the early players I remember were North, Shaw Bradshaw, Hutchins, Williamson and, of course, Jock Rutherford among others too numerous to mention. Of course I have seen Arsenal in their lean years as well as the glorious 30s with players like Alex James, David Jack, Cliff Bastin, where are the players of their standard today, I wouldn't have swapped any one of them for six Georgie Bests. Which brings me to what I think was the greatest goal ever scored at Highbury, it was by David Jack in a match against Aston Villa, picking up the ball in his own penalty area he dribbled it the length of the field beating half the Villa team just by his body swerve and shooting from inside their penalty area to score a perfect goal, to me it was poetry in motion. My greatest moments in all those years? There were two, the night we won the Fairs Cup at Highbury, I have never seen such emotion from a football crowd, and the other was when Ray Kennedy scored that winning goal at Tottenham to give us the Championship and the first leg of the double, after that I was certain that the Cup Final was only a formality. Thanks Ray and thank you Charlie and Eddie for the two in the Final. You see I work in Tottenham and can see the Spurs ground from my office window, after that I could really walk tall.

I hope to be able to see Arsenal for some time yet, and thank you for your interesting reading in the programmes. There is just one more thing, I prefer the old Arsenal song to the tune of Anchors Aweigh to the one we have now!
