Challenge from Rangers

THE pre-season friendly match against another club has now become the accepted practice, and in meeting Glasgow Rangers here this evening we know we are staging one of the most attractive games prior to the opening of the new League season.

In recent years we have, of course, cemented a close relationship with the famous Rangers Club. A year ago this week we played them on their own ground in Glasgow, and two years ago Rangers were here in a match that corresponds to tonight's fixture.

We also played Rangers in a memorable tour match in Toronto last summer, and we hope our visitors tonight will forgive us mentioning that each of these three meetings between the two clubs in the last two years have resulted in victory for Spurs!

The term "friendly", commonly used though it is, hardly fits such an occasion as tonight's match. When we visited Ibrox Stadium last August, Rangers labelled the fixture as a "Challenge Match".

It is indeed a challenge tonight, and it is in this frame of mind that our players will tackle the distinguished men of Rangers.

If the challenge is met successfully, it will be a happy start to a season which we hope will add a fresh chapter of triumph to our history.

OFF TO MAJORCA

The next test for our team will be on Friday against F.C. Cologne, the German club, in a four-club tournament to be held at Palma, Majorca.

The other clubs competing are Red Banner, Sofia and Atletico Madrid. The winners of each match will meet at the week-end, and the two losing teams will also clash to determine third and fourth place.

Our party is due back next Monday, and the rest of that week will be spent in stern preparation for our big opening League match of the new season, at home to West Ham United.

BETTER PREPARATION

Pre-season matches of this type provide much more entertainment, and a better preparation for the

players, than the old-style practice match between first team and reserves.

The last time we staged a public practice match between our own players on this ground was six years ago.

That year we also played a "Select Glasgow XI" for the Glasgow Charity Cup. It is interesting, in the light of our meeting with Scottish opponents this evening, to recall that we played the match before a crowd of 58,768 spectators at Hampden Park.

Spurs were beaten 4-2 by a Glasgow team that included six Rangers players in Billy Ritchie, John Greig, Jim Baxter, Willie Henderson, Jim Forrest and Ralph Brand.

We also played a pre-season match with Feyenoord in Rotterdam that year. In both 1965 and 1966 we com-

peted in the Costa del Sol tournament in Malaga prior to the season's opening, and in 1967 met Celtic at Hampden Park, and Manchester United at Old Trafford for the F.A. Charity Shield.

SCOTLAND LAST YEAR

A few days after Rangers' visit two years ago, we played F.K. Austria in Vienna, and last year were in Scotland for our pre-season games against Rangers and Hearts.

The pre-season programme over the last six years has provided high-quality football, thrills and competitiveness. Quite a contrast to the sedate atmosphere of the old Whites versus Blues type of public trial.

When Spurs visited Rangers last August, Jimmy Pearce scored the only goal of the match in the second half. Spurs gave an impressive display that evening before a crowd of 55,033.

IN TORONTO

The match between Spurs and Rangers in the Toronto Cup in June, 1969 ended 4-3 in our favour. In an incident-packed game our goals were scored by Jimmy Greaves 3-2 (2 from penalties) and Roger Morgan.

Rangers' last appearance here two years ago was memorable for the performance of Peter Collins. He was making his senior debut, and he scored twice in the first nine minutes.

We won the match 3-1, Alan Mullery scoring our third goal.

Many supporters will remember the more serious clashes in 1962. We played Rangers in the European Cup-Winners' Cup, and beat them here 5-2 in the first leg of the First Round before a crowd of 58,859.

Spurs also won the second leg at Ibrox by 3-2 and went on to win the Cup-Winners' Cup.

REFEREE FOR TONIGHT



The man in the middle this evening is Mr. Roger Kirkpatrick of Leicester.

Mr. Kirkpatrick started refereeing schoolboy matches more than 20 years ago, and still gives a lot of his time to boys' football.

He continued to referee while serving in the Royal Navy, and after leaving the Service officiated in the Midland League. Then came 10 years as a referee in the Southern League before he was appointed to the Football League List of Linesmen in 1964.

Two years later he was promoted to the "middle".

Mr. Kirkpatrick, who is married with two sons, is a sales director with a hosiery company. He finds time to play in five-a-side football himself, and is also keen on golf and squash.

His last match on this ground was our League fixture with Everton in March.

TONIGHT'S VISITORS

GLASGOW RANGERS

SOME of the greatest names in the history of football have been associated with Rangers, and the number of players who have worn Scottish international colours

while serving the famous Glasgow club is too long for reproduction in this programme.

The ranks of Rangers have included celebrated players throughout the club's history, and true to the pattern, the present team shows no shortage of famous names.

John Greig deserves pride of place. He is captain of Rangers and also of Scotland. Greig has a preference for right-half, but he has occupied other defensive positions for both Rangers and Scotland.

He was born in Edinburgh, and joined Rangers from Whitburn Juniors in 1960.

Willie Henderson is another name familiar to every close follower of the game. He has been capped for Scotland both at outside-right and outside-left, and is noted for his lightning acceleration and adroitness of movement.

He arrived at Ibrox from Caldercruix School in 1960, and for years has been playing havoc with opposing defences.

FROM HIBS

Centre-forward **Colin Stein**, another Scottish international, is one of the outstanding players in British football. He joined Hibernian from Armadale Thistle in 1965, and two seasons ago was the subject of a spectacular transfer move to Rangers.

Another newcomer to Rangers' ranks since their last visit to this ground is **Peter McCloy**, their goal-keeper. The powerfully-built McCloy was signed from Motherwell last season.

He spent six years with Motherwell after first making impact as a youngster with Crosshill Thistle.

Inside-forward **Alex McDonald** is starting his second full season with Rangers. He joined St. Johnstone in 1965, acquired a big reputation with the Perth club, and moved to Rangers two years ago.

Billy Johnston, inside or outside-left, is one of the fastest forwards off

the mark in Scottish football. Yet another Scottish international, Johnston joined Rangers from Lochore Welfare in 1964.

FROM DUNDEE

Andy Penman, who scored Rangers' goal here two years ago, is best described as an inside-forward. He joined Rangers from Dundee early in 1967, and is noted for the power of his shooting. An alternative choice could be **Graham Fyfe**, one of Rangers' younger players who was signed from Ashfield in 1968.

One of Rangers' most versatile players is **Sandy Jardine**—his real name is William—who comes from Edinburgh. He has played in both defensive and attacking positions for Rangers.

Jardine's speed is one of his greatest assets. Recently, he won a big sprint event in Scotland.

Full-back **William Mathieson** grabbed his chance when injury put Davie Provan, the former Rangers defender, on the side-lines. That was three seasons ago, and Mathieson was quick to seize his opportunity. He has a habit, disconcerting to opposing defenders, of forcing his way upfield in the hope of snatching a goal.

Mathieson joined Rangers from a Scottish minor club in 1963.

BROKEN LEG

Wing-half **David Smith** had the bad luck to break a leg last season. This was a terrific blow to both Rangers and Smith himself, and his return to the team can have a big influence on the club's fortunes this season.

Smith joined Aberdeen in 1961, and five years later moved to Rangers. He is the type of player who applies intense concentration to every minute of every match in which he plays.

He has a lethal left foot, and for all-round ability ranks with the best midfield players in British football today.

An alternative choice to Smith is **Alfie Conn**, son of the inside-forward of the same name who played in the

same team for Hearts as Dave Mackay, our old skipper, in the 1950s.

Conn joined Rangers from a minor club in Edinburgh in 1968.

Ronnie MacKinnon, Rangers' centre-half, has been at Ibrox since 1959. He was born in Glasgow, but spent some years in Stornoway. A product of the Dunipace club, he now has a string of international honours to his name.

THE SCOTTISH SCENE FOR 1970-71

THE Scottish football season once again looks as if the Old Firm, Celtic and Rangers, will dominate the scene.

Celtic, Scottish League champions and Scottish League Cup winners for the fifth successive season, are still determined to maintain their place as the No. 1 club under the managership of Jock Stein.

But Rangers, who have now Willie Waddell as their manager, are all out to be the top club in Scotland this season. It will certainly be a stiff challenge for Celtic have established themselves as a great soccer power.

And they are planning to introduce some of their talented youngsters to the team. Already George Connelly and Dave Hay have broken through to the first team pool, and Willie Fernie, the famous Celtic inside-forward, has joined the Parkhead coaching staff with the job of bringing on the young players.

Rangers during the close season appointed Jock Wallace, the former Hearts assistant manager, as their head trainer and coach, and Stan Anderson, Clyde wing-half, as their assistant trainer.

No doubt Aberdeen, winners of the Scottish Cup last season, along with Hearts, Hibs, Dunfermline, Dundee United and Kilmarnock, will be making a bid to challenge Celtic and Rangers.

The breakthrough by Aberdeen last season in winning the Scottish Cup and gaining entrance into the European Cup-Winners' Cup has certainly created a lively interest in the North of Scotland.

The fans will give the Dons every encouragement when they face Honved of Hungary in the First Round of the Cup-Winners' Cup.

At least 11 Scottish First Division clubs will be competing in the four big competitions—European Cup, Cup-Winners' Cup, Fairs Cup and British Cup this season, while Scotland will be hoping to get the breaks in the European Nations Cup.

MAJOR DEALS

Two major deals have taken place in recent months—Steve Murray of Dundee to Aberdeen for £50,000 and Jim Blair, inside-forward of St. Mirren, to Hibs for £40,000. Both players are big investments for their new clubs.

In the Second Division it will be interesting to see how Partick Thistle, relegated for the first time, operate. Partick were one of the teams Tottenham Hotspur played years ago in the Anglo-Scottish Floodlight League. Thistle at one time were the club for the Glasgow neutrals since a large number of their supporters did not want to be associated with either Celtic or Rangers.

However, Partick have lost a large part of their support due to the changing conditions of Scottish football.

And the transfer market in Scotland has also changed. It was a sensation when Tottenham paid a total of £65,000 for goalkeeper Bill Brown of Dundee, wing-half Dave Mackay of Hearts, and inside-forward John White of Falkirk, who played a vital part in taking the Spurs to the top in the early 60s. Now at least one top Scottish player costs £100,000 . . . but the question is—where are they?

Arsenal paid £100,000 for Peter Marinello, Hibs outside-right, and Colin Stein, centre-forward of Hibs, was sold to Rangers for the same fee.

Stein has proved himself to be a six-figure class player, and Rangers are depending a lot on him this season.

An interesting feature of the First Division programme this season will centre around Cowdenbeath, who will be back in the First Division for the first time in 31 years.

Their manager Andy Matthew, is a former Rangers left-winger and has done a tremendous job for the Central Park club.

About Rangers . . .

THE lowest League position occupied by Rangers at the end of any season since the war was fifth in 1965. In that period of time Rangers have carried off the championship on 10 occasions.

★ ★ ★

In all, Rangers have won the Scottish League championship 33 times. To this convincing record can be added their joint success with Dumbarton in 1891. That was the first season of the Scottish League's existence. Rangers and Dumbarton finished with 29 points each. A play-off finished in a 2—2 draw, and the clubs were declared joint holders.

★ ★ ★

Rangers were formed in 1873 . . . as a rowing club! History records that the club members were attracted to football by the sight of youngsters kicking about on the banks of the River Clyde. They switched to football, and laid the foundations of one of the greatest clubs in the world.

★ ★ ★

Rangers finished runners-up in the League last season for the fifth time in succession. Back in pre-war days they won the championship five times running, from 1927 to 1931 inclusive.

★ ★ ★

When Rangers played Red Star (Belgrade) in the Preliminary Round of the European Cup in 1964, the aggregate score after the two matches was 5—5. Rangers won the play-off on Arsenal's ground by 3—1 before a crowd of 34,428.

That was Rangers' last appearance in the European Cup. They were beaten in the quarter-finals by Inter-Milan.

★ ★ ★

Rangers have won the Scottish Cup on no less than 19 occasions. Their biggest margin of victory in the Final tie was by 5—0 against St. Mirren in 1934.

★ ★ ★

There was a time in the early years of Rangers' existence when their chairman kept the club alive with a loan of £30!

★ ★ ★

Can you imagine Rangers in the Semi-final of the F.A. Cup? It happened in 1887, when Rangers lost in the Semi-final by 3—1 to Aston Villa at Crewe. Lincoln City were among the clubs Rangers beat in the earlier rounds.

★ ★ ★

When Rangers won the Scottish League championship in season 1898-99, they gained the maximum 36 points by winning every one of the 18 matches played.

★ ★ ★

In season 1948-49 Rangers pulled off a spectacular treble by winning the League, the Cup and the League Cup.

★ ★ ★

In May, 1953, Spurs played two matches on Rangers' ground against Hibernian in the Coronation Cup.

Kevin was born in Tottenham, but has since lived at Waltham Cross, and has played for Lea Valley Schools.

Danny Clapton, **Gary Mabey** and **Julio Grato** are all forwards. Danny, nephew of the former England and Arsenal winger of the same name, comes from Hackney, and is a Schoolboy international.

Gary was born in Oxford, and played for both Oxford and Oxfordshire County Boys' teams. Julio is another Hackney boy, who has played for the Hackney and Islington Boys' teams.

Know the Game

A player commits one of the offences listed as "Fouls and Misconduct" under Law 12 in his own penalty area against an opponent at a time when the ball is in play in midfield. What decision should be given by the referee?

The decision should be a penalty kick against the offending player's team.

It is clearly laid down under Law 12 that a penalty kick can be awarded irrespective of the position of the ball, if in play, at the time an offence within the penalty area is committed.
