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BREW XI

For the men of the Midlands



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● By word and deed, MIKE BAILEY is rated as one of the most respected skippers in the First Division. Born in Wisbech, he joined Charlton Athletic as a youngster and skippered all their teams. After winning five England Under-23 caps, he won his first full caps against U.S.A. and Wales in 1964 and then had the misfortune to break a leg at Middlesbrough. He recovered well and on March 4, 1966, was transferred to Wolves for £40,000. He made his debut eight days later in the home game with Southampton and later took over the captaincy from Ron Flowers. Mike was a towering inspiration in the promotion run from the Second Division and won the Midland "Footballer Of The Year" award in 1966-67. A member of the F.A. party in the Canadian Centenary celebrations in Montreal, Mike has also played for the Football League XI.



SCENE

FOR the fourth time in little over three years, the vagaries of cup soccer brings together again Wolves and Spurs.

And while we extend a hearty welcome to the men from White Hart Lane, there is scarcely need to remind Molineux regulars of the last occasion the two teams met here on cup business.

It was, of course, seven months ago when a spectacular late goal by **MARTIN CHIVERS** gave Spurs a 2—1 lead in the first leg of the U.E.F.A. Cup Final.

"Big Chiv" had also scored Spurs' first goal, which was equalised by **JIM McCALLIOG** . . . but it was that late Chivers "special" at Molineux which was decisive, for the second leg at White Hart Lane was drawn 1—1.

★

Down there **DAVE WAGSTAFFE** netted a spectacular equaliser after an opportunist goal by Tottenham's former skipper **ALAN MULLERY**, who is now with Fulham. It was, in fact, Mullery's last game for Spurs.

For the first-ever Wolves v Spurs cup encounter one has to go back to the 1921 F.A. Cup Final at Stamford Bridge when **JIMMY DIMMOCK** got the only goal of the game in the 55th minute to win the trophy for Spurs.

Then came a lapse of 48 years before the next cup-tie between the clubs. This was in the fourth round of the F.A. Cup in January, 1969 at White Hart Lane and we made a grand start with **DAVE WAGSTAFFE** giving us a first-half lead. After the interval, however, **NEIL JOHNSON** and a certain **JIMMY GREAVES** turned the game with the goals that gave Spurs a 2—1 win.

★

In the following September — on Wednesday, September 31, 1969, to be precise — came the one and only previous League Cup encounter. Poignancy was added to the occasion by the fact that **PETER KNOWLES** had just announced that he would retire from the game after the following Saturday's game, but a brighter note was struck by the return of **DAVE WAGSTAFFE** for his first game since suffering a knee injury on the opening day of the season.

Appropriately enough it was Peter and Dave who were the stars of a great first-half display by Wolves, with Spurs having to pull out all the stops to limit the score to one goal — scored after eight minutes with a great volley by **JIM McCALLIOG** after Dave Wagstaffe had spreadeagled the visiting defence.

Among many memories of a thrill-packed match are the brilliant backward diving save by **PAT JENNINGS** to tip a cunning lob by **HUGH CURRAN** to safety just before half-time and a fantastic barrage early in the second half when, after Dave Wagstaffe's shot had rebounded off **TONY WANT**, almost every member of the Wolves team seemed to hammer the ball goalwards before it was ultimately cleared.

Not that all the thrills came at the one end, for **PHIL PARKES** made a brilliant save late in the game to turn away **ROGER MORGAN'S** header and almost immediately afterwards only a brilliant tackle by **FRANK MUNRO** overhauled the same player as he made tracks for the equaliser.

Two other players also deserve a mention — **JOHN PRATT** made his first appearance at Molineux, where he has since distinguished himself, when he substituted for **MARTIN CHIVERS** in the last 15 minutes; and **DEREK DOUGAN**, who had been given a suspended sentence two days earlier, earned everyone's admiration for the way he refused to be lured into retaliation even though receiving some rough treatment at times.

Super Spurs . . . your A.B.C. guide

BEAL, Phil (defender): Phil was born at Godstone in Surrey and is Spurs' longest serving player, but he had to wait almost 11 years before gaining his first senior trophy as a member of the League Cup-winning team of 1970-71. He graduated to full professional status in January, 1962. Made his debut away to Aston Villa in September, 1963.

CHIVERS, Martin (forward): Born at Southampton, and played for Southampton and Hampshire Boys. Turned professional with Southampton, and made his League debut in the Second Division in 1962-63. Joined Spurs from Southampton in January, 1968, and scored the winning goal in his debut on Sheffield Wednesday's ground a few days later. Scorer of both goals in Spurs' 2-0 League Cup Final victory at Wembley in 1970-71. A Full England international.

COATES, Ralph (forward): Transferred from Burnley to Spurs on May 6, 1971. Born at Hetton-le-Hole, County Durham, and was playing as a striker for Hetton Juniors when spotted by Burnley. Developed into an outstanding midfield player in Burnley's Youth team, and made his League debut against Sheffield United in December, 1964. Gained eight Under-23 caps, and has since made four appearances in the full England team.

ENGLAND, Mike (defender): Born at Greenfield, near Holywell in North Wales. Was an inside-forward at school in Holywell, and joined Blackburn Rovers as a 15-year-old ground-staff boy. Before settling at centre-half he filled various other positions. Joined Spurs from Blackburn in August, 1966.

EVANS, Ray (defender): A product of Edmonton Schools football, Ray first signed for Spurs as an apprentice professional in July, 1965, becoming a full professional in May, 1967. Represented England Youth on several occasions in season 1967-68. Made his League debut away to Arsenal in March, 1969.

GILZEAN, Alan (forward): Comes from Coupar Angus in Perthshire, and joined Spurs from Dundee in December, 1964. The Scottish First Division club spotted Alan when he was playing for Coupar Angus Juveniles. Army service took him to Aldershot, where with Dundee's agreement he played for the local side. His first cap for Scotland was gained against Norway in season 1962-63.

JENNINGS, Pat (goalkeeper): Joined Spurs from Watford in June, 1964, and has been first choice for the last six seasons. Born at Newry in Northern Ireland, and spent half a season with the Newry Town club. Selection for the Irish Youth team in a tournament at Bognor Regis

brought him to the notice of Watford. Pat won his first full cap for Ireland against Wales at Swansea in April, 1964 when he was 18.

KINNEAR, Joe (defender): Born in Dublin, but has lived in Watford since he was seven years of age. Joined Spurs as an amateur in August, 1963, after playing for St. Albans City, and signed as a professional in February, 1965. Made his League debut at home to West Ham United in April, 1966.

KNOWLES, Cyril (defender): Comes from Fitzwilliam, a mining village three miles from Pontefract in Yorkshire. Joined Spurs from Middlesbrough in May, 1964. After playing for the South Elmsall District Boys team, Cyril spent a season with Manchester United, returned home to play for the local Hemsworth club, and then joined Wolves' nursery. Originally a left-winger, he switched to full-back at Middlesbrough and has since stayed in that position.

NAYLOR, Terry (defender): Born at Islington and played for Islington Boys. Trained for a while with Arsenal and also had a brief association with Millwall before joining Spurs on trial. After service as an amateur, signed professional forms in July, 1969. Terry made his League debut at West Bromwich at Easter, 1970.

PEARCE, Jimmy (forward): A product of local schools football in Tottenham and a former Schoolboy International. After leaving school, Jimmy joined Spurs as an apprentice professional in May, 1963, and he reached full professional status two years later. Made his League debut against Arsenal on the opening day of season 1968-69.

PERRYMAN, Steve (midfield): Born at Ealing and played for Middlesex, London, and England Boys teams. Joined Spurs as an apprentice professional in July, 1967, and was upgraded to full professional in January, 1969. Made his League debut against Sunderland in 1969.

PETERS, Martin (midfield): Joined Spurs from West Ham United in March, 1970. Born at Plaistow, but attended the Fanshawe School in Dagenham, and played for Dagenham Boys. Graduated to Schoolboy International status and also played for London and Essex. Made his League debut for West Ham in 1962 and his first appearance for Spurs in the home match against Coventry City a few days after joining the club. Has gained many top representative honours.

PRATT, John (midfield): Born at Hackney and attended Clark's College, Enfield. Played for the London F.A. Boys team, and spent a year in Brentford's Youth side. Joined Spurs as an amateur, and signed as a full professional in November, 1965. Made his League debut at Arsenal in March, 1969.

TALK

Introduced by **ALAN WILLIAMS** (*Daily Express*)



NO ONE would dispute the fact that the Football League Cup gained a new stature once it was decided that the Final should be played at Wembley.

While, maybe, the Spring setting does not possess quite the same atmosphere of a Maytime F.A. Cup Final, the important factor is that far more genuine fans can watch the match.

But I always think there is great satisfaction in even playing at Wembley, whereas defeat in a semi-final always has a cruel finality. So near and yet so far.

Over the years the two-legged semi-finals have produced some tremendous matches — particularly since Wembley became the target for the winners starting in 1967.

Take 1967 for instance and first I recall the great 4—1 success of Third Division leaders **Queen's Park Rangers** over **Birmingham City** at St. Andrews.

Birmingham have always felt that their cup record and savage support enabled them to stride out for home ties fearing no side in the land. Birmingham in fact took a third minute lead through **BARRY BRIDGES**, but failed to get firm command and ten minutes after half-time Rangers sounded their first warning with a brilliant equaliser by **RODNEY MARSH**, who that same morning had been fined £25 following three bookings.

This was Rangers 100th goal of a memorable season, Marsh's 34th, and from then onwards the Londoners confidence increased, while Birmingham slipped into one embarrassing tangle after another.

ROGER MORGAN, **MARK LAZARUS** and **LES ALLEN** completed a most convincing win and in the second leg Rangers never had to touch the form of their second half at St. Andrews but they won 3—1 without any real trouble.

In the other semi-final the Midlands had much greater success with **Albion** gaining a first-leg lead at The Hawthorns and then drawing 2—2 in a splendid match at West Ham.

So Albion became firm favourites to become the first Wembley winners of the League Cup and everything seemed perfect as they gained a 2—0 lead through first half goals by **CLIVE CLARK**. But then inspired by Marsh, Rangers steadily took command and won 3—2.

The following year the Midlands were back in the semi-finals in the shape of **Derby County**, but despite two brave battles they lost on a 4—2 aggregate to the eventual winners, **Leeds United**.

No Midland interest in 1969, but the semi-finals were memorable for tough games between **Spurs** and **Arsenal** and a wonderful play off between **Burnley** and **Swindon** at The Hawthorns.

It was the same day as the launching of the new **Aston Villa** regime, but Swindon's extra-time triumph eventually swept even **TOMMY DOCHERTY'S** arrival out of the main headlines.

Maybe it was the fact that they had overcome such setbacks in the semi-final that gave Swindon the extra confidence to go on and master Arsenal 3—1 in the Final.

The next year saw Albion through to Wembley again, disposing of **Carlisle** without any great trouble in the semi-final. They lost 1—0 at Carlisle, but powered through 4—1 in the return. But it was the other semi-final that captivated me. **Manchester United** and **Manchester City**.

City won the first leg 2—1 but most critics felt United would be capable of reaching Wembley. Albion were already through to the final and I went North with an open mind. But City, despite a brilliant second half by **GEORGE BEST**, left no doubts about their position as the new masters of the Mancunian soccer scene. They thoroughly deserved their 2—2 draw and I wrote "City's success was a victory for teamwork over wayward individualism and United can have no real complaints."

In the Final, **MIKE DOYLE** and **GLYN PARDOE** helped City to a 2—1 win and Albion, like United, could have no complaints.

It was back to Old Trafford the following season for another epic semi-final with **Aston Villa** staggering everyone by holding the First Division side to a 1—1 draw in the first leg. It was no fluke and Villa won the return 2—1 to become the third side from the Third Division to reach a Wembley League Cup Final. Their opponents were **Spurs**.

Final saw Villa play with great heart, but their failure to snap up chances in the first hour was punished as **MARTIN CHIVERS** rapped two goals in the closing stages and take the cup to White Hart Lane.

Some people felt that Villa's League Cup interests sapped much of their promotion strength, but I prefer to feel that it did the club and the Midland public a tremendous amount of good.

Last season it was **Stoke City's** turn to carry the Midland banner into the semi-finals and then to Wembley after four tremendous games with **West Ham**.

It was in the second game at West Ham that **GORDON BANKS** made one of the greatest saves of his career from a penalty by **GEOFF HURST**. The scores in the four games were, Stoke at home first, 1—2, 1—0, 0—0, 3—2.

Then on March 4 goals by **TERRY CONROY** and **GEORGE EASTHAM** enabled Stoke to win a major prize for the first time in 108 years.

Now it is up to Wolves to keep the trophy in the Midlands and so earn the right to take their place in the grand arena of European soccer next season.

SECOND LEG AT TOTTENHAM...

THE second leg of the semi-final is provisionally arranged at White Hart Lane for **MONDAY, JANUARY 1st** (kick-off 7.30 p.m.).

If you are planning to travel down to London by road, here is the recommended Automobile Association route:

FOLLOW signs **Walsall A454** to leave by Horseley Fields to Willenhall and then onto **Motorway M6** (signs Birmingham). Keep to right-hand lanes (signs London M1) past service area at Corley to join **M1**.

Continue on **M1** past service areas at Watford Gap, Newport Pagnell, Toddington and Scratchwood to end of motorway. Join **A1**, keep to left-hand lanes following signs City to join **North Circular Road A406** to Henlys Corner, Manor Cottage Tavern, Palmers Green and the Cambridge PH. At roundabout take third exit into **Silver Street** to Edmonton. Follow **Fore Street** southwards **A1010** forward into **High Road** to Tottenham's ground on the left.

Ramsey's full England squad.
