SEMI-FINALS AHEAD

WE have no need to emphasise the importance of tonight's fifth round Football League Cup-tie with Doncaster Rovers. The winners of this match will qualify for the semi-finals, and at that stage the twin towers of Wembley become more than a mirage.

We extend a hearty welcome to the officials, players and supporters of Doncaster, who have never previously visited this ground for a cup-tie. Their last visit, referred to in some detail on page 12 was in fact for a League match as long ago as 1947.

Doncaster stand seventh in the Fourth Division, and judged by the book of form, Spurs should emerge winners tonight. In cup-ties, however, we all know what can happen to the book of form, and Doncaster will be all out to pull off a shock result.

The other three ties in tonight's quarter-finals are Burnley v. Middlesbrough, Manchester City v. Mansfield Town and Newcastle United v. Notts County. **If tonight's match ends in a draw, the replay will be at Doncaster next Tuesday, December 9th, kick-off 7.30 p.m.**

In Saturday's programme for Burnley's visit, we stressed the need for a win. Well, as all our supporters know, we managed it by 2-1, but the events of the day gave us no cause to jump for joy.

As Burnley had already brought on their substitute in the first half, the departure through injury of Willie Morgan just after half-time left them with only 10 players. It was hard luck for Burnley, whose Ray Hankin had given them a first half lead, and also to their credit that they finished losers by only the odd goal.

It was a relief to us when John Duncan equalised from John Pratt's left-wing corner, and our Scottish striker was well placed to head the winner from Terry Naylor's accurate cross midway through the second half.

It was a laboured win against a handicapped team, and there is little doubt that our players were feeling some reaction from that lengthy and demanding struggle against West Ham United in the League Cup earlier last week.

The team against Burnley was Jennings; Naylor, Knowles, Pratt, Young, Osgood, Coates, Perryman, Duncan, Jones and Neighbour (sub. McNab.)

TONIGHT'S REFEREE



MR. DENIS TURNER of Cannock graduated through the Cannock Youth, Staffordshire County and West Midland Leagues before his appointment to the Football League List.

He refereed the last Amateur Cup final at Wembley in 1974 and has officiated in Italy. He was a linesman in the Wales v. Ireland international match in 1972 and in a European Cup match in Malta in 1968.

Employed as a mines safety engineer, he is a keen cricketer and also enjoys swimming.

Mr. Turner has refereed a number of colourful F.A. Cup clashes between League and non-League clubs. He was in charge of the Hereford v. Newcastle tie in 1973, the Derby v. Boston game in 1974 and last season's clash between Leeds and Wimbledon.

YOUNG SPUR...

GARRY BACON, our midfield reserve player, made his Football Combination debut in our final match away to Ipswich Town last season. This season he has been a regular member of the Combination team.

Garry was born in Dagenham and still lives there. He attended the local Parsloes Manor School, and played in the Barking Boys team.

Fulham, Queen's Park Rangers and West Ham United were all interested in Bacon, but he assures us he was a Spurs supporter in his schooldays, and was glad of the chance to sign for us as an apprentice professional in July, 1972.

He was upgraded to full status last May.

Garry's interests outside football are angling and keeping rabbits. He is a member of the Dagenham Cables Angling Club, and likes nothing better than to spend Sunday on the river bank. Not surprisingly, he is known to his team-mates as "Streaky"!



NOTHING NEW

A cup-tie against Spurs is nothing new to Mr. Stan Anderson, the Doncaster manager.

He was Middlesbrough's manager when we met the north-eastern club in the League Cup in 1972. That tie went to three matches, and then we won only in extra time.

Stan will also recall playing left-half in the Sunderland team beaten 5-0 here by Spurs in the sixth-round F.A. Cup replay of 1961. He was also in the Middlesbrough team beaten here in the third round of the F.A. Cup in 1966.

LANDMARK FOR CYRIL



Congratulations to Cyril Knowles, who made his 400th Football League appearance for Spurs in the match against Burnley on Saturday.

It's a tremendous record, and only one of those 400 League appearances was as a substitute. Not many of our supporters are likely to recall the occasion when Cyril came on as a sub. It was away to Manchester City in October, 1968. In the second half Mike England went off with an ankle injury, Cyril coming in on the left with Tony Want moving to the centre. We lost that match 4-0.

That's Cyril's Spurs record in the League alone. He has also played in 104 major cup-ties, made up as follows:

In the earlier rounds of this season's League Cup, Doncaster defeated Grimsby Town (3-1) at home; Crystal Palace (2-1) at home; Torquay United (3-0) in a home replay after drawing 1-1 at Torquay; and Hull City (2-1) also at home.

introducing... **our visitors** **DONCASTER ROVERS**



Although **DONCASTER ROVERS** were knocked out of the F.A. Cup in the first round at Bury last month, this is proving an exciting season for them. They are in the running for promotion from the Fourth Division and had never previously progressed beyond the third round of the League Cup. As their final position in the League last season was 17th, it is clear they have made good progress. At the end of season 1973-74, Doncaster were forced to apply for re-election to the League, but there was a time when the Yorkshire club held a respected place in the Second Division. Rovers won the championship of the old Third Division (North) in 1950 and spent the following eight seasons in Division 2. During that span of years their highest position at the end of any season was 11th in

1950-51. That was by no means Doncaster's only experience of Division 2. They had spent one other post-war season, 1947-48, in the Second Division, and between the two wars they had a two-season spell in that section of the League between 1935 and 1937. Doncaster were, in fact, members of the Football League before Spurs. In 1901, Doncaster were accepted into the Second Division of the Football League. Two years later they failed to gain re-election, but came back for the solitary season of 1904-05. It was a dismal return. They finished with only 8 points and didn't even seek re-election! They switched to the Midland League, and stayed outside the national competition until elected to the Third Division (North) in 1923.

THE DONCASTER PLAYERS

Doncaster's goalkeeper is **DENNIS PEACOCK**, who was signed from Nottingham Forest late in August. Ideally built for the position, Peacock had Second Division experience with Forest. He was born at Lincoln, and during his Forest days had a spell on loan to Walsall.

The back four tonight are likely to comprise **STEVE REED**, **STEVE UZELAC**, **STAN BROOKES** and **FRED ROBINSON**.

Of these players Robinson is the newest to the ranks of Doncaster. Born in Rotherham, he left Rotherham United for Doncaster in July.

Reed is a product of the apprentice ranks at Doncaster. He was born in the Yorkshire town, and has been on a full professional contract since January, 1974.

Uzelac also was born in Doncaster. It was in June, 1971 that he signed as a professional for the club, and he was a regular first-team player in his first season at Belle Vue.

Brookes, who can also play in mid-field, is another experienced Doncaster player. He is another local discovery who developed through the apprentice ranks. He made his League debut in season 1971-72.

LES CHAPPELL, **ALAN MURRAY** and **CHRIS BALDERSTONE** are mid-field players.

Chappell has moved around quite a bit. A Nottingham man, he established himself as a League player with Rotherham United, and later had a spell with Blackburn Rovers. He next played for Reading, who transferred him to Doncaster last December.

Murray is a former London player. He was a regular member of Brentford's League team when they were in the Third Division in season 1972-73. Murray was born at Newcastle and has also played for Middlesbrough and York City (on loan). He signed for Doncaster in the summer of 1973 after

Brentford had given him a free transfer. Balderstone is the Leicestershire County cricketer, who was given a free transfer by Carlisle United at the end of last season.

Only last season he played against us in the First Division for Carlisle both here and at Brunton Park. It was, in fact, Balderstone's twice-taken penalty kick that cost us the points at Carlisle.

Pat Jennings saved his first kick but Referee Roy Cahey decided our goalkeeper had moved too soon. Balderstone made no mistake the second time.

He also played against us in the F.A. Cup both in 1971 and 1972. Born in Huddersfield, he started his career with Huddersfield Town.

Doncaster's strikers are **BRENDAN O'CALLAGHAN**, **IAN MILLER** and **PETER KITCHEN**.

O'Callaghan is the highest scorer in the four divisions with 18 League and Cup goals. He was born at Bradford, and Doncaster snapped him up as a schoolboy. He signed as a professional for Rovers in July, 1973.

Miller joined Doncaster from Nottingham Forest on the same day as Peacock in August. He is a Scot from Perth who played for Bury before joining Forest.

Kitchen was born at neighbouring Mexborough and can therefore be described as a local. He has been a professional at Belle Vue since July, 1970 and is a product of the Don and Dearne Boys team.

WE'VE MET BEFORE . . .

THE match this evening is not the first cup-tie between Spurs and Doncaster Rovers. Many of our supporters will remember that we were drawn away to the Yorkshire club in the fifth round of the F.A. Cup in 1956.

Doncaster were then in the Second Division and Spurs were among the lowly clubs of the First Division at the time of the game. It was therefore quite a test for the Spurs team of that time, but we pulled through by a winning margin of 2-0.

It took Spurs only three and a half minutes to seize the lead that day at Belle Vue. The scorer was **BOBBY SMITH**, who put the finishing touch to a fine move with a good shot.

Ten minutes later Spurs scored again. A combined move on the left between Smith and George Robb created the opening that enabled **JOHNNY BROOKS** to score our second.

Doncaster fought back well, and had a lot of the second-half play. On one occasion Ron Reynolds, Spurs' goalkeeper, was out of position, and Mel Hopkins managed to clear off the goal-line.

Spurs may well have had more goals that day. Tony Marchi hit the post and Robb was only robbed of a goal by a fine save by Harry Gregg, the former Northern Ireland goalkeeper, who now manages Crewe Alexandra, our victims in this season's third round of the League Cup.

The teams at Doncaster that day will revive some memories. Here they are—**Doncaster**: Gregg; Makepeace, Graham; Kilkenny, Williams, Teasdale; Mooney, Jeffrey, McMorran, Tindill and Walker. **Spurs**: Reynolds; Norman, Hopkins; Blanchflower, Clarke, Marchi; Harmer, Brooks, Duquemin, Smith and Robb.

Look who played centre-half for Doncaster in direct opposition to Len Duquemin. None other than Charlie Williams, who has since made greater fame as a comedian.

Len, who will be in his usual seat in H Block of the West Stand tonight, tells us he remembers that game well . . . but he cannot recall Charlie calling him "old flower"!

By the way Len still runs his newsagent, tobacconist and confectionery shop at the High Road end of Northumberland Park.

DISRUPTED BY INJURIES

In League football Spurs and Doncaster have met six times at Second Division level. The last occasion was at Belle Vue in February, 1948. The match was drawn 1-1, and it was a good performance by a Spurs team seriously disrupted by injuries.

Ronnie Burgess, our left-half and captain, left the field injured in the first half, and there were, of course, no substitutes in those days. He did, in fact, return to hobble out the game at outside-left.

Early in the second half Horace Woodward, our centre-half, also became a casualty and limped the match out on the right wing with Bill Nicholson moving from right-half to the middle of our defence.

Doncaster took the lead in the second half, but the gallant Woodward shuffled into the centre to head the equaliser two minutes from time.

Early that season Doncaster paid what was their last visit to this ground. It was a September Saturday, and the gate of 46,011 was the biggest of the day in the Second Division.

Spurs finished winners by 2-0, inside-right **JOHNNY JORDAN** scoring a goal in each half. Doncaster had a star centre-forward of the same surname in their team that day. Clarie Jordan, who had scored 41 goals in Doncaster's Third Division (North) championship team the previous season, led their attack.

A few facts about the four pre-war League matches between the teams may interest our older supporters.

The first-ever League match between Spurs and Doncaster was at Belle Vue in December, 1935. Doncaster won 2-1 and knocked Spurs off the top of the

Second Division. All three goals were scored in the second half, **JOHNNY MORRISON** netting for Spurs. The return match was on Cup Final day at the end of April. Spurs won 3-1, **JOE MEEK** 2 and **ANDY DUNCAN** scoring the goals.

In the following season Spurs won at home 2-0 and drew 1-1 at Belle Vue. In the match here **GEORGE HUNT** scored a first-half goal and **JIMMY MCCORMICK** was on the target in the second half. Doncaster's inside-left that day was Albert Malam, father of Colin Malam, the *Sunday Telegraph* football writer.

Take the first exit—Prince of Wales Road—and continue to the junction with the **B.6388** and **B.6054**. Turn right on to the **B.6388**—Gleadless Road—and continue to the end. Turn right and continue to Queen's Road and then take the second on the left—Bramall Lane. The ground is on the right.

There is parking space available near the ground but the police control street parking so watch for any special signs, including diversions. The approximate distance from the Tottenham area is 160 miles.
