COMMENT

Four weeks ago today we played Wolverhampton Wanderers in the Fourth Round of the F.A. Cup. This afternoon they are again our visitors, this time in a League match, and once more we extend to their officials, players and supporters a cordial welcome to White Hart Lane.

Wolves always provide attractive opposition, and we can expect a stern tussle with the men from Molineux this afternoon. It is no test of memory to recall the hard struggle we had to finish winners over Wolves in the Cup, and we could not complain at our defeat by two clear goals at Wolverhampton in December.

Wolves have been under the management of Mr. Bill McGarry since November, and with their Cup interests for the season ended, he is urging his team to finish in the highest possible position in the League.

Our own Cup interests are, of course, still very much alive, but we are still eager to finish the season in a sound League position. There should, therefore, be no mid-table apathy attaching to the match today.

NO WIN

Since the Cup-tie here last month, Wolves have played three League matches, and have failed to win any of them. Their first match after the Cup knock-out was away to Everton, where they lost 0-4.

Wolves' last two matches, both at Molineux, have ended all square. They drew 1-1 with Burnley, and last Saturday were held to a 2-2 draw by Manchester United, Against United, Wolves were winning 2-0 at half-time, but the Manchester team scored twice after the break.

Top scorer for Wolves is Derek Dougan, who has nine League goals to his credit this season. He has also scored three times in Cup matches.

The rest of Wolves' goals have been scored by Frank Wignall and Peter Knowles 7 each: John Farrington 4: Mike Bailey and David Wagstaffe 3 each; Mike Kenning and Frank Munro 2 each; and Hugh Curran 1.

Frank Wignall, who played part of the second half as substitute against us in the Cup, has since been transferred to Derby.

MAN IN CHARGE

Referee for today is Mr. Tom Dawes of Norwich, who ranks with the most experienced officials in football.

Mr. Dawes is, in fact, in his 11th season on the Football League List. His path to the top as a referee was via the East Anglian and Eastern Counties Leagues.

In his younger days Mr. Dawes played in good-class amateur football himself. He served in the R.A.F., and it was an injury sustained in a Service match that put an end to his activities as a player.

Mr. Dawes has refereed many big games in the F.A. Cup, and has also officiated in the European Cup. He is employed as a sales representative.

His last match on this ground was the occasion of Manchester City's visit in February, 1967, Last Saturday he refereed the League match between Arsenal and Burnley at Highbury.

SEMI-FINAL

We hope a good crowd will be here on Wednesday evening next for the second leg of our Football Combination Cup Semi-final with Southampton Reserves.

We were beaten in the first leg at Southampton by 2—0 in December, and therefore start at a disadvantage. It should not be beyond our second string, however, to wipe out the arrears and score the extra goal to qualify for the Final, in which we would meet West Ham United or Cardiff City, the other Semi-finalists.

West Ham have already won the home leg by 4—0, and should therefore reach the Final.

Spurs have done well in the Combination Cup since the competition was revived two seasons ago. We were joint winners of the trophy with Leicester City in 1966-67, and last season were defeated by only an odd goal in the double-leg Final by Arsenal.

PEN PICTURES OF WOLVES . . .

PHIL PARKES (Goalkeeper). A lastline defender of powerful physique. Born at West Bromwich, but joined Wolves as a junior, and developed steadily through the club nursery system. Made his League debut for Wolves in the Second Division during season 1966–67.

DEREK PARKIN (Right-back). Signed from Huddersfield Town in February, 1968. Comes from Newcastle-upon-Tyne, and was snapped up by Huddersfield as a young amateur. Made his League debut for Huddersfield in season 1964–65.

BOBBY THOMSON (Left-back). Born in Birmingham, and has played for no other League club. A full English international who developed through Wolves' junior ranks. Has made more appearances for the club than any other player on the books.

GERALD TAYLOR (Full-back). Born at Hull, but developed through Wolves' nursery system. Made his League debut in the Second Division with Wolves in season 1966-67, and has since had plenty of experience in Division 1.

MIKE BAILEY (Right-half). Captain of Wolves, and a full English international. Born at Wisbech, and was spotted by Charlton Athletic at a young age. Moved from Charlton to Wolves in March, 1966. Made his League debut with Charlton in season 1960–61.

JOHN HOLSGROVE (Centre-half). Was an amateur with Spurs in season 1962-63, when he played for us both in the Eastern Counties and S.E. Counties Leagues. Also had a spell on Arsenal's books. Born at Southwark, but brought up at Lambeth, and played for South London Boys. Turned professional with Crystal Palace, and moved to Wolves in May, 1965.

LES WILSON (Left-half). Born in Manchester, but emigrated to Canada for a time. After his return to England he arrived at Wolverhampton on trial at the start of season 1963–64. Signed as a professional in September, 1964, and made his League debut at Middlesbrough in December, 1965.

FRANK MUNRO (Half-back). A Scot from Arbroath, who was a young-ster on the books of Chelsea when Terry Venables was at Stamford Bridge. Returned to Scotland to play for Dundee United, and later signed for Aberdeen. Wolves secured his transfer from Aberdeen in January, 1968.

MIKE KENNING (Outside-right). A player with plenty of experience with other clubs. Started his career with Aston Villa, but made his first real impact with Shrewsbury Town. Transferred to Charlton Athletic, and later joined Norwich City. Left Norwich for Wolves in January, 1968. Born in Birmingham.

JOHN FARRINGTON (Winger). Comes from Lynemouth in the Northeast, and joined Wolves straight from school. Signed as a full professional for Wolves in June, 1965.

PETER KNOWLES (Inside-forward). Younger brother of our own Cyril Knowles, and a product of Wolves' nursery at Wath in Yorkshire. Turned professional for Wolves in October, 1962, and made his League debut against Leicester City 12 months later.

DEREK DOUGAN (Centre-forward). Born in Belfast, and started his career with Belfast Distillery. A full Irish international, he played for Portsmouth, Blackburn Rovers, Aston Villa, Peterborough United and Leicester before joining Wolves in March, 1967.

HUGH CURRAN (Inside-forward). A newcomer to Wolves since their visit last month in the F.A. Cup. Born in Glasgow, and made his first big move up the soccer ladder when transferred from Corby Town to Millwall in March, 1964. Norwich City signed him from the Lions during season 1965–66. Wolves signed him from Norwich on the strength of his goalscoring reputation.

DAVID WAGSTAFFE (Winger). Born in Manchester, and made his name with Manchester City. Developed through City's junior ranks, and made his senior debut at 17. Left the Manchester club for Wolves in December, 1964.
