FOURTH MEETING

A LOT has happened since our last first-team home match against Manchester United three weeks ago. We have suffered the acute disappointment of a double knock-out from the F.A. and Football League Cups, but can look back with pride on last Saturday's 2-1 win at Ipswich in the League.

After the two previous matches at Newcastle and Stoke, it was just the result we needed to put everyone in the right mood for today's big test against West Ham, to whose officials, players and supporters we extend our usual cordial welcome.

We meet the Hammers for the fourth time this season. A single goal left us beaten in the League match at Upton Park last August, and there were, of course, the two tense games between the teams in the Fourth Round of the League Cup.

After the goalless draw on this ground, Spurs won the replay with extra-time goals from John Duncan and Willie Young. Now our sole concern is improving our League position, and the players know what is expected of them today.

FINE GOAL

RALPH COATES scored a fine early goal at Ipswich in a match in which Steve Walford made his first full League appearance. Steve gave an impressive performance, and Mike Stead, who stood by as substitute for the first time, was also delighted to be with the winning party in spite of the fact that he was not called into service.

Spurs played well on a difficult surface and well deserved both points. **KEITH OSGOOD** rammed home our second goal from the penalty spot in the 83rd minute after goalkeeper Paul Cooper had brought down Chris Jones following a good move by Duncan and Coates. David Johnson scrambled a consolation goal for Ipswich in the 86th minute following a left-wing corner.

Once more we thank our large body of away followers for their support at Ipswich. Their presence is a great encouragement to the players, and it is not unconnected with our good away record.

It speaks volumes for the loyalty of our travelling supporters that they should have turned out on such a bitterly cold day so soon after the disappointments, and indeed expense, of the trips to Newcastle and Stoke. The team at Ipswich was Jennings; Walford, McAllister, Pratt, Young, Osgood, Coates, Perryman, Duncan, Jones and Neighbour.

YOUTH HONOURS



Terry Boyle

We are well represented in the qualifying round match between Wales and England on Cardiff City's ground next Wednesday in the 29th International Youth Tournament of U.E.F.A.

Both **GLENN HODDLE** and **STEVE WALFORD** are in the England squad, and **TERRY BOYLE** is among the players named for Wales.

Steve was in our first team last Saturday and Glenn has appeared in the First Division side this season as a substitute, but Terry has been a full contract player only since November.

Terry comes from Llanelli and his family and several friends will be making the 60-mile journey to Cardiff for the match.

We expect all three to be included in their respective teams, and hope they all give a good account of themselves. Glenn has already made a number of appearances for England Youth.

FULL STATUS

STEVE CAVANAGH, who played in our Combination defence last Saturday, has been upgraded from apprentice to full contract status. It was Steve's third Combination appearance this season. He comes from Hackney and played for Hackney and Middlesex Boys before joining us as an apprentice in July, 1974. We wish him every success.

LANDMARK

The match at Ipswich last Saturday was a landmark in the career of **JIMMY NEIGHBOUR**. He was making his hundredth League appearance, although that figure includes 15 as substitute.

HARRY SKITT

It was with very deep regret that we learned of the death last week of **HARRY SKITT**, a skilful and popular half-back, who was a first-team player for Spurs from 1924 until 1931.

Harry, a Staffordshire man, was one of the first players to emerge from our old Northfleet nursery, and in the course of his time with Spurs, he made 212 appearances in the League alone.

After leaving us in 1931, he joined Chester and played regularly for them in the old Third Division (North).

Harry, who was 74, was a publican in Staffordshire for several years, but was living at Hamworthy, Poole, until his admission to St. Leonards Hospital, Ringwood, towards the end of last year.

We offer our sincere condolences to his widow and family.



STILL PLAYING

JOHNNY BROOKS, our former English international inside-forward, was here for the first time in a long while for our match with Manchester United. Johnny lives at Stevenage, and in addition to coaching work with Letchworth, the Athenian League club, he still enjoys a game in local Sunday football.

HOME AGAIN . . . Next Saturday we stage another London "derby" against Queen's Park Rangers . . . When we played them at Shepherd's Bush in November, the result was a 0-0 draw . . . When Rangers were here last season, they defeated us 2-1, John Duncan scoring our goal . . . Rangers have won two away League matches this season, at Derby and Aston Villa . . . Their win at Villa Park last Saturday was by 2-0 . . . The match with Rangers will be refereed by Mr. Les Hayes from Doncaster.

The Reserves were dealt a late blow by West Ham United in the Football Combination match here last Saturday. A goal in the closing seconds left us beaten 2—1 after **MARTIN ROBINSON** had put us in front with a good goal in the opening minutes.

West Ham equalised late in the first half, but Spurs should have had the game won by half-time. Robinson hit the woodwork, Chris McGrath had one effort kicked off the goal-line and two chances fell to Gerry Armstrong.

The Youth team made short work of Crystal Palace in the South East Counties League, Division 1 at Cheshunt last Saturday. On these centre pages we expressed the view when **WEST HAM UNITED** were here in the League Cup in November that there was a strong likelihood that the East Londoners would finish this season in a higher position in the First Division than the final 13th placing they occupied at the end of 1974-75. As the Hammers were, in fact, on top of the table at the time of that match, we were not exactly blinding them with flattery! It happens, however, that the Hammers have slipped quite a bit since November, and their prospects of winning the Football

League championship have receded. Nevertheless, the likelihood we indicated of a higher final position than last season for the Hammers has become a strong probability with most of the League season now in the past. West Ham's highest-ever final placing in the First Division is sixth, a position in which they finished in 1927, 1959 and 1973. As they stand sixth at present, this could easily prove their best-ever League season. West Ham were elected to the League in 1919. They won promotion to Division 1 in 1923, slipped back to Division 2 in 1932, and regained premier status in 1958.

MERVYN DAY (Goalkeeper). Played for the England Under-23s against Portugal on the Crystal Palace ground in November. Born at Chelmsford and as a schoolboy played for the Chelmsford and Essex teams. Played for England Youth, and emerged through West Ham's apprentice ranks.

JOHN McDOWELL (Defender). Born at East Ham and as a schoolboy played for the Newham and Essex teams. A former Youth international who has also made several appearances for the England Under-23 team. Has been a full professional since August, 1969.

KEITH COLEMAN (Defender). Born at Newcastle-upon-Tyne, and started in League football with Sunderland. Played on loan with West Ham for a time before his transfer was completed in September, 1973. Played for Durham County in his schooldays.

TOMMY TAYLOR (Defender). Born at Hornchurch and made his name with Orient. Left Leyton for the Hammers in October, 1970 and made his First Division debut against Spurs in that month at Upton Park. Made several appearances for the England Under-23 team.

KEVIN LOCK (Defender). Was named as a substitute for the full England team against Portugal in Lisbon in November. Born at Plaistow and played for the Newham and Essex Boys teams before joining the apprentice ranks at West Ham. An England Under-23 player.

FRANK LAMPARD (Defender). A full England international. Born in West Ham and another product of the apprentice system at Upton Park. A former Youth international who also played for the Under-23s, he has been a full professional since September, 1965.

PAT HOLLAND (Midfield). Yet another of West Ham's home products. Born at Poplar and played for East London Boys. Was also a trialist for London Boys. Came through the Hammers' apprentice ranks and has been a full professional since April, 1969.

TREVOR BROOKING (Midfield). A current English international who was in the team against Portugal in November. Another local who was born at Barking, and attained schoolboy international rank. Has been a full professional since May, 1966.

GRAHAM PADDON (Midfield). Born in Manchester and joined Coventry City as a young apprentice. Made his League debut with Coventry, later moving to Norwich City. Left Norwich for West Ham in December, 1973. Was a member of West Ham's F.A. Cup-winning team last season.

BILLY JENNINGS (Forward). Born at Hackney, where he attended Upton House School. Was a regular member of the Hackney Boys team, and for three months reported twice weekly for evening training sessions here at White Hart Lane. Turned professional with Watford, and left the Hertfordshire club for West Ham in September, 1974.

ALAN TAYLOR (Forward). Scored the two goals that enabled the Hammers to defeat Fulham in last season's F.A. Cup final. Signed from Rochdale in November, 1974. Born at Lancaster and first appeared in League football for Rochdale against Brighton and Hove Albion in the Third Division in August, 1973.

KEITH ROBSON (Forward). Born at Hetton-le-Hole in County Durham and established himself as a League player with Newcastle United. Left Newcastle for West Ham in September, 1974 and played his first senior game for the East Londoners in a replayed second-round Football League Cup-tie against Tranmere Rovers at Upton Park in that same month.

JOHN AYRIS (Forward). Born at Wapping and played for East London Boys. Has been a full professional since October, 1970. Made several appearances in the England Youth team. His League debut was at home to Burnley in October, 1970.

YILMAZ ORHAN (Forward). Made his first-team debut against Queen's Park Rangers at Upton Park a fortnight ago and played against Liverpool last Saturday. A Turkish Cypriot, he attended Clissold Park School, Stoke Newington, and played for Aveley before signing for West Ham.

IT HAPPENED IN HOLLAND...

NEXT month West Ham will play Den Haag of Holland in the European Cup-Winners' Cup. They have already defeated Reipas Lahden (Finland) and Ararat Erevan (Russia) in this competition, and if they succeed in carrying off the trophy this season, they will equal the record of A.C. Milan, the only club to have won the Cup-Winners' Cup on two occasions.

The Italians won the trophy in both 1968 and 1973. West Ham's past triumph in the competition was in 1965, when they defeated TSV Munich in the final at Wembley.

This is the third season in which West Ham have played in the Cup-Winners' Cup, and it is a point of interest that in facing Den Haag, they will play on Dutch soil in the competition for the first time.

Their visit to Holland will be a reminder to Spurs supporters of our own triumph in the Cup-Winners' Cup in 1963. The final that year was played on the ground of Feyenoord in Rotterdam, and Spurs' performance that night against Atletico Madrid ranks with the finest in our long history.

We wish the Hammers well in their efforts to bring the Cup-Winners' Cup back to England again, and hope they will bear with us while we savour the memories of our own success in that final against Atletico.

Many of the 5,000 Spurs supporters who travelled to Rotterdam for that match—and we hasten to add that there was no hint of crowd trouble—will be here today, and will recall how we became the first British club to win a major European competition by crushing Atletico 5-1.

The match was played in mid-May after the long English season in which we had finished runners-up in the First Division and had fought our way through the previous six Cup-Winners' Cup matches.

WITHOUT MACKAY

When it came to that final we were without the matchless services of Dave Mackay, who was unfit to play. It would therefore be untrue to claim that our team was overflowing with confidence about the outcome of the match. We expected the Spaniards to give us a really hard match.

That Spurs won by what is our biggest margin of victory in any major Cup final—and we can claim eight triumphs in the F.A. Cup, League Cup and U.E.F.A. Cup—reflects the skill, spirit and determination of the team captained by Danny Blanchflower on that unforgettable night in Rotterdam.

It was a team effort in every sense, and the nature of Atletico's tackling in the opening minutes gave our players an immediate insight into the realities of the task facing them.

To their credit they emerged unruffled from that hectic opening spell, and in the 16th minute took the lead with a fine goal volleyed home by **JIMMY GREAVES** following a rhythmic move started by Tony Marchi, who was Mackay's deputy.

Before half-time Spurs had scored again, the late **JOHN WHITE** driving the ball in off the underside of the crossbar following a cross by **TERRY DYSON**.

Early in the second half Spurs conceded a goal when Ron Henry punched the ball clear with goalkeeper Bill Brown well beaten. Collar, the Spanish international left-winger, stroked home the penalty kick, but Atletico's goal was nothing more than a momentary set-back, to Spurs.

Dyson, who had a great match, floated a deceptive ball into Atletico's net, Greaves side-footed Spurs into a 4-1 lead and with only a few minutes left on the clock, the former hammered in an 18-yard shot for the fifth.

The team that pulled off that history-making win was Brown; Baker, Henry; Blanchflower, Norman, Marchi; Jones, White, Smith, R. Greaves and Dyson.
