FOREWORD

LAST season can best be described as a traumatic one for all concerned with the interests of Tottenham Hotspur Football Club.

A disastrous start to our League programme was accentuated by Bill Nicholson's decision to resign his position as manager of the Club. It was a resignation which was not accepted by the Board before he had been asked to reconsider his decision.

Bill Nicholson's record since joining Spurs in 1936 is well known to us all, and he will be remembered with gratitude as the most successful manager in the Club's history.

His services to football were honoured with the award of the O.B.E. by Her Majesty the Queen, a distinction which I, personally, think should have been bestowed upon him some years earlier.

By a unanimous decision of the Board, Terry Neill, manager of Hull City and also of the Northern Ireland international team, was appointed to fill the vacancy.

Coming at a time when our total points from six League matches was just two, and after we had been bundled unceremoniously out of the Football League Cup 4—0 at home by Middlesbrough, Terry had no illusions about the task facing him.

Slowly we began to pull away from the foot of the table, but a series of defeats in the New Year again saw us facing a serious situation, which culminated with our survival in the First Division by the barest of margins after defeating Leeds United in the final League match of the season.

At reserve-team level, we were probably represented by the youngest side ever to play for Spurs in the Football Combination. No honours were achieved, but in these circumstances the Combination team acquitted itself well.

Although our Youth team was not as successful as in the previous season, we reached the fifth round of the F.A. Youth Cup, when we were beaten at Middlesbrough by a single-goal margin in a second replay.

At League level, the Youth team finished runners-up in the South East Counties League, Division 1, a creditable performance and an improvement on the previous season's record.

After the season ended, the Youth team competed in two tournaments in Switzerland. They won the Club Sportif Chenois International Youth Tournament in Geneva, and were defeated finalists on a penalty play-off only in the Blue Stars 37th International Youth Tournament in Zurich.

It was a fine performance in both tournaments, and I offer the team my congratulations. A full report of the youth tour appears in pages 61 to 65 of this Handbook.

The junior team pulled off the "double" in the South East Counties League, Division 2, winning both the League and Cup competitions. They also are to be heartily congratulated on this dual achievement.

Once again it is my pleasure to offer congratulations of an individual nature to Spurs players who gained international honours. Pat Jennings, Joe Kinnear and Chris McGrath all added to their stock of caps, and Alfie Conn attained full Scottish international rank and also played for the Under-23s last season.

Steve Perryman, who was appointed Club captain following the departure of Martin Peters to Norwich City in March, made a further four appearances in the England Under-23 team, bringing his total to an impressive 17.

A wealth of recognition also came the way of Spurs players at Youth international level. Glenn Hoddle, Ian Smith and Andy Keeley all played for England; Neil McNab wore the blue shirt of Scotland; Noel Brotherston represented Northern Ireland; and Roger Wade played for Eire.

In view of the position in which we found ourselves in the League last season, it was not surprising that a number of changes should take place in the playing ranks. Notable additions to the playing staff during the season were John Duncan and Don McAllister, who were signed from Dundee and Bolton Wanderers respectively.

In addition to Peters, a number of players left us during last season. Gary Anderson joined Northampton Town; Danny Clapton left for South African football; Phil Holder was transferred to Crystal Palace; and Mike England decided to retire from League football as a player.

Since last season ended Philip Beal has left us for Brighton and Hove Albion, and in thanking him for his many years of loyal and consistent service, we also wish him success with his new club. To Terry Lee, who has been transferred to Torquay United this summer, we also extend our good wishes.

Others to leave us this summer for new clubs are John Margerrison (Fulham), Wayne Cegielski (VfB Stuttgart), and Roger Gibbins (Oxford United). Mike Dillon, who joined New York Cosmos for the summer period, has decided to stay with the American club. We shall follow the progress of all these players with interest.

There were also a couple of notable departures from the non-playing staff with the retirement of both Cecil Poynton and Bill Beeby.

Cecil joined Spurs in 1922 and remained with the Club as a player until 1934. He returned in 1946 as assistant-trainer and took over as senior trainer in the following year. During the last few seasons he has served the Club as physiotherapist.

Bill was in charge of the Ticket Office for 16 years and was involved in the smooth distribution of tickets for many of the great matches staged by the Club during that time.

I wish them both a long and happy retirement.

After three successive years in the U.E.F.A. Cup, we missed the thrills and excitement of European competition last season, but interest was added to our programme of matches by the visit of Red Star Belgrade for Alan Gilzean's testimonial match.

It was pleasing that we should have beaten Red Star on that

occasion, and that we should also have defeated them in a return match in Belgrade three months later.

While the success of the team remains our first consideration, we have also been giving close attention to the development of other activities and amenities.

The New Spurs Shop, on the corner of the High Road and Park Lane, was opened during last season and offers a wide range of items of interest and use to supporters. It is open every weekday.

During the summer the "Chanticleer", the new restaurant and banqueting suite, has been opened and is now available for bookings. It is situated at the North or Paxton Road end of the ground, a short distance up from the High Road.

The "Chanticleer" will be open to members of the newly-formed "Hotspur Club" on first-team match days. Naturally, we hope this new venture will meet the needs of supporters and prove a great success.

In the economic climate prevailing today, it has been necessary to reduce the playing staff, and the scouting system also has been reorganised. In recent years we have paid closer attention to the development of young players, and this policy is being accelerated.

In conclusion, I feel sure we have all learned something from the events of the past year. It has been suggested that I have known only success since I joined the Board, but I recall that in my first full year as a director—and in Bill Nicholson's first season as manager—we finished 18th in the table, having at one time propped up the division.

We climbed back into the limelight then . . . we shall do so again.

BACON, Garry (midfield). 5ft. 6in.

Upgraded from apprentice to full professional in May of this year. Born at Dagenham, where he attended the Parsloes Manor School. Played for Barking Boys and joined Spurs as an apprentice in July, 1972. Played mainly in the Youth team last season, but also appeared in the final Football Combination match at Ipswich.

BROTHERSTON, Noel (midfield). 5ft 8in.

A member of the current Northern Ireland Youth team. Comes from Dundonald, near Belfast, and played for both the North Down and Northern Ireland Boys teams. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in September, 1972, and was upgraded to full professional in April, 1974. Made 7 appearances in the Combination team last season and scored twice.



CHIVERS, Martin (forward). 6ft. 1in.

Has made 24 appearances in the full England team. Born at Southampton and played for the Southampton and Hampshire County Boys teams. Signed as a professional for Southampton and made his League debut in the Second Division in season 1962-63. Transferred from Southampton to Spurs in January, 1968, and scored the winning goal in his debut on Sheffield Wednesday's ground a few days later. Has made 246 League appearances for Spurs and scored 111 First Division goals. His total of appearances for Spurs in major cup competitions is 83 and his goals tally is 54.



COATES, Ralph (forward). 5ft. 7in.

Has played four times for the full England team. Born at Hetton-le-Hole, County Durham, and joined Spurs from Burnley in May, 1971. Played as a striker for Eppleton Colliery Welfare Juniors before joining Burnley. Scored Spurs' League Cup-winning goal against Norwich City at Wembley in 1973. Has scored 9 goals in 130 League appearances for Spurs, and 10 goals in 49 major cup appearances.



CONN, Alfred (midfield). 5ft. 8in.

Made his first Scottish international appearance as substitute against Northern Ireland in May and was retained for the match with England at Wembley the following Saturday. Also played for the Scottish Under-23s in May. Joined Spurs from Glasgow Rangers in July, 1974. Born in Edinburgh and attended Preston Lodge Secondary School, Prestonpans, a rugby-playing school. Played rugby on Saturday mornings and juvenile soccer for Musselburgh Windsor in the afternoons! Spotted by Rangers while playing for Musselburgh Windsor and joined the Ibrox ground staff. Made 17 League appearances for Spurs last season, scoring 6 goals. He also made one F.A. Cup appearance and played as a substitute in the League Cup. Son of Alfie Conn, former Scottish international and Hearts inside-forward.



CRANSTONE, IAN (goalkeeper). 6ft. 0in.

Was upgraded from apprentice to full professional in the closing weeks of last season. Born at Rochford, and attended Rayleigh Swayne Comprehensive School. Played for Essex County and also South-East Essex Boys. Signed as an apprentice for Spurs in July, 1972. Played mainly in the Youth team last season but also made 8 Combination appearances.



DAINES, Barry (goalkeeper). 5ft. 11½in.

Has had an eventful summer. Had a cartilage operation in May, and was married in June. Born at Witham and played for Chelmsford, Mid-Essex and Essex County Boys before joining Spurs as an apprentice. Upgraded to full professional in September, 1969. Played for the England Youth team. Has made 9 League appearances, 2 in the U.E.F.A. Cup and 1 in the League Cup.



DUNCAN, John (forward). 5ft. 10in.

Joined Spurs from Dundee last October. Born in Dundee, where he attended Clepington Road School and Morgan Academy. Played for Dundee Schools Under-15s and after Dundee had signed him on a provisional form, he was "farmed" out to Broughty Athletic for development. Made his debut for Spurs at Luton last October, and finished the season as our top scorer with 12 goals from 28 League games. He also played in the two F.A. Cup matches. Played for Scottish League against the Football League in 1973.



HODDLE, Glenn (midfield). 6ft. 0in.

A regular member of the England Youth team that won the Little World Cup in Switzerland this May. Comes from Harlow and played for Harlow District and Essex Under-15 and Under-19 teams. Attended Burnt Mill School. Also played fly half in the West Essex Boys rugby team. Signed for Spurs as an apprentice in April, 1974 and was upgraded to full professional status in the closing weeks of last season. Made 11 Combination appearances last season.

JENNINGS, Patrick (goalkeeper). 6ft. 0in.

Now close to establishing a new all-time Football League appearance record for Spurs. Ted Ditchburn holds the present record with 418 appearances, and Pat's figure for the club at the opening of this season stands at 409. He has also played in 108 major cup-ties for Spurs. An automatic selection for Northern Ireland, for whom he has played on 54 occasions. He has also played for the Rest of the U.K., the "All Ireland XI" and the Three against the Six in the Common Market match. Born at Newry, and joined Watford after playing for the Irish Youth team. Left Watford for Spurs in June, 1964.



JONES, Chris (forward). 5ft. 11in.

Made his League debut for Spurs on the opening day of last season and finished the campaign with 16 First Division appearances and one goal. Born in Jersey and established himself in schools football in the Channel Islands. Signed for Spurs as an apprentice in May, 1971 and was upgraded to full professional in May, 1973. Top scorer in the Combination last season with 13 goals.

KEELEY, Andrew (defender). 5ft. 8in.

Played in the England Youth International team last season. Comes from Basildon and played for Basildon Boys. Signed as an apprentice for Spurs in September, 1972 and was upgraded to full professional in January, 1974. Made 14 Combination appearances last season. Brother of Glen Keeley, the Newcastle United defender.





KINNEAR, Joseph (defender). 5ft. 8in.

Made his 25th appearance for the Eire international team this summer. Born in Dublin, but lived most of his early life in Watford. Joined Spurs as an amateur in August, 1963, after playing for St. Albans City, and signed as a professional in February, 1965. Made his League debut at home to West Ham United in April, 1966. Has now made 195 League appearances and scored 2 League goals. Has also made 62 appearances in the major cups.

KNOWLES, Cyril (defender). 6ft. 0in.

Now starting his 12th season as a Spurs player. Joined us from Middlesbrough in May 1964 and made his League debut for Spurs at home to Sheffield United on the opening day of the following season. Comes from Fitzwilliam, three miles from Pontefract in Yorkshire and played for the South Elmsall District Boys team. Had spells with Manchester United and Wolverhampton Wanderers before signing for Middlesbrough. Has made 4 appearances in the full England team and also played for the Under-23s and the Football League. Has made 391 League appearances for Spurs, scoring 15 First Division goals. Has also played 103 major cup-ties for Spurs scoring two goals.



McALLISTER, Donald (defender) 5ft. 10in.

Joined Spurs from Bolton Wanderers last February, and made his debut in our colours at Coventry. Born at Radcliffe, near Manchester, and played for Lancashire County and the combined Prestwich, Radcliffe and Whitefield District Boys team. Had a trial with Coventry before joining Bolton, who first signed him as an apprentice. Made 8 League appearances for Spurs last season.

McGRATH, Chris (forward). 5ft. 9in.

A full Northern Ireland international who has made 4 appearances for his country. Comes from Belfast, where he attended Dunlambert Secondary School. Captained the South Belfast and Northern Ireland Boys teams. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in July, 1970, and was upgraded to full professional in January, 1972. Made his League debut for Spurs at home to Arsenal in October, 1973, and now has 34 First Division appearances to his credit. Has also played in 9 major cup-ties. Has scored 5 League goals and 5 in the U.E.F.A. Cup.



McNAB, Neil (midfield). 5ft. 6½in.

Joined Spurs from Morton in February, 1974 and after reverting to amateur status for the rest of that season, signed as a professional in June of that year. Has played for the Scottish International youth team and is a former schoolboy international. Made his League debut for Spurs as substitute in the home match with Chelsea in April, 1974. Made two full League appearances last season. Born at Greenock.

NAYLOR, Terence (defender). 5ft. 10in.

Born at Islington and played for Islington Boys. Trained for a while with Arsenal and also had a brief spell with Millwall before joining Spurs as an amateur. Gave up his job in Smithfield Market to sign as a professional in July, 1969, and made his League debut at West Bromwich at Easter, 1970. Has played in 101 League matches and in 36 major cup-ties. His only goal for the first team was against Chelsea in the League Cup semi-final in 1971.



NEIGHBOUR, James (forward). 5ft. 7in.

Born at Chingford, where he attended Heathcote Secondary Modern School. Played for Waltham Forest, Essex and London Boys. Signed full professional forms for Spurs in November, 1968, having joined the club as an apprentice in April, 1966. Was a member of our Football League Cup-winning team against Aston Villa in 1971. Has made 77 League appearances, scoring five goals. He has also appeared in 26 major cup-ties, scoring twice.

OSGOOD, Keith, (defender). 5ft. 11in.

Made his League debut as substitute at Newcastle in the final League match of season 1973-74. Last season he made 10 League appearances and one in the League Cup. Born at Isleworth, and attended Syon School. Gained Schoolboy international honours and also played for London and Hounslow Boys. Is also a former England Youth international. Signed for Spurs as an apprentice in June, 1971, and was upgraded to full professional in June, 1972.





PERRYMAN, Stephen (midfield). 5ft. 8in.

Club captain. Made four appearances for the England Under-23 team last season, bringing his total at that level up to 17. Born at Ealing and played for Middlesex, London and England Boys. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in July, 1967, and was upgraded to full professional in January, 1969. Made his League debut against Sunderland in September 1969, and now has a total of 226 First Division appearances to his credit, in the course of which he has scored 14 goals. Has also played in 78 major cup-ties, scoring six goals.

PRATT, John (midfield). 5ft. 8in.

Born at Hackney and attended Clark's College, Enfield. Played for the London F.A. Boys team, and spent a year in Brentford's youth side. Joined Spurs as an amateur on the recommendation of Terry Medwin, our former winger. Signed as a full professional in November 1965 and made his League debut away to Arsenal in March, 1969. Has made 152 League appearances, scoring 12 goals. In 53 major cup-ties he has scored five times.



ROBINSON, Martin (forward). 5ft. 7in.

Upgraded from apprentice to full professional this May. Comes from Chadwell St. Mary, near Grays. Attended Quarry Hill and Torells Schools, Grays. Played for the Thurrock District Boys team. Signed apprentice forms for Spurs in July, 1973. Was top scorer in the youth team last season with 32 League and Cup goals and made 3 appearances in the Combination side.

SMITH, Ian (defender). 5ft. 10in.

Regular member of the England Youth team that won the Little World Cup in Switzerland in May. Comes from Rotherham, where he attended Wingfield Secondary School. Played for Rotherham and Yorkshire County Boys teams. Signed as an apprentice for Spurs in July, 1972 and was upgraded to full professional in April, 1974. Made 17 Combination appearances last season.



STEAD, Michael (defender). 5ft. 7½in.

Upgraded from apprentice to full professional in November, 1974. Born at West Ham and as a school-boy played in the Newham District team, Joined Spurs as an apprentice in July, 1973 and was a member of our F.A. Youth Cup-winning team in season 1973-74. Made 10 appearances in the Combination team last season.

WALFORD, Stephen (centre-half). 6ft. 1in.

Comes from Islington and played for Islington Boys. A former pupil at Holloway School. Signed for Spurs as an apprentice in April, 1974 and twelve months later was upgraded to full professional. Made 16 appearances in the Combination team last season.

BARWICK, Frederick (defender).
















Martin Chivers (out of picture) has given Spurs the lead in the home League match with Everton. It ended in a 1—1 draw.








Joe Kinnear is seen in an attacking mood in our home League match with Coventry City. The result was a 1-1 draw.






This picture, from the 1-1 League draw at Coventry, emphasises the difficulties of penetrating a packed defence.

INTERNATIONAL YOUTH TOURNAMENTS MAY 1975

SPURS' Youth team enjoyed a highly successful trip to Switzerland in May, winning the Club Sportif Chenois International Youth Tournament at Geneva, and finishing runners-up by the narrowest of margins to Manchester United in the Blue Stars 37th International Youth Tournament at Zurich.

Our party assembled at the Ariel Hotel, Heathrow, on the evening of 6th May, and flew to Zurich the following morning. We were met by officials of Blue Star, and enjoyed a pleasant journey by coach through Zurich to the Hotel Olympia.

Spurs were grouped with Grasshopper Club Zurich and Etoile Carouge in the Blue Stars tournament. We played our first match on 8th May against Grasshoppers, and after kicking off in slightly overcast conditions, the sun came out and the temperature rose considerably.

Our team for this first match was Cranstone; Osgood, Stead, M., Walford, Cegielski, Margerrison, McGrath, McNab, Jones, Bacon and Gibbins. Roger Gibbins gave Spurs the lead, and soon after half-time Steve Walford headed an excellent second goal well beyond the goalkeeper's reach.

Spurs were playing well, and Chris McGrath quickly added a third. Martin Robinson then replaced Gibbins and Gary Hyams took over from John Margerrison. The match ended at 3—0 for Spurs.

It was a good start, and it put everyone in our party in the right frame of mind. Only 30 minutes after the match with Grasshoppers, we were again in action against Etoile Carouge, a Swiss team from close to the French border.

As Etoile had drawn their first match with Grasshoppers, we needed only a draw to put us through to the semi-finals. The playing surface for this second game was in poor condition, and it was far from easy to produce a good standard of play.

Spurs established a grip from the start, but missed a number of scoring chances before Gibbins took full advantage of a defensive error to slot the ball in calmly from an acute angle. This was just before half-time, and our other goal in a 2—0 win was scored by Margerrison with a powerful shot that gave the goalkeeper no chance.

For this match we fielded the same team as against Grasshoppers, but during the second half Fred Barwick replaced Gary Bacon and Hyams again came on for Margerrison.

Our semi-final pairing was against Atalanta Bergamo, and this match was played on a superb pitch. The kick-off was just two and a quarter hours after we had defeated Etoile.

We again fielded the team that had commenced the two previous matches, and a good goal from Margerrison gave Spurs the right start. Gibbins quickly added to our lead with a glancing header, and the same player, again with his head, gave Spurs a 3—0 half-time lead after splendid work down the left by Neil McNab.

Spurs were playing attractive football that was well appreciated by a crowd of some five to six thousand spectators, and the standard was maintained during the second half. Margerrison volleyed home a fourth and last goal for Spurs.

As Manchester United won the other semi-final 2—0 against F.C. Augsburg of Germany, the stage was set for an all-English final. This was timed to start only a couple of hours after we had finished our third game, and again we fielded the same team. There had been no substitutes against Atalanta.

Again we had the value of a quick goal. A downfield ball from Ian Cranstone was helped on by the breeze for Gibbins to head into the path of Chris Jones, who had the ball in the net in a flash.

Jones had been unlucky not to score in the previous games, but his early success in the final delighted his team-mates, who smothered him with their congratulations.

Unfortunately, our game began to fall apart. United applied a lot of pressure, and their wingers were giving us problems. We were no longer stringing our passes together, players were not moving off the ball as they had done in the semi-final, and in consequence we were being caught in possession.

We retained our lead until half-time, but United netted an equaliser within the first five minutes of the second half. This had a tonic effect on the Manchester team, and we had difficulty in raising our own game. We did, however, have one or two good scoring opportunities. We struck the crossbar with ten minutes left to play, and Margerrison brought an excellent save from the Manchester goalkeeper, who played really well.

This was a position in which Spurs also were well served by Cranstone.

The final score was 1—1 and this meant settling the tie on penalty kicks. United won the toss and elected to take the first. This was saved by Cranstone, but the referee adjudged that he had moved, and no mistake was made with the second shot.

Keith Osgood took Spurs first penalty and scored. United did likewise with their second spot kick and Margerrison also scored. Then came a third United goal, but our own third kick, taken by McNab, was driven over, leaving United with a 3—2 lead.

Then United missed one, but Gibbins had the next Spurs penalty saved by the goalkeeper. Again a United player failed but credit in this instance goes to Cranstone for a fine save.

With the penalty situation at 3—2 for United, McGrath stepped up for our fifth kick, and he calmly slammed the ball home to leave the penalty score at 3—3 and the total score at 4—4.

This meant calling on other players for penalties for a "sudden death" result. United took the first one, scoring with a shot that only just entered the net after scraping the underside of the bar.

Bacon put Spurs level. The next United player scored, but Jones had his kick saved and after this tense finish we left the field as beaten finalists on penalties by 5—4 and on a total score of 6—5.

It was a most disappointing final for Spurs as we had played well enough throughout the tournament to emerge as winners. For their part, United had a spirit and enthusiasm that pulled them through to their narrow margin of triumph. All matches in this tournament were of 20 minutes' duration each way.

After a couple of rest days, we travelled to Netstal, a village nestling in a valley, for the first of our exhibition games. For this match, played on a small, bare and bumpy pitch, we fielded the following team—Markwick; Osgood, Stead, M., Barwick, Walford, Margerrison, Bradbury, Robinson, Jones, Bacon and Hyams.

Spurs took an early lead through Hyams and Andy Bradbury scored from a penalty after he had been brought down in the box. The final 9—0 score-line of this match tells its own story. Robinson and Margerrison took the score to 4—0, and Osgood, Gibbins, Robinson again, Hyams from a penalty, and lastly Micky Stead scored further goals. During this match Wayne Cegielski, McNab and Gibbins came on as substitutes for Walford, Margerrison and Jones respectively.

After a further rest day, much of which was enjoyed in the local swimming pool and in mountain climbing, we tackled our second exhibition game in the village of Gossau on 13th May.

Spurs' team was Cranstone; Osgood, Stead, M., Walford, Cegielski, Margerrison, McGrath, McNab, Jones, Bacon and Gibbins, and we were held to a 1—1 draw. McGrath scored an early goal for Spurs, but Gossau equalised before half-time.

The following day we played the last of our three exhibition matches against F.C. Schaffhausen. The team was Markwick; Stead, M., Walford, Cegielski, Barwick, Osgood, Bacon, Margerrison, McGrath, Jones and Robinson. After a disappointing first half, Gibbins replaced Robinson and McNab took over from Bacon. We became more positive, and McGrath scored with an excellent shot.

This goal was followed by further Spurs goals from Jones and Osgood. In the second half of this match Hyams replaced Margerrison, and Bradbury came on for McGrath. By this time Noel Brotherston had joined us from the Northern Ireland Youth party, who had been engaged in the Little World Cup in Switzerland.

We left Zurich for Geneva on 15th May, and played our first match in the Sportif Chenois tournament at 10.30 on the following Saturday against F.C. Grenchen. Our team was Cranstone; Osgood, Stead, M., Walford, Cegielski, Margerrison, Barwick, McNab, Jones, Bacon and Gibbins.

Jones headed Spurs into the lead, and the score was 1—0 still at half-time. In the second half Osgood scored from a penalty after Margerrison had been brought down and that ended the scoring. In this match Robinson replaced Jones and Roger Wade made his first appearance in place of Margerrison.

Our next match was against Varesse Calcio, an Italian team, and we fielded the same side that had started against Grenchen. Margerrison gave Spurs the lead, and we led by this goal at half-time. The quality of the play was higher in the second half, and Jones scored a second goal to give Spurs a 2—0 win.

Robinson replaced Gibbins in the second half.

This now meant that we had to beat O.K.S. Stomil, a Polish club, on the following day in order to reach the final. We played Stomil at 10.15 in the morning. The records of the two teams were the same, and we fielded the side that had kicked off in the previous match.

Bacon gave Spurs a half-time lead with a good shot and Gibbins headed a second goal in the second half. Jones and

Bacon took the score to 4—0 for Spurs and we were far from flattered by the margin. In the second half Brotherston replaced Gibbins and Hyams came on for Barwick.

We were now in the final and faced C. F. Barcelona at 5.30 p.m. on the Sunday. We had played well on the way to the final and were in a very confident mood for the big test before a crowd of about 7,000.

Spurs started well and it came as no surprise when Gibbins headed through after excellent work by McNab on the right. Barcelona came back and Cranstone showed a lot of courage when required. We entered the second half with our single-goal lead, but a mix up-in our defence enabled the Spaniards to equalise.

In much the same way that Manchester United had rallied against us in the final in Zurich, Spurs were stung into renewed effort by the Barcelona goal. Unfortunately, Osgood sustained severe bruising of the back, and had to be replaced by Wade.

Extra time looked probable until McNab and a Barcelona defender, who was trying to clear a cross, both played the ball at the same time. Fortunately for us, the ball passed over the goalkeeper's head for what proved to be the tournament-winning goal, scored only a minute from the end.

Spurs were popular winners and in addition to receiving a magnificent trophy, we were also presented with an award for being the top-scoring team. McNab also received an award as the best player of the tournament.

In the Chenois tournament all matches before the final were of 25 minutes duration each way. The final consisted of 30 minutes each way.

Our back-four players deserve a special pat on the back. The Barcelona goal was, in fact, only the third—excluding the play-off penalties in Zurich—they had conceded throughout the entire stay in Switzerland!

Much praise was bestowed on Spurs, particularly as we had expressed individuality in our style of play, and we were highly acclaimed by the Swiss press.

Our party consisted of: Mr. C. F. Cox (Vice-Chairman), Mr. R. P. Welton (Tour Manager), Mr. S. Tickridge (Trainer) and players G. Bacon, F. Barwick, W. Cegielski, I. Cranstone, R. Gibbins, G. Hyams, C. Jones, A. Bradbury, J. Margerrison, N. Markwick, C. McGrath, N. McNab, K. Osgood, M. Robinson, M. Stead, S. Walford, N. Brotherston and R. Wade.



TOTTENHAM HOT-SPOTS

- 1882 Club formed by boys from a local cricket club and from the local Grammar School. The name of "Hotspur F.C." was adopted.
- 1883 Club reorganised under the presidency of Mr. John Ripsher. Club colours—navy blue. Matches played on Tottenham Marshes.
- 1885 First competitive match versus St. Albans in the London Association Cup, Spurs winning 5—2. Colours changed to light blue and white halves. First credit balance—9s.
- 1886 First cup final. Played Caledonians in the East End Cup and lost 1—0. Club re-named "Tottenham Hotspur Athletic Club".
- 1887 First meeting with Arsenal—then Royal Arsenal. Match abandoned 15 minutes from time "owing to darkness", with Spurs leading 2—1.
- 1888 Spurs move to private ground in Northumberland Park, where the first admission charge of 3d. was made.
- 1890 Colours changed to red shirts and navy blue shorts.
- 1895 Spurs adopt professionalism.
- 1896 A record crowd of 6,000 spectators watch the friendly match against Aston Villa. Spurs elected to the Southern League, Division 1, and finish in fourth place. Club colours changed to chocolate and gold.
- 1898 The Club becomes a limited company and a match against Woolwich Arsenal attracts a record crowd of 14,000 spectators.
- 1899 Final change of colours to the now familiar white shirts and blue shorts. The Club moves to present site, originally a market garden. Accommodation for 35,000. Ground almost named as "Gilpin Park" but instead gradually became known as "White Hart Lane". First match staged was a friendly versus Notts County—gross receipts £115.
- 1900 Success at last—Spurs become champions of the Southern League.
- 1901 Spurs win the F.A. Challenge Cup to become the only non-League club, following the formation of the Football League in 1888, ever to achieve this honour.

- 1908 Entry secured to the Second Division of the Football League.
- 1909 Promotion to Division 1 gained at first attempt.
- 1915 Relegation to Division 2.
- 1920 Promoted again at first attempt, this time with a still unsurpassed Second Division record of 70 points.
- 1921 Second F.A. Cup triumph, Spurs beating Wolverhampton Wanderers by 1—0 at Stamford Bridge.
- 1928 Relegation to Second Division with 38 points.
- 1933 Promotion again, this time as Division 2 runners-up.
- 1934 New East Stand completed.
- 1935 Relegation to Second Division.
- 1938 The existing crowd record of 75,038 spectators was established for the visit of Sunderland in the Sixth Round of the F.A. Cup.
- 1950 Promotion to Division 1.
- 1951 Football League champions for the first time.
- 1959 Ted Ditchburn completes 418 League appearances between 1946 and 1959, still a Club record.
- 1961 Football League champions and winners of the F.A. Cup. The first club to complete the "double" since Preston North End and Aston Villa did so in 1889 and 1897 respectively.
- 1962 Winners again of the F.A. Cup.
- 1963 Winners of the European Cup-Winners' Cup. The first British club to win a major European competition. Jimmy Greaves becomes Spurs' highest League goalscorer in one season with 37 goals.
- 1967 F.A. Cup-Winners for the fifth time.
- 1971 Winners of the Football League Cup.
- 1972 First winners of new U.E.F.A. Cup and therefore the first British club to have won two major European trophies.
- 1973 Winners of the Football League Cup, the first club to have won the trophy twice.
- 1974 First British club to have played in three major European Finals. Net Receipts of £49,920, at U.E.F.A. Final (Home leg) is Club record.
- 1975 Pat Jennings sets a new Club record of 517 League and Cup appearances.
