

FOREWORD

By SIDNEY A. WALE

Chairman

I hardly needs saying that I find it no easy task to write the Foreword to the Handbook this year. After a stretch of 27 years in the First Division of the Football League, many of them glorious and illustrious years of outstanding achievement, we have been relegated to the Second Division, and for all of us it is a bitter blow.

With the benefit of hindsight, it can be seen that the decline of our Club was not halted by the appointment made following the resignation of Bill Nicholson in August, 1974, although the appointment then made was based on the strength of the qualifications offered by those who responded to the advertised vacancy.

As all our loyal followers are aware, we never really recovered from a poor start last season. We took action to strengthen the defence but our habit of missing scoring chances was to prove costly as the season advanced.

In football, luck is said to even itself out over a season, and it has always been our policy to refrain from any complaints on that score. Nevertheless, it is a fact with which few will disagree that the loss of John Duncan with a back injury for most of last season was a great handicap in the efforts of the team to reach a position of safety.

John had finished top scorer in each of the two previous seasons, and in even the nine League matches he played last term, he netted four goals. His record shows that he has scored 36 goals in his 74 League appearances for Spurs, an impressive average for a striker in modern football.

Obviously, John is a key man in our plans for this season and I am glad to be able to report that he has made an excellent recovery from his two operations, and I hope his goalscoring touch will again be in evidence.

With so many results going against us, it was not surprising that a loss of confidence began to show in the play of the team. Even some of our established players would be the first to admit that they did not play to their full potential.

During the course of the season we secured the transfers of Ian Moores (Stoke City), John Gorman (Carlisle United), Peter Taylor (Crystal Palace) and Jim Holmes (Coventry City). It was not easy for any of these players to settle in a struggling team, and we look to them to produce top form in their first full season at White Hart Lane. During last season Chris McGrath (Manchester United), Jimmy Neighbour (Norwich City), Willie Young (Arsenal) and Alfie Conn (Celtic) were transferred to the clubs named.

At a lower level, we can draw some satisfaction from the improved performance of the reserve team. We were edged into third place by Plymouth Argyle in the Football Combination only on goal difference after finishing in eleventh position in the previous season. This represents an encouraging advance, and although some members of the reserve team have now left the Club, we can feel optimistic about the development of some of the younger players.

At youth team level we reached the semi-final of the F.A. Youth Cup, only to lose heavily to Crystal Palace, who went on to win the trophy. We had previously beaten Norwich, Orient, Portsmouth and Liverpool in this competition. The youth team also reached the final of the South East Counties League Cup, but were defeated at the last stage by Queen's Park Rangers.

Even in a season of misfortune in the League, we are able to congratulate a number of our players on the honours they gained in the field of international football.

Pat Jennings has taken his all-time record of international appearances for Northern Ireland to 68 this summer, and Gerry Armstrong's name has now been added to the list of players to wear the colours of that country.

Jim Holmes has made three more appearances for Eire since becoming a Spurs player last March, the month in which Terry Boyle made two appearances for the Welsh international youth team. Glenn Hoddle had the distinction of playing in the England Under-21 team against Wales at Wolverhampton last December.

A number of players have left us this summer. Noel Brotherston has joined Blackburn Rovers, Kevin Stead is now with


Arsenal and Fred Barwick and Steve Cavanagh have signed for Wealdstone and Ilford respectively. I wish them all good luck with their new clubs.

Most of this Foreword has been devoted to the events of last season. The past is now history, however, and it is to the future that we now turn.

It goes without saying that our prime object is to return to the First Division, and everyone within the Club is determined to make the utmost effort and endeavour to achieve this allimportant target within the year.

Only in this way can we restore our pride and recompense our thousands of loyal supporters for the encouragement they have given the team at a time of adversity.

We enjoyed an honoured place in English football over many years in the past, and we mean to regain it.



YOUTH TOURNAMENTS

SPURS' Youth team competed in the 39th International Youth Tournament, organised by F.C. Blue Stars in Zurich, and the 23rd International Youth Tournament held by Club Sportif

Chenois in Geneva.

Our party flew from Heathrow to Zurich on May 18th in readiness for the opening match, against F.C. Winterthur, the following morning. We were defeated 2—1, Neil McNab scoring Spurs' goal, and our team was Kendall; Wade, Cavanagh, S., C. Hughton, Holyoak, Walford, McNab, Barwick, Stead, K., Beavon and Robinson.

For the next match, against Young Fellows of Switzerland, Paul Miller and Mike Hazard replaced Phil Holyoak and Stuart Beavon respectively, and a goal by Martin Robinson gave Spurs a 1—0 win. In this match Mark Falco replaced Kevin Stead at

half-time.

Our third match that day, in the afternoon, was against Verona of Italy, and we were good winners by 3—0, Holyoak, Beavon and Robinson scoring the goals. Our team was Kendall; Wade, C. Hughton, Holyoak, Walford, Hazard, Barwick, Beavon, McNab, Stead, K. and Robinson.

In this tournament the matches were of 20 minutes' duration

each way.

As we had failed to qualify for the finals, we were next called upon to face F.C. Zurich in the play-off for 5th and 6th places. A second-half goal by Beavon gave us a 1—0 win in a scrappy game. We fielded the same team as against Verona, but Miller and Falco replaced Barwick and Stead respectively, during the

game.

Between the two tournaments, and before leaving the Zurich area, we played three exhibition matches against Swiss clubs. Spurs won the first, against F.C. Bischofszell on May 22nd, by 4—2 with goals from Hazard, Falco, Beavon and McNab. The team was Kendall; C. Hughton, Cavanagh, S., Barwick, Holyoak, Walford (sub. Miller), Beavon, Hazard, Stead, K., M. Falco (sub. Stead, M.) and McNab.

The following day we played a second exhibition match against F.C. Schattdorf. Spurs ran out easy winners by 5—2, Falco (2), Robinson, McNab and Beavon scoring the goals. Team: Kendall; C. Hughton, Cavanagh, S., Barwick, Miller, Walford, McNab, Beavon, M. Falco, Hazard (sub. Holyoak)

and Robinson.

The third and last exhibition match, on May 24th, ended in a 3—0 win for Spurs over F.C. Chur. All three goals, netted by

Steve Walford, Falco and Hazard, were scored in the second half. Team: Kendall; Wade (sub. Hazard), Cavanagh, S., Barwick, Holyoak, Walford, C. Hughton, Stead, M. (sub. Miller), Stead, K. (sub. M. Falco), Beavon (sub. McNab) and Robinson.

Our first match in the Geneva tournament was on May 28th, when we defeated F.C. Fribourg of Switzerland by the only goal of the game, headed through in the first half by Robinson. The team was Kendall; C. Hughton, Stead, M., Barwick, Holyoak, Walford, McNab, Hazard, Stead, K., Beavon and Robinson.

We fielded the same team in the second game, against Atalanta Bergamo of Italy, but lost 1—0. The following day we played Olympique Lyonnais, the French club, and again lost 1—0. The only change in the team was the inclusion of Miller for Hazard, but the former was replaced by Steve Cavanagh after 24 minutes.

All matches in this tournament were of 25 minutes' duration each way. Again our final match, against Chenois, the host club, was for 5th and 6th place. A goal by Falco gave Spurs a 1—0 win and the only change from the team that started against Lyonnais was Falco for Miller. Cavanagh replaced Mike Stead at half-time.

Chris Hughton was voted "Player of the Tournament" in Geneva and was presented with a handsome watch. The tournament winners in Zurich were A.C. Milan, and Atalanta Bergamo,

also an Italian club, won the Geneva tournament.





ARMSTRONG, Gerard (forward). 5 ft. 111 in.

BEAVON, Stuart (midfield). 5 ft. 61 in.



Born at Llanelli, Dyfed, where he attended Llanelli Grammar School, and had captained the Welsh schoolboy international team before signing apprentice forms for Spurs in April, 1975. Upgraded to full contract status in November, 1975. Has captained the Welsh international youth team, and last season made 14 Combination appearances. Also played rugby for his school and represented Carmarthenshire at javelin-throwing.

COATES, Ralph (forward), 5 ft. 7 in.





DAINES, Barry (goalkeeper). 5 ft. 113 in.



Born at Witham and played for Chelmsford, Mid-Essex and Essex County Boys before joining Spurs as an apprentice. Upgraded to full professional rank in September, 1969. Played for the England Youth team and was a member of Spurs' side that won the F.A. Youth Cup in 1970. Last season he made 19 League appearances, the most in any one campaign to date. His total of League appearances now stands at 30. Has also made three appearances for Spurs in the League

Cup and two in the U.E.F.A. Cup.

DUNCAN, John (forward). 5 ft. 11 in.



Was out of action for most of last season with a back injury, and has been training during this summer. Born in Dundee, where he attended Clepington Road School and Morgan Academy. Played for Dundee Schools Under-15s and after Dundee had signed him on a provisional form, he was "farmed" out to Broughty Athletic for development. Transferred from Dundee to Spurs in October, 1974 and made his debut in our colours at Luton on the last Saturday of

that month. Has scored 36 goals in his 74 League appearances for Spurs and in 12 F.A. Cup and League Cup matches for us he has netted five times. Played for the Scottish League against the Football League in 1973.





GORMAN, John (defender). 5 ft. 61 in.

Joined Spurs from Carlisle United in November, 1976. Born at Winchburgh, where he attended the local Broxburn St. Nicholas Secondary School. A Scottish schools trialist, he was spotted by Celtic while playing for Uphall Saints, but later captained Edina Hearts. He remained under Celtic's wing and at 17 signed for them as a professional. In September, 1970 he was transferred from Celtic to Carlisle. He made his debut for Spurs at home to Bristol City last November and



finished the season with 15 League appearances to his credit, plus the F.A. Cup-tie at Cardiff. He left the field with a knee injury during the home match with Liverpool last March that kept him out of the team for the rest of the season.



Played for the England Under-21 team against Wales at Wolverhampton last December as substitute. Born at Hayes, Middlesex, but has lived at Harlow most of his life. Attended Burnt Mill School and played for Harlow District and the Essex Under-15 and Under-19 teams. Signed for Spurs as an apprentice in April, 1974 and upgraded to full professional in April, 1975. Played for the England Youth team and as a schoolboy also played flyhalf in the West Essex rugby team. Last

season he was voted "Best Reserve Player" of 1975–76 by Spurs Supporters Club. Made his League debut as a substitute at home to Norwich City in August, 1975 and his appearance total now sands at 46 in the course of which he has scored five goals. He has also made three F.A. Cup and League Cup appearances, scoring one goal in the latter competition.





HOLMES, James (defender). 5 ft. 101 in.

Joined Spurs from Coventry City last March. A regular member of the Eire international team, he was born in Dublin, where he attended Strand Street Christian Brothers School and later Emmet Road Technical School. He played for both the Dublin and Eire Boys' teams and also shone at Gaelic football. While playing at centre-half for Bosco Boys' Club in Dublin, he impressed Coventry and was invited to sign for the midland club. He joined Coventry as an apprentice and was up



graded to full professional at Highfield Road in November, 1970. Made 10 League appearances for Spurs last season, and scored his first and only goal to date for us against Leicester City in the final League match at White Hart Lane last season.

HOLYOAK, Philip (centre-half). 6 ft. 1 in.



Born in Sunderland, where he attended the Castle View Comprehensive School. Captained Sunderland Boys and was a Durham County trialist, Signed apprentice forms for Spurs in September, 1975 and has been upgraded to full professional this summer. Was on Wolverhampton Wanderers' books as a schoolboy. Played regularly in our senior youth team last season and also made 11 appearances in the Combination side.

HUGHTON, Chris (defender), 5 ft. 71 in.

Born at Forest Gate and joined Spurs as a schoolboy. Played regularly in our senior youth team last season and also made three appearances in the Combination side. Signed as a part-time professional on returning from the youth tournaments in Switzerland in May. Is now serving his apprenticeship as a lift engineer in the City. Attended St. Bonaventure's Secondary School, Forest Gate, and played for Newham Boys. Was voted "Player of the Tournament" in Geneva



in May, and received a presentation watch. His brother Henry, also a defender, is a professional with Orient.

JONES, Chris (forward), 5 ft. 11 in.



Born in Jersey and established himself in schools football in the Channel Islands. Signed for Spurs as an apprentice in May, 1971 and was upgraded to full professional in May, 1973. Made his League debut for us on the opening day of season 1974-75 at home to Ipswich Town. Has now made 81 League appearances, in the course of which he has scored 15 goals. Last season he finished top scorer with nine League goals. Has also played in eight F.A. Cup and League Cup matches, scoring once.

Was married in June and has settled in Cheshunt.

KEELEY, Andrew (defender), 5 ft. 10 in.



Comes from Basildon and played for Basildon Boys. Signed as an apprentice for Spurs in September, 1972 and was upgraded to full contract status in January. 1974. A former England Youth international, he made his League debut at home to Birmingham City last October and had made six First Division appearances when the season ended. In 20 Combination appearances last season, he scored two goals. Brother of Glenn Keeley. the Blackburn Rovers defender

KENDALL, Mark (goalkeeper). 6 ft. 01 in.

Born at Tredegar but attended Bedwelty School, Bargoed. In addition to his county and district teams, he played for Wales as a schoolboy and has since been honoured by inclusion in the Welsh international youth side. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in April, 1975, when a number of other clubs were also showing interest in him, and was upgraded to full contract status in July, 1976. Last season he made 28 appearances in our Combination team.



McALLISTER, Donald (defender), 5 ft. 10 in.



Joined Spurs from Bolton Wanderers in February, 1975 and made his debut in our colours at Coventry that month. Born at Radcliffe, near Manchester, and played for Lancashire County and the combined Prestwich, Radcliffe and Whitefield District Boys' team. Graduated through Bolton's apprentice ranks to sign for them as a full-time professional in June, 1970. As a teenager with Bolton, he attended the local technical college and gained his City and Guild certificate in Motor

Joined Spurs from Stoke City last August and scored in his debut in the League Cup at Middlesbrough and also in his first League game away to Manchester United. Born at Newcastle-under-Lyme, where he attended the Edward Orme Secondary School, and played for Staffordshire Boys. Comes from Chadwell St. Mary, near Grays. Attended Quarry Hill and Torells Schools, Grays, and played for the Thurrock District Boys team. Signed apprentice forms for Spurs in July, 1973 and was upgraded to full professional in May, 1975. Has finished top scorer in the Combination team in each of the last two seasons. Made his League debut at home to Leicester City in February, 1976 and also played as substitute at home to Aston Villa the following month, scoring a goal

in that game. Has not appeared in the League team since that match.

The Cheshunt training ground is on the western side of the Great Cambridge Road, a few hundred yards north of the traffic lights at Church Lane, Cheshunt.

The nearest 'bus routes to the ground are the 310 from Enfield to Hertford, stopping at the eastern end of Brookfield Lane, and the 279 from Manor House via Waltham Cross to Hammond Street, stopping at the western end of Brookfield Lane.



HOTSPUR HISTORY

- 1882 Club formed by boys from a local cricket club and from the local Grammar School. The name of "Hotspur F.C." was adopted.
- 1883 Club reorganised under the presidency of Mr. John Ripsher. Club colours—navy blue. Matches played on Tottenham Marshes.
- 1885 First competitive match versus St. Albans in the London Association Cup, Spurs winning 5—2. Colours changed to light blue and white halves. First credit balance—9 shillings.
- 1886 First cup final. Played Caledonians in the East End Cup and lost 1—0. Club re-named "Tottenham Hotspur Athletic Club".
- 1887 First meeting with Arsenal—then Royal Arsenal. Match abandoned 15 minutes from time "owing to darkness", with Spurs leading 2—1.
- 1888 Spurs move to private ground in Northumberland Park, where the first admission charge of 3d. was made.
- 1890 Colours changed to red shirts and navy blue shorts.
- 1895 Spurs adopt professionalism.
- 1896 A record crowd of 6,000 spectators watch the friendly match against Aston Villa.

 Spurs elected to the Southern League, Division 1. Club colours changed to chocolate and gold.
- 1898 The Club becomes a limited company and a match against Woolwich Arsenal attracts a record crowd of 14,000 spectators.
- 1899 Final change of colours to the now familiar white shirts and blue shorts.

 The Club moves to present site, originally a market
 - The Club moves to present site, originally a market garden. Accommodation for 35,000. Ground almost named as "Gilpin Park" but instead gradually became known as "White Hart Lane". First match staged was a friendly versus Notts County—gross receipts £115.
- 1900 Success at last—Spurs become champions of the Southern League.
- 1901 Spurs win the F.A. Challenge Cup to become the only non-League club, following the formation of the Football League in 1888, ever to achieve this honour.
- 1908 Entry secured to the Second Division of the Football League.

- 1909 Promotion to First Division gained at first attempt.
- 1915 Relegation to Second Division.
- 1920 Promoted again at first attempt, this time with a still unsurpassed Second Division record of 70 points.
- 1921 Second F.A. Cup triumph, Spurs beating Wolverhampton Wanderers by 1—0 at Stamford Bridge.
- 1928 Relegation to Second Division with 38 points.
- 1933 Promotion again, this time as Division 2 runners-up.
- 1934 New East Stand completed.
- 1935 Relegation to Second Division.
- 1938 The existing crowd record of 75,038 spectators was established for the visit of Sunderland in the Sixth Round of the F.A. Cup.
- 1950 Promotion to First Division.
- 1951 Football League champions for the first time.
- 1961 Football League champions and winners of the F.A. Cup. The first club to complete the "double" since Preston North End and Aston Villa did so in 1889 and 1897 respectively.
- 1962 Winners again of the F.A Cup.
- 1963 Winners of the European Cup-Winners' Cup. The first British club to win a major European competition. Jimmy Greaves becomes Spurs' highest League goalscorer in one season with 37 goals.
- 1967 F.A. Cup-Winners for the fifth time.
- 1971 Winners of the Football League Cup.
- 1972 First winners of new U.E.F.A. Cup and therefore the first British club to have won two major European trophies.
- 1973 Winners of the Football League Cup, the first club to have won the trophy twice.
- 1974 First British club to have played in three major European Finals.

Net Receipts of £49,920, at U.E.F.A. Final (home leg) is Club record.

- 1975 Pat Jennings sets a new Club record of League appearances by passing Ted Ditchburn's previous record total of 418. Jennings finished season 1976–77 with 472 League appearances and 118 in the four major cup competitions.
- 1977 Relegation to Second Division.
