Chance of a "Double"

THIS afternoon it is our pleasure to welcome our old friends and rivals, West Bromwich Albion, to White Hart Lane.

We have already played Albion away from home. Our visit to the Hawthorns in August was our first away fixture of the season, and we brought back both points, Martin Peters scoring the only goal of the match.

Last Saturday we had a chance of completing our first "double" of the season on Birmingham City's Ground, but had to be satisfied with a draw.

Albion's visit today gives us another chance, and we hope at the end of the 90 minutes to be able to claim our first haul of four points this season from the same club.

Last Saturday Albion were defeated on their own ground by Newcastle United, but we know enough about the strange workings of football form to disregard that result as any firm indication of a Spurs win today.

It is true Albion have not won on this ground since December, 1963, and that they are in a lowly position at present. Those facts alone should alert our players against any mood of complacency.

LACKED PENETRATION

A point from an away match has long been regarded as a point gained, and on this basis we can look back on last Saturday's goalless draw on Birmingham City's ground with some degree of satisfaction.

It was not, however, a performance over which we can enthuse. Spurs played the better football in the first half, but too often our movements were backwards and sideways, and we lacked the penetration necessary to break down the Birmingham defence.

In the closing minutes we might easily have snatched a winning goal, but taken overall a draw was a fair result to a match in which the art of finishing was noticeably absent.

THE MEN OF ALBION

PETER LATCHFORD (Goalkeeper). New to League football this season. Born in Birmingham, and a product of Albion's nursery system. Moved up into the Reserve team last season, and has since made rapid progress. He's a brother of Bob Latchford, the Birmingham City striker, and David Latchford, the Birmingham goalkeeper.

GORDON NISBET (Defender). Made his debut as a goalkeeper, but has since been converted to his present position with considerable success. Born at Wallsend in the North-East, and has been a professional with Albion since September, 1968. Was selected for the Under-23s against East Germany.

ALAN MERRICK (Defender). Another local Birmingham-born player. Made his League debut for Albion during season 1968-69. Developed through the apprentice ranks at the Hawthorns. A 90-minute player who is noted for the strength of his tackle.

JIMMY WOOLGAR (Defender). A newcomer to League football this season. Born in Chesterfield, and joined Albion as a junior. Signed as an apprentice professional, and was upgraded to full professional rank in October, 1969. Has been allowed to develop steadily in the Reserve team.

JOHN WILE (Defender). Albion's captain. Started his career with Sunderland but was given a free transfer by the Wearside club at the end of season 1966-67. Joined Peterborough United, and made the further move to Albion in December, 1970. Ever-present in Albion's League team last season.

RAY WILSON (Defender). A Scot from Grangemouth, who has played for his country at Under-23 level. Made his first-team debut with Albion as a winger, but has since settled in defence. Made 40 League appearances last season.

ALISTAIR ROBERTSON (Defender). A Scot from Glasgow who has won golden opinions by his form with Albion. A former Scottish Schoolboy and Youth international, he made his debut against Manchester United as a 17-year-old three seasons ago. Is noted for his ability to "read" the game.

COLIN SUGGETT (Midfield). Born at Washington in County Durham and started his career with Sunderland. Was a regular member of the Sunderland team, then in the First Division, before his transfer to West Bromwich in July, 1969. A key man in linking defence with attack.

ASA HARTFORD (Midfield). One of the outstanding personalities in Albion's line-up. Born in Glasgow. Joined Albion as a young amateur, and signed full professional forms in October, 1967. Made his League debut in his first season as a professional. A former Scottish Under-23 player, who achieved full international rank last season.

STEWART McLAREN (Midfield). Born at Larkhall and a player who promises to reach the top with Albion. Signed as an apprentice in July, 1969, and was upgraded to full professional rank in May, 1970.

TONY BROWN (Forward). A full English international, who was born at Oldham and played for the Manchester Boys team. Played for the England Youth team and made his League debut for Albion at Ipswich in 1963. Headed Albion's League scorers last season with 17 goals.

BOBBY GOULD (Forward). Joined Albion from Wolverhampton Wanderers early last season, and is well known to North Londoners as a former Arsenal player. Born at Coventry and started his career with Coventry City, who transferred him to Arsenal in February, 1968. Finished last season with 12 League goals for Albion and one for Wolves to his credit.

ALISTAIR BROWN (Forward). A Scot from Edinburgh who established himself in English football with Leicester City. Finished top scorer for Leicester in season 1970-71, and although transferred to Albion early last March, was again at the top of City's scoring list when the campaign ended.

OLD SPUR...



Les Allen joined Spurs from Chelsea in December, 1960 in an exchange deal that took Johnny Brooks to Stamford Bridge. He was born at Dagenham, and played for Briggs Sports before joining Chelsea in 1954.

Allen, who played for the England Under-23s and the Football League, has a proud place in Spurs' history. As our inside-left, he was an ever-present member of the "double-winning" team of season 1960-61.

Les made his Spurs debut in a home match with Newcastle, and by the time he was transferred to Queen's Park Rangers in July, 1965, had made 119 League appearances in our colours. He scored 47 League goals for Spurs, and notched 14 in 18 major cup-ties.

Les went on to enjoy further success with Rangers, and eventually became manager of the club. After a spell in charge of Woodford Town, he joined Swindon as chief scout earlier this year, and on Tuesday was appointed their caretaker manager. Les still lives at Hornchurch, but spends a large part of each week in Swindon.

Les reflects with pleasure on his years as a Spurs player. "Without meaning any disrespect to Chelsea, I feel that Spurs are the club that really taught me what football is all about", Les tells us. "The influence of Bill Nicholson, and the calibre of the other players in the team, made a big difference to my own game."

During his career with Spurs, Mike England has known the heights of elation and the depths of despair.

Mike joined us from Blackburn Rovers, then recently relegated to the Second Division, on the day prior to the opening of season 1966-67.

Spurs beat Leeds United here 3-1 and it was the beginning of an excellent season for Mike. He played in every League match and was a member of our F.A. Cup-winning team.

The season Mike would rather forget was 1970-71. He was a regular member of the team until we met Bristol City in the second leg of the League Cup Semi-final here just before Christmas. That night he went off with an ankle injury, and remained on the casualty list for the rest of the season.

After playing in every League Cup-tie to the Final, he had to miss our triumph over Aston Villa at Wembley.

England comes from Greenfield, two miles from Holywell in North Wales, and was at school with Ron Davies, Southampton's Welsh international centre-forward. He had played in many international matches in his Blackburn days, and now has 37 full appearances for Wales to his credit.

Mike's total of First Division appearances for Spurs now stands at 220 and he has scored 12 League goals for us. In major Cup competitions, and the F.A. Charity Shield, he has played 70 matches for Spurs and scored twice.

Mike and his wife, Gwen, who live at Broxbourne, have two sons, 7-year-old Darren and 6-year-old Wayne, and a 16-month-old daughter, Gabrielle.

For the benefit of supporters planning to travel to our away match with Leicester City next Saturday by road, we have reproduced this map, together with the following directions, recommended by the R.A.C.

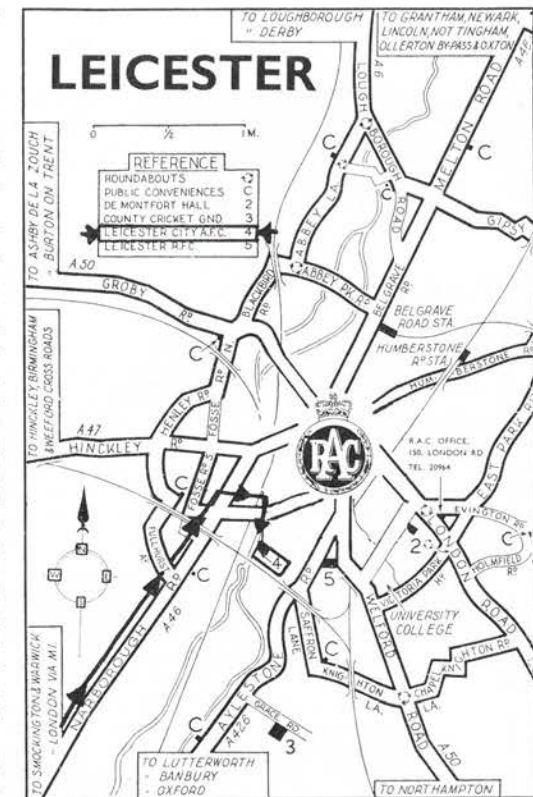
Follow **M.1 Motorway** northward to Intersection No. 21... Proceed by the signs "Leicester" and continue on the **A.46** to Leicester. Enter Leicester by Narborough Road (A.46) and continue to the crossroads—Fosse Road South and Upperton Road—and turn right into Upperton Road. The ground is in Filbert Street, which has been signposted.

There are car parks near the ground and some street parking is permitted but controlled by the police, so watch for the signs, including diversions.

The total distance from the Tottenham area is approximately 111 miles.

BY RAIL In connection with this match, British Rail will run a special train at a reduced day return fare of £1.50 for adults and 75p for children 3 to 14. This train will leave St. Pancras at 12.15, arriving Leicester at 13.50. The return time is 17.15 from Leicester, arriving at St. Pancras at 18.53.

Horseshoe Coaches (formerly Henry Coaches) will operate a service at a return fare of 95p, leaving Broad Lane, N.15 at 09.00 and Whitehall Street (opposite ground) at 09.15. For further details telephone 01-888 8326.
