No Mood of Charity

MANY of our matches with Burnley have provided skilful and rousing tussles in League and Cup, and since the resumption of First Division competition with them following our promotion in 1950, the Lancashire club have been one of the most popular and respected of sides to visit this ground.

It is therefore with genuine concern for our Burnley friends and rivals that

we note their present position at the foot of the League table.

We have no wish to embarrass Burnley by emphasising their lack of success this season. The League record tells its own story, however, and the remedy is something for which Burnley are obviously striving with each fixture they tackle.

Whatever one's sympathies, there can be no mood of charity on the field. We will not rejoice in worsening the situation for Burnley, but our own interests are paramount, and our ambitions demand the maximum effort to strengthen our present League position.

Burnley know, of course, that any improvement on their present position can only be achieved by their own efforts. For our own part, we need no reminder of football's capacity for surprise, and cannot afford to assess Burnley's challenge solely on their playing record to date.

We may, in fact, find ourselves facing a rejuvenated team. Last Saturday's 2—1 win over Crystal Palace at Turf Moor was Burnley's first of the season, and their long-delayed taste of victory is certain to have had an uplifting effect on their morale.

We know Burnley will be keen to pull off a shock result, but welcome as they are to this ground today, we hope their second victory will be a bit longer delayed.

ONLY TWO GOALS

In the course of the seven away League games Burnley have already played, they have scored only twice.

Their first away match was drawn 1—1 at Everton, Dave Thomas scoring the Burnley goal. Their other away goal, netted by Ralph Coates, was at West Ham, where Burnley lost 3—1.

In five away matches Burnley have therefore drawn a scoring blank. A goalless draw earned them a good point on Manchester City's ground, but they have been beaten at Ipswich (3—0), Derby (1—0), Liverpool (2—0) and Southampton (2—0).

Until last Saturday, Burnley's home

record in the League also had a dismal look. Apart from goalless draws with Chelsea and Coventry City, they had been beaten at Turf Moor by Manchester United (2—0), Liverpool (2—1), Leeds United (3—0), Arsenal (2—1) and Wolverhampton Wanderers (3—2).

The goals that beat Palace last week-end to brighten the Burnley outlook were both scored by Eric Probert.

Burnley's experience has been no happier in Cup competition this season. They lost 2—0 to Aston Villa in their opening League Cup match, and were beaten on aggregate by Hearts in Round 1 of the Texaco Cup.

REFEREE FOR TODAY



The man in charge today is Mr. Charles Nicholls of Plymouth.

TODAY'S VISITORS

BURNLEY

IN VIEW of Burnley's present position on the League table it is understandable that a number of changes have been made in the team in recent weeks, and at the time this page was completed, we could not be sure of the composition of the team to face us this afternoon.

It is a compliment to Burnley, however, that even in their present plight, they can field a number of players who command the respect of the opposition wherever the team plays.

At the top of the list in this respect is **Ralph Coates**, the midfield player, who is a full English international, and was with the World Cup squad in Mexico, although left out of the final pool.

Coates is one of the many first-rate players to emerge from the Burnley nursery system. He comes from Hetton in County Durham, and was spotted playing for Hetton Juniors.

STAR QUALITY

Dave Thomas is another Burnley player of star quality. He has played for England at School, Youth and Under-23 level, and seems assured of higher honours in the future.

Thomas, who may be seen in the No. 7 shirt today, was born at Kirkby-in-Ashfield, Nottinghamshire, but spent much of his early life at West Auckland in County Durham.

The name of goalkeeper Tony Waiters is familiar to everyone in football. An England international in his Blackpool days, Waiters retired to become a coach three years ago.

Just before this season opened, however, he left Liverpool's staff to sign for Burnley, and try his luck as a player a second time.

Centre-half Colin Waldron is the former Bury and Chelsea player. An Oldham man, he left Chelsea for Burnley in October, 1967.

Burnley's defence today may also include Mick Docherty, Eddie Cliff and Arthur Bellamy.

Docherty, son of Tommy Docherty, the former Chelsea and Aston Villa manager, was born at Preston when his father was a star right-half with the club of that town.

Cliff comes from Liverpool, and has developed from Burnley's junior ranks. He is new to League football this season.

ALL-PURPOSES PLAYER

Bellamy is an all-purposes player, who can also pull his weight in midfield or as a striker. He comes from Blackhill, in County Durham, and has played only for Burnley.

Geoff Nulty is another player with more than one string to his bow. Originally a left-back, he has been converted to the role of striker.

Nulty was born at Prescot in Lancashire, and was given a free transfer by Stoke City at the end of season 1967–68. Burnley signed him a few weeks later.

Eric Probert, perhaps best described as a midfield player, is another of Burnley's bright young discoveries. He is a former Yorkshire Schools player from South Kirkby, and was snapped up as a junior.


Striker Steve Kindon was Burnley's top scorer last season with 17 League goals. He comes from Warrington, and was an outstanding schoolboy athlete and Rugby Union player.

FROM CHESHIRE

Another young player who may face us today is Alan West, who comes from Hyde in Cheshire. West, who is still a teenager, made his League debut for Burnley last Easter. If West is in the team he will probably occupy an upfield position.

Defender Ray Ternent may also come into the reckoning. He is a Northumbrian from Blyth, who made his League debut for Burnley at Southampton in April, 1967.

Striker Frank Casper is the former Rotherham United player, while Dave Wilson, another attacking player, was signed from Walsall.



CONFIDENCE CAN SNOWBALL

News of The World

ONLY TWO teams separated Spurs and Burnley in the Final League table last season, when both clubs finished in the middle of the pack without either championship dreams or relegation fears.

Now the gap is considerably wider. And, if nothing else, the difference in the fortunes of the two clubs this campaign has shown the importance of confidence—or the lack of it—to a soccer side.

Few people could have foreseen Spurs making such a marked improvement this season with the same players who were at White Hart Lane in May. I'll admit I certainly didn't.

And there was no reason for anybody connected with Burnley to imagine their side would be fighting for First Division survival when November dawned.

But talk, as I have, to the Spurs first-teamers and they will tell you what a tonic effect a series of good results and a flow of goals can have. The players have re-discovered a belief in themselves and now they are making their own "luck".

When a break, or a decision, goes against them you can sense the whole side has the confidence to fight back. When constant pressure does not produce a goal, they battle on convinced it will only be a matter of time.

Burnley's players, on the other hand, must sometimes despair that anything will go their way. It's a feeling common to every team at the wrong end of every table.

Confidence can snowball. Just think back to Spurs' "double" side in 1960–61. As that season wore on, Danny Blanchflower and company never seemed to give a thought to the fact that they might lose any game.

Yet I've often wondered what influence the events of the very first game of that season had on what was to follow in shaping the "glory, glory" era of Spurs.

FANTASTIC FINALE

With less than five minutes to go in that opening fixture between Spurs and Everton at White Hart Lane the score was 0—0. Then, in a fantastic finale, Bobby Smith and Les Allen notched a couple of spectacular goals.

It's history now that Spurs went on to win their first 11 League games and lay the foundations of the "double" triumph, before a temporary setback in the form of a 1—1 home draw with Manchester City.

Yet would it have been quite the same without the impetus of that victory over Everton . . . if that first match had ended goalless?

Admittedly, many Spurs fans had expected their favourites to pull off the "double" a season earlier. Instead, they were beaten 3—1 at home by Blackburn in the Fifth Round of the F.A. Cup and squandered a commanding five-point League lead in the closing two months to finish with only a hard-luck story.

Champions that season were . . . Burnley. And thereby hangs another memory, for you never know when you are going to see a goal which will decide the League title.

The spectators at White Hart Lane on 3rd October, 1959, when Spurs and Burnley drew 1—1, certainly weren't aware of it as Brian Miller (now on the Turf Moor coaching staff) popped up with a Burnley equaliser 90 seconds from the end.

Spurs were hanging on to a 1—0 lead a few minutes from time when manager Bill Nicholson, sitting immediately in front of me, was asked "how long is there to go?".

Bill, obviously apprehensive that Spurs were losing their grip on the game, replied "too long". And then, to underline his words, Miller scored that all-important goal.

At the time it seemed Spurs had only lost a point. Seven months later the full significance was realised when Burnley became champions with 55 points, two more than Spurs.

But for that golden Miller equaliser, Spurs would have won 1—0 to give both clubs 54 points . . . and a superior goal-average would have taken Spurs to top place.

BACK HOME

Billy Mail, the reserve winger who left us last year and has since been playing for Germiston Callies in South Africa, was a spectator at our League Cup match with West Bromwich.

Billy has flown back during the South African close season, and is staying at Walthamstow. He returns to Germiston in January, when the new season opens, and plans to marry a South African girl in June.

We were glad to hear from Billy that Peter Baker, our former back, is doing well as caretaker-manager of Durban United, and that Tony Smith, our former reserve centre-half, has proved a success with that club.

NEW PRO.

Eddie Jones, who has worn the No. 3 shirt in our Youth team regularly this season, and was a member of the side that won the F.A. Youth Cup last season, signed professional forms for the Club last week.

Eddie was born at Finchley, but attended the Risley Junior and Belmont Secondary Schools in Tottenham, and later the Huxley Secondary School in Edmonton.

He gained a place in the Edmonton Boys' team, and played on trial for

Middlesex. Before signing as a professional, he worked for two years a a carpenter. We wish Eddie every success as a Spurs player.

FADE-OUT

Motherwell 3, Spurs 1

Our hopes of further progress in the Texaco Cup were dashed on Tuesday evening at Motherwell, where we found ourselves facing a determined and inspired team.

This was a big occasion for Motherwell, and they made the most of it.

We played some good football in the opening 20 minutes and took the lead when Jimmy Pearce rammed a hard shot into the net.

The course of the match changed, however, when Brian Heron equalised for Motherwell shortly before half-time. 

CHEER THE SPURS AT CHELSEA



For the benefit of supporters planning to travel by road to our away match with Chelsea next Saturday, and unfamiliar with that area of South-west London, we have reproduced the above R.A.C. map, showing the approach route to Stamford Bridge from the Dalston district.

The R.A.C. recommend the route via Kingsland Road. As there is no right turn at Old Street continue to junction with Great Eastern Street and turn right, proceeding ahead to Clerkenwell Road and Theobald's Road. Follow the "one-way" system via Proctor Street to Bloomsbury Way and Oxford Street. Continue ahead by Oxford Street to Marble Arch, turn left into Park Lane and follow to Hyde Park Corner.

Proceed via the "roundabout" to Knightsbridge (A.4), bear left into Brompton Road (A.304) and bear left again into Fulham Road and the ground is on your right. The approximate distance from the Tottenham area is $12\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

Street parking is controlled by the police, so watch for the signs, including diversions.
