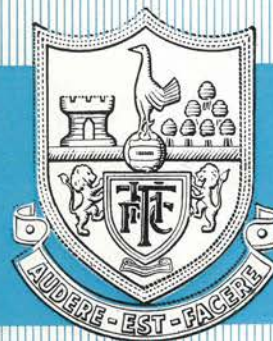

A Proud History

FIFTEEN YEARS have passed since Huddersfield Town last played us here on this ground. It was a vital end-of-season match in which both clubs were striving to fight clear of the relegation threat, and the facts are recalled on another page of this programme.

We can reflect upon some of the greatest successes in Spurs' history in the years that have since passed, but for Huddersfield, relegated soon after that last visit, 14 seasons of Second Division existence had to be endured before they regained their premier place a year ago.

As the current League table clearly shows, it has been a hard struggle for Huddersfield this season. Our Yorkshire opponents have, however, kept their heads above water in their first season back in Division 1.

Huddersfield have a proud history. Back in the 1920s they became the first club to win the League championship three years in succession, and they are also past winners of the F.A. Cup.

We have had some memorable matches with Huddersfield in the past, and we are happy to welcome them back to White Hart Lane. We have good reason to anticipate stubborn opposition from Huddersfield. When we played them in Yorkshire last September, we had to fight really hard to bring back a point.

RECORD PRESERVED

In beating Crystal Palace here by 2-0 on Saturday we preserved our record of never having conceded a goal to the South London club in League football.

We cannot, however, claim any pride in this latest performance. The match fell well below the standard expected of a London "derby" between First Division teams, and our only real satisfaction was provided by the result.

Steve Perryman certainly seized his chance well to give Spurs an early lead, but we had a narrow shave when Peter Collins kicked away a shot by Alan Birchenall after Pat Jennings had been drawn out.

After Jennings made a fine save from a free-kick by Phil Hoadley early in the second half, we seemed

certain to score following a fine move by Alan Mullery and Martin Peters. Martin Chivers failed to finish the move off, but the loose ball ran to Peters, who shot over the gaping net.

The late goal that gave us a comfortable win would rank with the prize-winners in a freak competition. Palace's Mel Blyth appeared to think play had stopped in midfield when he slammed the ball casually towards his own goal.

Like most of us, goalkeeper John Jackson was wondering what was going on as the ball spun into his net. Referee John Gow gave a goal, and there's a lesson there for everyone—play to the whistle.

BOB McDONALD

The older generation of Spurs supporters will share our deep regret at the death early this month of Bob McDonald, left-back in our F.A. Cup-winning team of 1921.

Bob joined Spurs in September, 1919, and made well over a hundred First-team appearances for the Club. He was unfortunate with injuries during his spell as a Spurs player, but he remained here until 1927, when he was transferred to Clapton Orient.

Inverness was Bob's home-town, but he lived in Glasgow from the time his football career finished here in London.

Time has therefore severed another link with the 1921 Cup-winning team, and we offer our condolences to Bob's widow, Mrs. Florence McDonald, and her family.

REFEREE FOR TONIGHT



The man in charge this evening is Mr. Dave Wallace of Swindon.

Back in 1949 Mr. Wallace was persuaded by one of his working colleagues to take up refereeing. He studied and sat for the examination, and in due course qualified.

His path to the Football League was via the Wiltshire and Western Leagues, and he has since officiated in a number of big European matches.

One of his most important assignments was as linesman in the 1966 Cup Final between Everton and Sheffield Wednesday.

Mr. Wallace served two years' National Service in the R.A.F. between 1951 and 1953.

Married, with a daughter and son, he is employed as a production technician with British Rail. His hobbies are all connected with his work for his local referees' association. He coaches candidates for examination including physical fitness.

Mr. Wallace's last match on this ground was our Football League Cup-tie against Swansea City last September.

TONIGHT'S VISITORS

HUDDERSFIELD TOWN

THE TEAM fielded by Huddersfield tonight is expected to be an even blend of players signed from other League clubs and products of the nursery system at Leeds Road.

No member of the opposition this evening is better known than Jimmy Nicholson, the former Manchester United wing-half. Nicholson, a Belfast man, first played for Northern Ireland in his Old Trafford days, and has since made many more appearances for his country.

It was in December, 1964 that Huddersfield signed Nicholson from United. He has therefore spent six and a half seasons in the service of the Huddersfield club.

Full-back Dennis Clarke is another Huddersfield defender who was signed from a First Division club.

Clarke joined the Yorkshire club in January, 1969 from West Bromwich Albion, for whom he has played on this ground. He comes from Stockton, and played for the Durham County Boys' team before joining Albion as a youngster.

BIG CHANCE

Goalkeeper David Lawson has been given his big chance this season, and has taken it well. He comes from Wallsend in the north-east, and made his League debut for Bradford Park Avenue. In May, 1969 he was transferred from Bradford to Huddersfield.

Huddersfield's back four this evening may include Geoffrey Hutt, who has steadily developed into one of the soundest defenders in the North. He is a product of Huddersfield's nursery ranks, and was at one time an apprentice at Leeds Road.

Trevor Cherry, who is best described as a half-back, is a local Huddersfield discovery, who also graduated through the junior ranks. He made his League debut for the club in the Second Division during season 1966-67.

Alan Jones, a back-four player, is new to League football this season. He is another of Huddersfield's own discoveries.

FROM HEMSWORTH

Roy Ellam, also a defensive player, was born at Hemsworth. That's a

spot in Yorkshire well known to Cyril Knowles.

Ellam made his name with Bradford City, who transferred him to Huddersfield in January, 1966.

Jimmy McGill and Jimmy Lawson are two players who may be seen in a midfield role. McGill is by no means unknown in this part of London.

A Scot from Glasgow, McGill left the local Possil Park Y.M.C.A. club for Arsenal in the summer of 1965. He played only a few matches in Arsenal's League team before his transfer to Huddersfield in September, 1967.

Lawson is the former Middlesbrough forward. He was born in Middlesbrough, and attended South Bank St. Peters, the same school as the celebrated Wilf Mannion.

Blackburn Rovers were interested in Lawson as a youngster, but he preferred to sign for his local club. He was transferred from Middlesbrough to Huddersfield in July, 1968.

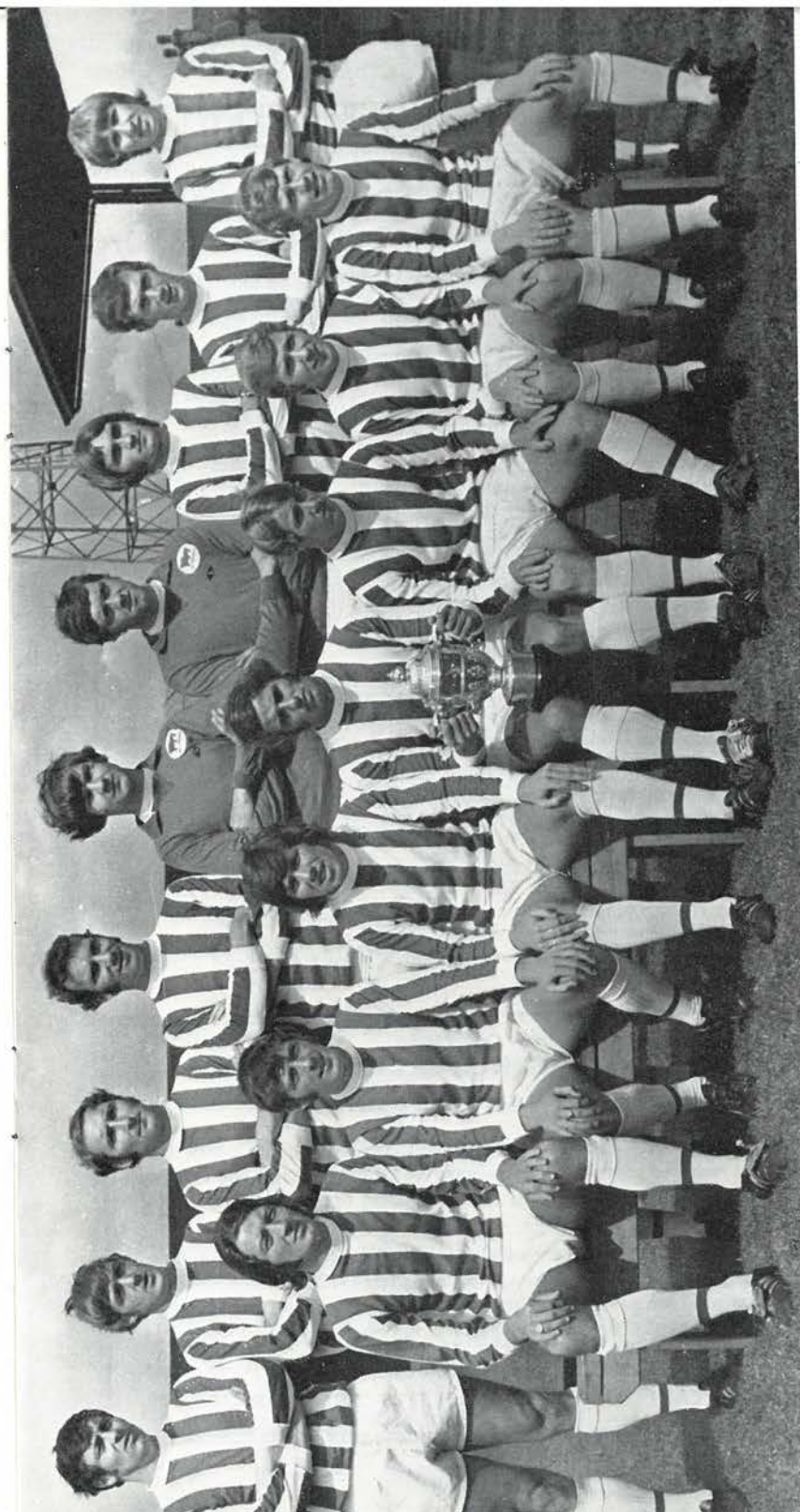
LOCAL BOY

Huddersfield's attacking force is likely to include Stephen Smith, a local boy, who has been a professional at Leeds Road since October, 1963.

Frank Worthington, also a forward, is another product of Huddersfield's nursery system. He comes from the Halifax district, and made his League debut for Huddersfield during season 1967-68. Worthington has since made a lot of progress, and now ranks with the most consistent players on Huddersfield's books.

Striker Brian Mahoney is another newcomer to League football this season. He comes from Tantobie in

the North-east, the birthplace of Billy ("W. H.") Smith, the outside-left who scored Huddersfield's winning goal from the penalty spot against Preston in the F.A. Cup Final of 1922.

HUDDERSFIELD CHIEF

Mr. Ian Greaves was appointed manager of Huddersfield in 1968, and is now nearing the end of his third season in charge of the Yorkshire club.

Mr. Greaves, a full-back in his own playing days, was born at Oldham. He joined Manchester United from Buxton, and was in the team defeated by Bolton Wanderers in the F.A. Cup Final of 1958.

At the end of season 1959-60 he left United for Lincoln City, then in the Second Division, and 12 months later joined Oldham Athletic, with whom he spent the last seasons of his playing career.

Before joining Huddersfield in a coaching capacity in 1964, he had a spell with Altrincham.

Providing his services are not required by us on the evening of the match, Roger Morgan will be available to play in the testimonial match for Les Allen, our former player, between Queen's Park Rangers and a London All-Stars XI on Rangers' ground on 3rd May, kick-off 7.30 p.m.

CHARGES FOR RESERVED SEATING FOR NEXT SEASON

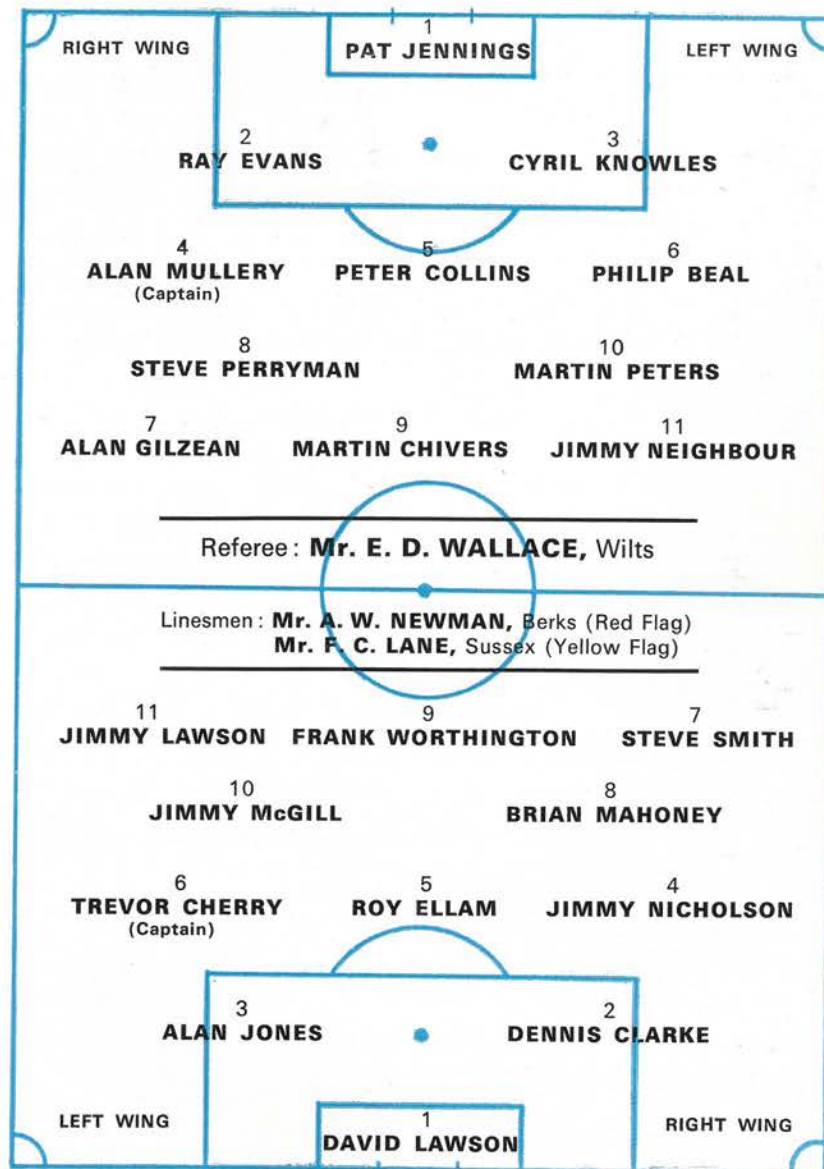

Huddersfield were bottom of the First Division at the time, and we were only three places above them.

It was a disappointing game, but Spurs were a goal ahead at half-time, scored from the penalty spot by Tommy Harmer after Johnny Brooks had been brought down in the area.

Early in the second half Maurice Norman headed into his own goal to put Huddersfield level, and from a quick breakaway Dave Hickson outpaced Harry Clarke to slam the winning goal past Ron Reynolds.

Spurs fought hard to save a point in the closing stages, but Harry Fearnley, Huddersfield's goalkeeper, was in top form.

In spite of that win Huddersfield were relegated when the season ended. The gate figure on that April Saturday was 36,387. The teams were:
