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Cup Dismissal

SINCE our dismissal from the F.A. Cup at Leeds last Saturday, we have been thrust back into European competition with the match against U.T. Arad here on Tuesday, and with three League matches to fulfil during next week alone, there is plenty to keep everyone interested in the Club, alert and occupied.

Tuesday's programme was printed prior to our visit to Leeds, and it was not, therefore, possible to include any reference to our Sixth Round F.A. Cup defeat.

It would be easy to sidestep the events at Elland Road, but a match at that late stage of the Cup competition calls for comment on this page before it slips quietly into the archives of history.

We knew what we were up against in tackling Leeds on their own ground, and most people would agree that we faced the hardest task of the four clubs called upon to travel in Round 6.

There can be no argument that we were beaten by a better team on the day. Several thousand Spurs supporters were there to see for themselves.

The disappointing aspect of our Cup knock-out was that we should have lost after taking the lead late in the first half and that the winning goal should have been netted by an unmarked player whose ability to snatch up this type of chance is common knowledge.

The Leeds match is now in the past and we can only hope that something has been learned from it. There is little consolation to be found in defeat, but it is only fair to the players and management to record that Spurs have figured in the Sixth Round in four of the last six F.A. Cup tournaments. This is a performance of considerable merit.

EARLY PRESSURE

We were subjected to heavy pressure by Leeds in the early stages, and our goal had a number of narrow escapes. Leeds were not having it all their own way, however. One excellent move by Martin Peters, John Pratt and Ray Evans ended with Gary Sprake saving a downward header by Martin Chivers.

The goal that raised all our hopes came a few minutes before half-time, when Pratt, from a position out on the left, swerved the ball into the goalmouth to deceive Sprake and a number of his defenders.

If we could have entered the

dressing-room at half-time with our morale boosted by a one-goal lead, the uplift in confidence, would have been immense. It was not to be. Lively Leeds swept to the attack for Allan Clarke to grab his equaliser less than three minutes later.

Jackie Charlton's header early in the second half finished off our Cup hopes and if it had not been for a great display by Pat Jennings, the margin of victory for Leeds would have been larger.

TODAY'S VISITORS

SHEFFIELD UNITED

MOST of the players expected to appear in Sheffield United's line-up today were in the team beaten by us here in the Third Round of the Football League Cup last season.

A notable change, however, is in the goalkeeping position, where John Hope has taken the place of the long-serving Alan Hodgkinson, who is still on the books as a player at Bramall Lane, but now has charge of the Reserve team.

Hope was signed from Newcastle United in January, 1971, and previously he played for Darlington. He was born at Shildon, and is a product of the Durham and Bishop Auckland Boys teams.

Full-backs **Len Badger** and **Ted Hemsley** both played here last season. Badger is a local Sheffield discovery, who has played for the England Under-23s and the Football League.

Hemsley, who scored United's goal here in the League Cup last season, was signed from Shrewsbury Town in August, 1968. Born at Stoke-on-Trent, he has also achieved distinction as a cricketer with Worcestershire.

NEWCOMER

Half-back **Ian Mackenzie** is a comparative newcomer, who had made only one League appearance prior to this season. He comes from nearby Rotherham, and has been a professional since June, 1968.

Centre-half **Eddie Colquhoun** is the club captain. A Scotsman from Prestonpans, he played for the Edinburgh Norton club before joining Bury. From Bury he moved to West Bromwich Albion, and in October, 1968 he was transferred to the Sheffield club.

Colquhoun has played for the Scottish Under-23s.

Geoff Salmons, who wore the No. 11 shirt here last season, is a versatile player. He can be described as a left-winger, inside-forward or wing-half. He's another local from Mexborough.

LEADING GOALSCORER

Alan Woodward is United's leading goalscorer, a distinction he has held in each of the previous three seasons. He was born in Sheffield, but first made impact in the Barnsley Boys team. He has gained representative honours at County, England Youth and Football League level.

Stewart Scullion is a Scottish forward who is well known here in

London. Born at Bo'ness, he started his career with Charlton Athletic, who transferred him to Watford.

Scullion enjoyed a lot of success with Watford, and United stepped in for his transfer in May, 1971. He has scored some valuable goals for the Sheffield club in his first season at Bramall Lane.

Bill Dearden is another Sheffield forward who needs to be kept in close check. Dearden, signed from Chester in April, 1970, has proved himself a splendid capture.

FORMER PLUMBER

A former plumber, Dearden completed his apprenticeship in that trade before turning professional for Oldham Athletic, his home-town club. Then came a spell of 18 months with Crewe Alexandra before Dearden moved to Chester in June, 1968.

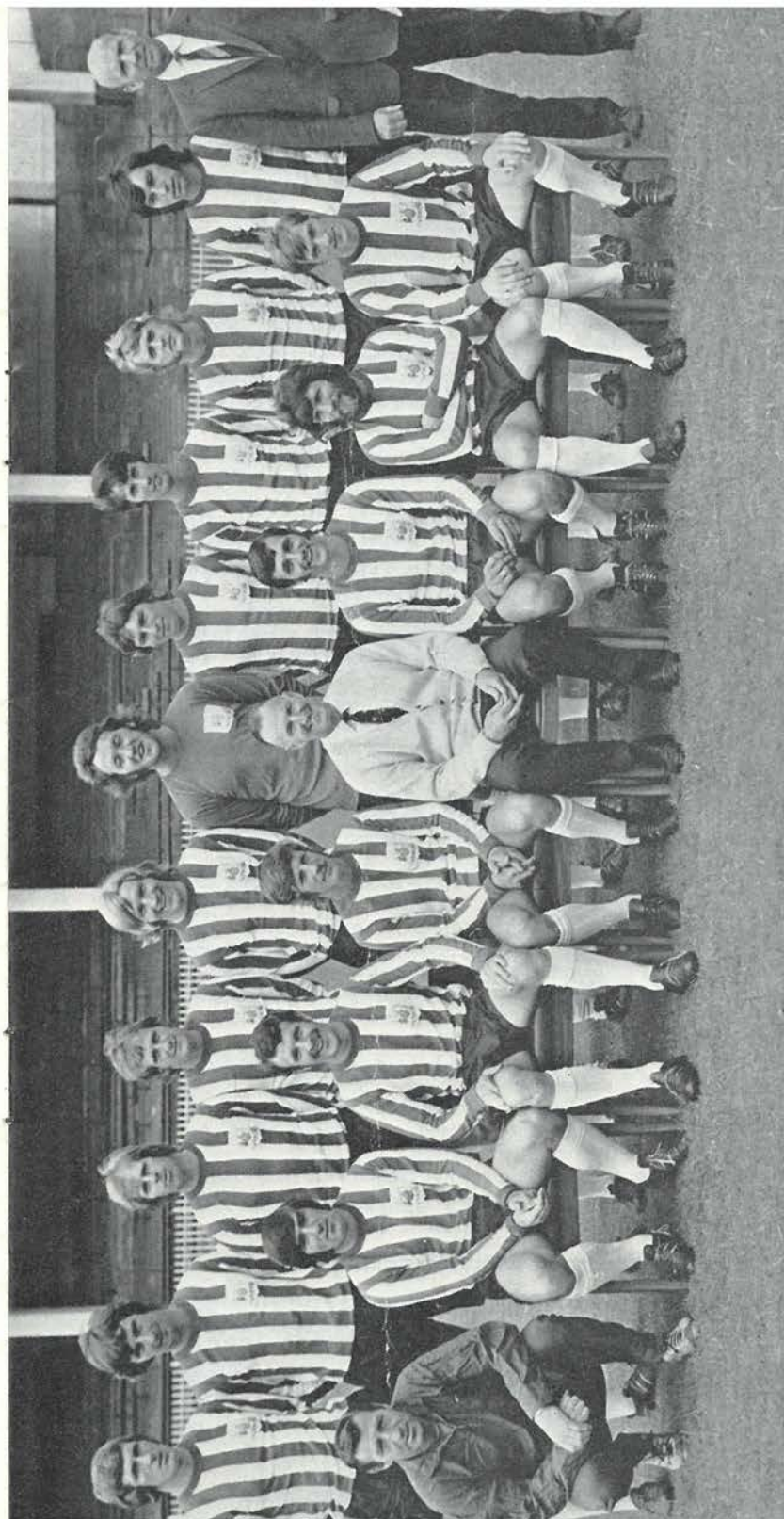
Last season Dearden missed only two League matches for United.

Tony Currie, who scored twice for the Football League against the Scottish League last week, is another former Watford player.

Currie was born at Edgware, and before joining Watford he had short spells with Queen's Park Rangers and Chelsea. It was in February, 1968 that Currie was transferred from Watford, and he scored in his League debut for United that month against Spurs at Bramall Lane.

Currie has also played for the England Under-23 team and is a former Youth international.

David Ford is the former Sheffield Wednesday and Newcastle forward. He left Newcastle for United in January, 1971.

YOUNG SPUR

JOE PECK, who had made 16 appearances this season in the Football Combination prior to Wednesday's match at Oxford, has made a lot of progress over the last year.

MAN IN CHARGE

The referee today is Mr. Dave Wallace of Swindon.

He started refereeing locally in 1949, and progressed to the Football League via the Swindon Borough, Swindon and District, Wiltshire and Western Leagues. He was appointed to the Football League Line in 1960, and the referees' list four years later.

Mr. Wallace was a linesman in the 1966 F.A. Cup Final between Everton and Sheffield Wednesday, and he has also officiated in a full international, in European Cup matches and in the Anglo-Italian competition.

His hobbies are all connected with refereeing, including coaching candidates for examination. He is a technical representative for British Rail Engineering Ltd.

Mr. Wallace's last match on this ground was our League fixture with Coventry City in March, 1970.

OLD SPUR...



The ball control and sleight of foot of Tommy Harmer had to be seen to be believed. He was one of the greatest soccer entertainers of his or any other age, and the most convincing argument for that old catch-phrase—"if they're good enough, they're big enough".

The newspapers had a string of names for Tommy. "Tiny Tom", "Tom Thumb", "Twinkletoes"—they all fitted.

Harmer joined Spurs as an amateur in 1945, and became a professional in 1948. He first appeared in our League team in 1951, and when he left us to sign for Watford in 1960 he had made 205 appearances in League matches alone for us.

Two years later Tommy moved to Chelsea, and it was at Stamford Bridge that he finished his League career.

Tommy, who lives at Wood Green, now works as a messenger for foreign exchange brokers in the City. He got the job on the recommendation of Johnny Brooks. How's that for a survival of the old Spurs team spirit?

Tommy tells us the Spurs matches that stand out most in his memory were his debut here against Bolton, and those two exciting F.A. Cup-ties with West Ham in 1956. Spurs won the replay at Upton Park, and Harmer scored in both games.

Tommy, who still plays in the occasional charity match for the Ex-Spurs All-Stars, looks back with pride. "Coming from Hackney, it was a great thrill for me to play for Spurs for so many years," he says.

FLASHBACK

TEN YEARS AGO THIS WEEK-END

By defeating Everton 3—1 on this ground, Spurs climbed into third position above the Merseyside club. Prior to the match both clubs had 38 points. All four goals were scored in the first half, Cliff Jones, John White and Jimmy Greaves netting for Spurs. We won the F.A. Cup that season and finished third in the League.

TWENTY YEARS AGO THIS WEEK-END

Spurs were away to Wolverhampton Wanderers, and a fine display by Ted Ditchburn in our goal was largely responsible for the point we gained in a 1—1 draw. A fitful wind made playing conditions difficult, and Spurs were a goal down after 10 minutes. Within two minutes Eddie Bailey equalised for Spurs from a pass by Sonny Walters.

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GOING TO IPSWICH?

Follow the Southend Road to Gallows Corner, and then take the A.12 via Brentwood By-pass, Ingatstone By-pass, Marks Tey Roundabout and Colchester By-pass to Ipswich.

The distance from the Tottenham district is approximately 66 miles.
