Third Attempt

THIS afternoon we make our third attempt to win a home League match, and we need hardly declare to our supporters that the players are approaching this fixture in a very determined frame of mind.

There can be no complaint with our record to date in away matches this season, but we cannot afford to surrender even one point on this ground today.

We are sharply aware that our supporters must have been acutely disappointed that our home matches with Leeds United and Burnley should have ended in home defeats. Whatever may happen away, it was no way to open our programme of home matches, and the fact that we conceded three goals in each strikes even deeper.

We give full credit to both Leeds and Burnley for the fine football they played, but know we were at fault defensively in conceding as many as six goals in the two matches.

This is, in fact, the first season in which we have been beaten in our two opening home fixtures since 1955-56, when we surrendered all four points to Burnley and Manchester United.

Sheffield United, who have already lost narrowly in North London this week to Arsenal, will, of course, have their own ideas about the outcome of today's clash. We can only repeat that we are in no mood for another home failure.

WELCOME, BLADES

To the Blades we extend a hearty welcome, and their record in the League to date suggests that our players will have to supplement their mood to win with their ability and skill to find a way through the Sheffield defence.

Elsewhere in this programme it is on record that the Sheffield club has not won a League match on this ground since 1938. Records like that are no more than interesting. They have little or no bearing on what is likely to happen today.

If Spurs record their first home win today, there is little doubt that we will have earned it.





BACKTRACK . . .

Reviving incidents from past League matches with Sheffield United

LAST season Sheffield United were our visitors just before Christmas. It was not a good match but we had the satisfaction of beating the Blades by two clear goals. Prior to that win we had picked up only one point from four League matches. Martin

Chivers ran through to put Spurs in the lead in the first half, and Steve Perryman made sure of the points by steering the ball past Tom McAlister after an exchange of passes with Chivers . . . When Spurs visited Sheffield United in February, 1968, Tony Currie, now one of the outstanding players in League football, made his First Division debut for the Yorkshire club. It was a disappointing night for Spurs. Jimmy Greaves raised our hopes with an early goal, but Barry Wagstaff equalised and Currie put Sheffield in front before half-time. Gil Reece increased United's lead during the second half, but Spurs could manage only one further goal, a great effort by Chivers, and we were beaten 3—2 . . . It was a happier story for Spurs in December, 1965. We then won 3—1, our last victory at

Bramall Lane. Scorers for Spurs that day were Cliff Jones 2 and Frank Saul . . . Today's is the 33rd League match between Spurs and Sheffield United on this ground, and on one occasion only have the Blades scored more than twice in any game. That was in April, 1962, when they held us to a 3—3 draw. In an eventful game Spurs took the lead, but two goals by Bill Hodgson changed the outlook for Sheffield. Spurs were level again before half-time, and Danny Blanchflower put us in front once more from the penalty spot in the second half. At the other end Ron Simpson also converted a penalty to save a point for the Blades . . . United's visit in March, 1955 was a memorable occasion for Johnny Gavin, our outside-right. Spurs won 5-0, and Gavin scored four of them. The other was notched by Johnny Brooks, and all five goals were scored in the second half . . . The last time Sheffield put as many as five in Spurs' net was in November, 1953. Alf Ringstead scored a hat-trick and Harold Brook and Derek Hawksworth netted the last two. Spurs' scorers in a 5—2 defeat were Sonny Walters and Les Bennett . . . Spurs' biggest-ever win over Sheffield United? It was by 7-0 on this ground in a Second Division match in November, 1949. Spurs won promotion that season with the "push-and-run" side, and Sheffield met us at our best. At half-time we led 5—0 with goals from Len Duquemin 2, Les Medley 2 and Sonny Walters. In the second half Walters completed his hat-trick with two more. Former Spurs centre-half Jack Chisholm was in the Sheffield team that day . . . Back in May, 1939, the boot was on the other foot. It was the last day of the season and Sheffield needed to win to ensure promotion. They did it in style, crushing Spurs 6-1. Jimmy Hagan scored three, George Henson netted a couple and the other home scorer was Harold Hampson. Spurs' lone goal, scored after the Blades were four up, was netted by left-winger Les Miller . . . Sheffield United have not won a League match on this ground since Good Friday, 1938. They defeated us by 2-1 that day, and rubbed it in with a 1-0 win over us at Bramall Lane on the Easter Monday . . . The First Division match on this ground in December, 1933 was a day of personal triumph for George Hunt, our brilliant and popular centre-forward of that era. Bobby Barclay, Sheffield's English international inside-right, gave them an early lead, but Hunt scored a couple

before half-time, and put another two past goalkeeper Jack Smith in the second half... Turning the pages of history back even further, there was an occasion, in March, 1927, when Spurs made a fine second-half recovery to hold the Blades to a 3—3 draw at Bramall Lane. United scored three early goals in as many minutes, but Arthur Sanders, our centre-forward, pulled one back just before half-time. Taffy O'Callaghan, playing one of his early games for Spurs, scored the two point-saving goals in the second half... Spurs' biggest-ever win at Bramall Lane was by 4—1 on the opening day of season 1913–14. Our goals were scored by Jimmy Bauchop 2, Billy Minter and Fanny Walden. If you remember those three, you remember Lloyd George!

When Spurs face Grasshopper-Club in Zürich next Wednesday evening it will be the first time we have played a European competitive match against a Swiss club. As we won the trophy two seasons ago, and reached the Semi-finals last season, it will be our twelfth tie in the U.E.F.A. competition.
