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Value of Home Points

TO ACHIEVE any real success in League football, it is necessary for points to be picked up regularly away from home. Take a look at the final tables of any League in any season, and it becomes obvious that only clubs with a high level of performance away from home have achieved positive success.

At the same time a good yield of points from the away programme loses its value if a club's home record is not at least as good.

Spurs' home record to date is satisfactory in spite of an uncertain start. This afternoon's match with Stoke City is our seventh in the League, and from the six already played we have secured nine points.

In our last four home League games we have captured maximum points, scoring seven goals without conceding as much as one to the opposition.

It's a sequence we are eager to maintain, and it will be a feather in the cap of our players if they can extend the run of home League matches without giving a goal away to five against Stoke today.

It happens that Stoke have never won a match on this ground, and their first visit was as long ago as April, 1920. This statistic, interesting though it may be, has no influence on the tide of events today.

We can only hope our players will today preserve the club's home record against Stoke, who have picked up one point only here from their last four visits.

STILL WAITING

Stoke are still waiting for their first away win of the season. Of the six matches they have played in the League, they have lost four and drawn two on opponents' grounds.

REFEREE FOR TODAY



The man in charge today is Mr. Peter Baldwin of Middlesbrough.

FACILITIES

The new Club laundry, a photograph of which appears in this programme, has now been in operation for the past month.

Its installation has cost approximately £5,500, and it is only one of a number of new projects being carried out on the ground.

Plans have now been completed for the construction of an additional ball court on the Paxton Road side of the ground at a cost in the region of £70,000.

This scheme will help tremendously with the general training programme, and will also prove of great benefit in helping to develop further the Club's youth and junior players.

Close attention is also being given to catering facilities on the ground. Improvements in the general standard of catering are being planned in all parts of the ground, and a new, modern bar is being built at the rear of the East Stand terracing.

The cost of the improvements to catering facilities will be around £6,000, and we hope our efforts in this direction will benefit supporters and add to their comfort on match days.

TODAY'S VISITORS

STOKE CITY

IT WAS in February of this year that Stoke were last here, and today's team is expected to show little change from the side then beaten by the only goal of the match.

There are several well-known names in Stoke's team, but none can be more widely known and acclaimed than Gordon Banks, the Potters' celebrated English international goalkeeper.

Banks ranks with the greatest goalkeepers in football history, and he has made more appearances for England than any other player in his position.

Little can be written about Gordon that is not already known to the football public. He was born in Sheffield, and started his career with Chesterfield, a club with which Hardy, another great goalkeeper of long ago, was associated.

It was with Leicester City, however, that Banks achieved international distinction, and in 1967 he made the further move to Stoke.

A volume could be written on Banks and his international experiences. In contrast, midfield man **Mick Bernard** can look back on just 10 minutes as substitute in the England Under-23 team against West Germany at Leicester last week.

Bernard, who comes from Shrewsbury, is a player of exceptional promise, who can expect plenty of opportunity in the future. He joined Stoke immediately after leaving school.

PLAYED FOR EIRE

Gerry Conroy, who may fill a forward position, was also on international duty last week. He was in the Eire team that drew with Sweden in Dublin.

Conroy is a former Glentoran player, who joined Stoke in March, 1967.

Other well-known Stoke forwards are **Jimmy Greenhoff**, **John Ritchie**, and **Harry Burrows**.

Greenhoff started his career with

Leeds United, moved to Birmingham City in August, 1968, and signed for Stoke a year later.

Ritchie is in his second spell with Stoke. He left the Potters for Sheffield Wednesday in November, 1966, but returned to the Victoria Ground in July, 1969.

He is a Kettering man, and played for the Kettering club before joining Stoke for the first time.

Burrows is the former Aston Villa winger, who moved to Stoke in March, 1965. He comes from Haydock in Lancashire.

Peter Dobing, another experienced forward, had the bad luck to sustain a double fracture of the left leg at Ipswich last Saturday. He is the former Blackburn Rovers and Manchester City player.

For many years Stoke have had a reputation for producing their own players, and there is a firm likelihood that four locals in **Jack Marsh**, **Mike Pejic**, **Denis Smith** and **Alan Bloor** will be in the team.

BORN IN POTTERIES

Full-backs Marsh and Pejic were both born in the Potteries. Marsh was a star of the Stoke Boys' team, and he joined the Potters as soon as he left school. He made his League debut three seasons ago.

Pejic, from the Chesterton district of Stoke, has made a lot of progress over the last 12 months. He was playing outside-left in the fourth team when Mr. Tony Waddington, Stoke's manager, formed the impression that he would slot in well at full-back.

The switch was made, and Pejic has never looked back.

Smith, a well-built centre-half, is another Stoke product. He made his

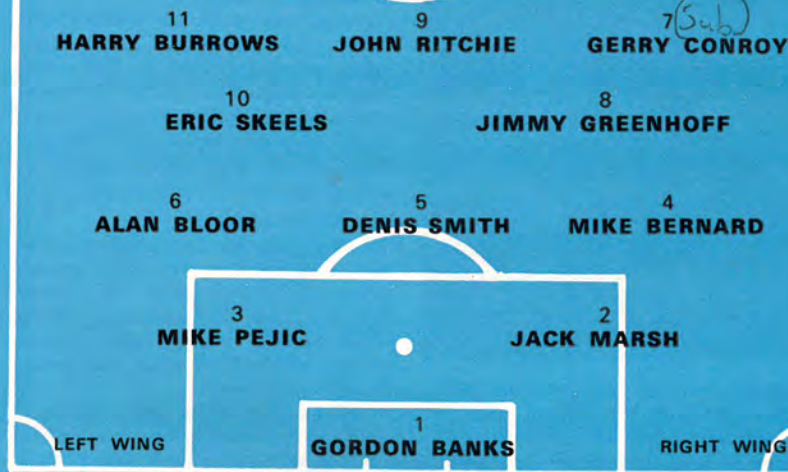

AGE

Presenting . . .

PHILIP BEAL



YOU might not think so to look at him, but blond, youthful-looking Philip Beal is Spurs' longest-serving player.

There are, of course, older players than Philip in the team, but in each case they were signed from other clubs, and cannot match his length of service as a Spur.

Philip—he prefers his full name to the abbreviated “Phil”—signed as a full professional in January, 1962 after a spell as an apprentice. His first form, as an amateur, had in fact been signed as long ago as May, 1960.

Beal was spotted by the late Harry Evans, then our assistant manager, playing right-half for Surrey Boys against Kent on Charlton's ground. He was invited to play in trials, and did well enough to be signed.

Philip was born at Godstone in Surrey, but moved to Bletchingley, where he attended the St. Catherine's School. He had no football ambitions as a youngster, and was considering a career as a steward in the Merchant Navy before that match at Charlton opened up a new way of life for him.

VILLA DEBUT

Philip made his League debut in an away match with Aston Villa on a Monday evening in September, 1963. Spurs won 4–3, and understandably, Philip felt 10 feet tall. He was called upon to fill the right-half position that Danny

Blanchflower had occupied with such distinction for so long.

Most of Beal's football has been played in defensive positions, and his chances of snatching a goal have therefore been limited. He managed it, however, against Queen's Park Rangers here two seasons ago, and as many supporters will recall, it was a highly spectacular effort.

Philip, right back that evening, made the running from a position deep in his own half, and after slipping a pass to Jimmy Greaves, he tore into Rangers' penalty area to hammer in the return pass. He must have run 80 yards in all.

Philip and his wife, Valerie, live at Oxted in Surrey. They have two sons, 2-year-old Deiren and 6-weeks-old Jason.

Beal's total of full League appearances to date is 180 plus 3 as substitute.

About Stoke . . .

IT MAY surprise a lot of people to know that Stoke were at one time members of the Southern League.

Although Stoke were founder members of the Football League on its formation in 1888, they fell on difficult times in the early years of the century.

At the end of season 1906–07, Stoke were bottom of the First Division. In the following season Stoke finished 10th in Division 2, but support had slumped to a serious level, and the club decided to resign from the competition.

It meant a lesser field of competition for the Potters, and seasons 1911–12 and 1912–13 were spent in the Southern League. Their nearest away matches during those two seasons were at Coventry and Northampton.

Stoke survived their period of comparative obscurity, and regained their place in the Football League when the Second Division was extended after the first world war.

Stoke's withdrawal from the League was of direct benefit to Spurs. When they resigned in the summer of 1908, we stepped in quickly with an application for membership, and were elected by one vote over Lincoln City.

NO MAJOR HONOUR

The Potters have never carried off a major soccer honour. Their highest final League placing was fourth in 1936, and again in 1947. The furthest they have progressed in the F.A. Cup was the Semi-final as long ago as 1899, when they were beaten 3–1 by Derby County at Wolverhampton.

Stoke have been finalists, however, in the League Cup. They were beaten by Leicester City by an aggregate score of 4–3 over the two-leg Final in season 1963–64.

Many famous players have worn Stoke's colours over the years, with Stanley Matthews the indisputable head of the list.

Another Stoke player with a special place in the record books is “Tim” Coleman, the winger who scored seven goals in a Second Division match against Lincoln in February, 1957.

The Stoke club was founded in 1863, and the team has worn red and white stripes since 1883.

Midfield man Eric Skeels is a long-serving Stoke player. He comes from the Eccles district of Manchester, and is now in his 12th season with the club.

GOING TO NOTTINGHAM?



FOR the benefit of supporters planning to travel by road to our away match with Nottingham Forest next Saturday, we have reproduced the above map, together with the following directions, compiled by the R.A.C.

Follow the **B.650** road from Potters Bar to the junction with the **A.6** . . . turn right on to the **A.6** and continue for four miles, then take the **A.405** to the **M.10** . . . proceed north by the **M.10** and then **M.1** to the Intersection No. 24 . . .

Follow the signs "Nottingham **A.648**" and at the roundabout eight miles on, take the first exit (**B.679**) . . . at 1½ miles further turn left on to the **A.60** to Nottingham. The total distance from the Tottenham area is about 133 miles.

Enter Nottingham by the **A.60** and continue to the second roundabout. Take the second exit—Radcliffe Road—then second left—Colwick Road—and the ground is at the end.

The Nottingham Forest club advise all motorists to use the car parks in the vicinity of the ground. There is a large car park at the rear of the East Stand, the entrance of which is in Colwick Road.
