Foreword

"WE ENJOYED AN HONOURED PLACE IN ENGLISH FOOTBALL OVER MANY YEARS IN THE PAST, AND WE MEAN TO REGAIN IT."

That was the concluding paragraph to my Foreword in last season's Handbook. Happily, we have taken a firm step towards its fulfilment by regaining our place in the First Division at the first attempt.

It was immediately after the close of season 1976-77 that we played two matches in Norway. We were still feeling stunned from the effects of relegation, but I was both impressed and encouraged by the determination of the players to win promotion in quick time.

Keith Burkinshaw, our manager, was able on that Norwegian trip to try out a different playing formation, a move he could not contemplate making when the pressures were so heavy and so much was at stake during the closing weeks of the previous season.

His plan worked well enough to encourage him to pursue it in our pre-season trip to Umea in Sweden, where we won a triangular tournament by beating Leicester City and Royale Union of Belgium, and those two visits to Scandinavia therefore proved of enormous value tactically.

Our prospects of promotion last season were always bright. We maintained our place in the top three and at one stage, late in the season, we led the division. We then faltered as the crucial time approached, but it is generally recognised that most promotion aspirants experience a "hiccough" or bad patch at some time of the season. Ours, unfortunately, came at the wrong time.

Defeats by Brighton and Sunderland meant we had to win our last home League match with Hull City to stay in the promotion race, and the tension that evening, when we finished winners by the only goal, was only exceeded in the final game at Southampton, where a goalless draw ensured our return to Division 1.

During the last 15 minutes at Southampton, I thought my watch had stopped! That's how nerve-racking those closing minutes were for everyone committed to the Tottenham cause.

In spite of the tension in those final matches, our target was achieved and congratulations are due to the Manager and his assistant, Pat Welton, and of course, to the players.

Now, with our return to the First Division, a new era opens for the Club, and we look ahead with optimism. We were fully aware of the need to strengthen our playing ranks and this all-important task occupied the attentions of the management from the latter part of last season. Strenuous efforts to sign new players culminated in the acquisition of Osvaldo Ardiles and Ricardo Villa, the Argentinian World Cup stars, in July, and in concluding this deal we achieved a major coup in the history of British football. Shortly after their double signing, we secured the transfer of John Lacy, the Fulham defender, and I wish all three players every possible success with Spurs.

Players now have freedom of contract and movement, but time alone will tell whether the new order will prove good for them as a whole and also good for the future of English football in general. Undoubtedly, there will be plenty of initial problems.

Change is part and parcel of the football scene and during the course of last season we signed Colin Lee (Torquay United), Tom Heffernan (Dunleary Celtic), Paul Bowgett (Letchworth Garden City) and Tony Galvin (Goole Town). Early this close season, Ralph Coates joined the St. George club of Sydney, Australia, and we wish him well in the future.

Departures from our ranks were Pat Jennings and Steve Walford, both to Arsenal before last season actually opened, and Keith Osgood and Martin Robinson to Coventry City and Charlton Athletic respectively during the campaign.

The reserve team struggled in some of their opening matches, but picked up so well that they headed the Football Combination table later in the season. When the campaign ended, they stood sixth on the chart, a performance that fell a bit short of the record in the previous season.

In the South East Counties League, Division 1, the youth team finished in a lowly position, but they provided one highlight by winning the final of the London Youth Cup, held over from season 1976-77, by beating West Ham United last October.

The Juniors also figured in the honours list by winning the Division 2 Cup, and the two-legged final was a memorable affair. Our team won the second leg 4-0 after losing 4-1 in the first match at Oxford. Their victory provided a fine finale to the season here at White Hart Lane in May.

We are always pleased to see our players gaining international honours. In playing against Bulgaria, Turkey, Poland, Norway and Denmark last season, Jim Holmes took his total of appearances for Eire to 25, an achievement that has earned him the award of a statuette from his country.

Gerry Armstrong also added to his international record for Northern Ireland with appearances against Belgium, Scotland, England and Wales.

We also contributed four players to the Under-21 teams. Glenn Hoddle played for England against Italy twice, Finland and Yugoslavia, and Chris Jones also appeared, as a substitute, in the match against the last-named country. Neil McNab was in Scotland's Under-21 team against Wales, for whom Mark Kendall kept goal. Congratulations to them all, and may many further honours come their way.

Unhappily, I have the sad task of referring to the death in June of Mr. Godfrey Groves, who had been a member of our Board of Directors since December, 1968. Mr. Groves enjoyed the respect and affection of all who knew him and his passing came as a big blow to everyone in the Club. He was prominent in public life in this area, and is sadly missed by his many friends.

In conclusion, I must record my appreciation of the tremendous support the Club has received both at home and away over the last year. It can only be described as fantastic, and it played its part in helping the team to win promotion.

Regrettably, there is a very small minority who, by their conduct, have besmirched our good name, and I appeal most earnestly to them to concentrate on watching the play and to behave in a manner that reflects credit on the Club. Only in that way can they prove themselves to be real supporters.

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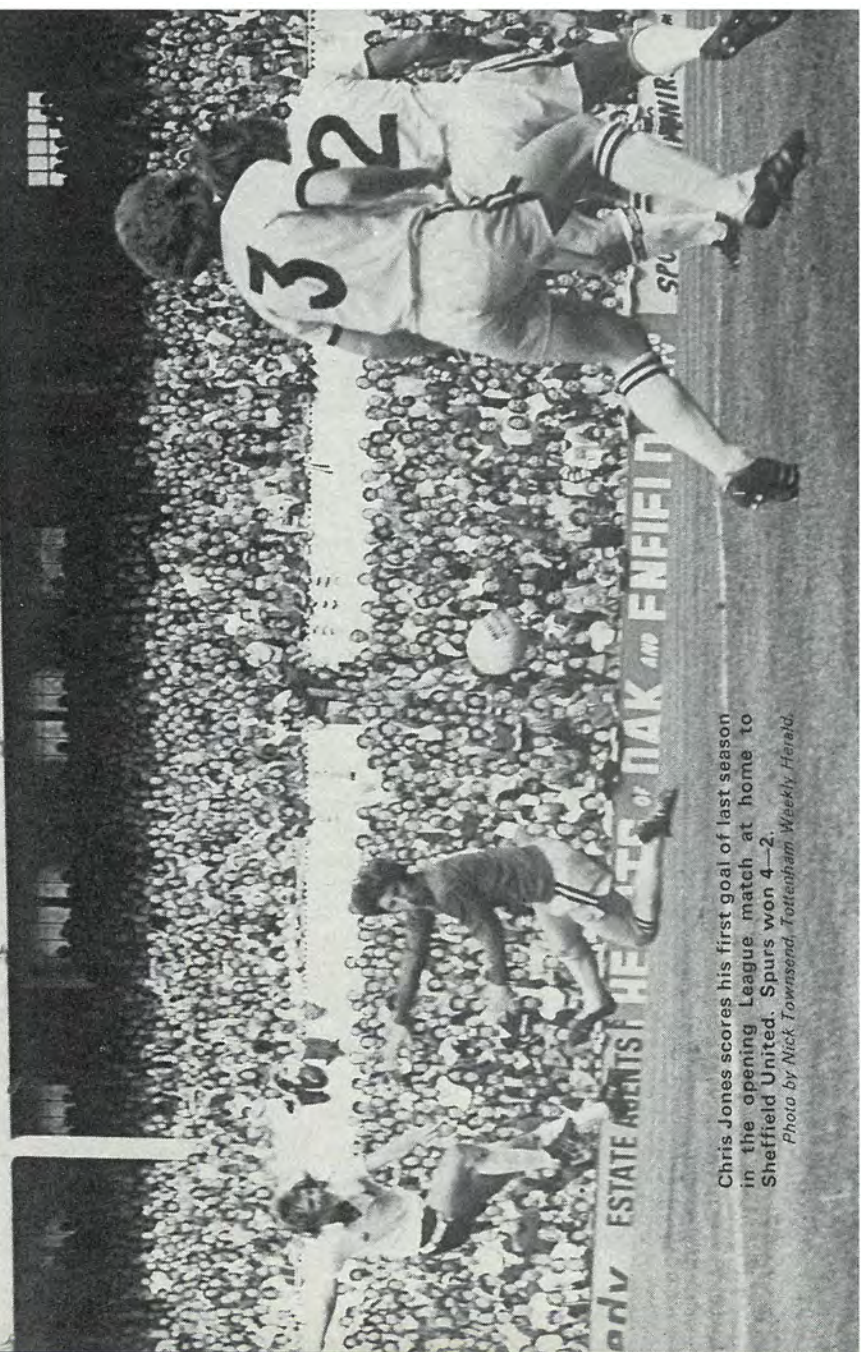

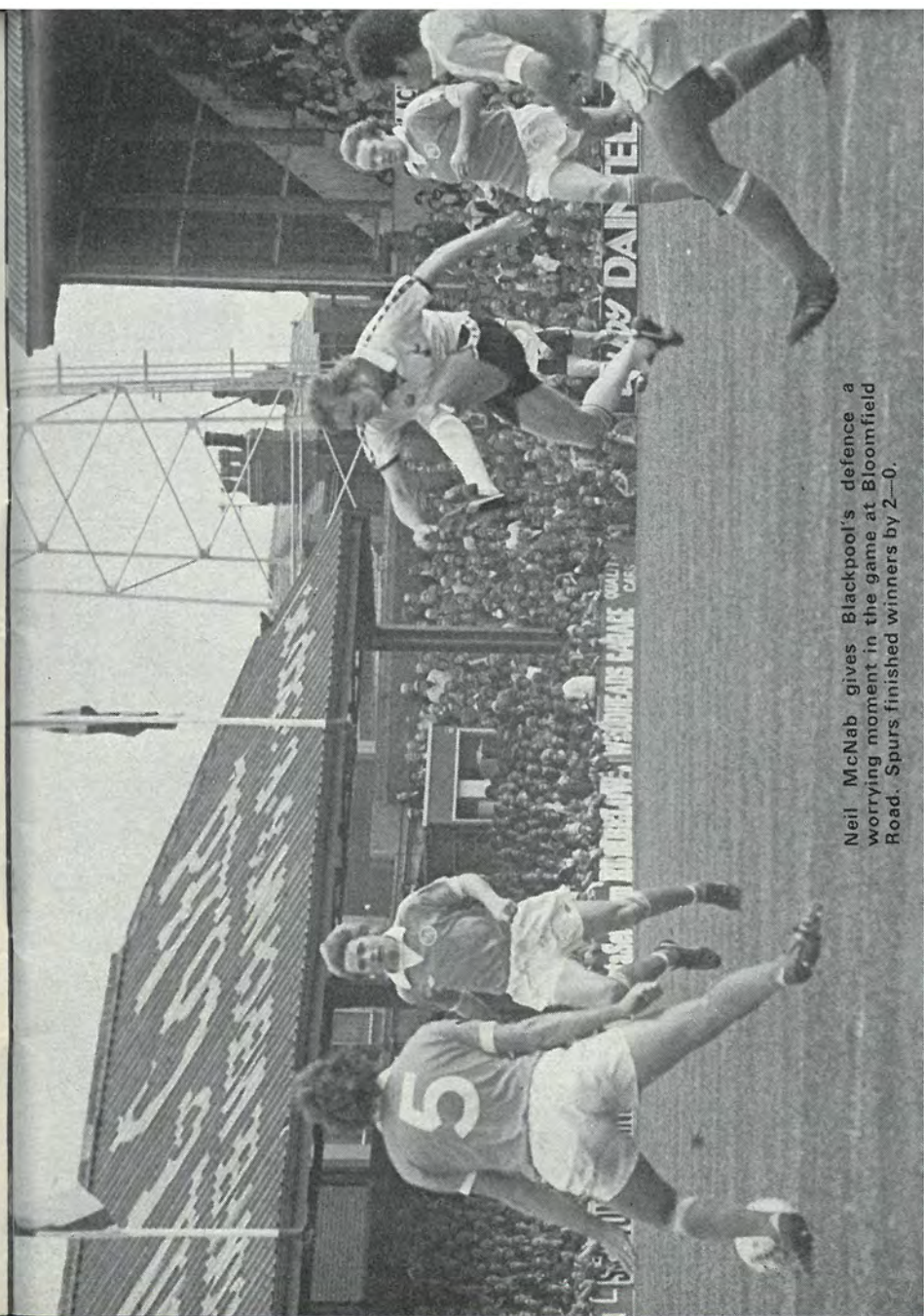

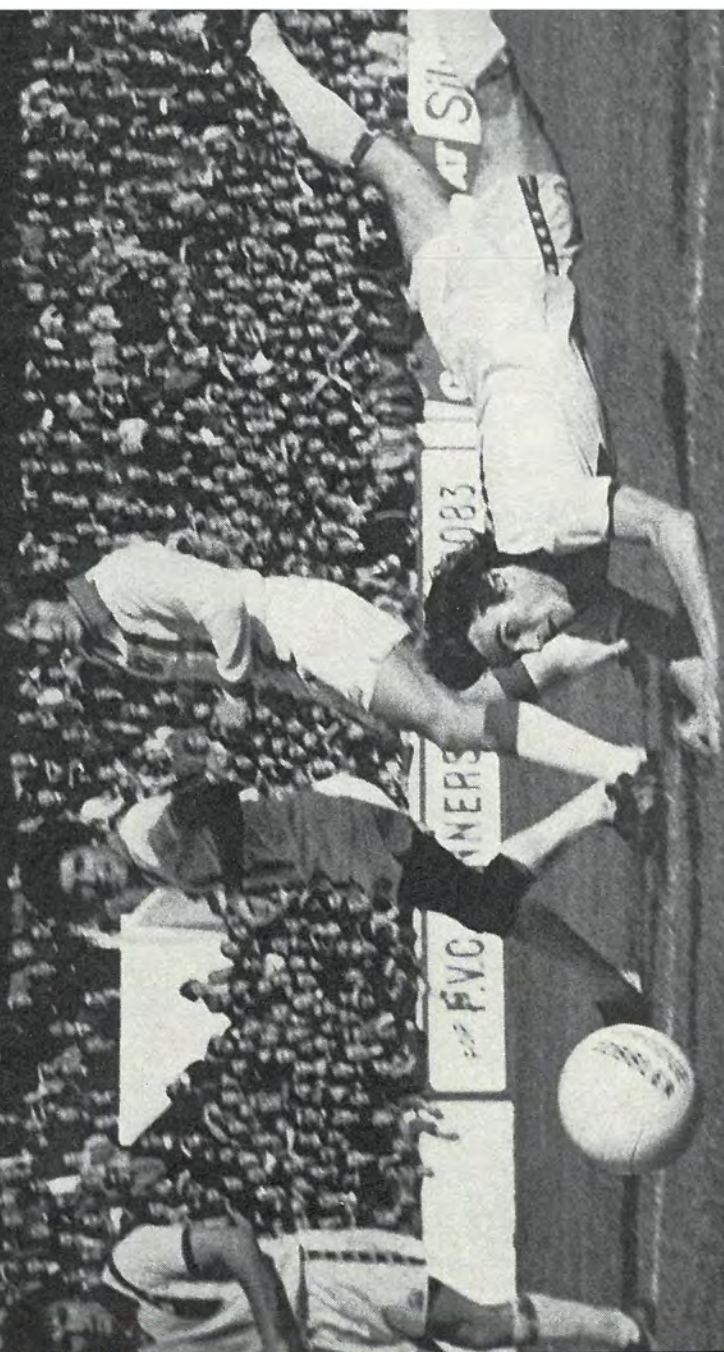

ARDILES, OSVALDO

(Midfield). 5 ft. 6 in.

His signing, with Ricardo Villa, from Argentinian football in July wrote a fresh chapter in the history of British football. A key figure in Argentina's World Cup triumph, he has played in well over 40 full internationals for his country, including the 1—1 draw with England in Buenos Aires in June, 1977. Born in Cordoba, where he attended Montserrat School, and later the local university. Has been at law school for the last four years and after a further year's book study, will sit for his examinations next summer. Developed his football with the Cordoba Institute team and joined the Huracan club of Buenos Aires in 1975. Was described by Ron Greenwood, the England team manager, as "the best right-sided midfielder player in the World Cup".



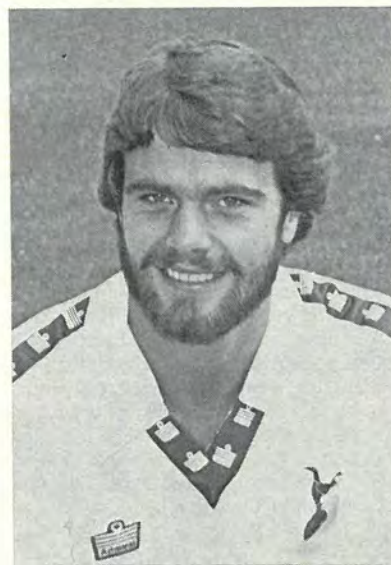


ARMSTRONG, GERARD
(Forward). 5 ft. 11½ in.

A full Northern Ireland international, who made his first appearance for his country against West Germany in April, 1977. Born in Belfast and joined Spurs from Bangor, the Irish League club, in November, 1975. Played for St. Paul's Swifts and Cromac Albion, local Belfast clubs, before joining Bangor as a part-time professional. His occupation in his Bangor days was as a senior clerical officer with the Northern Ireland Housing Executive. Made his League debut for Spurs away to Ipswich Town on the opening day of season 1976-77. Has now made 39 League appearances, scoring 5 goals, and has played in three F.A. Cup and League Cup matches, scoring once. Played Gaelic in Ireland before concentrating on football.

BEAVON, STUART
(Midfield). 5 ft. 6½ in.

Played regularly in our Football Combination team last season and finished with 13 goals to his credit. Born in Wolverhampton, but brought up in Oxford, where he attended the Northway School. Played for Oxfordshire Boys before joining Spurs as an apprentice in March, 1975. Was upgraded to full professional rank in July, 1976. His father is Cyril Beavon, the former Oxford United full-back.



BOWGETT, PAUL
(Defender). 5 ft. 8 in.

Signed as a full contract professional last February after playing in our Combination team as a trialist. Born in Stevenage, where he attended the Fairlands Junior and Barclay Senior Schools, and gained a place in the North Herts Boys' team and the Hertfordshire Youth Under-18s. Played for Stevenage Youth and later Letchworth Garden City. He holds the City and Guild certificate in mechanical engineering and gave up a job as a toolmaker for a career in football.

DAINES, BARRY
(Goalkeeper). 5 ft. 11¾ in.

An ever-present in our League team last season. Born at Witham and played for Chelmsford, Mid-Essex and Essex County Boys before joining Spurs as an apprentice. Upgraded to full professional rank in September, 1969. Played for the England Youth team and was a member of Spurs' team that won the F.A. Youth Cup in 1970. His total of League appearances now stands at 72, and he has also played in nine F.A. Cup, League Cup and U.E.F.A. Cup matches.





DIXON, KERRY

(Forward). 6 ft. 00 in.

Signed as a part-time professional in July, and is combining football with his apprenticeship as a tool-maker at a Luton factory. Born in Luton, where he attended the local Beechwood Road Junior and Challney Comprehensive Schools. Played for Luton district and Bedfordshire County Boys' teams, and had a spell in Luton Town's youth team. Made one appearance in our senior Youth team last season and scored one of the goals for the Juniors in the South East Counties Division 2 Cup final victory over Oxford United. Played for Chesham United, the Isthmian League club, earlier last season.

DUNCAN, JOHN

(Forward). 5 ft. 11 in.

Finished top scorer for Spurs last season with 20 goals in the League, F.A. Cup and League Cup. Born in Dundee, where he attended Clepington Road School and Morgan Academy. Played for Dundee Schools Under-15s and after Dundee had signed him on a provisional form, he was "farmed" out to Broughty Athletic for development. Transferred from Dundee to Spurs in October, 1974 and made his debut in our colours at Luton on the last Saturday of that month. Has scored 52 goals for Spurs in 101 League appearances, and in 15 F.A. Cup and League Cup games, he has netted nine times. His scoring average for us is therefore more than one for every two matches. Played for the Scottish League against the Football League in 1973.



FALCO, MARK

(Forward). 6 ft. 00 in.

Upgraded from apprentice to full professional in July. Born at Hackney and attended South Hackney Secondary School. Played for London, Hackney, Middlesex and Inner-London Boys' teams before signing for Spurs as an apprentice in July, 1977. Finished top scorer in the Combination last season with 17 goals from only 27 matches, and also netted 25 in League and Cup matches for the senior youth team.

GALVIN, ANTHONY

(Forward). 5 ft. 9 in.

Signed professional forms for Spurs last January after playing for Goole Town, the Northern Premier League club. Born in Huddersfield, where he attended All Saints Comprehensive School, and played stand-off in the school rugby team. Decided to concentrate on soccer and gained a place in both the Yorkshire Schools and England Schools Under-18 teams. Later played for Hull University, where he obtained a B.A. degree with Russian Studies his main subject. His brother Chris is a mid-field player with Hull City.





GORMAN, JOHN

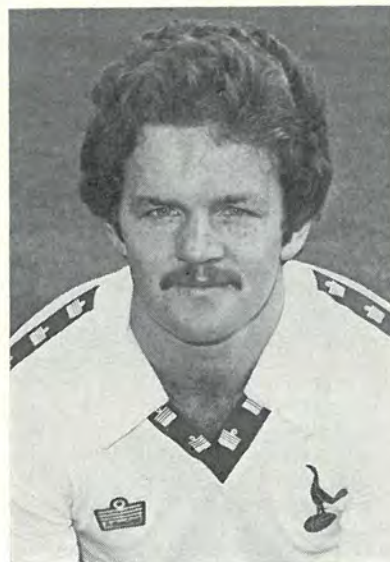
(Defender). 5 ft. 6½ in.

Was out of action with a knee injury for most of last season, but returned to the reserve team in the closing weeks. Joined Spurs from Carlisle in November, 1976. Born at Winchburgh, where he attended the local Broxburn St. Nicholas Secondary School. Spotted by Celtic while playing for Uphall Saints, but later captained Edina Hearts. He remained under Celtic's wing and at 17 signed for them as a professional. In 1970 he was transferred from Celtic to Carlisle. Made his debut for Spurs at home to Bristol City in November, 1976, and had made 15 League appearances plus one in the F.A. Cup, when that season ended. A talented artist, his caricatures of Spurs players appeared regularly last season in the Club programme.

HAZARD, MICHAEL

(Midfield). 5 ft. 7 in.

Upgraded from apprentice to full professional last February. Born in Sunderland, where he attended St. Aidans School, and gained a place in both the Sunderland District and Durham County Boys teams. He also represented Sunderland Schools at cross-country running. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in July, 1976, and last season made 33 appearances in the Combination team, scoring 7 goals.



HEFFERNAN, THOMAS

(Defender). 5 ft. 11½ in.

Signed a full professional contract for Spurs last October after a period on trial. Born in the Sallynoggin district of Dun Laoghaire, a few miles from Dublin, and previously played for Dunleary Celtic. Had attended the Christian Brothers School in Dun Laoghaire, but as the school game was Gaelic, he developed his football with the local St. Josephs Boys Club. Gave up a job as an orderly at a rehabilitation centre for a career in football, and finished last season with 29 Combination appearances to his credit.

HODDLE, GLENN

(Midfield). 6 ft. 1 in.

Made his fifth appearance in the England Under-21 team against Yugoslavia in May. Born at Hayes Middlesex, but attended Burnt Mill School, Harlow and played for Harlow District and the Essex Under-15 and Under-19 teams. Signed for Spurs as an apprentice in April, 1974, and up-graded to full professional in April, 1975. Played for the England Youth team and as a schoolboy also played fly-half in the West Essex rugby team. Last October he was elected "Player of the Year" by Spurs Supporters Club. Made his League debut as a substitute at home to Norwich City in August, 1975 and his appearance total now stands at 87, in the course of which he has scored 17 goals. He has also made seven appearances in the F.A. Cup and League Cup, scoring once in each competition.





HOLMES, JAMES
(Defender). 5 ft. 10½ in.

A regular member of the Eire international team, who joined Spurs from Coventry City in March, 1977. Made his League debut for Spurs at home to West Bromwich that month. Born in Dublin, where he attended Strand Street Christian Brothers School and later Emmet Road Technical School. Played for both the Dublin and Eire Boys' teams, and also shone at Gaelic football. While playing at centre-half for Bosco Boys' Club in Dublin, he impressed Coventry, and was invited to sign for the midland club. Joined Coventry as an apprentice and was upgraded to full professional at Highfield Road in November, 1970. Has made 48 League appearances for Spurs, scoring one goal, and has also played in two F.A. Cup and two League Cup matches.

HUGHTON, CHRIS
(Defender). 5 ft. 7¼ in.

Born at Forest Gate and joined Spurs in his schooldays. Signed as a part-time professional in June, 1977, and has since combined football with his apprenticeship as a lift engineer in the City. Attended St. Bonaventure's Secondary School, Forest Gate, and played for Newham Boys. Was a regular member of the Combination team last season, finishing with 37 appearances to his credit. His brother Henry, also a defender, is a professional with Orient.



JONES, CHRIS
(Forward). 5 ft. 11 in.

Played as substitute for the England Under-21 team against Yugoslavia on Manchester City's ground in May. Born in Jersey and established himself in schools football in the Channel Islands. Signed for Spurs as an apprentice in May, 1971 and was up graded to full professional in May, 1973. Made his League debut on the opening day of season 1974-75 at home to Ipswich Town. Has now made 101 League appearances, in the course of which he has scored 23 goals. Has also played in nine F.A. Cup and League Cup matches scoring once.

KENDALL, MARK
(Goalkeeper). 6 ft. 0¼ in.

Played for the Welsh Under-21 team against Scotland at Chester last February, and is also a former schoolboy and youth international. Born at Tredegar, but attended Bedwelty School, Bargoed, and played for his county and district teams. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in April, 1975, when a number of other clubs were also showing interest in him, and was upgraded to full contract status in July, 1976. Last season made 41 Combination appearances, more than any other Spurs player.





LACY, JOHN

(Defender). 6 ft. 3 in.

Joined Spurs from Fulham in July. Born in Liverpool and lived on Merseyside until he was nearly 18. Came south and attended the London School of Economics. Was a member of the London University team that was coached by George Cohen, the former England and Fulham full-back. This led to his signing by Fulham, for whom he played as an amateur before signing as a professional in June, 1972. Made his League debut, as a substitute, in a Second Division match for Fulham away to Cardiff City in November, 1972, and wore their No. 5 shirt against West Ham United in the F.A. Cup final of 1975. Has a Bachelor of Science degree in Economics.

LEE, COLIN

(Forward). 6 ft. 00 in.

Joined Spurs from Torquay United last October and scored four goals in his first match, against Bristol Rovers at White Hart Lane the following Saturday. Born in Torquay but lived most of his early life at neighbouring Buckfastleigh. Played for the Torbay Boys team and was spotted by Bristol City, who signed him as an apprentice. Upgraded to full professional by the Bristol club in July, 1974, but after a spell on loan to Hereford United, he was transferred to Torquay. Has played in 25 League matches for Spurs, scoring 11 goals. Also played in the two F.A. Cup matches against Bolton Wanderers last season.



McALLISTER, DONALD

(Defender). 5 ft. 10 in.

Joined Spurs from Bolton Wanderers in February, 1975 and made his debut in our colours at Coventry that month. Born at Radcliffe, near Manchester, and played for Lancashire County and the combined Prestwich, Radcliffe and Whitefield District Boys' team. Graduated through Bolton's apprentice ranks to sign for them as a full-time professional in June, 1970. As a teenager with Bolton, he attended the local technical college and gained his City and Guild certificate in Motor Vehicle Maintenance. Has made 80 League appearances for Spurs, scoring seven goals. Has also played in 14 F.A. Cup and League Cup matches, scoring once in the latter competition. Spent the summer of 1977 playing for Washington Diplomats in the North American League.

McNAB, NEIL

(Midfield). 5 ft. 7½ in.

Played for the Scottish Under-21s against Wales at Chester last February, and is also a former schoolboy and youth international. Joined Spurs from Morton in February, 1974 and after reverting to amateur status for the rest of that season, signed as a professional in June of that year. Made his League debut for Spurs as a substitute at home to Chelsea in April, 1974 as a 16-year-old. Had played in Morton's Scottish League team at 15. Has now made 70 League appearances for Spurs, in the course of which he has scored three goals. Has also played in six F.A. Cup and League Cup matches. Was ever-present last season. Born at Greenock.





MILLER, PAUL

(Defender). 6 ft. 0 $\frac{1}{4}$ in.

Born at Stepney and attended Morpeth Secondary School, Bethnal Green. Played for East London, Middlesex and London Boys and was an England school trialist. Signed for Spurs as an apprentice in April, 1976, and was upgraded to full professional in May, 1977. Made 23 Combination appearances last season before joining Skeid F.C. of Oslo in March. He is due to rejoin us when the Norwegian season ends in October.

MOORES, IAN

(Forward). 6 ft. 2 in.

Joined Spurs from Stoke City in August, 1976 and scored in his debut in the League Cup at Middlesbrough and also in his first League game away to Manchester United. Born at Newcastle-under-Lyme, where he attended the Edward Orme Secondary School, and played for Staffordshire Boys. Graduated to full professional rank from the apprentice staff at Stoke and made his League debut for the Potters at Leicester in April, 1974. As a Stoke player he gained England Under-23 honours against Wales and Czechoslovakia. Has played in 27 League matches for Spurs, scoring six goals. Has also played in three League Cup games for us, scoring twice. During the summer of 1977, he played in Australia for the Western Suburbs club of Sydney.



NAYLOR, TERENCE

(Defender). 5 ft. 10 in.

Born at Islington and played for Islington Boys. Trained for a while with Arsenal and also had a brief spell with Millwall before joining Spurs as an amateur. Gave up his job in Smithfield Market to sign as a professional in July, 1969 and made his League debut at West Bromwich at Easter, 1970. Has made 214 League appearances and 52 in major cup-ties. His only goal for the first team was scored against Chelsea in the semi-final of the League Cup at Stamford Bridge in 1971.

PERRYMAN, STEPHEN

(Midfield). 5 ft. 8 in.

Club captain. Born at Ealing and played for Middlesex, London and England Boys. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in July, 1967 and was upgraded to full professional in January, 1969. Made his League debut at home to Sunderland in September, 1969 and now has a total of 350 League appearances to his credit, in the course of which he has scored 22 goals. Has also played in 93 major cup-ties, scoring seven goals. Has been ever-present in each of the last two seasons, and has not missed a match since our away fixture with Sheffield United in December 1975. In making his 17th appearance for the England Under-23 team four seasons ago, he equalled the record set up by Martin Chivers. Runs his own sports outfitting business at Hayes, Middlesex.





PRATT, JOHN
(Midfield) 5 ft. 8 in.

Born at Hackney and attended Clark's College, Enfield. Played for the London F.A. Boys' team and spent a year in Brentford's youth side. Joined Spurs as an amateur on the recommendation of Terry Medwin, our former winger. Signed as a full professional in November, 1965 and made his League debut away to Arsenal in March, 1969. Has made 269 League appearances, scoring 33 goals. In 69 major cup-ties he has scored nine times. Was an ever-present in the senior team last season, at the close of which he had a testimonial match against Arsenal.

STEAD, MICHAEL
(Defender). 5 ft. 8 in.

Born at West Ham and as a school-boy played in the Newham District team. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in July, 1973, and was a member of our F.A. Youth Cup-winning team in season 1973-74. Upgraded to full professional in November, 1974. Made his League debut away to Stoke City in February, 1976, and in all has made a total of 15 League appearances for us. Made five appearances in the Fourth Division of the League for Swansea City while on temporary transfer to the Welsh club early in 1977.

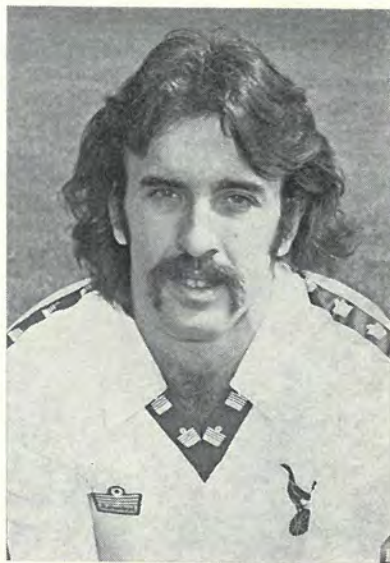


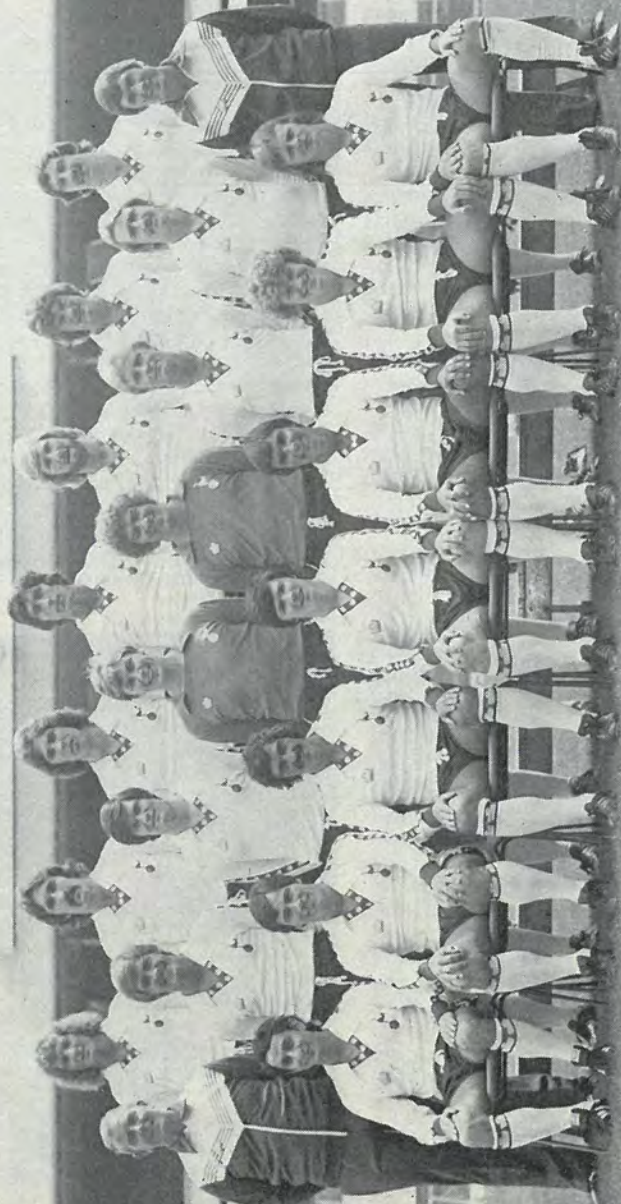
TAYLOR, PETER
(Forward). 5 ft. 7 in.

Missed only one League match last season. Joined Spurs from Crystal Palace in September, 1976 and made his debut for us in the away match with West Bromwich early the following month. Born at Rochford, where he attended King Edmund Comprehensive School. A midfield player in his schooldays, he gained a place in the South-East Essex District team and later played for Canvey Island. Spotted by Southend United, who transferred him to Palace in October, 1973. Has made four appearances in the full England team and four in the Under-23s. Has made 73 League appearances for Spurs, scoring 19 goals. Has also played in five F.A. Cup and League Cup matches for Spurs, scoring one goal, from a penalty, in the replay with Bolton last January.

VILLA, RICARDO
(Forward). 6 ft. 00 in.

Signed with Osvaldo Ardiles from Argentinian football in July. Played twice as substitute for Argentina in their triumphant World Cup campaign this summer, and his total appearance figure in full internationals is around the 25 mark. Born in Buenos Aires and joined the Quilmes club of that city on leaving the state school as a 17-year-old. Moved to Atletico Tucuman, and when he left that club for the Racing Club of Buenos Aires, he became the most expensive signing in the history of Argentinian football. It was from Racing Club that he joined Spurs, and like Ardiles, he was visiting Britain for the first time when he arrived in July. A great lover of outdoor life, he is keen on hunting and fishing.

KEITH BURKINSHAW was appointed manager of Spurs in July, 1976, having joined us as coach just prior to the opening of the previous season. A fully-qualified F.A. coach, he had spent seven years on the coaching staff of Newcastle United, four of them as coach to the first team.

Keith comes from the mining village of Higham, near Barnsley, and as a schoolboy played for the Barnsley District team. After a spell with Wolverhampton Wanderers' nursery team in Yorkshire, he signed for Denaby United, but after only a matter of weeks with the Midland League club, he was spotted by Liverpool.

A wing-half, Keith left Liverpool in 1957 for Workington. He spent eight seasons with Workington, and during that time filled the post of player-manager. In May, 1965 he moved to Scunthorpe United solely as a player, with the Lincolnshire club, he had a ten-month

A fully-qualified F.A. Staff Coach, Pat was England's Youth team manager for several years and for some time he combined this post with his job as Physical Education Instructor at Forest School, Snaresbrook, in addition to managing the Walthamstow Avenue Club.

Born at Eltham, he played for Chislehurst before turning professional with Orient in 1949. He spent nine seasons as a goalkeeper with Orient before finishing his League career with Queen's Park Rangers, and later had a spell managing St. Albans City.

HAMILL, ALEXANDER

(Defender). 5 ft. 6 in.

Has been on our apprentice staff since February, and when last season ended, he had made nine appearances in the South East Counties, Division 1 team. Born at Coatbridge, where he attended the St. Patrick's High School, and played for the Airdrie and Coatbridge Schools team. Also spent two years with Eastercraigs, a minor club in that district.

SIMMONDS, JOSEPH

(Midfield). 5 ft. 6 in.

Signed as an apprentice in June, 1977 and made 17 appearances in our Combination team last season, scoring two goals. Born in Walthamstow, where he attended the Cardinal Wiseman Senior High School. Played one match for the Waltham Forest district team, and was recommended to Spurs by Danny Clapton, our former forward.

SOUTHEY, PETER

(Defender). 5 ft. 6 in.

Born at Parsons Green and lives at Putney. Attended Hotham Primary School in Putney and Wandsworth School, and played for the Wandsworth district team and Inner London. Left school in June and signed as an apprentice in the following month. Made five appearances in our Combination team last season, three of them as substitute.

A LOOK AT

The Training Ground

We take great pride in our training ground at Brookfield Lane, Cheshunt, and feel it must be one of the best of its kind in the country.

It is at Cheshunt that our home fixtures in the South East Counties League are played, usually starting at 11 o'clock on Saturday mornings, and supporters within reasonable reach of the ground would find it worth their time to make a special effort to join the loyal band of diehards who watch our matches there.

There are three playing pitches, all with excellent surfaces, and the entire training complex occupies an area of approximately eight acres. The main pitch is well-appointed and there is a small brick stand, erected in 1957, which offers protection in bad weather.

It was in 1952 that the freehold and existing pavilion were acquired by the Club and following gradual improvements over the intervening years, a big modernisation scheme was carried out, including the installation of new dressing-rooms, at a cost of approximately £50,000, four years ago. The ground is now well-equipped to stage two matches at the same time, and to cater for our general training requirements.

Most of our pre-season training is held at Cheshunt, and during the playing season it is used for this purpose most week-days. In recent years we have tended to make greater use of the ground for training. In the past it has been used by England teams, and Mexico carried out all their training there for the World Cup in 1966.

The site, originally grazing land for cows, was used as a sports ground for a nursery firm before it was purchased by Spurs, and was used for football, bowls and tennis. During the war the pavilion served as an auxiliary fire station, and for a time after it became our training ground, Cheshunt F.C. played their matches there.

The Groundsman at Cheshunt is Don Coulston, who was a young inside-forward with Spurs shortly before the war. The son-in-law of the late Jack Coxford, our former trainer, Don, and his wife Doreen, have lived in a flat on the Cheshunt ground since his return to our service in 1956.

The ground is on the western side of the Great Cambridge Road, a few hundred yards north of the traffic lights at Church Lane, Cheshunt.

The most convenient 'bus route is the 279 from Manor House via Waltham Cross to Hammond Street, stopping at the western end of Brookfield Lane at the White Horse public house.

Refreshments are available in the pavilion at half-time, and there is ample car-parking space.

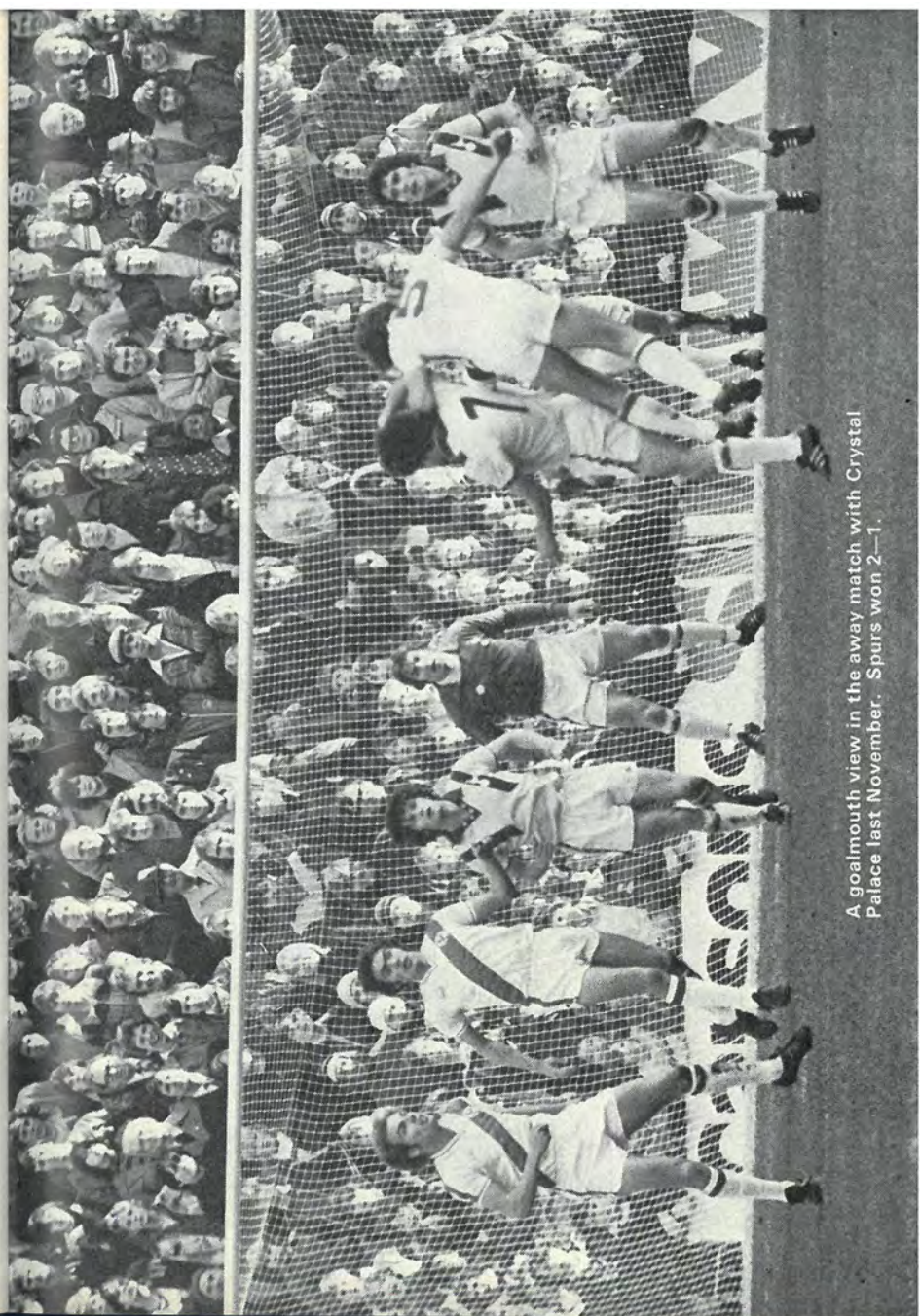

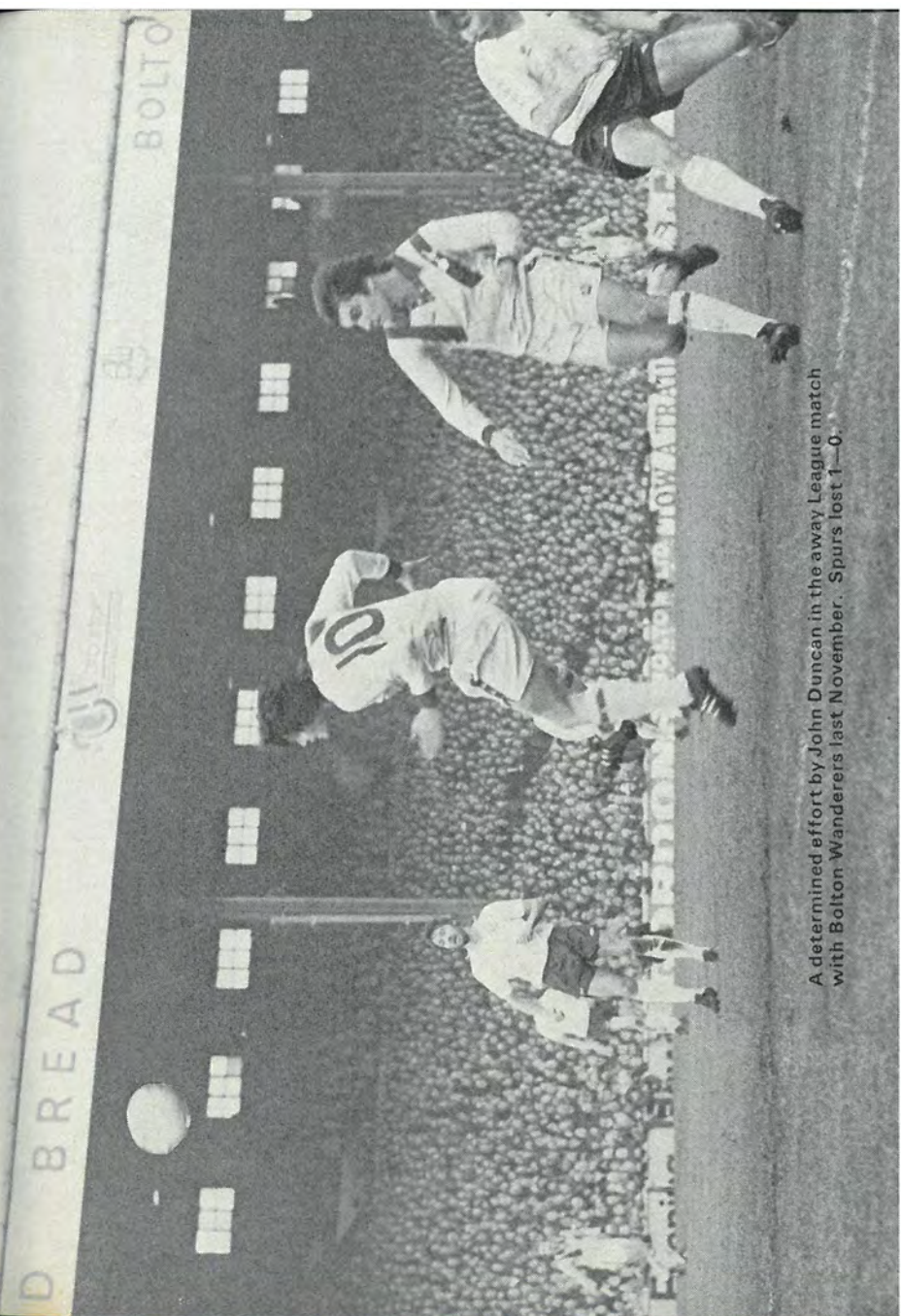


A goalmouth view in the away match with Crystal Palace last November. Spurs won 2-1.

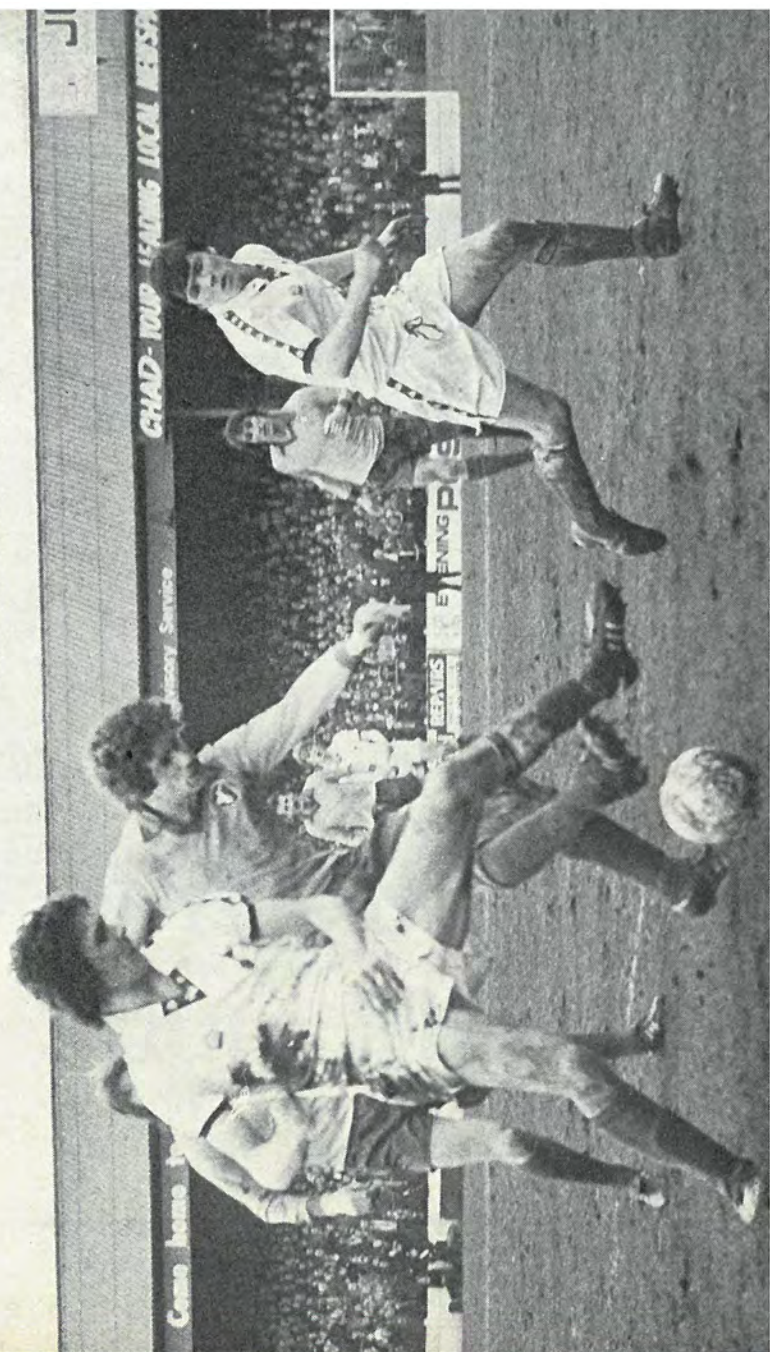

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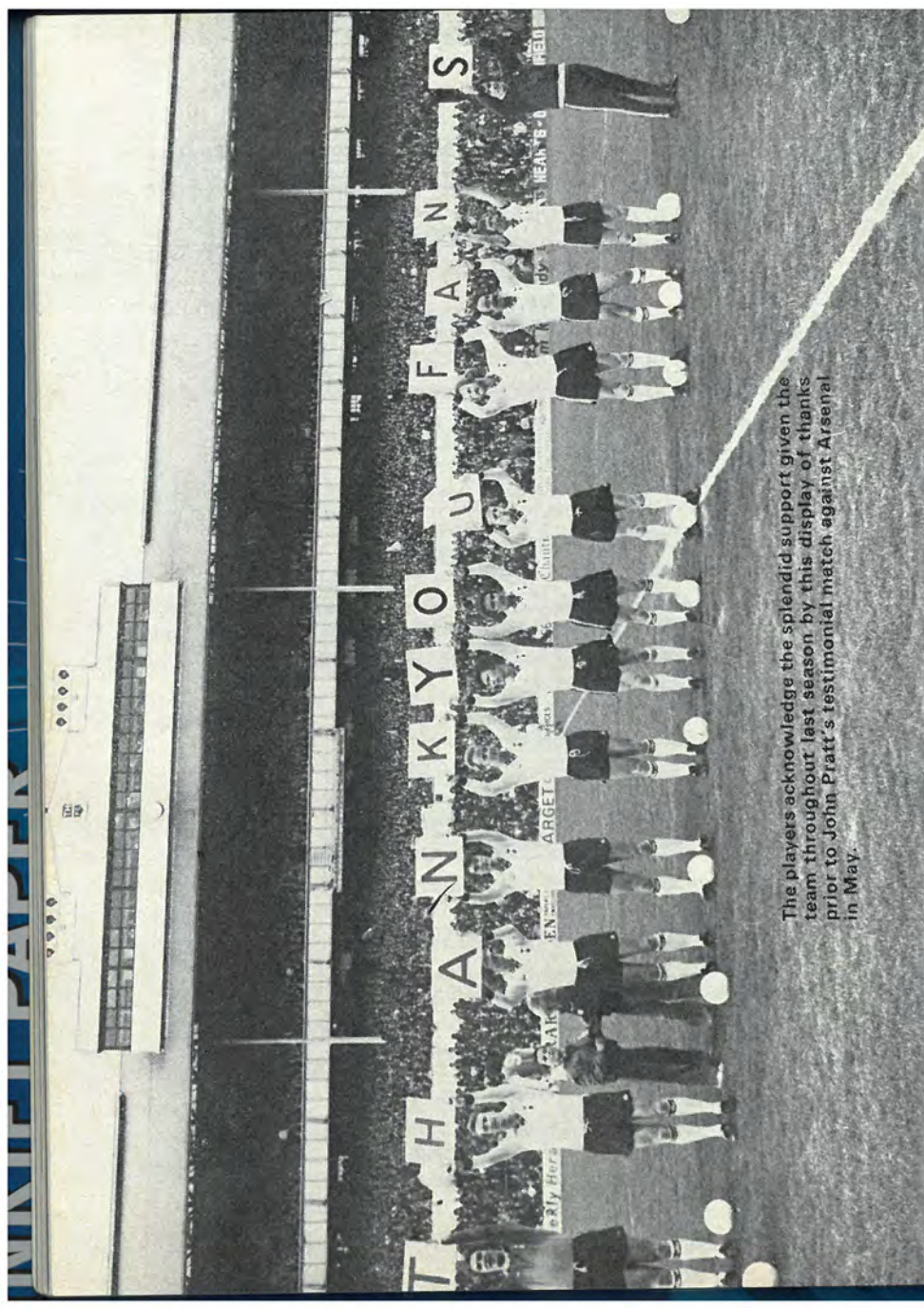


A breathtaking (!) moment for Peter Taylor in the goalless draw at Southampton in the final League match of last season.

HOTSPUR HISTORY

- 1882 Club formed by boys from a local cricket club and from the local Grammar School. The name of "Hotspur F.C." was adopted.
- 1883 Club reorganised under the presidency of Mr. John Ripsher. Club colours—navy blue. Matches played on Tottenham Marshes.
- 1885 First competitive match versus St. Albans in the London Association Cup, Spurs winning 5—2. Colours changed to light blue and white halves. First credit balance—9 shillings.
- 1886 First cup final. Played Caledonians in the East End Cup and lost 1—0. Club re-named "Tottenham Hotspur Athletic Club".
- 1887 First meeting with Arsenal—then Royal Arsenal. Match abandoned 15 minutes from time "owing to darkness", with Spurs leading 2—1.
- 1888 Spurs move to private ground in Northumberland Park, where the first admission charge of 3d. was made.
- 1890 Colours changed to red shirts and navy blue shorts.
- 1895 Spurs adopt professionalism.
- 1896 A record crowd of 6,000 spectators watch the friendly match against Aston Villa. Spurs elected to the Southern League, Division 1. Club colours changed to chocolate and gold.
- 1898 The Club becomes a limited company and a match against Woolwich Arsenal attracts a record crowd of 14,000 spectators.
- 1899 Final change of colours to the now familiar white shirts and blue shorts. The Club moves to present site, originally a market garden. Accommodation for 35,000. Ground almost named as "Gilpin Park" but instead gradually became known as "White Hart Lane". First match staged was a friendly versus Notts County—gross receipts £115.
- 1900 Success at last—Spurs become champions of the Southern League.
- 1901 Spurs win the F.A. Challenge Cup to become the only non-League club, following the formation of the Football League in 1888, ever to achieve this honour.

- 1908 Entry secured to the Second Division of the Football League.
- 1909 Promotion to First Division gained at first attempt.
- 1915 Relegation to Second Division.
- 1920 Promoted again at first attempt, this time with a still unsurpassed Second Division record of 70 points.
- 1921 Second F.A. Cup triumph, Spurs beating Wolverhampton Wanderers by 1—0 at Stamford Bridge.
- 1928 Relegation to Second Division with 38 points.
- 1933 Promotion again, this time as Division 2 runners-up.
- 1934 New East Stand completed.
- 1935 Relegation to Second Division.
- 1938 The existing crowd record of 75,038 spectators was established for the visit of Sunderland in the Sixth Round of the F.A. Cup.
- 1950 Promotion to First Division.
- 1951 Football League champions for the first time.
- 1961 Football League champions and winners of the F.A. Cup. The first club to complete the "double" since Preston North End and Aston Villa did so in 1889 and 1897 respectively.
- 1962 Winners again of the F.A. Cup.
- 1963 Winners of the European Cup-Winners' Cup. The first British club to win a major European competition. Jimmy Greaves becomes Spurs' highest League goalscorer in one season with 37 goals.
- 1967 F.A. Cup-Winners for the fifth time.
- 1971 Winners of the Football League Cup.
- 1972 First winners of new U.E.F.A. Cup and therefore the first British club to have won two major European trophies.
- 1973 Winners of the Football League Cup, the first club to have won the trophy twice.
- 1974 First British club to have played in three major European Finals.
- 1975 Pat Jennings sets a new Club record of League appearances by passing Ted Ditchburn's previous record total of 418. Jennings finished season 1976—77 with 472 League appearances and 118 in the four major cup competitions.
- 1977 Relegation to Second Division.
- 1978 Promotion again secured at first attempt.
