Foreword

A new season is always a time for optimism, and it is the fervent hope of everyone with the interests of Tottenham Hotspur at heart that 1979-80 will prove a season of success for the Club.

It would be fair to say that last season had both its satisfactory and disappointing aspects. It was satisfying in the sense that in our first season back in the First Division, we managed to finish inside the top half of the table. We finished higher than Southampton and Bolton Wanderers, the two clubs promoted with us at the end of season 1977-78, and this is an encouraging sign on the road to recovery.

The season was disappointing in the sense that we would have finished higher in the League if only our home record had been better.

Taken over the season, the form of the team was more impressive away than at home, and our large band of loyal followers who travel to opponents' grounds must have wondered at times why the standard of performance should have been so much better than at White Hart Lane.

We had contrasting fortunes in the two cup competitions. We had a good run in the F.A. Cup, and only that defeat in the replay on Manchester United's ground robbed us of a place in the semi-final.

It had been a different story in the League Cup early in the season. We rallied well after facing a 2-0 deficit in the opening game at Swansea to bring the Welsh club to Tottenham for a replay, but one of our indifferent home performances cost us that tie. The fact that Swansea went on to win promotion to the Second Division was no consolation to us.

The season had opened in a blaze of publicity for Spurs with the arrival of Osvaldo Ardiles and Ricardo Villa from Argentina. The signing of these players undoubtedly stimulated public interest, and this was reflected in gate figures both at home and away. Our home gates were, in fact, our best for several years, and in a season when the severe winter weather disrupted the match programme, causing much inconvenience to both the public and the clubs.

John Lacy had also been signed from Fulham before the season opened, and new arrivals during the campaign were Gordon Smith, the Aston Villa full-back, and Milija Aleksic, the goalkeeper who joined us from Luton Town.

Unfortunately, Smith was absent owing to injury until shortly before the season ended, but has since proved his fitness both in the closing League matches and on the summer tour.

Our rebuilding plan led to the departure of a number of players during last season. Neil McNab, John Duncan and Ian Moores left for Bolton, Derby County and Orient respectively, and John Gorman signed for Tampa Bay Rowdies, the North American club. Mike Stead had moved to Southend United earlier in the season.

Of the players who finished last season with us, Tom Heffernan has moved to Bournemouth, and we wish him well with the seaside club.

In August, 1978, Mr. D. W. (Ken) Kennard was appointed to the Board of Directors, and he has made a very valuable contribution to the overall management of the Club.

It is the success of the first team that matters most, but I hasten to congratulate the Reserve and Youth teams on winning their respective championships.

The Reserves won the Football Combination by one point over Ipswich Town, the runners-up, in a tense and exciting finish, and amassed the convincing total of 105 goals.

The Youth team won the South East Counties League Division 1 title with a margin of four points over the runners-up, and coincidentally, it was Ipswich again who were second. In this competition Spurs scored 80 goals, a total far in excess of any other club in their league.

The Juniors finished in mid-table in Division 2 of the South East Counties League, but here again Spurs shone as marksmen. Our 49 goals from 16 matches were not bettered by any other club.

The reinforcement of our youth and junior ranks is a matter of constant concern to us, and we start this season with more apprentice professionals than for a number of years. Among them is Terry Gibson, who played as a substitute in the England Youth team against Italy in April.

We also have a number of schoolboy internationals on our books, and this must surely augur well for the future.

At the top level, I must commiserate with Jim Holmes on breaking a leg playing for Eire against Bulgaria in Sofia in May, and supporters will join me in wishing him a complete recovery. He had added to his already impressive international record by playing against Northern Ireland, England and Denmark earlier in the season.

Gerry Armstrong made nine more appearances for Northern Ireland last season, Glenn Hoddle played for both the England Under-21 and B teams, and Osvaldo Ardiles has again worn the shirt of Argentina this summer.

It is good to see these players enjoying the international limelight, and I hope many more honours will come their way.

During last season we varied our match programme with away "friendly" fixtures against IFK Gothenburg, the Saudi Arabian National XI and El Nasr of Dubai. This type of fixture widens the experience of the players and also gives Keith Burkinshaw, our manager, the opportunity of trying out younger players when there is nothing vital at stake.

Our summer tour embraced Kuwait, Kuala Lumpur and Japan. We competed in the Japan National Cup tournament and finished winners of the trophy with a 2-0 victory in the final over Dundee United. We were unbeaten in the eight matches we played on tour, full details of which appear on page 52 of this Handbook.

I sensed an improvement in the play of the team towards the end of last season, and with better finishing, there could be a dramatic turnaround in our fortunes in 1979-80.

I write this Foreword in an attitude of hope. May the reality of the months ahead bring the success we all eagerly await.

ALEKSIC, MILIJA
(Goalkeeper). 6ft. 1 in.

Joined Spurs from Luton Town last December and made five league appearances, and one in the F.A. Cup, for us in the latter half of the season. The son of a Yugoslav father and an English mother, he was born at Newcastle under Lyme, and attended the St. Patrick's Secondary Modern School in the Staffordshire town. Played for the district boys team and Staffordshire County before joining Port Vale as an apprentice. Later signed for Stafford Rangers, and in February, 1973, he became a full-time professional for the first time with Plymouth Argyle. Following a spell on loan to Luton in December, 1976, his full transfer to the Bedfordshire club was completed. Spent a few weeks towards the end of last season on a temporary transfer to Sheffield United.



ARMSTRONG, GERRY
(Forward). 5 ft. 11½ in.

Has now made 17 appearances in the full Northern Ireland team. Born in Belfast and joined Spurs from Bangor, the Irish League club, in November, 1975. Played for St. Paul's Swifts and Cromac Albion, local Belfast clubs, before joining Bangor as a part-time professional. His occupation in his Bangor days was as a senior clerical officer with the Northern Ireland Housing Executive. Made his League debut for Spurs away to Ipswich Town on the opening day of season 1976-77. Has now made 49 League appearances, scoring six goals, and has played in eight F.A. Cup and League Cup matches, scoring twice. Played Gaelic in Ireland before concentrating on football.

ARDILES, OSVALDO
(Midfield). 5 ft. 6 in.

Joined Spurs in July, 1978 after playing a big part in Argentina's triumph in the World Cup that year. Had played in many full internationals for his country before joining us, and has worn the shirt of Argentina again this summer. Born in Cordoba, where he attended Montserrat School, and later the local university. Had been at law school for four years before leaving the Argentine. Developed his football with the Cordoba Institute team and joined the Huracan club of Buenos Aires in 1975. Made 38 League appearances for us last season, scoring three goals, and also played in seven League Cup and F.A. Cup matches, scoring once.



BEAVON, STUART
(Midfield). 5 ft. 6½ in.

Made his League debut in the home match with Manchester City last February, and has now been a full professional for just over three years. Born in Wolverhampton, but brought up in Oxford, where he attended the Northway School. Played for Oxfordshire Boys before joining Spurs as an apprentice professional in March, 1975. Scored 19 goals, five from the penalty spot, for the Reserves in the Football Combination last season. His father is Cyril Beavon, the former Oxford United full-back.

BROOKE, GARRY
(Forward). 5 ft. 6 in.

Born at Bethnal Green but has lived most of his life in Walthamstow, where he attended the McEntee Senior High School. Played for Waltham Forest and Essex County Boys' teams, and joined Spurs as an apprentice in June, 1977. Was upgraded to full professional status last October. Made 21 appearances in the Combination team last season, including four as substitute, and scored two goals. Also made 24 appearances in the senior Youth team last season, scoring seven goals.





DAINES, BARRY

(Goalkeeper). 5 ft. 11¼ in. Was out of action for a large part of last season through injury. Born at Witham and played for Chelmsford, Mid-Essex and Essex County Boys before joining Spurs as an apprentice. Upgraded to full professional rank in September, 1969. Played for the England Youth team and was a member of Spurs' team that won the F.A. Youth Cup in 1970. His total of League appearances now stands at 86, and he has also played in 11 F.A. Cup, League Cup and U.E.F.A. Cup matches. Made his League debut at home to West Bromwich Albion in November, 1971.

FALCO, MARK

(Forward). 6 ft. 0 in.

Made his League debut for Spurs in the final away match at Bolton last season, and scored the first of our goals in a 3-1 win. Born at Hackney and attended South Hackney Secondary School. Played for London, Hackney, Middlesex and Inner London Boys' teams before signing for Spurs as an apprentice in July, 1977. Upgraded to full professional rank twelve months' later. Finished last season as top scorer in the Football Combination with 24 goals from 35 matches. Made five appearances for the England Youth team last season, scoring five goals.



GALVIN, ANTHONY (Forward). 5 ft. 9 in.

Made his League debut for us in the home match with Manchester City last February. Born in Huddersfield, where he attended All Saints Comprehensive School, and played stand-off in the school rugby team. Decided to concentrate on soccer and gained a place in both the Yorkshire Schools and England Schools Under-18 teams. Later played for Hull University, where he obtained a B.A. degree with Russian Studies his main subject. Last season, his first as a full-time professional, he made 37 appearances in our Combination team, scoring 10 goals. Joined Spurs as a professional in January, 1978 after playing for Goole Town, the Northern Premier League club.

GRAYLING, PAUL

(Midfield). 5 ft. 7½ in.

Joined Spurs this summer after establishing himself over the last two seasons in the youth team of the VFR Dortmund Solde club in West Germany. The son of a warrant officer in the Royal Artillery, he was born at Ipswich, but has spent much of his life in Germany. Attended the British Military Schools in Münster and Dortmund, leaving the latter in August, 1978 with four "O" and one "A" level. Played for Hemer 32 and SSV Kalthof, both German clubs, before joining Dortmund Solde as a 16-year-old. Worked for a time as a storeman in the N.A.A.F.I. at Holzwickede, near Dortmund, and in May returned to England to spend six weeks as a junior bank clerk at the Mount Street branch of Barclay's. Speaks fluent German.





HAZARD, MICHAEL
(Midfield). 5 ft. 7 in.

A cartilage operation in January kept him on the side-lines for part of last season. Born in Sunderland, where he attended St. Aidans School, and gained a place in both the Sunderland District and Durham County Boys' teams. He also represented Sunderland Schools at cross-country running. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in July, 1976, and was upgraded to full professional in February, 1978. In spite of his period on the injured list, he made 29 Combination appearances last season, scoring four goals.

HODDLE, GLENN
(Midfield). 6 ft. 1 in.

Has made eight appearances in the England Under-21 team and one in the England 'B'. Born at Hayes Middlesex, but attended Burnt Mill School, Harlow, and played for Harlow District and the Essex Under-15 and Under-19 teams. Signed for Spurs as an apprentice in April, 1974, and upgraded to full professional in April, 1975. Played for the England Youth team and as a schoolboy also played fly-half in the West Essex rugby team. Made his League debut for us as a substitute at home to Norwich City in August, 1975, and his appearance total now stands at 122, in the course of which he has scored 24 goals. He has also made 14 appearances in the F.A. Cup and League Cup, scoring four goals.



HOLMES, JAMES
(Defender). 5 ft. 10½ in.

Had the bad luck to break a leg in May when making his 29th appearance in the full Eire team against Bulgaria in Sofia. Joined Spurs from Coventry City in March, 1977, and made his League debut for us at home to West Bromwich that month. Born in Dublin, where he attended Strand Street Christian Brothers School. Played for both the Dublin and Eire Boys' teams, and also shone at Gaelic football. While playing at centre-half for Bosco Boys' Club in Dublin, he impressed Coventry and was invited to sign for the midland club. Has made 81 League appearances for Spurs, scoring twice, and has also played in 11 F.A. Cup and League Cup matches.

HUGHTON, CHRIS
(Defender). 5 ft. 7¼ in.

Has completed his four-year apprenticeship as a lift engineer this summer, and is now a full-time professional for the first time. Born at Forest Gate, and joined Spurs in his school-days. Signed as a part-time professional in June, 1977. Attended St. Bonaventure's Secondary School, Forest Gate, and played for Newham Boys. Has been a regular member of the Combination team in each of the last two seasons. His brother Henry, also a defender, is a professional with Orient.





JONES, CHRIS

(Forward). 5 ft. 11 in.

Born in Jersey and established himself in schools football in the Channel Islands. Signed for Spurs as an apprentice in May, 1971 and was upgraded to full professional in May, 1973. Made his League debut on the opening day of season 1974-75 at home to Ipswich Town. Has now made 120 League appearances, in the course of which he has scored 28 goals. Has also played in 16 F.A. Cup and League Cup matches, scoring five times. Played as substitute for the England Under-21 team against Yugoslavia on Manchester City's ground in May, 1978.

KENDALL, MARK

(Goalkeeper). 6 ft. 0¼ in.

Made his League debut away to Norwich City last November, and finished the season with 23 First Division appearances and six in the F.A. Cup. Born at Tredegar, but attended Bedwelty School, Bargoed, and played for his county and district teams. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in April, 1975, when a number of other clubs were also showing interest in him, and was upgraded to full professional status in July, 1976. Played for the Welsh Under-21 team against Scotland at Chester in February, 1978.



LACY, JOHN

(Defender). 6 ft. 3 in.

Joined Spurs from Fulham in July, 1978. Born in the Everton district of Liverpool, where he attended the Collegiate School, and gained a place in both the Merseyside Schools and Lancashire County Boys' teams. Played for Liverpool Marine but came south to study at the London School of Economics. Was a member of the London University team coached by George Cohen, the former England and Fulham full-back. Signed as a professional for Fulham in June, 1972, and was in their F.A. Cup final team against West Ham in 1975. In his first season with Spurs made 35 League appearances and eight in the League Cup and F.A. Cup. Has a Bachelor of Science degree in Economics.

LEE, COLIN

(Full-back/Forward). 6 ft. 0 in.

Played in defence in the closing matches of last season. Joined Spurs from Torquay United in October, 1977 and scored four goals in his first match against Bristol Rovers at White Hart Lane. Born in Torquay but lived most of his early life at neighbouring Buckfastleigh. Played for the Torbay Boys team and was spotted by Bristol City, who signed him as an apprentice. Upgraded to full professional by the Bristol club in July, 1974, but after a spell on loan to Hereford United, he was transferred to Torquay. Has played in 52 League matches for Spurs, scoring 18 goals, and in seven F.A. Cup games, in which he netted a hat-trick in the replay against Altrincham last January.





McALLISTER, DONALD
(Defender). 5 ft. 10 in.

Born at Radcliffe, near Manchester and played for Lancashire County Boys' team. Joined Bolton Wanderers and graduated through their apprentice ranks to sign as a full professional in June, 1970. As a teenager with Bolton, he attended the local technical college and gained his City and Guild certificate in Motor Vehicle Maintenance. Left Bolton for Spurs in February, 1975, and made his debut for us at Coventry that month. Has made 118 League appearances for Spurs, scoring eight goals. Has also played in 21 F.A. Cup and League Cup matches, scoring once. Spent the summer of 1977 playing for Washington Diplomats. He and his wife, Linda, run a ladies' clothing shop in Covent Garden.



MILLER, PAUL
(Defender). 6 ft 0¼ in.

Made his League debut for Spurs away to Arsenal last April, and finished the season with seven First Division appearances to his credit. Born at Stepney and attended Morpeth Secondary School, Bethnal Green. Played for East London, Middlesex and London Boys and was an England schools trialist. Signed for Spurs as an apprentice in April, 1976, and was upgraded to full professional in May, 1977. Was released to play for Skeid F.C. of Oslo in March, 1978, but returned to Spurs at the end of the Norwegian season last October.

MAZZON, GEORGE
(Defender). 5 ft 10 in.

Signed as a full professional last April, but had been playing regularly in the senior Youth team. Made eight appearances in the Combination team in the closing weeks of the season. Born at Waltham Cross and attended the Cardinal Bourne School in Broxbourne. Played for Lea Valley Boys and also for the Hertfordshire County Youth team, and also shone at athletics in his schooldays. Formerly played for Waltham New Town and gave up a job as an orders clerk with a firm of builders in Enfield in order to turn professional.



NAYLOR, TERENCE
(Defender). 5 ft. 10 in.

Born at Islington and played for Islington Boys. Trained for a while with Arsenal, and also had a brief spell with Millwall before joining Spurs as an amateur. Gave up his job in Smithfield Market to sign as a professional in July, 1969, and made his League debut at West Bromwich at Easter, 1970. Has made 236 League appearances and 60 in major cup-ties. His only goal for the first team was scored against Chelsea in the semi-final of the League Cup at Stamford Bridge in 1971.





PRATT, JOHN

(Midfield). 5 ft. 8 in.

Spurs' longest-serving professional. Born at Hackney and attended Clark's College, Enfield. Played for the London F.A. Boys' team and spent a year in Brentford's youth side. Joined Spurs as an amateur on the recommendation of Terry Medwin, our former winger. Became a full professional in November, 1965 and made his League debut away to Arsenal in March, 1969. Has made 307 League appearances, scoring 37 goals. In 76 major cup-ties he has scored nine times. Had a testimonial match against Arsenal at White Hart Lane at the end of season 1977-78. Has his own newsagent's and confectionery business in Hoxton.

PERRYMAN, STEPHEN

(Midfield). 5 ft. 8 in.

Club captain. Born at Ealing and played for Middlesex, London and England Boys. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in July, 1967, and was upgraded to full professional in January, 1969. Made his League debut at home to Sunderland in September, 1969, and now has a total of 392 League appearances to his credit, in the course of which he has scored 23 goals. Has been ever-present in each of the last three seasons, and has not missed a match since our away fixture with Sheffield United in December, 1975. He has also played in 101 major cup-ties, scoring eight goals. Made 17 appearances for the England Under-23s. Is in business as a sports outfitter at Hayes in Middlesex.



SMITH, GORDON

(Defender). 5 ft. 8 in.

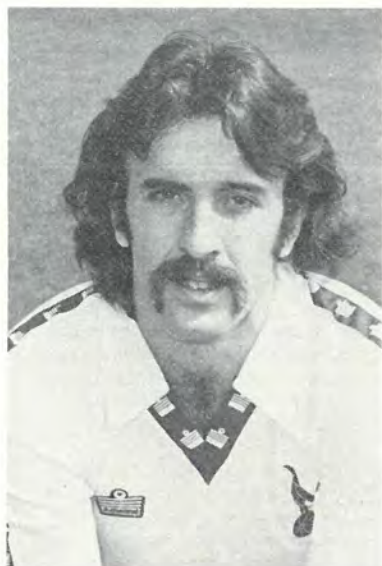
Transferred to Spurs from Aston Villa last February. Born in the Partick district of Glasgow and attended Broadholm Primary and later Waverley Secondary School in Drumchapel. In his Broadholm days he gained a place in the Glasgow Primary Schools representative team. Signed for St. Johnstone while still at school, and became a professional with them at 17. Made four appearances in the Scottish Under-23 team while with St. Johnstone and was transferred to Villa in August, 1976. Was unlucky with injuries in the closing months of last season but made his League debut for Spurs away to Bolton as substitute in May and also played the full 90 minutes in the final match at home to West Bromwich.

TAYLOR, PETER

(Forward). 5 ft. 7 in.

Joined Spurs from Crystal Palace in September, 1976 and made his debut for us in the away match with West Bromwich early the following month. Born at Rochford, where he attended King Edmund Comprehensive School. Gained a place in the South-East Essex District team and later played for Canvey Island. Spotted by Southend United, who transferred him to Palace in October, 1973. Has made four appearances in the full England team and four in the Under-23s. Has made 106 League appearances for Spurs, scoring 30 goals. Has also played in 14 F.A. and League Cup matches for Spurs scoring twice in the former competition. Has his own sports outfitting shop at Westcliff.





VILLA, RICARDO
(Forward). 6 ft. 0 in.

Signed at the same time as Osvaldo Ardiles from Argentinian football in July, 1978. Born in Buenos Aires and joined the Quilmes club of that city on leaving the state school as a 17-year-old. Moved to Atletico Tucuman, and when he left that club for the Racing Club of Buenos Aires, he became the most expensive signing in the history of Argentinian football. It was from Racing Club that he joined Spurs, and like Ardiles, he was visiting Britain for the first time when he arrived last year. Scored on making his League debut for us away to Nottingham Forest on the opening day of last season, and finished the campaign with three goals from the 32 First Division matches in which he played. Also played in seven League Cup and F.A. Cup matches. Likes outdoor life, and is keen on hunting and fishing. Played for Argentina in the World Cup last year.

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Gerry Armstrong dashes in but this Spurs attack in the home match with Coventry City last September was cleared by Les Sealey, the Midlanders' goalkeeper. The match ended in a 1-1 draw.

HE'S IN CHARGE . . .



KEITH BURKINSHAW has been Spurs' manager since July, 1976, when he was promoted from the position of coach he had held throughout the previous season. A fully-qualified F.A. coach, he had spent seven years on the coaching staff of Newcastle United, four of them as coach to the senior team.

A Yorkshireman from Higham, near Barnsley, Keith played as a schoolboy for the Barnsley District team. As a young player he was in Wolverhampton Wanderers' nursery team in Yorkshire, but was later spotted by Liverpool when playing for Denaby United in the Midland League.

He gave up his job in the local pit for a career in professional football, and filled the wing-half position. In 1957 he left Liverpool for Workington, and spent eight seasons at Borough Park. During that time he filled the post of player-manager. In May, 1965 he joined Scunthorpe United solely as a player, but during his three seasons at the Old Show Ground, he had a ten-month spell as caretaker-manager.

. . . RIGHT-HAND MAN



PAT WELTON was appointed assistant manager at the time Keith Burkinshaw was promoted to his present post.

Pat had joined Spurs as Youth Team Manager in August, 1969, and in his first season we were winners of the F.A. Youth Cup, a performance that was repeated under his guidance in 1974.

Pat is a fully-qualified F.A. coach, who was England's Youth team manager for several years. For some time he combined this post with his job as Physical Education Instructor at Forest School, Snaresbrook, in addition to managing Walthamstow Avenue.

He was born at Eltham, and played for Chislehurst before turning professional with Orient in 1949. A goalkeeper, he spent nine seasons with Orient before finishing his League career with Queen's Park Rangers. Later he had a spell as manager of St. Alban's City.

Apprentice Professionals

BOLTON, JAMES (Forward) 5 ft. 6 in.

Signed as an apprentice immediately after leaving school in April. Born in Kensington but lives at Merton and made eight appearances for England Boys. Also played for the Merton, South London, London and Surrey boys' teams. Made one appearance in our Combination team as substitute last season.

COOPER, JOHN (Midfield) 5 ft. 9 in.

Born at Euston and lives in the Russell Square district. Attended the Sir William Collins School, Euston, and in addition to football did well at cricket, athletics and cross-country running. Played for the Camden District and Inner London soccer teams. Signed as an apprentice in April.

CORBETT, PATRICK (Defender). 5 ft. 11"

Signed as an apprentice this summer. Born at Hackney, where he still lives. Attended St. Bernards Secondary School, Bethnal Green, and played for the East London Boys team. Also shone at school as a sprinter. Made six appearances in our senior youth team last season.

CROOK, IAN (Midfield) 5 ft. 7 in.

Born at Romford and lives at Collier Row. Attended Pinewood and Forest Lodge Schools in Collier Row, and played for Havering district boys' team. Was also an Essex County trialist. A good all-round sportsman, he played cricket for Havering Boys and is a handicap-11 golfer. Previously played for Great Danes, a Brentwood Sunday soccer club. Signed as an apprentice this summer.

DICKENSON, KEVIN (Defender). 5 ft. 6 in.

Born at Hackney, but now lives at Havering. Attended Morpeth Secondary School, Bethnal Green, and Bedfords Park School, Harold Hill. Gained a place in both the East London and Havering Boys teams, and formerly played for Marshalls Park, a Havering Sunday club. Made seven appearances in our senior youth team last season. Signed as an apprentice this summer.

EMMS, TERENCE (Defender). 5 ft. 6 in.

Born at East Ham, where he still lives. Attended St. Michael's Primary School, East Ham and St. John's in Upton Park. Played for the Newham and Essex County Boys' teams, and was under West Ham United's wing for a short time. Started training here at White Hart Lane when he was 13. Signed as an apprentice this summer.

GIBSON, TERENCE (Forward). 5 ft. 6 in.

Born in Walthamstow but lives at Woodford Green. Played for Waltham Forest, London and Essex Boys, and is a schoolboy international. Played as a substitute for the England Youth team against Italy early in April, the month in which he signed for us as an apprentice. Made five appearances, three as substitute, in the Combination team last season.

HAMILL, ALEXANDER (Defender). 5 ft. 7 in.

Joined our apprentice staff in February, 1978, and has since played regularly in our senior youth team. Also made two appearances in the Combination team last season. Born at Coatbridge, where he attended the St. Patrick's High School, and played for the Airdrie and Coatbridge Schools team. Also spent two years with Eastercraigs a minor club in that district.

HARVEY, CHRISTOPHER (Forward). 5 ft. 6 in.

Born at Barking, but now lives at Dagenham. Attended Roding Junior and Erkenwald Comprehensive Schools in Dagenham, and played for Barking, Essex County and London Boys. Made 11 appearances in our senior Youth team last season, and signed as an apprentice this summer. Had trials with Ipswich Town and Millwall before joining Spurs.

PARKS, ANTHONY (Goalkeeper). 5 ft. 9 in.

Born at Hackney and attended Upton House School, Homerton. Played for Hackney Boys and also the Inner London Schools team. Trained for a time with Queen's Park Rangers before joining Spurs. Has been on an apprentice engagement since April.

SOUTHEY, PETER (Defender) 5 ft. 7 in.

Born at Parsons Green and lives at Putney. Attended Hotham Primary School in Putney and Wandsworth School, and played for the Wandsworth district team and Inner London. Left school in June, 1978, and signed as an apprentice in the following month. Made 15 appearances in our Combination team last season.

No idle summer!

There has been no lack of activity here at White Hart Lane during the close-season weeks that have slipped away since the curtain rang down on the League season after the match with West Bromwich Albion on 14th May. The senior players left on the following day for Kuwait on the first lap of their tour of the Middle East and Japan, and returned in mid-June via Bermuda.

Work on the playing pitch commenced immediately after the West Bromwich match, and a new automatic "pop-up" irrigation system with 40 watering points spread across the playing area, has been installed.

This ensures a consistent level of watering over the entire field, and should maintain the playing surface at the highest possible standard. A sand-slitting operation across the pitch has also been carried out to improve drainage as part of the annual ground renovation work.

A lot of work has to be carried out in a comparatively short time, and no item is overlooked in the annual inspection to maintain the ground and facilities at a high level.

This summer the steel girders in the roof of the West Stand have been re-painted as part of the general maintenance, and there has been an extension of the Enclosure Boxes at the front of that Stand. There are now six boxes instead of four, and this extension has provided 200 extra seats.

The refreshment bars around the ground have also been refurbished and redecorated, and we hope this will add to the comfort of supporters.

We are always seeking to improve facilities, and since last season ended have installed a new Public Address System that should now provide the right service for spectators. The old system has been replaced and now the main concourses and bars, in addition to the Stadium, should be well served in this respect.

While work on the ground was proceeding, the back-room staff were busy preparing for the new season. The Ticket Office were kept busy with the sale of season tickets from the time last season ended, arrangements had to be made in connection with the team's travels abroad and for those players engaged in international matches during May and June, and the preparation of the fixture lists for the new season also kept our secretarial staff busy.

Another Spurs Shop, additional to the established premises on the corner of Park Lane, has been opened this summer at the junction of Paxton Road and the High Road. This means that supporters are catered for in approaching the ground from both directions in the High Road.

As a further facility, the Souvenir Kiosk beneath the East Stand has been rebuilt and is now a permanent feature that will serve supporters on that side of the ground.

Our away match with Liverpool last September ended in a disastrous 7-0 defeat, but in this incident Peter Taylor is seen giving the home defence a troublesome moment.

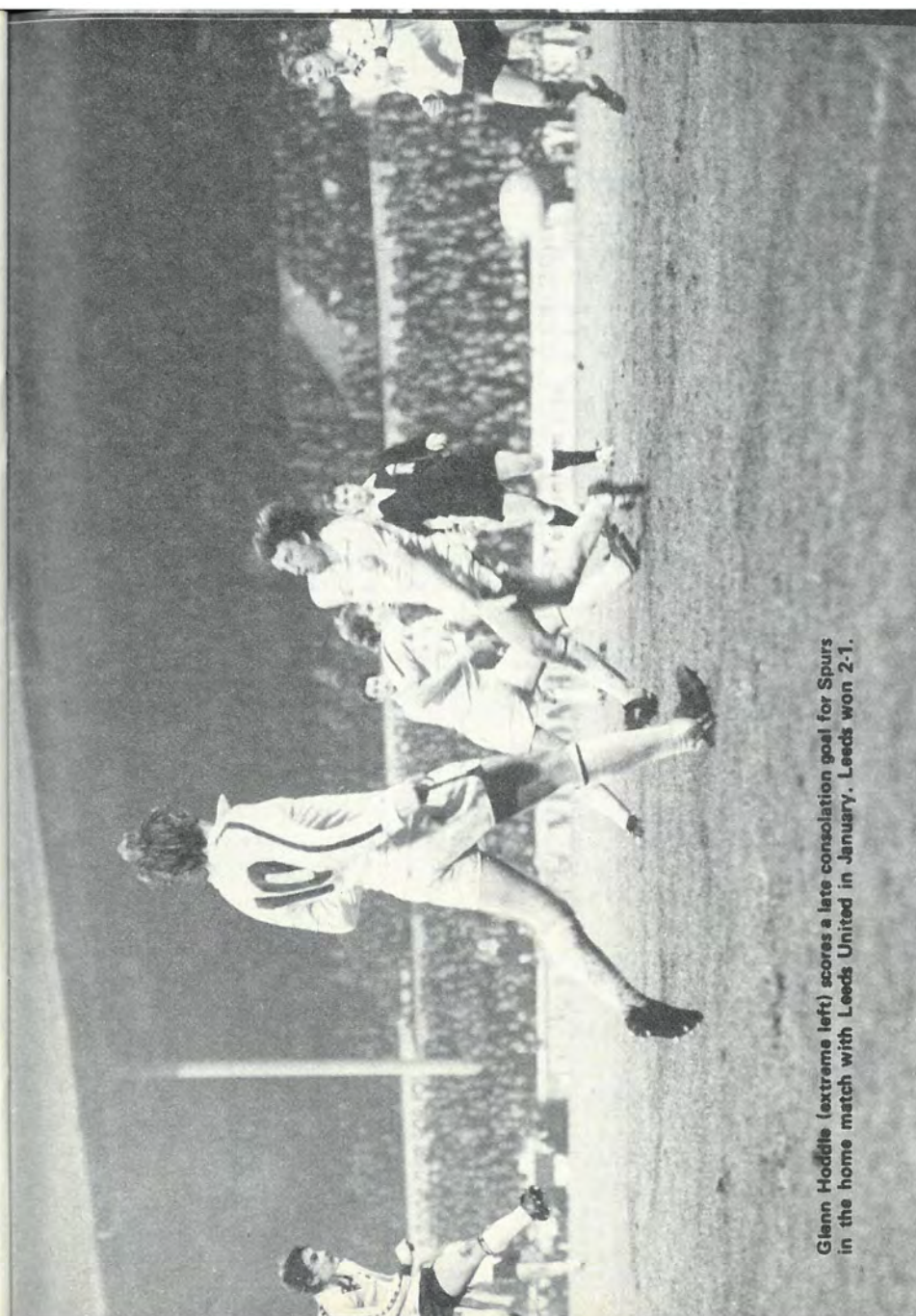

Cup-winners in Japan

The final, which was televised live, was watched by a crowd of 12,000 at the National Stadium in Tokyo. Second-half goals by Gordon Smith and Ossie Ardiles gave Spurs victory over the Scottish club.

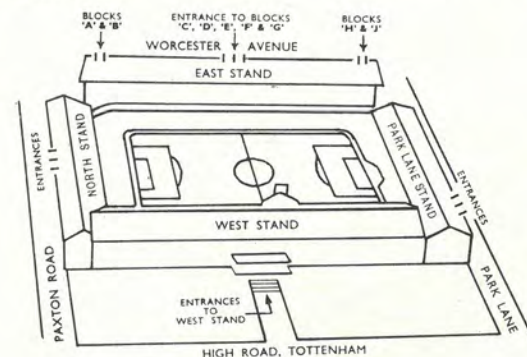

MATCHES AT CHESHUNT

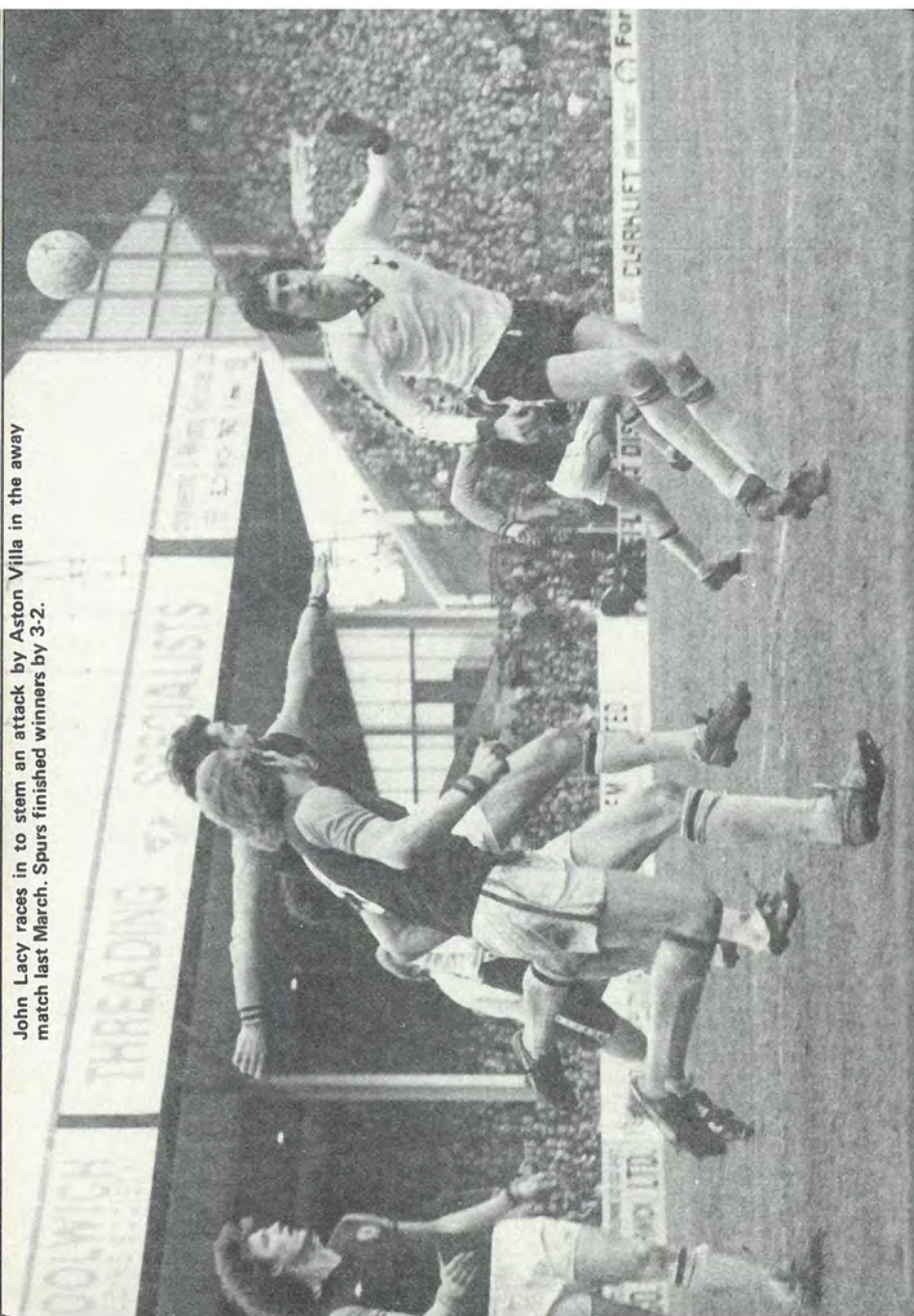

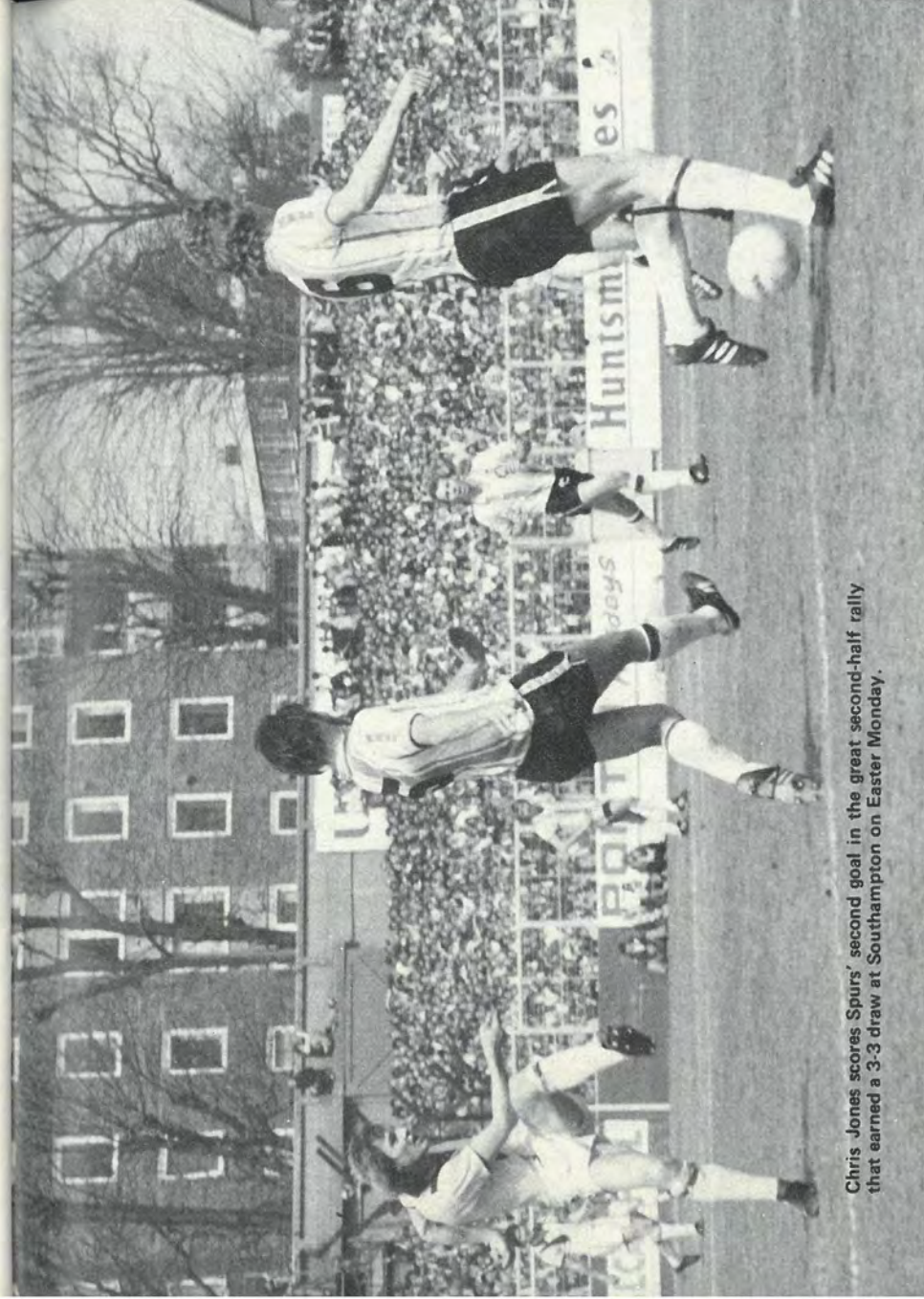

HOTSPUR HISTORY

- 1882 Club formed by boys from a local cricket club and from the local Grammar School. The name of "Hotspur F.C." was adopted.
- 1883 Club reorganised under the presidency of Mr. John Ripsher. Club colours—navy blue. Matches played on Tottenham Marshes.
- 1885 First competitive match versus St. Albans in the London Association Cup, Spurs winning 5—2. Colours changed to light blue and white halves. First credit balance—9 shillings.
- 1886 First cup final. Played Caledonians in the East End Cup and lost 1—0. Club re-named "Tottenham Hotspur Athletic Club".
- 1887 First meeting with Arsenal—then Royal Arsenal. Match abandoned 15 minutes from time "owing to darkness", with Spurs leading 2—1.
- 1888 Spurs move to private ground in Northumberland Park, where the first admission charge of 3d. was made.
- 1890 Colours changed to red shirts and navy blue shorts.
- 1895 Spurs adopt professionalism.
- 1896 A record crowd of 6,000 spectators watch the friendly match against Aston Villa.
Spurs elected to the Southern League, Division 1. Club colours changed to chocolate and gold.
- 1898 The Club becomes a limited company and a match against Woolwich Arsenal attracts a record crowd of 14,000 spectators.
- 1899 Final change of colours to the now familiar white shirts and blue shorts.
The Club moves to present site, originally a market garden. Accommodation for 35,000. Ground almost named as "Gilpin Park" but instead gradually became known as "White Hart Lane". First match staged was a friendly versus Notts County—gross receipts £115.
- 1900 Success at last—Spurs become champions of the Southern League.
- 1901 Spurs win the F.A. Challenge Cup to become the only non-League club, following the formation of the Football League in 1888, ever to achieve this honour.

- 1908 Entry secured to the Second Division of the Football League.
- 1909 Promotion to First Division gained at first attempt.
- 1915 Relegation to Second Division.
- 1920 Promoted again at first attempt, this time with a still unsurpassed Second Division record of 70 points.
- 1921 Second F.A. Cup triumph, Spurs beating Wolverhampton Wanderers by 1—0 at Stamford Bridge.
- 1928 Relegation to Second Division with 38 points.
- 1933 Promotion again, this time as Division 2 runners-up.
- 1934 New East Stand completed.
- 1935 Relegation to Second Division.
- 1938 The existing crowd record of 75,038 spectators was established for the visit of Sunderland in the Sixth Round of the F.A. Cup.
- 1950 Promotion to First Division.
- 1951 Football League champions for the first time.
- 1961 Football League champions and winners of the F.A. Cup. The first club to complete the "double" since Preston North End and Aston Villa did so in 1889 and 1897 respectively.
- 1962 Winners again of the F.A. Cup.
- 1963 Winners of the European Cup-Winners' Cup. The first British club to win a major European competition.
Jimmy Greaves becomes Spurs' highest League goalscorer in one season with 37 goals.
- 1967 F.A. Cup-Winners for the fifth time.
- 1971 Winners of the Football League Cup.
- 1972 First winners of new U.E.F.A. Cup and therefore the first British club to have won two major European trophies.
- 1973 Winners of the Football League Cup, the first club to have won the trophy twice.
- 1974 First British club to have played in three major European Finals.
- 1975 Pat Jennings sets a new Club record of League appearances by passing Ted Ditchburn's previous record total of 418. Jennings finished season 1976—77 with 472 League appearances and 118 in the four major cup competitions.
- 1977 Relegation to Second Division.
- 1978 Promotion again secured at first attempt.
