Foreword

For the first time I have the privilege of writing the Foreword to the Handbook, and I do so in a spirit of hope and optimism. A new season is always a time for renewed enthusiasm, and in spite of last season's disappointments, I look ahead with confidence.

Regrettably, we finished lower in the League last season than at the end of 1978-79. In the latter season we were let down by our home record. Last season our haul of points from home games was appreciably higher, but our poorer record away from White Hart Lane finally left us in the lower half of the table.

It was a season in which we experienced the ebb and flow of football fortune. After losing our first three League matches, we defeated Manchester United at home in the first leg of our tie in the Football League Cup, and this win had a good effect on the team's morale in spite of the fact that we were knocked out on aggregate after visiting Old Trafford for the second leg.

As supporters will recall, we exacted ample revenge from Manchester United by defeating them, against all the odds, in extra time in our replayed third-round F.A. Cup-tie at Old Trafford.

In beating Swindon Town and Birmingham City in the next two rounds, we qualified for the sixth round for the second season running. Liverpool then halted our progress by winning 1-0 at White Hart Lane, and with that result our dream of a trip to Wembley evaporated.

It was a big disappointment, but after falling in the opening round in each year from 1973 to 1978, we can at least look back on two seasons in each of which we reached the last eight.

It was a season in which we were hit hard by injuries, and in mentioning this I am not seeking in any way to offer excuses for our mediocre League season. Injuries are part and parcel of football life, and they present a hazard which has to be overcome. Nevertheless, the plain fact remains that extra problems confronted the management with key players unavailable for such long periods.

Jim Holmes, who sustained a broken leg in May of last year playing for Eire, was out of League action for the entire season, and Milija Aleksic also remained on the casualty list for the rest of the campaign after sustaining serious injury in that F.A. Cup replay with Manchester United.

Peter Taylor was on the casualty list for a large part of the season, and Ricardo Villa was forced to miss the closing matches following an operation on his right knee. Gordon Smith, who has been extremely unlucky with injuries since joining us from Aston Villa in February, 1979, also had an operation on his left knee in April.

All these players have worked hard to regain fitness, and at the time this Handbook went to press, reports on their progress were favourable. No club can expect an injury-free season, but we feel we deserve better luck in this direction in the new campaign.

In a season in which Terry Yorath, signed from Coventry City shortly before the opening match, added strength and experience to the team, it was heartening that young players like Chris Hughton and Paul Miller should have seized their chance in the first team in so convincing a manner.

It was clear, however, that we needed fresh blood in attack, and we believe the signings this close season of Steve Archibald, the Scottish international from Aberdeen, and Garth Crooks, the England Under-21 player from Stoke City, will give us the striking power we have been lacking.

It is obviously the success of the first team that matters most, but I am delighted to be able to congratulate our Reserves on winning the championship of the Football Combination for the second year running. We are one of eight First Division clubs competing in the Combination, and success in this competition is not to be treated lightly.

At youth level we were less successful last season. We finished well down the South East Counties League Division 1 table, but reached Round 5 of the F.A. Youth Cup, when we then lost by the only goal of the match away to Manchester United. The Juniors earn a word of praise for reaching the final of the South East Counties League Division 2 Cup, but were then beaten by Wimbledon.

Naturally, we like to shine in these competitions, but even more important than the actual results is the quality of the young players being groomed at this level. The playing record is not necessarily a reliable yardstick from which to assess their potential.

It is always pleasing to see our players being honoured in the field of international football, and we have been well represented in this respect in the matches played this summer.

Apart from Archibald, who has played for Scotland as a Spurs player before actually wearing our colours, Glenn Hoddle has played

for England, Terry Yorath for Wales, Gerry Armstrong for Northern Ireland and Chris Hughton for Eire.

In addition to these five, Terry Gibson, who was given his chance in our League team against Stoke City last December, and stayed in for the two Cup matches with Manchester United, has played regularly in England's Youth team, and scored the goal against Poland in East Germany in May that won the European Youth Cup for England.

I hope all these players will add to their list of representative honours this season.

It is always with a sense of regret that we part with players who have given us good service, but change and movement is inseparable from football. John Pratt left us before last season ended for Portland Timbers, and has now had time to settle down in American football. Last January Colin Lee was transferred to Chelsea, and we continue to follow his progress at Stamford Bridge with interest.

Off of the field, this will be a significant period in the Club's growth as we begin construction of the new West Stand. In planning this major development, the Board had in mind both the age and facilities of the old stand and the need for Tottenham Hotspur to maintain itself as a big club and be in the forefront of modern development.

The new stand is not only being built to provide more and better facilities, but also for commercial reasons. In the long run it will be more economical to operate, provide greater income through commercial activities and create a ground in which both players and supporters can take pride. The completion of the stand will only mark phase one of an overall design for the development of the entire stadium, which of course is a long-term project.

This coming season we would ask our supporters for their patience and understanding for any inconvenience caused during the difficult period of major works.

In June Mr. Sidney Wale, my predecessor as Chairman, resigned his position on the Board of Directors. Mr. Wale first joined the Board in 1957, and was Chairman from October, 1969 until March of this year.

In acknowledgement of his long-standing service on the Board of Directors, he has been appointed Life-President of the Club.

A newcomer to the Board is Mr. Douglas Alexiou, and I wish him a long and successful association with the Club.

The stage is now set for the opening of a new season, and I hope it will provide plenty of entertaining football, and a place in the honours list for our Club.

Finally I wish to add the thanks and appreciation of the Board of Directors, officials and players for the loyal and magnificent support which has been given to Tottenham Hotspur at all times.

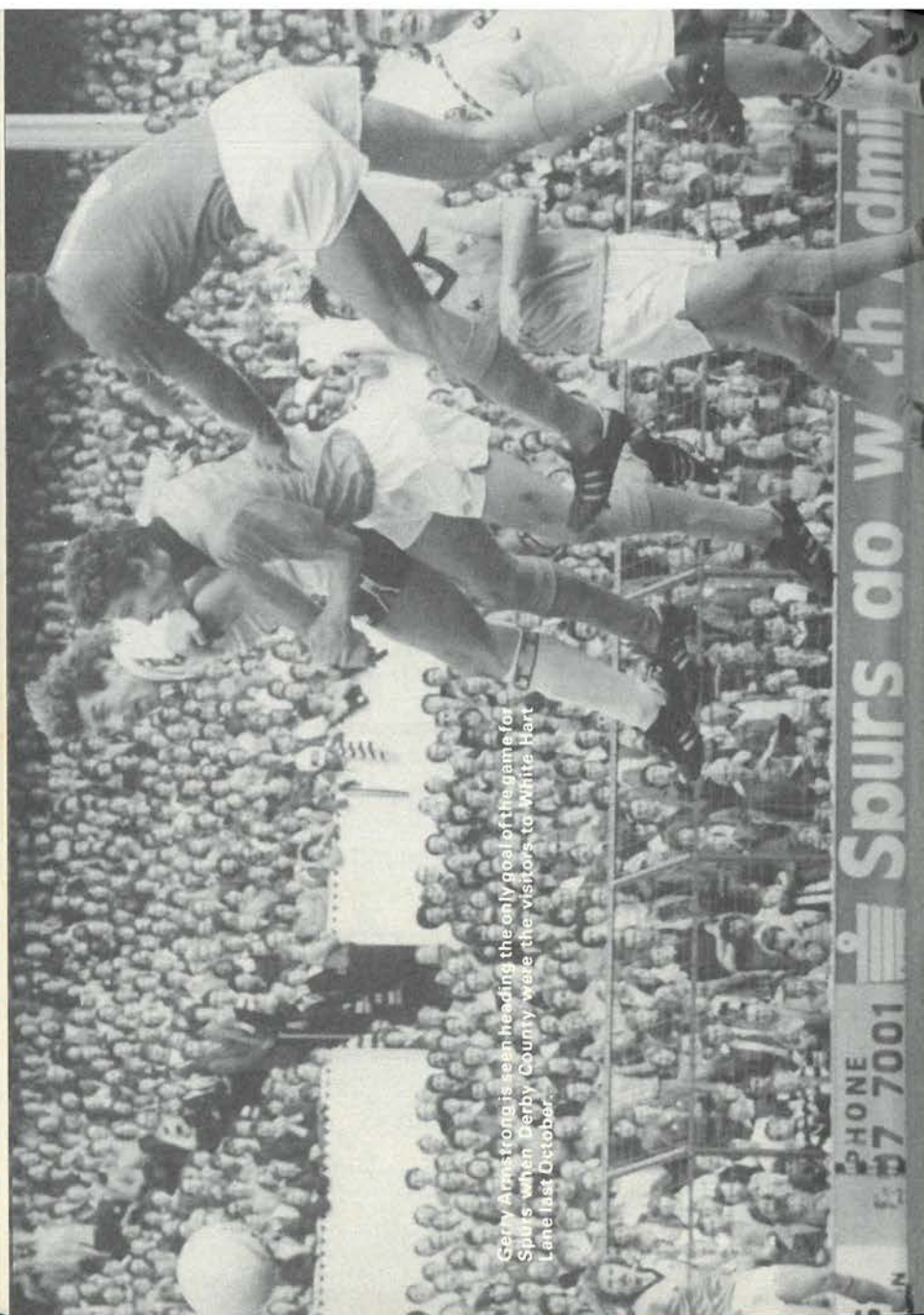

ALEKSIC, MILIJA (Goalkeeper). 6 ft. 1 in.

Had the bad luck to sustain injuries in the replayed F.A. Cup tie away to Manchester United last January, and has remained in training throughout this summer. Joined Spurs from Luton Town in December, 1978, and his appearance totals for us now stand at 13 in the League and three in the F.A. Cup. The son of a Yugoslav father and an English mother, he was born at Newcastle under Lyme and attended the St. Patrick's Secondary Modern School in the Staffordshire town. Played for the district boys' team and Staffordshire County before joining Port Vale as an apprentice. Later signed for Stafford Rangers, and in February, 1973 he became a full-time professional for the first time with Plymouth Argyle. Following a spell on loan to Luton in December, 1976, his full transfer to the Bedfordshire club was completed. Towards the end of his first season with us, he spent a few weeks on a temporary transfer to Sheffield United.





ARCHIBALD, STEVEN

(Forward). 5 ft. 10 in.

Joined Spurs from Aberdeen in May. Born in Glasgow, where he lived in the Rutherglen area, and attended Gallowflat Secondary and Stonelaw High Schools. Played for local clubs Crofoot United and Fernhill Athletic before signing for Clyde as a part-time professional in 1974. Served a four-year apprenticeship as a Rolls Royce motor mechanic, and after a brief spell running a service station with a business partner in Glasgow, was transferred to Aberdeen in January, 1978. Became a full-time professional at Pittodrie Park for the first time, and has since risen to full Scottish international rank. Scored Scotland's goal in their last match, away to Hungary at the end of May. Scored for Aberdeen against Spurs in the pre-season friendly match lost 2-0 by us in August of last year. His leisure-time pursuits include angling and working on his car. After leaving school he played one match for East Stirling, but preferred to sign for Clyde. Has made four appearances in the full Scottish international team.

ARDILES, OSVALDO

(Midfield). 5 ft. 6 in.

Joined Spurs in July, 1978 after playing a big part in Argentina's triumph in the World Cup that year, and has played in many other international matches for his country. Born in Cordoba, where he attended Montserrat School, and later the local university. Had been at law school for four years before leaving the Argentine. Developed his football with the Cordoba Institute team and joined the Huracan club of Buenos Aires in 1975. In the two seasons he has been with us, he has made 78 League appearances, scoring six goals. He has also played in 14 League Cup and F.A. Cup matches, scoring three times. Has been quick to master the English language, and still studies under a tutor. In his leisure time he enjoys playing snooker, table tennis and chess. Lives at Turnford in Hertfordshire.



ARMSTRONG, GERRY

(Forward). 5 ft. 11½ in.

Born in Belfast and joined Spurs from Bangor, the Irish League club, in November, 1975. Played for St. Paul's Swifts and Cromac Albion, local Belfast clubs, before joining Bangor as a part-time professional. His occupation in his Bangor days was as a senior clerical officer with the Northern Ireland Housing Executive. Made his League debut for Spurs away to Ipswich Town on the opening day of season 1976-77. Has now made 79 League appearances, scoring 10 goals, and has played in 14 F.A. Cup and League Cup matches, scoring six times. Played Gaelic in Ireland before concentrating on football. A regular member of the Northern Ireland international team, he appeared in all their matches in the home international tournament and in Australia this summer.

BOLTON, JAMES

(Forward). 5 ft. 6 in.

Upgraded from apprentice to full professional this summer. Born in Kensington but lives in Merton and made eight appearance for England Boys. Also played for the Merton, South London, London and Surrey boys' teams. Signed apprentice forms for us on leaving school in April, 1979. Made 11 appearances in our Combination team last season. Top scorer for the senior Youth team last season with 26 goals.





BROOKE, GARRY

(Forward). 5 ft. 6 in.

Born at Bethnal Green but has lived most of his life in Walthamstow, where he attended the McEntee Senior High School. Played for Waltham Forest and Essex County Boys' teams, and joined Spurs as an apprentice in June, 1977. Was upgraded to full professional status in October, 1978. Scored eight goals in 28 Football Combination appearances last season before his move to the GAIS club of Gothenburg in April. He is due to rejoin us when the Swedish season ends in October.

CHAMBERS, ANTHONY

(Forward). 5 ft. 8 in.

Born at Islington of Jamaican parents, and had played for Haringey district when at junior school in Hornsey. Later attended Somerset School in Tottenham. Signed as a contract professional in August, 1979 following an 18-month spell in New Jersey, U.S.A. During his spell in the States he played for the East Orange High School, New Jersey, and before signing for Spurs he had a trial with Chelsea. Made 10 League and Cup appearances in the senior youth team last season.



COOPER, JOHN

(Midfield). 5 ft. 11 in.

Has been a full professional since last January. Born at Euston and lives in the Russell Square district. Attended the Sir William Collins School, Euston, and in addition to football did well at cricket, athletics and cross-country running. Played for the Camden District and Inner London soccer teams. Signed as an apprentice professional for us in April, 1979. Made eight appearances in the Combination team last season.

CROOK, IAN

(Midfield). 5 ft. 8 in.

Upgraded to full professional from apprentice this summer. Born at Romford and lives at Collier Row. Attended Pinewood and Forest Lodge Schools in Collier Row, and played for Havering district boys' team. Was also an Essex County trialist. A good all-round sportsman, he played cricket for Havering Boys and is a keen golfer. Previously played for Great Danes, a Brentwood Sunday soccer club. Signed as an apprentice in May, 1979, and made six appearances in the Combination team last season.





DAINES, BARRY

(Goalkeeper). 5 ft. 11¾ in.
Born at Witham and played for Chelmsford, Mid-Essex and Essex County Boys before joining Spurs as an apprentice in July, 1968. Upgraded to full professional rank in September, 1969. Played for the England Youth team and was a member of Spurs' team that won the F.A. Youth cup in 1970. His total of League appearances now stands at 118, and he has also played in 17 F.A. Cup, League Cup and U.E.F.A. Cup matches. Made his League debut at home to West Bromwich Albion in November, 1971.



FALCO, MARK
(Forward). 6 ft. 0 in.

Born at Hackney and attended South Hackney Secondary School. Played for London, Hackney, Middlesex and Inner London Boys' teams before signing for Spurs as an apprentice in July, 1977. Upgraded to full professional rank 12 months later. Made his League debut away to Bolton Wanderers in May, 1979, and scored the first of our goals in a 3—1 win. Has now made 10 League appearances, and has scored three goals. Has also made three appearances in the F.A. Cup and League Cup. Made five appearances for the England Youth team in season 1978—79, scoring five goals.



GALVIN, ANTHONY
(Forward). 5 ft. 9 in.

Born in Huddersfield, where he attended All Saints Comprehensive School, and played stand-off in the school rugby team. Decided to concentrate on soccer and gained a place in both the Yorkshire Schools and England Schools Under-18 teams. Later played for Hull University, where he obtained a B.A. degree with Russian Studies his main subject. Joined Spurs as a professional in January, 1978 after playing for Goole Town, the Northern Premier League club. Made his League debut for Spurs at home to Manchester City in February, 1979, and last season made 10 further First Division appearances. Has scored four League goals for us.

GIBSON, TERRY
(Forward). 5 ft. 5 in.

Upgraded from apprentice to full professional as recently as January, but had already made his League debut at home to Stoke City last December. Also played in the two following F.A. Cup matches against Manchester United. Born in Walthamstow but lives at Woodford Green. Played for Waltham Forest, London and Essex Boys apart from the England team before joining our apprentice ranks in April, 1979. An England Youth player, he was in the Little World Cup team early this summer, and had the distinction of scoring the winning goal in the final in Leipzig. Netted 15 Combination goals for us last season.



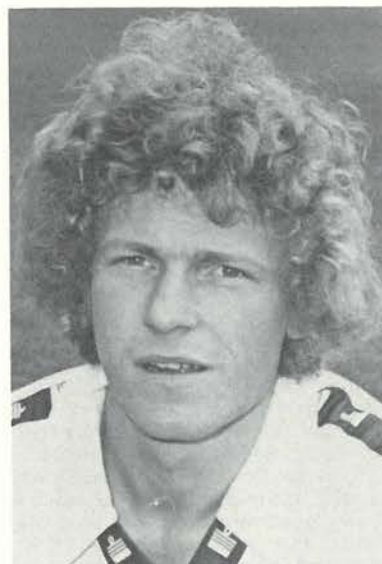


GRAYLING, PAUL
(Midfield). 5 ft. 7½ in.

Joined Spurs in the summer of 1979 after establishing himself over the two preceding seasons in the youth team of the VFR Dortmund Solde Club in West Germany. The son of a warrant officer in the Royal Artillery, he was born at Ipswich, but has spent much of his life in Germany. Attended the British Military Schools in Münster and Dortmund, leaving the latter in August, 1978 with four "O" and one "A" level. Played for Hemer 32 and SSV Kalthof, both German clubs, before joining Dortmund Solde as a 16-year-old. Worked for a time as a storeman in the N.A.A.F.I. at Holzwickede, near Dortmund, but early last summer returned to England to spend six weeks as a junior bank clerk at the Mount Street branch of Barclay's. 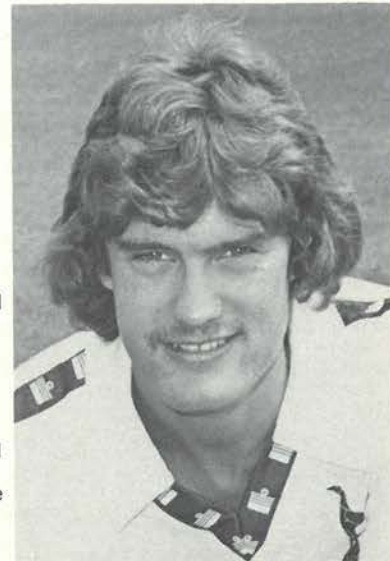


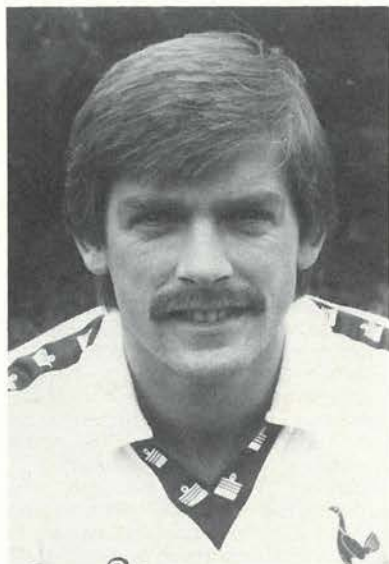
HAZARD, MICHAEL

HOLMES, JAMES

(Defender). 5 ft. 10½ in.

Had the misfortune to break a leg in May, 1979 when making his 29th appearance in the full Eire team against Bulgaria in Sofia, and his come-back was delayed until the end of April, when he played in Terry Naylor's testimonial match against Crystal Palace. Joined Spurs from Coventry City in March, 1977, and made his League debut for us at home to West Bromwich that month. Born in Dublin, where he attended Strand Street Christian Brothers School. Played for both the Dublin and Eire Boys' teams, and also shone at Gaelic football. While playing at centre-half for Bosco Boys' Club in Dublin, he impressed Coventry and was invited to sign for the midland club. Has made 81 League appearances for Spurs, scoring twice, and has also played in 11 F.A. Cup and League Cup matches.

HUGHTON, CHRIS

(Defender). 5 ft. 7½ in.

Looks back on a remarkable year of success. Completed his four-year apprenticeship as a lift engineer in the summer of 1979, and became a full-time professional for the first time last season. Made his senior debut in the home leg of our second-round League Cup-tie against Manchester United last August, and kept his place for the home League match with Manchester City on the following Saturday. Was ever-present for the rest of the season, making a total of 39 League games, and eight in the two Cup competitions. His only senior goal was scored at Brighton last January. Born at Forest Gate, and joined Spurs in his schooldays. Signed as a part-time professional in June, 1977. Attended St. Bonaventure's Secondary School, Forest Gate, and played for Newham Boys. Made four appearances in the full Eire team last season. His brother, Henry, also a defender, is a professional with Orient.



JONES, CHRIS

(Forward). 5 ft. 11 in.

Born in Jersey and established himself in schools football in the Channel Islands. Signed for Spurs as an apprentice in May, 1971 and was upgraded to full professional in May, 1973. Made his League debut on the opening day of season 1974-75 at home to Ipswich Town. Has now made 157 League appearances, in the course of which he has scored 37 goals. Has also played in 20 F.A. Cup and League Cup matches, scoring five times. Played as substitute for the England Under-21 team against Yugoslavia on Manchester City's ground in May, 1978.

KENDALL, MARK

(Goalkeeper). 6 ft. 0¼ in.

Born at Tredegar, but attended Bedwelty School, Bargoed, and played for his county and district teams. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in April, 1975, when a number of other clubs were also showing interest in him, and was upgraded to full professional status in July, 1976. Made his League debut away to Norwich in November, 1978, and can now claim 25 First Division appearances. Has also played in six F.A. Cup-ties. Played for the Welsh Under-21 team against Scotland at Chester in February, 1978.





LACY, JOHN
(Defender). 6 ft. 3 in.

Transferred from Fulham to Spurs in July, 1978. Born in the Everton district of Liverpool, where he attended the Collegiate School, and gained a place in both the Merseyside Schools and Lancashire County Boys' teams. Played for Liverpool Marine, but came south to study at the London School of Economics. Was a member of the London University team coached by George Cohen, the former England and Fulham full-back. Signed as a professional for Fulham in June, 1972, and was in their F.A. Cup final team against West Ham United in 1975. Has played in 39 League matches for Spurs and nine in the League and F.A. Cups. Has a Bachelor of Science degree in Economics.

McALLISTER, DONALD
(Defender). 5 ft. 10 in.

Born at Radcliffe, near Manchester, and played for Lancashire County Boys' team. Joined Bolton Wanderers and graduated through their apprentice ranks to sign as a full professional in June, 1970. As a teenager at Bolton, he attended the local technical college and gained his City and Guild certificate in Motor Vehicle Maintenance. Left Bolton for Spurs in February, 1975, and made his debut for us away to Coventry City that month. Has made 154 League appearances for Spurs, scoring nine goals. Has also played in 27 F.A. Cup and League Cup matches, scoring once. Spent the summer of 1977 playing for Washington Diplomats. His leisure pursuits include golf, squash and water ski-ing.



MAZZON, GEORGE
(Defender). 5 ft. 10 in.

Born at Waltham Cross and attended the Cardinal Bourne School in Broxbourne. Played for Lea Valley Boys and also for the Hertfordshire County Youth team, and also shone at athletics in his schooldays. Formerly played for Waltham New Town and gave up a job as an orders clerk with a firm of builders in Enfield to sign as a professional for Spurs in April, 1979. Made 35 appearances in our Combination team last season.

MILLER, PAUL
(Defender). 6 ft. 0 1/4 in.

Made his league debut for Spurs away to Arsenal in April, 1979, and last season held down a regular first-team place. Now has 34 First Division appearances to his credit and played in all our eight F.A. Cup and League Cup games last season. Born at Stepney and attended Morpeth Secondary School, Bethnal Green. Played for East London, Middlesex and London Boys and was an England schools trialist. Signed for Spurs as an apprentice in April, 1976, and was upgraded to full professional in May, 1977. Was released to play for Skeid F.C. of Oslo from March, 1978 until the end of the Norwegian season in the following October.





NAYLOR, TERRY

(Defender). 5 ft. 10 in.

Born at Islington and played for Islington Boys. Trained for a while with Arsenal and also had a brief spell with Millwall before joining Spurs as an amateur. Gave up his job in Smithfield Market to sign as a professional in July, 1969, and made his League debut at West Bromwich at Easter, 1970. Has made 243 League appearances and 61 in major cup-ties. His only goal for the first team was scored against Chelsea in the semi-final of the League Cup at Stamford Bridge in 1971. Had a testimonial match against Crystal Palace at White Hart Lane last April.

O'REILLY, GARY

(Defender). 5 ft. 11 in.

Signed professional forms for Spurs last September. Born at Isleworth, but lives at Harlow, where he attended Latton Green Primary and Latton Bush Comprehensive Schools. Played for Harlow District and Essex County Boys' teams, and made four appearances in the England Schools Under-18 team, once captaining the side. By parental qualification, he has also played for the Eire youth team. Was Essex County Schools javelin champion and also finished fifth in the National Schools Javelin Championship at Chesterfield in 1978. "A" levels in Geography and Biology qualified him for a place at university but he decided instead on a career in professional football. Made 39 appearances in our Combination team last season, and stood by as substitute for the first team in the final League match.



PERRYMAN, STEPHEN

(Midfield). 5 ft. 8 in.

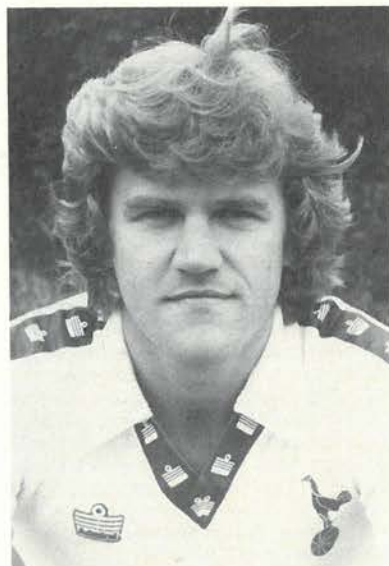

Born at Southampton, and attended Weston Park Boys School. Gained a place in the Southampton and Hampshire County Boys teams and also played for Hampshire County Youth. Signed as an Associated Schoolboy for Southampton but after a spell with Sholing, the Hampshire League club, joined Bournemouth and played in their youth team. His next move was to Portsmouth followed by a two and a half year spell with Dorchester Town. Joined Weymouth early last season, and worked as a fitter's mate for a shipbuilding concern before signing for Spurs. A keen golfer.





SMITH, GORDON
(Defender). 5-ft. 8 in.

Had an operation on his left knee towards the end of last season, and has trained during the summer. Born in the Partick district of Glasgow, and attended Broadholm Primary and later Waverley Secondary School in Drumchapel. In his Broadholm days he gained a place in the Glasgow Primary Schools representative team. Signed for St. Johnstone while still at school and became a professional with them at 17. Made four appearances in the Scottish Under-23 team while with St. Johnstone, and was transferred to Aston Villa in August, 1976. Made his League debut for Spurs away to Bolton as substitute in May, 1979, and now has 16 First Division appearances for us to his credit. Made one appearance in the League Cup last season. Joined us from Villa in February, 1979.

SOUTHEY, PETER
(Defender). 5 ft. 7 in.

Made his one and only appearance in our League team in the home match with Brighton and Hove Albion last September when still an apprentice. Upgraded to full professional status before that month was out. Comes from Putney and played for the Wandsworth and Inner London schools teams. When he left school in June, 1978, he had already appeared in our Football Combination team. First signed as an apprentice for us in July, 1978. His progress last season was retarded by a fractured ankle last October, but he was back in the Combination team before the campaign ended.



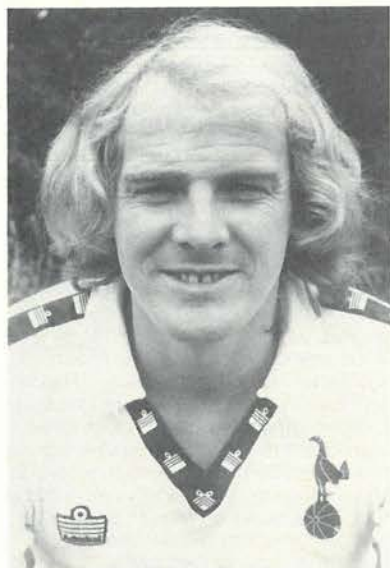
TAYLOR, PETER

Had an operation on his right knee late last season, and has been under treatment during the close season. Joined Spurs at the same time as Osvaldo Ardiles from Argentinian football in July, 1978. Born in Buenos Aires and joined the Quilmes club of that city on leaving the state school as a 17-year-old. Moved to Atletico Tucuman, and when he left that club for the Racing Club of Buenos Aires, he became the most expensive signing in the history of Argentinian football. It was from Racing Club that he joined Spurs, and he scored on his debut away to Nottingham Forest on the opening day of season 1978-79. Has played in 54 League matches for us, scoring six goals. Has also played in 13 League Cup and F.A. Cup matches. Played for Argentina in the World Cup in 1978. Likes outdoor life, and is keen on hunting and fishing.





YORATH, TERRY
(Midfield). 5 ft. 11 in.

Captain of the Welsh international team. Born in Cardiff, where he attended the Gabalfa Primary and Cathays Grammar Schools. As a schoolboy he played for the district team at soccer, rugby, cricket and baseball. Of the clubs keen to sign him as a youngster, he chose Leeds United, and he developed through the apprentice ranks to full professional status at Elland Road. Made his League debut for Leeds away to Burnley as a central defender in 1968. Played as a substitute for Leeds against Sunderland in the F.A. Cup final of 1973, and collected a League championship medal with the Yorkshire club in the following year. Left Leeds for Coventry in August, 1976, and made the further move from the midland club to Spurs in August of last year. Made 33 League appearances in his first season with us, scoring one goal, the first in the 2-0 home win over Bolton. He also played in seven League and F.A. Cup matches last season.

CROOKS, GARTH
(Forward). 5 ft. 8 in.

Joined Spurs from Stoke City towards the end of July. Born in Stoke of Jamaican parents, and attended the local St. Peters School. Signed for Stoke as an apprentice after playing for the Stoke and Staffordshire County Boys' teams, and was upgraded to full professional in March, 1976. Made his League debut for Stoke at home to Coventry in the following month and was given a further League game at home to Birmingham City that season. Is now an England Under-21 player, and celebrated his first appearance at that level by scoring three goals against Bulgaria at Leicester last November. Finished top scorer for Stoke last season with 15 goals.

The Men in Charge

KEITH BURKINSHAW joined Spurs as coach in the summer of 1975 and has been the Club manager since July, 1976. He had spent the previous seven years on the coaching staff of Newcastle United, four of them with the senior team. He was born at Higham, near Barnsley, and as a schoolboy played for the Barnsley district team. His first League club was Liverpool, who spotted him playing for Denaby United in the Midland League. A wing-half, he left Liverpool in 1952 for Workington, then in the Football League, and during his time at Borough Park he was appointed player-manager. In 1965 he joined Scunthorpe United solely as a player, but in three seasons with the Lincolnshire Club, he had a ten-month spell as caretaker-manager.

PAT WELTON was appointed assistant-manager at the time Keith Burkinshaw was promoted to his present position. A fully-qualified F.A. coach and for several years England's Youth Team manager, he joined Spurs as Youth Team Manager in August, 1969. Born at Eltham, he played for Chislehurst before turning professional with Orient in 1949. A goalkeeper, he spent nine seasons with Orient before finishing his League career as a player with Queen's Park Rangers. Later he had a spell as manager of St. Alban's City. For some time he combined the England Youth management with both his post as Physical Education Instructor at Forest School, Snaresbrook, and the management of Walthamstow Avenue.

PETER SHREEVES, who has been in charge of our reserve team since 1977, joined Spurs in 1974, and was formerly Youth Team Manager. He was born at Neath in South Wales in 1940 at a time when his mother was a war-time evacuee. He was brought up in Islington and played for Middlesex and London Boys. After playing for Finchley, his first senior club, he signed for Reading, and first appeared in their League team in season 1958—59. His career as a forward with Reading was brought to a premature close by injury in 1966, but he had further spells with Chelmsford City and Wimbledon. He was on Charlton Athletic's coaching staff before joining Spurs.

Apprentice Professionals

BAXTER, PAUL (Defender)

Born in Hackney but has lived in Chingford from a young age. Attended the Chingford Junior and Senior High Schools, and played for Waltham Forest Boys. Had trials for Essex County, and also played for Waltham Forest Boys at cricket. Made nine appearances in the senior Youth team last season. Signed as an apprentice professional in June.

BOWEN, MARK (Midfield)

An addition to our apprentice ranks this summer. Born at Neath, and attended St. Joseph's Primary School, Neath, and St. Joseph's R.C. School, Port Talbot. Was a regular member of the Welsh schoolboy international team, and also played scrum-half for the Aberavon district rugby team. Made eight appearances in the senior youth team last season.

CORBETT, PATRICK (Defender)

Signed as an apprentice in June, 1979. Born at Hackney, where he still lives, and attended St. Bernards Secondary School, Bethnal Green. Played for the East London Boys team, and also shone at school as a sprinter. Played regularly in the senior youth team last season, and also made seven appearances in the Combination side.

COX, STEVEN (Forward)

Born at Enfield, where he still lives. Attended Brimsdown Junior and Albany Comprehensive Schools in Enfield, and played for Enfield Boys. Was also a Middlesex trialist. Also did well at school at cricket and athletics. Was javelin champion for Enfield district. Signed for Spurs as an apprentice this summer.

HARVEY, CHRISTOPHER (Forward)

Born at Barking, but now lives at Dagenham. Attended Roding Junior and Erkenwald Comprehensive Schools in Dagenham, and played for Barking, Essex County and London Boys. Signed as an apprentice in May, 1979, and played regularly in the senior youth team last season. Had trials with Ipswich Town and Millwall before joining Spurs.

McCABE, MICHAEL (Forward)

Born at Waterford in Southern Ireland, and attended the Scoil Lorca Primary and the Mount Sion Secondary Schools in that town. Played for the local Johnville Club in Waterford and made several appearances in the Eire schoolboy international team. Also played centre-forward at Gaelic for Waterford County. Joined us as an apprentice this summer.

PARKS, ANTHONY (Goalkeeper)

Born at Hackney and attended Upton House School, Homerton. Played for Hackney Boys and also the Inner London Schools team. Trained for a time with Queen's Park Rangers before joining Spurs. Signed as an apprentice in April, 1979, and played three matches in the Combination team last season.

ROLLOCK, ANDERSON (Forward)

Born in Barbados, but has since lived in Enfield. Attended Brettenham Road Primary School, Edmonton, and Arnos Grove Secondary School. Played regularly in the England Boys team and was also in the Enfield, Middlesex and London Boys' teams. Also played basketball for Enfield Boys and shone at athletics, winning the 200 metres title two years running. Made 20 appearances in the senior youth team last season. Signed as an apprentice this summer.

WEBSTER, SIMON (Defender)

Another addition to the apprentice ranks this summer. Born at Earl Shilton, near Hinckley in Leicestershire, but has been brought up in Hatfield. Attended Hazel Grove Junior School in Hatfield and later Hatfield Secondary School. Played for Mid-Herts Boys and Hertfordshire County. Was also county squash champion in his schooldays and shone at swimming. Made 11 appearances in our senior youth team last season.

WILKINS, PAUL (Forward)

Born at Hackney but now lives at Chingford. Attended the William Fitt and McEntee Senior High Schools in Walthamstow, and played for the Waltham Forest and Essex Boys' teams. Also shone at athletics and the javelin. Scored the goals that gave McEntee School a 2-0 win in the final of the English Schools Under-16 Cup against Cardinal Heenan High School of Leeds in April. Signed as an apprentice for Spurs this summer. Made 23 League and Cup appearances last season for our senior youth team, scoring nine goals.

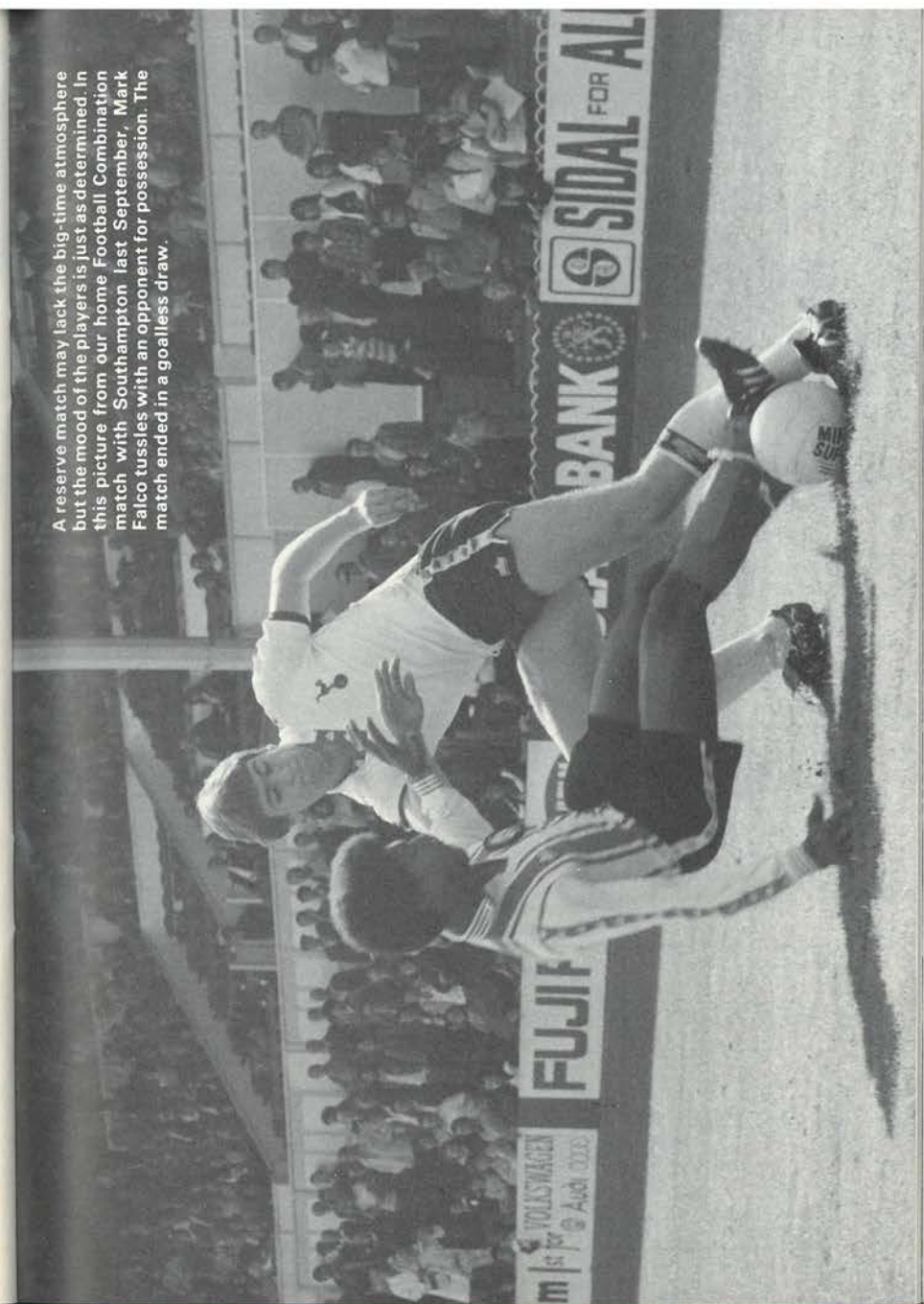

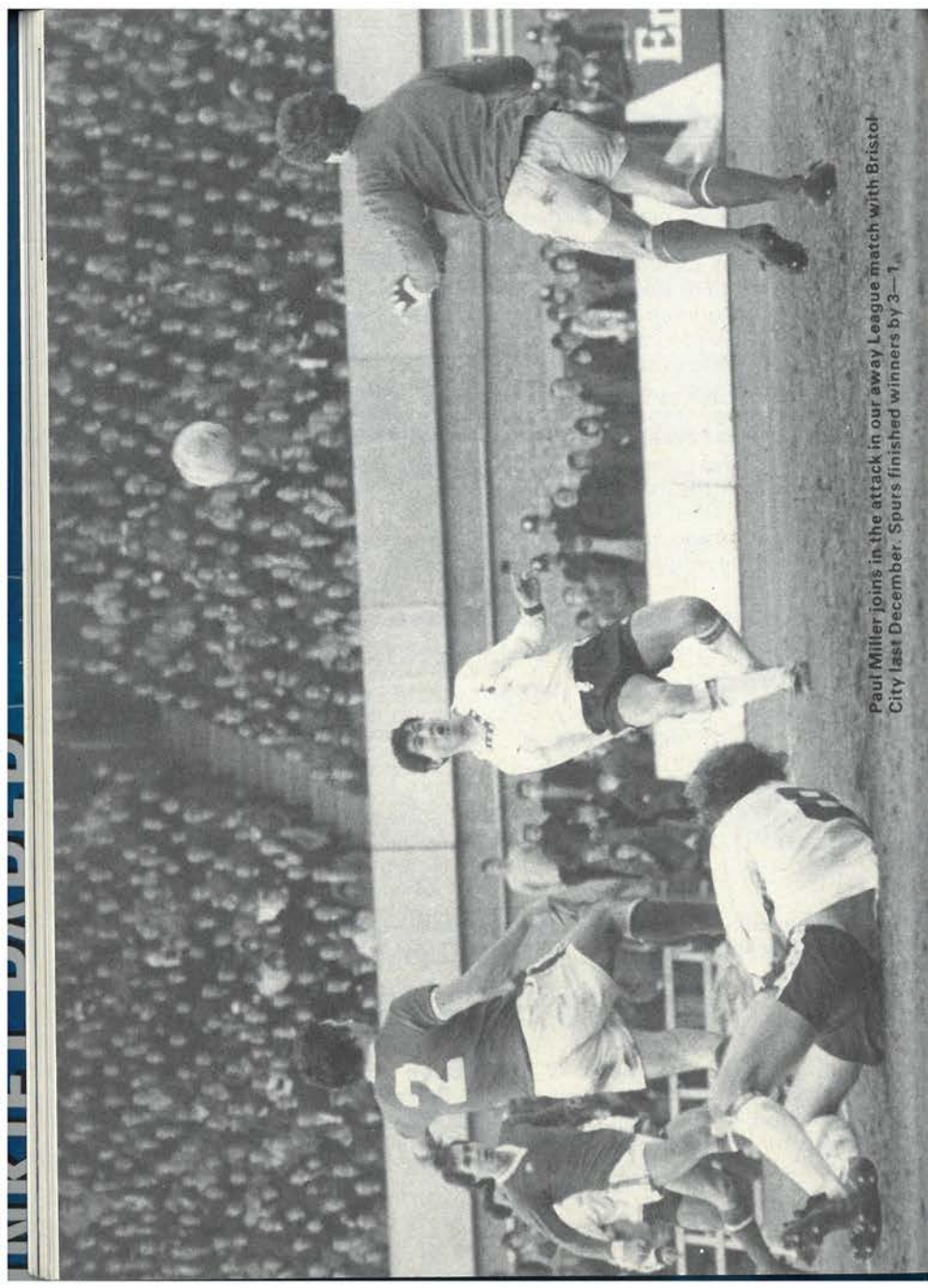

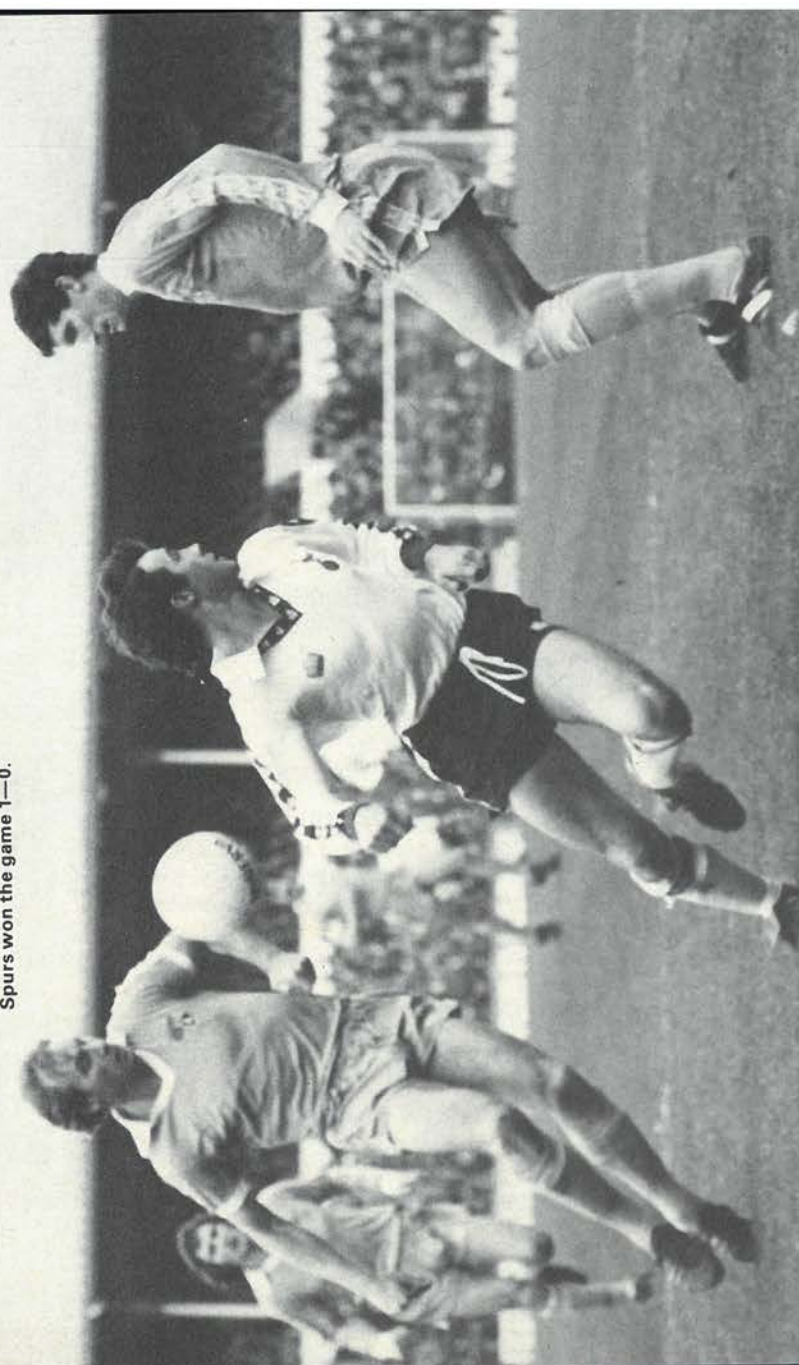

HOTSPUR HISTORY

- 1882 Club formed by boys from a local cricket club and from the local Grammar School. The name of "Hotspur F.C." was adopted.
- 1883 Club reorganised under the presidency of Mr. John Ripsher. Club colours—navy blue. Matches played on Tottenham Marshes.
- 1885 First competitive match versus St. Albans in the London Association Cup, Spurs winning 5—2. Colours changed to light blue and white halves. First credit balance—9 shillings.
- 1886 First cup final. Played Caledonians in the East End Cup and lost 1—0. Club re-named "Tottenham Hotspur Athletic Club".
- 1887 First meeting with Arsenal—then Royal Arsenal. Match abandoned 15 minutes from time "owing to darkness", with Spurs leading 2—1.
- 1888 Spurs move to private ground in Northumberland Park, where the first admission charge of 3d. was made.
- 1890 Colours changed to red shirts and navy blue shorts.
- 1895 Spurs adopt professionalism.
- 1896 A record crowd of 6,000 spectators watch the friendly match against Aston Villa. Spurs elected to the Southern League, Division I. Club colours changed to chocolate and gold.
- 1898 The Club becomes a limited company and a match against Woolwich Arsenal attracts a record crowd of 14,000 spectators.
- 1899 Final change of colours to the now familiar white shirts and blue shorts. The Club moves to present site, originally a market garden. Accommodation for 35,000. Ground almost named as "Gilpin Park" but instead gradually became known as "White Hart Lane". First match staged was a friendly versus Notts County—gross receipts £115.
- 1900 Success at last—Spurs become champions of the Southern League.
- 1901 Spurs win the F.A. Challenge Cup to become the only non-League club, following the formation of the Football League in 1888, ever to achieve this honour.
- 1908 Entry secured to the Second Division of the Football League.
- 1909 Promotion to First Division gained at first attempt.
- 1915 Relegation to Second Division.
- 1920 Promoted again at first attempt, this time with a still unsurpassed Second Division record of 70 points.
- 1921 Second F.A. Cup triumph, Spurs beating Wolverhampton Wanderers by 1—0 at Stamford Bridge.
- 1928 Relegation to Second Division with 38 points.
- 1933 Promotion again, this time as Division 2 runners-up.
- 1934 New East Stand completed.
- 1935 Relegation to Second Division.
- 1938 The existing crowd record of 75,038 spectators was established for the visit of Sunderland in the Sixth Round of the F.A. Cup.
- 1950 Promotion to First Division.
- 1951 Football League champions for the first time.
- 1961 Football League champions and winners of the F.A. Cup. The first club to complete the "double" since Preston North End and Aston Villa did so in 1889 and 1897 respectively.
- 1962 Winners again of the F.A. Cup.
- 1963 Winners of the European Cup-Winners' Cup. The first British club to win a major European competition. Jimmy Greaves becomes Spurs' highest League goalscorer in one season with 37 goals.
- 1967 F.A. Cup-Winners for the fifth time.
- 1971 Winners of the Football League Cup.
- 1972 First winners of new U.E.F.A. Cup and therefore the first British club to have won two major European trophies.
- 1973 Winners of the Football League Cup, the first club to have won the trophy twice.
- 1974 First English club to have played in three major European Finals.
- 1975 Pat Jennings sets a new Club record of League appearances by passing Ted Ditchburn's previous record total of 418. Jennings finished season 1976—77 with 472 League appearances and 118 in the four major cup competitions.
- 1977 Relegation to Second Division.
- 1978 Promotion again secured at first attempt.
