

Another Wembley Trail

THIS season we are in the remarkable, but very happy position of knowing we will tread the distinguished turf of Wembley even before we have kicked our first ball in today's Third Round F.A. Cup-tie with Sheffield Wednesday.

As one of the two clubs through to the Final of the Football League Cup. to be played in February, we now commence the trail that also leads to Wembley in May.

We are delighted at the prospect of meeting Aston Villa in next month's League Cup Final, but our success to date in that competition in no way diminishes our determination also to do well in the F.A. Cup.

In football no club can be too ambitious. Every match is a contest to be won, and it is in this mood that we tackle Wednesday, always welcome visitors to this ground, this afternoon.

Wednesday were relegated to the Second Division at the end of last season. This term they have failed to achieve the success they had hoped for, but to under-rate them would be a grave mistake on our part.

Wednesday's neighbours, Sheffield United, gave us a hard match in the Third Round of the League Cup, and Bristol City, another Second Division club, pushed us all the way in the League Cup Semi-finals last month.

When it comes to cup-ties, divisional status sometimes means very little, and we expect sterner opposition from Wednesday today than we have met in some First Division matches this season.

ELEVENTH TIE

This afternoon's is Spurs' 11th major cup-tie of the season. Not so many years ago the opening round of the F.A. Cup involved clubs in their first cup-tie of the season.

A glance at our First Team fixture list on another page of this programme will show how regularly we have been engaged in cup-ties since the visit of Swansea City in the Second Round of the League Cup in September.

In reaching the League Cup Final we have played six matches, including the double-leg Semi-final. To these matches can be added the double-leg ties against Dunfermline Athletic and

Motherwell in the Texaco Cup, which bring our total of cup-ties played to 10 before today.

The figure can even be pushed to 12 if we include the two games played in the Palma de Mallorca International tournament in August.

A run of cup success, such as we have enjoyed to date in the League Cup competition, certainly lengthens the fixture list. Including the matches in Majorca and the full-scale home friendly with Glasgow Rangers, our senior team had fulfilled 35 fixtures prior to today.

Not far short of a full season's match programme, and this is only the first Saturday of January!

TODAY'S VISITORS

SHEFFIELD WEDNESDAY

THE Sheffield Wednesday team includes a number of International players. Among them is Peter Rodrigues, their captain, who was signed from Leicester City in the middle of October.

Full back Rodrigues, who has, of course, played against us in First Division football in the past, was

born in Cardiff, and made his name in League football with Cardiff City. Rodrigues, who has made many appearances for Wales, was transferred from Cardiff to Leicester during season 1965-66.

Half-back Gerry Young is another international player. He comes from South Shields, and has been a Wednesday player for more than 15

Young played for England in November, 1964 at Wembley against Wales, who were captained by Mike England, then with Blackburn. Cliff Jones was in the Welsh team that day.

UNDER-23 HONOURS

Among the Wednesday players with a string of England Under-23 honours is left-winger **John Sissons**, well-known to us here in London as the former West Ham United star.

Sissons, who was born at Hayes in Middlesex, joined Wednesday from West Ham only last August. He was a member of the West Ham team that won the F.A. Cup in 1964 and the European Cup-Winners' Cup a year later.

Midfield player Graham Pugh is another former Under-23 player. Born at Hoole, near Chester, he joined Wednesday straight from school, and developed through the apprentice ranks at Hillsborough.

At one time it was feared that a knee injury would finish his football career, but Pugh fought back. As a schoolboy he played for Cheshire County.

Sam Ellis, who is expected to occupy a defensive position, made three appearances for the England Under-23 team. He comes from Ashton-under-Lyne, and is another of Wednesday's nursery products. He was in Wednesday's team beaten by Everton in the F.A. Cup Final of 1966.

FROM FOREST

Goalkeeper Peter Grummitt, another player who has had his share of Under-23 limelight, was signed from Nottingham Forest last January. He comes from Bourne in Lincolnshire, and among the matches he played for Forest against Spurs was the F.A. Cup Semi-final of 1967 on Wednesday's ground.

Full-back **Ken Burton** is a local Sheffield discovery, who was formerly an apprentice at Hillsborough. Originally a wing-half, he has been converted successfully to full-back.

Burton, a former England Youth player, made his League debut for Wednesday against Stoke City in November, 1968.

Other players who may fill defensive positions for Wednesday today are Alan Thompson and Colin Prophett.


Thompson comes from Liverpool, and in his schooldays captained Liverpool Boys. He has emerged from the junior ranks at Hillsborough, and is new to League football this season.

Prophett is a Crewe man, who was named as substitute when Wednesday were here in the League last season. He is another product of Wednesday's nursery system.

Named for the No. 10 spot in Wednesday's team today is **Steven Downes.** Downes is a Yorkshireman from Leeds, who joined Wednesday from Rotherham United.

Defender Jimmy Mullen, who is only 18, has been given his League chance this season. He comes from Jarrow in the north-east.

The match at Ipswich last Saturday was our first senior postponement of the season. Fortunately, the decision was made in time to stop the team making a fruitless journey.

In the League Cup this season Wednesday were defeated by Chelsea in Round 2.

THIRD PAIRING

THE PAIRING of Spurs and Sheffield Wednesday in the F.A. Cup is an unusual event. Although we have been meeting the Yorkshire club in either First or Second Division football, on and off, since season 1909-10, this is only the third time we have been drawn against Wednesday in the Cup.

Our clashes in the Cup with the men of Hillsborough have been well separated by the years.

The first was as long ago as 1904 in the old Third Round, which involved the last eight clubs. Spurs, members of the Southern League at the time, were at home to Wednesday, who went on to win the League championship that season.

History records that the tie here was a thrilling affair, and that Spurs were every bit as good as the famous Wednesday team of that time. The game ended goalless, and Wednesday were worthy winners by 2—0 in the replay at Hillsborough.

CHAMPIONS AGAIN

It was 28 years later, in 1932, that Spurs and Wednesday were next paired in the Cup. Many present-day supporters will remember the tie.

We were then in the Second Division, and jogging along in a mid-table position. Wednesday were then one of the most powerful clubs in the First Division, and their visit in the Cup created tremendous interest.

We were badly in need of a boost, and our players, rising nobly to the occasion, nearly pulled off a shock result. In a fine game, before a crowd of more than 40,000, Harry Burgess, their inside-left, gave Wednesday the lead, but Spurs fought back in great style.

George Hunt equalised, and to the accompaniment of what used to be known as the "Tottenham Roar", Willie Evans put us in front.

Ellis Rimmer, Wednesday's English international left-winger, saved the day for his side with an equaliser, but we had good reason to feel we would have won if Albert Lyons, our right-back, had not been injured at a critical stage of the game. No substitutes in those days!

The Cup is full of nostalgia, so here are the teams that day to stir the memories of our older supporters.

Spurs: Spiers; Lyons, Poynton; Colquhoun, Rowe, Evans, T.; Davies, Brain, Hunt, O'Callaghan and Evans, W.

SHEFFIELD WEDNESDAY: Brown; Walker, Blenkinsop; Strange, Leach, Gowdy: Hooper, Stephenson, Millership, Burgess and Rimmer.

Our Cup hopes ended at Hillsborough in the replay the following Wednesday. We were well beaten by 3—1, Hunt scoring our solitary goal from the penalty spot.

Today it's another age, another story. Twice before we have been drawn at home to Wednesday in the Cup, and have lost in an away replay by a two-goal margin.

It's a pattern we hope to break by winning outright to earn a place in Monday's Fourth Round draw.

It was in November, 1969 that Sheffield Wednesday were last here. At that time only two clubs, Southampton and Sunderland, were below Wednesday on the First Division chart, but the Sheffield side gave us a hard game, and were beaten by the only goal of the match.

It was scored by Roger Morgan late in the game when it seemed the result would be a goalless draw.

Three members of Wednesday's team that day are now with other clubs. Peter Eustace is with West Ham United, David Ford is a Newcastle United player, and Tony Coleman has since joined Blackpool.

WEMBLEY BOUND

Spurs 2, Bristol City 0

In view of the postponement through snow of last Saturday's home reserve match with West Ham United, this is the first opportunity we have had of referring to our extra-time victory over Bristol City in the second-leg Semi-final of the League Cup on Wednesday of last week.

All our supporters will join in congratulating the team on reaching Wembley, and we now have the exciting prospect of meeting Aston Villa in the Final next month.

It was a hard-won victory over Bristol City, and we salute them on the gallant fight they put up. The quality of their performance, especially in the first half, made a mockery of their League position, and although we had most of the play, we could not even begin to anticipate victory until Martin Chivers headed us into the lead from Cyril Knowles' free-kick in the 7th minute of extra time.

City's flickering hopes were finally extinguished after five minutes of the second period of extra time, when Jimmy Pearce calmly and deliberately crashed the ball in with his left foot. it was an unlucky night for Mike England, who wrenched an ankle after only nine minutes, and was replaced by Pearce.

ROUTE TO LEEDS

For the benefit of supporters planning their own travelling arrangements by road to Leeds for our League match there next Saturday, we reproduce the following route, recommended by the R.A.C.

Follow the M.1 Motorway northward to the junction with the A.61. Then follow the R.A.C. signposted route via Church Street, Waterloo Road, Balm Road, Beza Street, Moor Road, Burton Road, Garnet Road and Dewsbury Road to Beeston Ring Road.

Continue ahead to the junction with Elland Road, turn right and the ground is on your left. The total distance from the Tottenham area is approximately 199 miles.

Car parks are available near the ground, but street parking is controlled by the police, so watch for the signs, including diversions.

British Rail will run a special train in connection with this match at a day return fare of 50s. This will leave King's Cross on the forward journey at 09.25 hours, arriving at Leeds City Station at 12.39. The return train is timed for 17.50 from Leeds City, arriving King's Cross at 21.15.

LAW 17

A PLAYER takes a corner-kick and the ball rebounds to him off a goal-post without touching another player. What is the referee's decision?

In this situation the referee awards an indirect free-kick to the team opposing the player taking the corner-kick, the free-kick being taken from the place where the infringement occurred.

Law 17 states that "the kicker shall not play the ball a second time until it has been touched or played by another player."

The law also states that "a goal may be scored direct from a corner-kick, and that players of the team opposing that of the player taking the corner-kick shall not approach within 10 yards of the ball until it is in play . . ."
