

I hear that Grimsby have a partisan crowd and that we'll need all the vocal encouragement we can get.

I know Christmas makes a big demand on everyone's pockets, but we hope as many of our supporters as possible will join us at Grimsby... your support really does help the players, I can assure you.

Paul Smith has always been interested in football thanks to his brother Errol's influence. Errol used to play every week and took his young brother along to watch. It was the time when Cyrile Regis was starting to make a name for himself and Paul followed Regis' path to success with interest. That fuelled Paul's ambition to make a career in football.

He was playing alongside Paul Merson (another of our young players) for Sunday team Forest United, Middlesex and the Brent district side. Youth officer Terry Murphy spotted his potential and asked him to come along to Highbury as a schoolboy. Paul also had a spell at Watford but the famous marble halls drew him to Arsenal. He spent two years on associate schoolboy forms then signed apprentice.

He found it easy to settle in at Arsenal because, as well as Paul Merson, there were a number of other boys he knew from Forest. His apprenticeship lasted for two years when he played for the youth team in the South East Counties League. In fact, he has been playing in the youth team for most of this season even though he has turned professional.

However, when Martin Hayes was called into firstteam action recently, Paul was given his chance in the reserves. He is realistic and accepts that while Martin is playing for the reserves he stands little chance of a regular place - but he is willing to adapt to any situation.

He came to Arsenal as a right midfielder but circumstances forced him to change position to the right-wing. He realises that he will have to be adaptable to give himself more chance of advancement though he admits that his favourite position is in midfield.

"You feel so much more involved in the game when you are in the middle. But in the end it's not up to me what position I play. I'll play wherever I am needed", he says.

His ambition this season is to win a regular place in the reserves team. He is being constantly encouraged by his family and friends and has a lot of confidence in himself . . .

"I know that if I play to the best of my abilities I ought to be able to hold a place in the reserves", he



BURTON'S BOYS KEEP KNOCKING ON THE DOOR

It's a healthy sign for the future of Arsenal when so many young reserves are knocking on the first-team door.

Already this season Martin Hayes, David Rocastle, Martin Keown, Niall Quinn and Gus Caesar have been given their chance in the Canon League — and all have rewarded manager Don Howe's confidence in them.

Says reserve team boss Terry Burton: "It's very nice for the club to see these youngsters coming through.

"And there are others Don Howe would have no worries about putting into the first team if circumstances required."

Youngsters often get their break because of injuries or loss of form by senior players — but there is always a certain amount of good fortune involved.

"There have been lots of good young players at this club who have not got their chance and have had to look elsewhere for success. But it's still satisfying for me to see them move on and make the grade at another club," says Terry.

Defender Martin Keown had a long loan spell at Second Division Brighton but was brought back to Highbury by Howe and given his first-team debut.

"Martin benefited greatly from the experience at Brighton," said Burton. "He's very quick and his exceptional pace is a great bonus playing in the First Division."

Rocastle, still in only his first full season in the reserves, made a quick impact on his first-team debut.

"A lot of people tend to forget how raw he is in terms of experience," said Burton. "But he's got a lot of natural ability and instinctively likes to take defenders on.

"When he came back into the reserves after playing in the first team he seemed to have lost a bit of appetite. But he's been back to his best in recent games."

Martin Hayes had to wait a little longer in the reserves before his chance came.

Said Burton: "He's got a lot of pace and scores a lot of goals. His consistency earned him his chance. He got in on merit and now his ambition must be to hold down a regular spot."

Niall Quinn's golden debut against Liverpool also pleased Burton.

"He's a handful in the air and has a nice touch on the floor, but because he's a big lad he's got to keep working on his mobility. But everyone must remember that one game means nothing. When he's had 50 games we can judge how good he is."

Defender Gus Caesar, who made his debut in place of suspended Viv Anderson in our 1-0 win at Manchester United, has overcome 18 injury-plagued months to earn his chance.

"I'm pleased to see him do so well," said Burton: "He's a skilful, combative defender, and he's come on a lot. He has pace, aggression, and gets up well in the air."

Soon back in contention for a first-team spot will be defender Tony Adams.

"Tony has had to fight back from a troublesome injury which ironically opened the door for Martin Keown to get his chance," said Burton. "Now Tony is back and looking like the Tony Adams of old.

"Full-back Michael Thomas is another who has had a good season so far and is knocking on the first-team door."

Admitted Burton: "We're on top of the Football Combination table but quite honestly I thought we'd do well to hold our own this season. We have a lot of players in the side who have not played regular reserve football until this season and I'm pleasantly surprised that the lads have done so well.

"The difficult part for me has been keeping the players who haven't got a first-team call on the boil!"

Tottenham suporters could be forgiven for thinking otherwise. Charlie started his goal spell against Spurs in our 2-1 Milk Cup win at White Hart Lane in November 1983; then followed up with two goals in our 4-2 league triumph that Boxing Day.

Nicholas netted the second in our 3-2 win at Easter 1984 — and fired us into the lead when we won 2-0 at Tottenham last April. That's some record!

Charlie has only failed to score once in five games against our local rivals — in this fixture last year. And that's the only one of the five games Spurs have won!

But Charlie assures the Tottenham fans, he doesn't store up something special for their team. "It's not something you can pinpoint; it's the way things happen," he says: "You can't go into any game thinking: I'll just go out and score a couple of goals today." I love the atmosphere of the Arsenal-Spurs derby clashes, just like the Celtic-Rangers games I grew up with. But I

don't think I do anything different from what I do in other matches."

Still, Charlie agrees that many of his finest Arsenal moments have come in these games — and his favourite was the goal he scored against Spurs that Easter, two years ago.

Charlie played a one-two off a defender's legs, dribbled past three more challenges, and slid the ball over the line as Tottenham legs lunged to clear.

Topscorer Charlie comes to today's game on a hot streak; goals in the victories over Liverpool, Manchester United and Q.P.R. mean he's scored in three successive games for the first time for Arsenal since December 1983 and he's set up for an exciting new year.

"I believe I'm going to score every time I play now," says Charlie: "I want to keep this run going."

And Charlie pays tribute to the role of 19-year-old Niall Quinn, who's been his striking partner since the start of December: "He's very strong in the air — and we need someone like him, the way we play. He's taken a lot of pressure off me."

It is rare for anyone to score more than once against Spurs these days. And, if they can maintain recent form, they may yet come into contention for the League Championship.

Manager Peter Shreeve brought in fitagain Gary Mabbutt to partner Graham Roberts in the middle of the back four. Gary has played for Spurs and England in midfield and at full-back and has made an equal success of his new job.

With Ray Clemence in goal and Gary Stevens and Chris Hughton at full-back, Spurs have looked sound at the back.

Paul Allen, Glenn Hoddle, Steve Perryman and Chris Waddle have been filling the midfield places though Ossie



Ardiles is still very much in contention here.

Having recovered from injury, Clive Allen was successfully recalled to the attack at the end of November so, with Mark Falco enjoying another good season, Spurs have a potentially lethal partnership up front.



EXCELLENT FIRST YEAR FOR PETER SHREEVE

Few people could have been better qualified than Peter Shreeve to take over as Spurs' manager in the summer of 1984. His long career in football has spanned all levels of the game and he has experienced just about every problem a footballer can face — including the shattering blow of having his own playing career ruined by injury.

Though a Londoner, Mr Shreeve was actually born in Neath, his mother having evacuated to Wales during the war.

He started his senior career with the amateur club Finchley and quickly established himself at that level. He was only 18 when Reading signed him on professional forms. In 1958/59 he was introduced to Reading's first team as they challenged for promotion from the Third Division. He scored once in 12 games during the course of that campaign.

While with Reading he was selected for the Wales Under-23s and was being watched by the full international selectors — but injuries robbed him of the chance of any caps.

He was forced out of League football in 1966. He played for a while in the Southern League, with Chelmsford City and Wimbledon, at the same time studying coaching. He is now a fully qualified FA Coach.

Mr Shreeve joined Charlton's coaching staff before moving to Tottenham in 1974. For three years he managed their youth team and in 1977 took charge of the reserve team. He was appointed assistant-manager in 1980, a post he filled until his promotion to the managerial chair in June last year.

Mr Shreeve had an excellent first year at the helm. Spurs were in contention from the League Championship and reached the quarter-finals of the UEFA Cup.

This season he is hoping to clinch his first trophy.





The Tottenham squad:

RAY CLEMENCE (Goalkeeper). Ray has been capped by England on 61 occasions. He began his career with humble Scunthorpe United but Liverpool signed him in 1967 and he enjoyed 10 glorious years at Anfield, winning just about every honour in the game. He moved on to Tottenham for £300,000 in 1981.

GARY STEVENS (Defender). Gary only recently returned to first-team duty after a long absence through injury. A versatile player who can play equally well in defence or in midfield, Gary started his career with Brighton, making his League debut in 1979. He played for the Seagulls against Manchester United in the 1983 FA Cup final, and replay, and was transferred to Spurs for 5300,000. After winning five England Under-21 caps, Gary won three full England caps last season.

GRAHAM ROBERTS (Defender). When Spurs signed Graham from Weymouth in 1980, the £35,000 fee was a record for a non-League player. He quickly established himself in First Division football and three seasons ago he was capped twice by England in the British Championship. He now has six

GARY MABBUTT (Defender/Midfield). Gary made a spectacular rise following his £125,000 transfer from Bristol Rovers in 1982. Within weeks he was in the England team and he now has nine caps. He has been plagued by injuries in recent months but has now played himself back into the side.

CHRIS HUGHTON Defender). Chris worked his way up from the junior teams and has been a regular in the first-team since his debut in 1979. He is now also a fixture in the Republic of

Ireland side, picking up his 27th cap against the USSR this season.

PAUL MILLER (Defender). Paul came through the apprentice ranks at White Hart Lane, making his first League appearance in 1978/79, when he made his League debut against Arsenal at Highbury.

DANNY THOMAS (Defender). Danny was a very young professional with Coventry, getting his first game in their League XI during 1979/80. He won five of his seven England Under-21 caps with the Sky Blues, then moved to Tottenham for a £250,000 fee in 1983.

GLENN HODDLE (Midfield). Glenn made a triumphant return to the England side towards the end of last season, and he now has 27 caps. He took his bow in League soccer in 1975, and quickly earned himself a firm place with his delightful passes, his body swerves, his curling free-kicks and vicious volleying. In 1979/80 he was Spurs' top scorer with 22 goals.

STEVE PERRYMAN (Defender/Midfield). Steve has long since smashed the club record for most League appearances, last season passing the 630 mark. He won one full England cap, following 17 appearances for the Under-23s. He is also a former Youth international. Steve has played in six winning Cup finals for Spurs — twice

PAUL ALLEN (Midfield). Paul won a record number of 23 England Youth caps during his early days with West Ham. He was a member of the Hammers FA Cup-winning side of 1980 and last season he played twice for the England Under-21s. His £400,000 transfer to Spurs this summer saw him link up with his cousin Clive Allen at White Hart Lane.

OSSIE ARDILES (Midfield). Ossie brought a new dimension to the English game when he joined Spurs after starring in Argentina's 1978 World Cupwinning team. He and Ricky Villa joined Spurs for a combined fee of £750,000 and he enjoyed four outstanding seasons in the Tottenham side. After returning to Argentina in preparation for the 1982 World Cup, Ossie spent a loan period with Paris St Germain before rejoining Spurs in 1984.

MARK FALCO (Forward). Mark has been leading Spurs' scoring list for the second successive season, following his grand tally of 29 last term. A former England Youth cap, Mark made his League debut against Bolton in 1979 but, before winning a regular place in the Spurs' side, he spent a loan period with Chelsea in 1982/83.

CHRIS WADDLE (Forward). Tottenham paid £590,000 to sign Chris from Newcastle this summer. He joined Newcastle from Tow Law Town, made his League debut in 1980 and, after picking up Under-21 honours, played in the last eight full England games of last season. He has appeared in all three of England's World Cup ties this season.

CLIVE ALLEN (Forward). Clive joined Spurs from QPR for £700,000 in 1984 following a highly successful introduction to the England side on tour in South America. He won three caps. Though injuries limited him to a dozen

or so games last season, he still scored 10 goals. Clive started his League career with QPR in 1978/79 and, after leading their scoring list with 30 the following season, he was transferred to Arsenal. But, before he had played a competitive game for the Gunners, he was transferred to Crystal Palace in exchange for Kenny Sansom. In 1981







Two months ago, Martin Keown was just ending another loan spell at second division Brighton, arriving back at Highbury — and praying for a first team chance.


Now he's broken into the Gunners side

Although he was born in Wales, Peter Shreeve actually grew up in Islington. Arsenal was his nearest club and he began watching the Gunners reserve team when he was eight years old. He loved football, so it was only natural that he should go and watch his local team: and soon he became a Highbury regular for first team games as well.

Then one Monday night, he went to Tottenham for the first time and was just as excited by what he saw there. After that he started going to both grounds on a regular basis.

Spurs soon became his favourite team. It was the era of Arthur Rowe's push-and-run side and although Spurs were only in the Second Division, there were indications of better things to come.

"At that time, anyone who loved football wanted to see Tottenham on a good night, myself included, and Spurs became my first love. I still went to watch Arsenal because I knew that I wanted to be involved in the game and I saw it all as part of my education," he explains.

When he began playing football full-time, he still used to go along to as many Spurs games as he could.

He is conscious that Arsenal and Tottenham have a great deal in common, not least where their supporters are concerned. Both sets of fans are passionate and critical, and he appreciates that anyone involved with either club has to be fairly thick skinned to take the knocks that inevitably come when the team isn't winning.

Taking that the clubs do have so much in common, ground sharing is something that springs to mind.
"In theory, it's a marvellous idea, there's no doubt about that", Peter says. "We have large stadiums in inner city areas, and the fans only come along in their masses roughly once a fortnight. When it comes to putting the idea into practice, the theory falls flat. Where Arsenal and Spurs are concerned, neither club would want to give up their own stadium; and if the clubs could come to an agreement, the fans certainly wouldn't. I know Tottenham supporters who wouldn't go to Highbury and Arsenal supporters who wouldn't go to White Hart Lane. That's a silly attitude, but it exists."

Back to today's game . . . The Arsenal-Spurs match is the biggest of the London derbies — but that is

mainly a fans view and to a lesser extent, a player's. As a manager, Peter Shreeve has to detach himself from the rivalry and look on the game as one more fixture, no more or less important than any other. Because both clubs have marvellous traditions, rivalry has grown, but if there has to be rivalry at all, Peter Shreeve would like to see a friendly rivalry between fans . . .

"I'd like the fans to realise that they are at a ground to watch a football match," he urges. "Of course every supporter wants to see his team win, but they have to realise that no team can win all the time."


To help build up this friendly rivalry, he is heartened by the junior supporters schemes that are in operation all over the country and he has been personally involved in a Junior Spurs day when junior supporters clubs from all over the country (Arsenal included) were invited to White Hart Lane.

"We are now half way through what everyone knew was going to be a testing season for football," he admits. "The conduct of most supporters throughout the country has been excellent and there have been no flashpoints of major concern. The half term report is encouraging and I wouldn't want anything to happen this morning between rival supporters that would dampen the progress being made."



BATTLING HIS WAY BACK . . . DETERMINED GRAHAM PUTS RESERVES BEHIND HIM

"When I was dropped, it shook up everyone in the club," That's how Graham Rix looks back on his omission from the side after the defeat at Everton in November. Now Graham has won his place back — and he's determined he'll never go through that battle again.

"If a player isn't doing his job, he knows he can be left out," said Graham: "It's up to the boss. When I was dropped it was like a signal to everyone — that no matter how big their reputation, it didn't guarantee them a place in the side."

Graham knows that the emergence of young players like David Rocastle, Niall Quinn, Martin Hayes, Martin Keown and Gus Caesar, has heaped more pressure on the established stars than for a long while.

He points to Tommy Caton and Steve Williams, who've had to sit on the sidelines while youngsters have slotted in for them.

"I was very disappointed and shook up when I was dropped — but I accepted it as part of the job," said Graham: "You can do one of two things if you're left out. You can demand a transfer; and in that case the club might as well give you one, because if that's your attitude they're better off without you. Or you can show what you're worth and make sure you win your place back."

"I've just tried my best — whether in the first team or reserves — and hoped my game would come right. I don't believe I'm doing much different from say three months ago — except that more is coming off for me now. If I could put my finger on the difference . . . I'd never have another bad game!"

Graham said earlier in the season he felt like 'a linesman without a flag' as the Gunners worked on a more direct style. Now he's drifting inside 10 or 15 yards to continue his familiar link-up with Kenny Sansom — staying involved in the action, and chipping in with shots like the rocket that smashed into the net for our opening goal against O.P.R.

Rix recalled the example set by former Gunners' doubles heroes, like Eddie Kelly, John Radford, Peter Simpson and George Armstrong, when he spent a brief spell in the reserves.

"I can remember as a youngster, playing in the reserves alongside those players," said Graham: "They'd done it all, yet they still approached every game like it was a cup final. There's a responsibility on the older players to set an example. So there was no way I was going to treat reserve football as something beneath me. It was a phase I had to go through to get back in the first team."

And he's been lifted by the arrival of the young Gunners. Graham was one of the last bunch of youngsters to cheer Highbury after troubled times — when he and Stapleton, Brady and O'Leary lifted the gloom of the haunted mid-70s.

"Those wins against Liverpool and Manchester United have given us all a boost," he said: "I think the fans felt the season was drifting away — but those results have given them a lot of hope."

Still, experience has taught him the problems that can affect young players at top level.

"The first season is often the easiest, because people are not aware of you," said Graham: "It's in the second year — when opponents have found out what you can do — when you find out if you can really make it."

As Graham jokingly said to Niall Quinn after his exciting debut against Liverpool: "The first game's easy . . . it's the next 450 that will be hard!"

Yet he's convinced the youngsters can help form one of the strongest squads he's known, in all his time at Highbury.

"We're finding strength and depth right through the squad now," he says: "And that competition will keep everyone on their toes."

THE VIEW FROM RIO

Kevin Connolly weighs up another trip to Brazil

Lolling on the beach at glorious Ipanema, basking in the warmth of 39°C (instead of England's 39°F), the world looks a jolly decent place. But not if you're a Brazilian football fan it doesn't.

As I've remarked before; while the English bookmakers reckon Brazil are a team of super-men, the Brazilians themselves are wondering anxiously how they are going to assemble a team to challenge in Mexico.

First they have to find themselves a manager. Tele Santana, the man who guided Brazil through the qualifying stages, has been sowing seeds of wisdom in Arabia and visiting his recuperating father in Belo Horizonte; while waiting to hear if he's still got the job for Mexico. The reason for this is that the CBF (the Brazilian FA) is in the throes of a presidential election and a manager can't be appointed until the CBF finds itself a new president.

Meanwhile, Jose Bonetti (the man who planned Brazil's preparations when they won in 1970) is backing Reubens Minelli, coach of the Gaucho champions Gremio, from the southern city of Porto Alegre, while the great Pele leads another lobby supporting Mario Zagalo, Brazil's boss in 1970 and 1974.

At least Bobby Robson and Don Howe never had to worry about that sort of pressure.

On the playing side, three of Brazil's 1982 heroes - Socrates, Zico and Falcao - have all fled the Italian lire and come home. Zico and Socrates should make Flamengo the strongest team in Rio and possibly in South America... when the two star midfielders are eventually fit enough to play. The most exciting football in Brazil is being played by Sao Paulo, led by 'O Marvailhoso' (the wonderful) Falcao - and Gremio, rapidly re-discovering to the form that made them world club champions two years ago.

The Brazilians are still waiting for another 82 idol, Junior, to come home from Torino - and arguing whether he should play defence or midfield.

But where are the new heroes? The Gremio forward Renato. perhaps. Sao Paulo's top scorer Careca may just turn out to become Brazil's first convincing central striker since Tostao.

His Sao Paulo colleague Muller and Guarani's 19-year-old Neto have their supporters for midfield. None is vet established. Otherwise the names have a familiar ring, from the side gunned down by Paolo Rossi and the Italians in 1982 - Socrates, Falcao, Zico, Junior, Leandro, Oscar, and Eder.

The Brazilians will spend four or five months in preparation. No one will be better prepared. But they wonder if it will be enough at altitude which is as much a problem for them as everyone else.

Santana surprisingly believes the top Europeans have crept ahead of Brazil - and the fans fear their old enemies Argentina. They hope Brazil will win - but they're not convinced yet.

SUPER LEAGUE COMING SOON?

While we've been talking about super leagues in England the same discussion has been gathering speed in Brazil. The former Flamengo president, now turned sporting politician, Marcio Braga, has managed to force through a change to the CBF rules, ending the old; one club, one vote system and replacing it with a system weighted in favour of the most popular clubs.

Now the big clubs with the big gates and the big state federations like Rio and Sao Paulo will call the tune - after years of a system which forced the clubs and areas with the biggest support always to move at a pace dictated by their weaker

The problem was starkly illustrated in Sao Paulo where the great Corinthians, who can draw 100,000 for big games, carried the same voting rights as clubs with a couple of thousand fans. I'm sure top English club administrators will recognise the situation!

The upshot could be the formation of a national league - comprising the top twenty clubs - for the first time in Brazilian football history; and an end to the present system of state leagues with the winners playing off for the Taca de Ouro championship trophy.

It's easy to see why the top clubs in the big cities want to break out of the state league structure. When Rio's big two, Flamengo and Fluminense, met recently they drew 95,049 to the Maracana. Yet for the match against no-hopers Bonsuccesso only 8,000 turned up to watch Flamengo win.

NO HOOLIGANS HERE, PLEASE

One problem the Brazilian don't face is football hooliganism. The fans at the Maracana happily pass each other to change ends at half-time.

So the Brazilians look askance at their Argentinian neighbours. No wonder . . . 99 fans have died in and around Argentine's football grounds since the first fatality back in 1958. A recent trial in Buenos Aires - in which Boca Juniors 'fans' received 21/2 year sentences for killing a rival supporter caused a storm - and Boca fans were alleged to have been involved again when a Racing supporter became the latest victim. However, unlike the English they haven't so far exported their violence into foreign stadiums.






