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COMMENT

A CLUB that wins at home and draws away can usually look back on a successful season. That kind of performance yields three-quarters of a season's points, and football history shows that many championships have been won on less.

The significance of a good away record is very important to Spurs at present. We have one of the best away records in the League. Unfortunately, the benefits that should accrue have been lost by the points we have yielded at home.

It's true we finished winners over Newcastle United in our last home game, but our present mid-table position is due to the nine points dropped in matches on this ground.

The point we brought back from Stoke last Saturday was our 11th in the course of nine away matches. Compare that with last season's total of 17 from the full complement of 21 away fixtures.

The way ahead obviously depends upon the ability of our players to find the same satisfying touch at home that has characterised most of their performances on opponents' grounds. The need is urgent, and we look for another home win against Sheffield Wednesday today.

LOWLY POSITION

Wednesday occupy a lowly position in the First Division, but this is no reason for taking them for granted. When Sunderland were here at the end of Sep-

tember, they were then, as now, on the bottom rung, and we all know what happened that day!

Wednesday's record shows, however, that they have won only one and drawn two of the nine away matches they have played to date.

Their victory was by 2-1 at Sunderland, and their two other away points were picked up on the grounds of Arsenal (0-0) and Wolverhampton Wanderers (2-2). Their six away defeats were inflicted by Manchester City (4-1), Newcastle (3-1), Everton (2-1), Ipswich (1-0), West Ham (3-0) and Burnley (4-2).

LEAD LOST

Stoke City 1, Spurs 1

It's always disappointing to lose an early lead, especially away from home.

The prospects for Spurs looked rosy when Alan Gilzean headed an accurate ball from Roger Morgan into Stoke's net in the eighth minute last Saturday.

Jimmy Greaves later struck the post, and no impartial observer could question Spurs' superiority in the first half. Spurs played plenty of smooth, attractive football, and Stoke could not have complained if our lead had been greater at half-time.

We have to acknowledge that Stoke were a more determined outfit in the second half. David Herd managed to coax the ball over the line for an equaliser a few minutes after half-time, and this goal had a tonic effect on the Stoke team.

Pat Jennings made a number of fine saves, but Spurs were robbed of a late winner when Harry Dowd, Stoke's goalkeeper, dashed out to thwart Roger Morgan after Greaves had created the opening.

Jimmy Pearce replaced Martin Chivers in the 72nd minute.

MAN IN CHARGE

Referee for today is Mr. Bill Castle of Dudley in Worcestershire.

Mr. Castle is now in his third season on the List of Football League referees after six seasons as a League linesman.

He started refereeing in the Wolverhampton district in 1950, and graduated to the top via the Staffordshire County and Central Leagues.

Referee Castle, who is married with a son and daughter, is employed as a representative to a brick manufacturing company in Dudley.

His last engagement on this ground was our League match with Queen's Park Rangers last January.

In March he was a linesman at the League Cup Final between Swindon and Arsenal.

WELCOME TO WEDNESDAY . . .

WHEN Sheffield Wednesday defeated us here last season, their first goal was scored by Jim McCalliog. He has since been transferred to Wolverhampton Wanderers, and another member of that team, centre-half Vic Mobley, is now with Queen's Park Rangers.

A noted newcomer is **Tony Coleman**, the winger who was signed from Manchester City last month. Coleman, who was a member of City's F.A. Cup-winning team last season, played for the Manchester club here last season.

Our ground has special memories for **Alan Warboys**, Wednesday's young striker. He made his League debut for Wednesday against us here last season.

Warboys comes from the Doncaster area, and turned professional with the Doncaster club. In May, 1968 he was transferred to Wednesday.

LONDON 'KEEPER

Peter Springett, Wednesday's goalkeeper, is well-known to London football followers. He was born in Fulham, and started his career with Queen's Park Rangers.

With Wednesday Peter has followed in the footsteps of his brother, Ron, the former English international, who started his own career with Rangers, and is now back with the West London club. Rangers and Wednesday swapped the Springett brothers in the summer of 1967.

Full-back **Wilf Smith** is one of Wednesday's best-known players. He was born in Germany when his father was serving there in the Army, but was brought up in Sheffield, and has been a Wednesday player since he was 15.

Wednesday's defence may also include **Ian Branfoot**, who made six League appearances last season. Branfoot, who played for Durham Boys, joined Wednesday from Gateshead in 1965.

Gerry Young is a full English international. He played in the England team that beat Wales 2-1 at Wembley in November, 1964. Mike England, then a Blackburn player, was in the Welsh team that evening.

AGAINST SPURS

Tommy Craig, the half-back who joined Wednesday from Aberdeen last May, has something in common with his clubmate, Warboys. He made his Wednesday debut against Spurs.

It was in the final match of last season at Hillsborough, when the result was a goalless draw. An Aberdonian by birth, he was snapped up by his local club from Scottish minor football.

Wednesday's defence is also expected to include **Sam Ellis**, who has been a professional with the Sheffield club since 1964. He was born at Ashton-under-Lyne. Last week he was in the England Under-23 team that beat Russia.

Winger **David Ford**, who made a good recovery from injuries sustained in a car crash two seasons ago, is a local Sheffield product. He made his senior debut for Wednesday against Werder Bremen at Bremen in August, 1964.

Peter Eustace, perhaps best described as a midfield player, is another of Wednesday's own local discoveries. He comes from Stocksbridge, and after two seasons on apprentice forms, signed as a full professional in June, 1962.

NEWCOMER

If **Michael Prendergast** is in Wednesday's forward line today, he will be a newcomer to this ground. He comes from Denaby, graduated through Wednesday's apprentice ranks and made his First Division debut last season.

Graham Pugh is a more familiar name to southern football followers. Pugh wore the No. 7 shirt in Wednesday's Cup Final game against Everton in 1966.

He was born in the Chester district, and is yet another of the Wednesday players who have emerged from the apprentice ranks at Hillsborough.

Defender **Ken Burton** is a Sheffield man, who has also developed through Wednesday's apprentice ranks. He made his League debut last season.

Colin Prophett is a Crewe-born midfielder player who is also a product of Wednesday's nursery system.

PASSING OF MR. FREDERICK WALE

It is with extreme regret that we record the passing on Wednesday, of Mr. Frederick Wale.

Mr. Wale, who was in his 83rd year, was elected to the Board of Directors in 1943. He became Vice-Chairman in 1958 and following the retirement of Mr. Fred. J. Bearman was elected Chairman in 1961, a position which he held with great distinction until last month.

During his period of Chairmanship the Club enjoyed considerable success, including the winning of the European Cup-Winners' Cup in 1963, when we became the first British club to win a major European title, an achievement in which Mr. Wale took immense pride.

He was always concerned with ground developments and improved facilities for spectators and much has been carried out in this direction in the 1960s as the result of his planning and guidance. His personal involvement in the Club's activities continued until the end and he will long be remembered for his kindly and understanding personality, not only here, but also in football circles throughout the country. He had served as a Council Member on Division V of the London Football Association since 1958 and was until recently, Chairman of the L.F.A. Challenge Cup Committee.

All followers of the Club will join with us in extending our sincere sympathy to Mr. Wale's family and particularly to his son, Mr. Sidney A. Wale, who recently succeeded his father as Club Chairman.

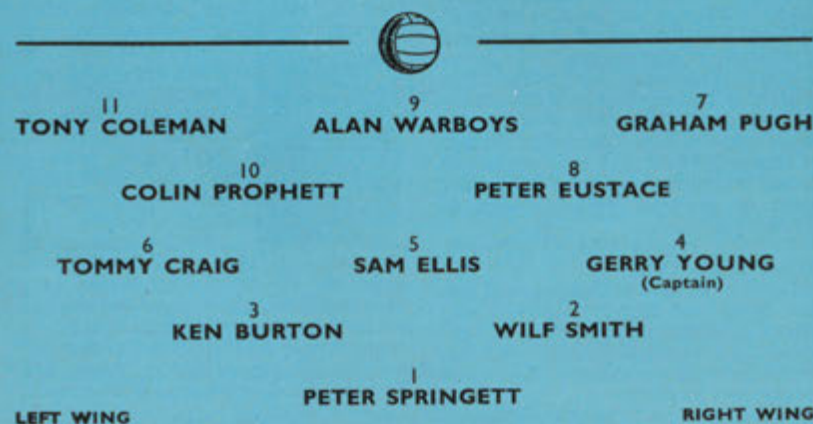
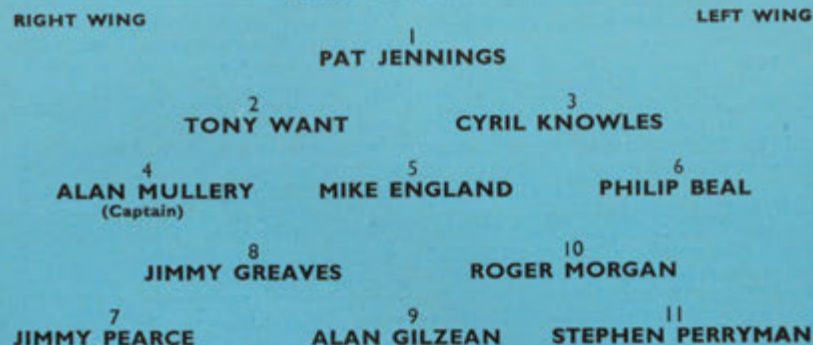

QUICK RETURN . . .

EVERYONE is familiar with the expression "the point of no return". For Sheffield Wednesday there is more significance in "the point of quick return".

Three times since the war Wednesday have suffered relegation to the Second Division. And three times they have bounced back a year later as champions of that division.

Wednesday's first crash of the three was at the end of season 1950-51. Chelsea, Wednesday and Everton all finished at the bottom with 32 points each, but Chelsea retained First Division status on goal average.

CENTURY OF GOALS

A year later Wednesday headed Division 2 after scoring a century of goals, and were promoted in company with Cardiff City. The next drop was in 1955. That season Wednesday conceded a hundred goals, and finished bottom.

Back they came as champions of Division 2 a year later, and in the years 1958 and 1959 the process of descent and rapid recovery was repeated.

When Wednesday were relegated in 1951, they had enjoyed only one season in Division 1. They had accompanied Spurs into the First Division at the end of season 1949-50, and their promotion hinged on the final match of the season, when we provided the opposition at Hillsborough.

HIGH TENSION

Tension ran high at Hillsborough that day. Spurs were already champions, and before the match we held a lead of eight points over Sheffield United, who had completed their programme and stood second with 52 points.

Wednesday had 51 points, and Southampton, at home to West Ham and still in with a chance, stood fourth with 50 points.

The goal average complications were too considerable to warrant a full explanation on this page all these years later. There were many ifs and buts that day, but all that mattered to Wednesday was that only a win or a goalless draw would ensure their promotion.

A 'crowd of 50,853 watched a thrilling

match played in an atmosphere of feverish excitement. Ted Ditchburn, Spurs' goalkeeper, stopped every Wednesday effort to score, but as all our own efforts proved abortive at the other end, the score ended goalless, and the Hillsborough club won promotion on goal average over Sheffield United and Southampton.

There were scenes of wild enthusiasm at the end of the match, and Hugh Swift, Wednesday's captain, made a speech from the stand.

UPGRADING

Ray Clarke, our Youth team centre-forward, has been upgraded from apprentice to full professional.



Ray was born at Hackney, and attended the Central Foundation School at Finsbury. He played for London, Middlesex and Islington Schools, and was an England trialist.

He signed apprentice forms in May of last year, and appeared in our Combination and Metropolitan League teams last season. He finished the season with 25 goals in competitive matches for the Youth team, and his six against Luton Youth last Saturday brought his total to 16 already this season.

FROM DOWN-UNDER



Brian Turner, the forward who arrived from Australia for trials at the beginning of the season, has been given an engagement for the rest of the campaign.

Brian was born at Waratah, a suburb of

Newcastle, New South Wales, and played for Northern New South Wales boys. As a member of a local club named New Lambton, he was coached by Tom Dawson, the former Charlton forward, who recommended him to us.

Brian is playing regularly for our Youth team, and has even had a taste of Combination football as substitute at Cardiff. This is the first time he has ever been away from his homeland, and he tells us he has never seen snow.

We wish both players a happy and successful career in football.

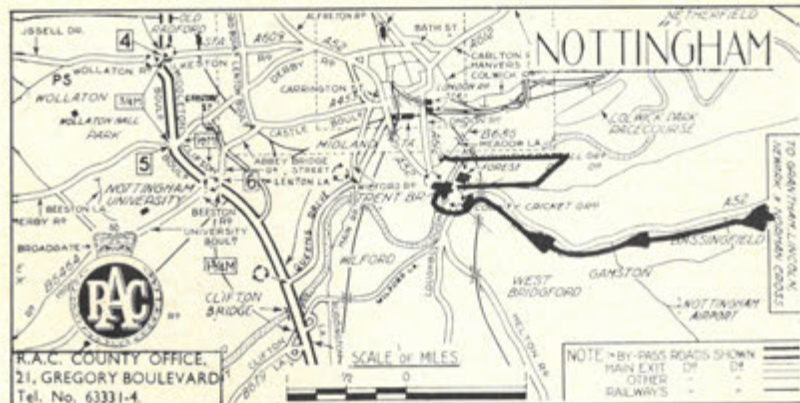


Jimmy Greaves receives his "Player of the Year" award, organised by Spurs Supporters Club, from Bobby Moore, the West Ham and England captain.

GOING TO NOTTINGHAM?

For the benefit of supporters planning to watch our away match with Nottingham Forest next Saturday, we have reproduced the above map, together with the following directions, compiled by the R.A.C., for those travelling by road.

Follow the B.650 road from Potters Bar to the junction with the A.6 . . . Turn right on to the A.6 and continue for four miles, then take the A.405 to the M.10 . . . Proceed north by the M.10 and then M.1 (Roadworks—Intersection 11 and 13) to the Intersection No. 24 . . . Follow the signs "Nottingham A.648" and at the roundabout eight miles on, take the first exit (B.679) . . . At 1½ miles further turn left on to the A.60 to Nottingham. The total distance from the Tottenham area is about 133 miles.

Enter Nottingham by the A.60 and continue to the second roundabout. Take the second exit—Radcliffe Road—then second left—Colwick Road—and the ground is at the end.

Side street parking is controlled by the police, so watch for the signs, including diversions. There is also parking space at the cricket ground and Victoria Embankment.

A Spurs team of Combination strength beat Oxford University in a friendly match at Oxford on Tuesday.

Our first goal was a header by Ray Bunkell from a cross by Peter Collins in the first half, and the second was netted shortly after the restart by John Cutbush
