FIRST HOME CUP-TIE

FOR this evening we put aside the cares of League football to concentrate all our application and effort into our first home cup-tie of the season.

We could scarcely be staging a more attractive match. After defeating Watford and Crewe Alexandra away from home in the earlier rounds, we now face West Ham United in the fourth round of the Football League Cup, and extend a cordial welcome to our friends and rivals from Upton Park.

Although held to a draw at home by Coventry City on Saturday, that point enabled the Hammers to take over at the top of the First Division on goal average. As F.A. Cup-holders, and a club now through to the quarter-finals of the European Cup-winners' Cup, West Ham have every reason to feel confident.

We have our own reasons, however, for approaching tonight's big test in optimistic mood.

On Saturday we visited Queen's Park Rangers and acquitted ourselves well by holding them to a draw on a ground where no visiting team had won this season at the time this programme went to press.

The absence of goals was the only defect in a first-class match, and for much of the first half, the pattern of play on the field contradicted the respective positions of the two clubs on the First Division chart.

It's true a shot by Don Givens struck our crossbar just before half-time, but there were times when Phil Parkes, Rangers' goalkeeper, had to be at his best to keep Spurs out. Twice in the early minutes of the second half, Parkes made fine saves from Martin Chivers, who was forced off the field by injury as early as the 57th minute.

It was tough luck on Chivers, who had always been a threat to Rangers, although John Duncan, his substitute, nearly won the match for Spurs with a header from a free-kick by Ralph Coates, the ball passing just wide of the post.

TONIGHT'S REFEREE



MR. MALCOLM SINCLAIR of Guildford has been on the Football League List of Referees since 1966.

He started refereeing in the Isle of Wight when he was only 17, later graduating through the Surrey Senior League and Football Combination.

Mr. Sinclair refereed the England v. Iceland amateur international in 1970, and has been on the line in a European Cup match in Russia in 1973 and in F.A. Cup semi-finals in both 1968 and 1970.

A bricklayer by trade, he is married with two children, and enjoys watching cricket in the summer. He is chairman of Guildford Referees' Society.

WEST HAM UNITED visit us this evening as holders of the F.A. Cup and as one of the top flight of First Division clubs. There seems a strong likelihood that the Hammers will finish this season in a higher position in the League than in 1974-75, when they occupied 13th place on the final chart. They did, in fact, recover well from a bad start last season. In the closing days of September they were in joint bottom position with Luton Town, and at that time we were four places above them. Such was the West Ham recovery, however, that before October was out they had reached the top half of the table. In beating Fulham at Wembley, West

Ham won the F.A. Cup for the second time in their history. They are, however, one of the minority of clubs in the First Division never to have carried off the League championship. The highest final position in the First Division of West Ham was sixth. They finished in that position in 1927, 1959 and 1973. The Hammers therefore have every chance of reaching their highest-ever final League position this season. The Hammers have reached the final of the Football League Cup, the competition that concerns us most this evening, in one year only. That was in 1966, the last year in which the final was played in two legs. They were beaten on a 5-3 aggregate by West Bromwich Albion.

WEST HAM'S PLAYERS

MERVYN DAY, West Ham's goalkeeper, has something in common with our own Barry Daines. Both played for the Chelmsford Boys team, and both have been married at Great Baddow this year! Day, who was born in Chelmsford, has played for the England Under-23s.

KEITH COLEMAN, TOMMY TAYLOR, JOHN McDOWELL and **KEVIN LOCK** are back-four players. Coleman was born at Newcastle-upon-Tyne, and entered professional football with Sunderland. He was transferred to West Ham in September 1973 after a period on loan to the Upton Park Club.

Taylor was born at Hornchurch and made his name with Orient. West Ham signed him from the Leyton club in October 1970 and he made his debut for them against Spurs at Upton Park in that month.

McDowell was born at East Ham and played for Newham and Essex schools teams. A former Youth international, he has made several appearances in the England Under-23 team.

Lock is also an England Under-23 player. He was born at Plaistow. He played for the Newham and Essex Boys teams, and developed through the apprentice ranks at Upton Park.

The midfield positions may be filled by **TREVOR BROOKING, PAT HOLLAND** and **GRAHAM PADDON**.

Brooking, a full English international,

was born at Barking and was a school-boy international. He has also played for the Under-23s and the Football League.

Holland is another of West Ham's local products. He was born at Poplar, and played for East London Boys. He made his League debut for West Ham against Arsenal on the day he was upgraded from apprentice to full professional.

Paddon is a northerner from Manchester. He joined the apprentice ranks of Coventry City, graduated to League rank with the Midlands and moved to Norwich City in 1969. West Ham signed him from Norwich in 1973.

BILLY BONDS is also a midfield player. Born at Woolwich, he made a big name with Charlton Athletic, and moved to West Ham in May, 1967. He is a former England Under-23 player.

BOBBY GOULD, ALAN TAYLOR and **KEITH ROBSON** are all strikers. Gould, born in Coventry, is a much-travelled player. He has also played for Coventry City, Arsenal, Wolverhampton Wanderers, West Bromwich Albion and Bristol City. He left the Bristol club for West Ham in 1973.

Taylor, scorer of West Ham's two goals against Fulham in last season's F.A. Cup final, was signed from Rochdale last November. He was born at Lancaster.

Robson was born at Hetton-le-Hole in County Durham, which is also the birthplace of Ralph Coates. Robson joined West Ham from Newcastle United in September 1974.

CUP-TIE MEMORIES . . .

THE clash tonight of Spurs and West Ham will stir many memories of past cup-ties between the two clubs. We meet for the second time in the Football League Cup, and it is a point of interest that West Ham were our first-ever opponents in this particular competition.

Our first match in the League Cup was away to the Hammers in September, 1966, and it was not an occasion on which we can reflect with any pleasure.

A crowd of 34,000 saw **GEOFF HURST** score the only goal of the game for West Ham in the eighth minute, and as Spurs were reduced to 10 men after Alan Gilzean had been sent off in the second half, it was not surprising that we trooped off at the end as losers.

In past years there have been plenty of clashes between Spurs and West Ham in the F.A. Cup. We have been paired with them in that competition on no fewer than seven occasions, and replays were necessary both in 1956 and 1939 before the ties were settled.

Our last F.A. Cup clash with the Hammers was in the third round on this ground in 1959. There were no goals at half-time, but **CLIFF JONES** gave Spurs the lead in the second half, and **BOBBY SMITH**, our captain that day, added to the score to give us a comfortable 2-0 win before a crowd of 56,252.

The meeting in the sixth round in 1956 was much more eventful. Spurs were drawn at home, and there were nearly 70,000 people here.

It was a game brimming with thrills and excitement. **JOHN DICK** shook us with two early goals, and after **TOMMY HARMER** had improved our outlook from the penalty spot, the Scot completed his hat-trick for the visitors.

GREAT RELIEF

A second Spurs goal by **GEORGE ROBB** left us trailing by only 3-2 at half-time, and **LEN DUQUEMIN** brought us great relief and a replay by scoring the only goal of the second half. The replay took place at Upton Park on the following Thursday afternoon, and play again reached a high standard. In that match Spurs were first to score, Harmer heading us into the lead just before half-time.

A capacity crowd saw West Ham equalise in the second half, centre-forward **BILLY DARE** finding the net with a header. West Ham then applied a lot of pressure, but Spurs regained their grip, and Duquemin drove in the winner with a fine shot. That goal put Spurs in the semi-final, but our Wembley hopes were dashed by Manchester City, who defeated us 1-0 at Villa Park.

The fourth-round tie in 1939 took even longer to settle. It started at Upton Park and the first match was drawn 3-3.

The gate figure at West Ham was 42,716. **JOHNNY MORRISON** opened the score for Spurs and **FRED SARGENT** added a second goal before **ARCHIE MACAULAY** converted a penalty for West Ham.

Spurs led 2-1 at half-time, and after the change-over, **ANDY DUNCAN** scored a third. In an exciting home rally, **STAN FOXALL** scored twice to earn the Hammers a replay.

A heavy fall of snow caused a postponement of the replay on the following Wednesday, but the game was played five days later. It was another tense cup-tie and at the end of extra time the score stood at 1-1. Sargent scored for Spurs and Foxall for West Ham. Percy Hooper, our goalkeeper, saved a penalty taken by Macaulay.

The second replay was on Arsenal's ground three days later. Morrison gave Spurs the lead with an oblique shot, but after another period of extra time, the Hammers were winners by 2-1. Their goals were scored by Foxall and Macaulay.

Dick Walker, who has been a full-time member of our scouting staff for many years, played centre-half for West Ham in each of those three matches in 1939.

- Spurs were knocked out of the League Cup last season by Middlesbrough, who won 4—0 on this ground in the second round.

Cup; by 1—0 against Blackburn Rovers in the Football League War Cup in 1940; and by 2—0 against Munich in the European Cup-Winners' Cup in 1965. Their only defeat was in losing 2—0 to Bolton Wanderers in Wembley's first-ever F.A. Cup final in 1923.
- Chester, then in the Fourth Division, reached the semi-finals of the League Cup last season.
- Ray Graydon scored the goal by which Aston Villa defeated Norwich City in last season's League Cup final.
