

CRICKET ORIGINS

It is appropriate that two such long-established footballing names as Orient and Tottenham Hotspur should be in opposition today - the last Saturday of the official cricket season - as both had their origins in the summer game back in the 1880s

The Hotspur Football Club, as the North London cricketers who combined with pupils from a local school, called their newly formed team, changed to their present title in 1886 and the club won their first senior honour in 1900 - the Southern League title. The following year the F.A. Cup was taken to White Hart Lane for the first time when Spurs beat Sheffield United 3-1 in a replayed Final at Burden Park, Bolton, after drawing at Crystal Palace.

LEAGUE STATUS

The club was elected to the Football League in 1908 and reached the First Division after one sea-

son in the Second, They repeated this instant success, when after being relegated in 1915, Division One status was regained at the first attempt - after the war in 1920.

UPS AND DOWNS

Spurs, like most clubs, have experienced ups and downs and spent two further spells in the Second Division before re-establishing themselves in the top flight by winning the League Championship for the first time in 1951. The League and Cup "double" followed ten years later and the club has now won every major English and European honour with the exception of the European Cup.

GREAT TEAMS

During their illustrious history Spurs have provided the game with three great teams. Coincidently these outstanding Tottenham sides were all blessed to be excellent captains! Arthur Grimsdeil, a torce-fully restored!

ful and magnificent wing-half led the team of the early twenties. Ron Burgess skippered the Spurs of the early fifties and Danny Blanchflower, the "Double" winning side of 1961.

At the moment everybody is impressed with the tremendous ability shown by Glenn Hoddle in midfield. Maybe this exciting young prospect could inspire hopes for another great Tottenham team to emulate those of the glorious past!

The O's ~ Spurs Connection



Links between Orient and the Tottenham Second Division Championship team of 1950 have been mentioned earlier in this programme but supporters of both teams will no doubt remember other personalities who have served both clubs.

Although there have been only eight previous meetings between the clubs at League level, the geographical situation of both grounds — four miles apart today and slightly less in earlier times — has inevitably led to a friendly rivalry amongst supporters and to many other connections since their formation in the 1880s.

"O's" have been privileged to benefit from the experience of two of Spurs most famous names — in an administrative capacity. Jimmy Seed, a member of the great White Hart Lane side of the 1920s, later managed Clapton Orient, before he took Charlton from the Third to First Division in the 30s.

Arthur Rowe, an International in his playing days with Spurs, and later one of the most famous managers in football has served Orient in advisory capacity for several years. His "push and run" style took Spurs to the Second and First Division Championships in the early fifties.

In addition, Pat Welton, a popular figure in the Orient goal during the 50s when he made over 250 League appearances — is Spurs Assistant Manager. David Dunmore, that forceful centre-forward in

"O's" first Division side of 1962-3, came to us from West Ham, after previously playing for Spurs.
