## COMMENT

THE visit of Wolverhampton Wanderers, who are always welcome visitors to this ground, serves as a reminder of our dismissal from the Football League Cup at their hands last month.

We were beaten by the only goal of the match at Molineux, and therefore have something to avenge in addition to the normal incentive of improving our League position.

Today's is, in fact, our fifth meeting with Wolves inside the last 12 months. We lost at Molineux in the League last December, and drew the return game here 1—1 in February. Sandwiched between those two League matches was the Fourth Round F.A. Cup-tie which Spurs won 2—1.

Despite their 3—2 home defeat by Everton last Saturday, Wolves have shown a lot of improvement this season. Their defeat by Everton was their first at home this season, although Manchester United, Derby County, Nottingham Forest and Burnley have all drawn at Molineux.

As these notes were written before Wolves' home match with Sheffield Wednesday on Wednesday evening, no reference can be made to that fixture.

#### TWO AWAY WINS

Wolves' away form is, of course, of more interest to us today then their performances at home. Of the six matches they have played on opponents' grounds, Wolves have lost only at Coventry, and then by only a single goal.

They have won at Sheffield Wednesday and Southampton, both by 3—2, and have drawn at Chelsea (2—2), and Ipswich and Newcastle, both 1—1.

Their reward for knocking us out of the League Cup was an away tie to Brighton which they won 3—2, and now they tackle Queen's Park Rangers at Shepherd's Bush in the next round next week.

Prior to Wednesday night Wolves had scored 22 League goals. Hugh Curran topped the list with 7, followed by Derek Dougan 5; Jimmy McCalliog 3; Peter Knowles 2; Frank Munro, Derek Parkin, Mike Bailey and Les Wilson 1 each; and Tony Allen (Stoke) own goal. The League Cup goals were scored by Curran 2, McCalliog and David Woodfield.

Of the 26 League and Cup matches played between Spurs and Wolves on this ground since 1908, only 3 have been drawn. Of the remaining 23, Spurs have won 21 and Wolves have been winners only twice.

#### **WOLVES MANAGER**

Mr. Bill McGarry, Wolves' manager, completes his first year as manager of Wolves next month.

Bill comes from Stoke-on-Trent, and started his playing career as a wing-half with Port Vale. He was transferred from the Vale club to Huddersfield Town in March, 1951, and the fee was used to help the club to pay for the new ground they had moved to at Burslem the previous year.

McGarry reached English international rank with Huddersfield, and was a member of the World Cup team in 1954. He played right-half for Huddersfield here in that memorable First Division match in April, 1952, when considerable controversy centred on the late winning goal scored by Len Duquemin after Eddie Baily's left-wing corner had rebounded off the referee.

Bill left Huddersfield to take over as player-manager of Bournemouth in March, 1961. Later he managed Watford and Ipswich Town.

He was Watford's manager at the time we signed Pat Jennings from the Hertfordshire club in June, 1964.

Wolves last victory on this ground was by 2—1 in September, 1962.

## MAN IN CHARGE

Referee for today is Mr. Vernon Batty of Helsby in Cheshire.

Mr. Batty qualified as a referee in 1946, and was appointed to the Cheshire County League in 1955. A year later he was on the Football League List of Linesmen.

From 1962 he has been a League referee, and in 1966 he stood by in reserve for all World Cup matches on Everton's ground.

Mr. Batty was a goalkeeper in his student days at Sheffield University. He graduated as a B.A. in 1951, and also holds a Diploma in Education, awarded in 1952.

He is geography master at Helsby County Grammar School for Boys, and speaks both French and German.

## TODAY'S VISITORS . . .

SINCE our visit to Molineux in the League Cup early last month, Wolves have strengthened their ranks by signing Mike O'Grady the England winger, from Leeds United.

O'Grady, who made his debut for Wolves at Newcastle a fortnight ago, played against us for Leeds on this ground last season. He was born in Leeds, but started his career with Huddersfield Town. In October, 1965 he was transferred to Leeds, and last season he missed only four League matches for the Yorkshire club.

Another Wolves forward who has never previously worn their colours on this ground is Jimmy McCalliog. We have however, already suffered at McCalliog's hands this season. He scored the goal that knocked us out of the League Cup

at Molineux.

## FROM WEDNESDAY

McCalliog joined Wolves from Sheffield Wednesday early in August. He played for Wednesday here early last season, and also scored against us on

that occasion.

Jim is, of course, a Scottish international who is well known here in London. He made his name with Chelsea before moving to Wednesday in October, 1965. Strange that both McCalliog and O'Grady should have figured in transfers that month.

John Holsgrove, who wore the No. 6 shirt for Wolves in the League match here last season, is no stranger to London. He was, in fact, an amateur with Spurs in season 1962-63, and was also on Arsenal's books for a time.

#### PALACE PLAYER

Holsgrove, at one time a wages clerk in Southwark Town Hall, turned professional with Crystal Palace, and was transferred to Wolves in May, 1965.

Phil Parkes, Wolves' goalkeeper, might have become a West Bromwich Albion player. He was born at West Bromwich, supported Albion and attended evening training for schoolboys at the Hawthorns.

After leaving Spon Lane School in West Bromwich, however, he joined the

junior ranks of Wolves, and graduated to League rank through their nursery

Les Wilson, who wore the No. 10 shirt for Wolves in the F.A. Cup match here last season, is a Manchester man who spent a number of years in Canada.

He returned to England, and joined Wolves on trial at the beginning of season 1963-64. Wilson has been a professional with Wolves since September, 1964.

#### EVER-PRESENT

Full-back Derek Parkin was an everpresent in Wolves' League team last season. He comes from Tyneside, but ioined Huddersfield as a young amateur, and made his name with the Yorkshire club.

Wolves stepped in to sign Parkin from Huddersfield in February, 1968. Last week he played for the England Under-23

team against Wales.

Mike Bailey, Wolves' captain, is a former English international wing-half. He was born at Wisbech, and joined Charlton Athletic at a young age. It was in March, 1966 that he was transferred from Charlton to Wolves.

Frank Munro, who may fill a midfield role today, is a Scot from Arbroath. He was on Chelsea's books as a youngster, but returned to Scotland to play for Dundee United and later Aberdeen. Wolves signed him from Aberdeen in January, 1968.

#### SUMMER SIGNING

Bernard Shaw is the former Sheffield United full-back. He was born in Sheffield and was signed by Wolves from the Yorkshire club during the season.

We have good reason to remember the skill of left-winger David Wagstaffe. He was in gréat form against us at Molineux last month, and it was from his cross that McCalliog scored.

Wagstaffe was born in Manchester, and made the League grade with Manchester City. He was transferred to Wolves in December, 1964.

Paul Walker is one of Wolves' upand-coming forwards. He made one appearance in the First Division last

## GOALS TO REMEMBER . . .

WOLVES have played Spurs 25 times on this ground in League football and once

in the F.A. Cup.

Not once in the course of all those matches have Spurs finished without scoring a goal. It is not, perhaps, an achievement over which there is any need to crow. But it is not without significance in the light of our record against other First Division clubs.

Of the other present-day members of the First Division, only Sheffield Wedneday and Ipswich Town have conceded at least one goal in every match they have played here over the years.

The Ipswich record amounts to little, of course. They have visited us in League and Cup on six occasions only. And Crystal Palace have yet to play here.

#### FRESH IN MEMORY

Goals are the very essence, indeed the object of football. Which is enough of a cue to reflect on the execution and value of some of those home goals against our opponents of today.



Last season stays fresh in the memory. It was in late February that Wolves were here in the League, and the early goal that gave us a point was scored in brilliant fashion by Roger Morgan, who was making his home debut.

A few weeks earlier Wolves were here in the fourth round of the F.A. Cup. It was a match Neil Johnson will always remember. He was recalled to the team to replace unfit Jimmy Pearce, and he scored an equaliser worthy of Wembley.

Neil started the move in midfield, and by the time four other Spurs players had combined to plant the ball in the goalmouth, he was there to hammer it in.

#### "DOUBLE YEAR"

Going much further back we recall Wolves' visit in February, 1961, the season we won the "double". We were top and Wolves were second, although there were no less than 12 points between us. Happy memories!

It was a Wednesday night match, and Wolves held us to a 1-1 draw.

The goal to remember from that night was crashed home with typical ferocity by Bobby Smith, who tore through like a whirlwind to collide with Bill Slater, Wolves' centre-half, in the act,

Smith and Slater were also very much involved when Spurs' winning goal was scored in the September meeting of 1958. A minute after half-time, with the score 1—1, Smith, who looked to be in a blatantly offside position, received the ball off Slater's stomach.

The deflection placed Bobby onside, and he took his chance well. Referee Harry Webb correctly awarded a goal, and it won Spurs the match.

#### BLUE-PRINT MOVE

Remember Boxing Day, 1957? Before the Christmas programme Wolves were top of the League with eight points more than West Bromwich, the next club.

Spurs were in mid-table, but Wolves, who came here with a run of 18 games without defeat, were beaten by the only goal of the game. Again, it was Smith who scored it, and a blue-print move by Terry Medwin and Danny Blanchflower created the opening.

There was another occasion, much further back in time, when Wolves visited us as divisional leaders. It was in January, 1932, when both clubs were in the Second Division.

Wolves were keen to strengthen their grip at the top, but a rousing game ended at 3—3 after the visitors had been in the lead at 2—1 and 3—2. Spurs' three goals were scored in spectacular style by George Hunt, our centre-forward, who was then running into the form that gained him international recognition by England the following season.

Wolves were edged into second place by that draw, but all came right in the end. They finished champions of Division 2.

We hope the goalscoring sequence against Wolves will be continued this afternoon. We have failed to score in our last two home games, and would naturally rejoice in a display of good marksmanship against our old rivals from Staffordshire.

#### POINT SAVED

Southampton 2, Spurs 2

After our defeats by Derby County and Sunderland there was a measure of satisfaction from our away draw with Southampton last Saturday.

At the same time this was a match that Spurs may well have won. We played some good football, particularly in the first half, but slackened off for a time in the second half

This period of lapse cost us two goals, and we then had to fight hard to save a point. The equaliser came in the 69th minute, when Jimmy Greaves showed excellent control and balance before hitting a left-footed shot into the net from Alan Gilzean's pass.

Our first goal, in the 24th minute, was flicked in by Gilzean from Dennis Bond's

left-wing corner.

It was a lively game, and chances were missed by both sides. Shortly before half-time Bond came close to scoring his first League goal for Spurs, but shot wide after Steve Perryman had pulled the ball back to him.

#### HANDICAP

Spurs' cause wa not helped by an injury sustained by Alan Mullery. Our



skipper had a knock on the calf early in the match, and carried on under a handicap. Alan stuck it out until the 74th minute, when Jimmy Pearce came on as substitute for him.

Spurs have not won at Anfield since 1912, and in view of Liverpool's present position in the League, and their 2—0 win here in August, we had no illusions about the severity of our task on Merseyside.

In all the circumstances a draw was a highly satisfying performance, and it was an improvement on last season, when we lost by the only goal of the match.

#### SPECTACULAR SAVE
