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A Hectic and Varied List

A GLANCE at the fixture page in this programme will show what a hectic and varied list of engagements our players have been called upon to fulfil at what can still be described as an early stage of the season.

Including the two pre-season friendlies with Hearts and Glasgow Rangers, our First Team have already played 21 matches. That's the equivalent of half a season's League competition! And including today's game with Nottingham Forest, we have still to play three matches before October is out.

As these programme notes had to be completed before Wednesday night's U.E.F.A. Cup match against Nantes, it has not been possible to make any reference to the events of that game.

We can, however, reflect with some satisfaction on our record during this crowded early-season spell. We occupy a creditable position in the League, have reached the last 16 in the League Cup and have won the Anglo-Italian League Cup-Winners' Cup. And whatever the result at Nantes on Wednesday, we have the second leg still to come on this ground on Tuesday week.

Plenty is happening to keep the players at full stretch, and to maintain public interest. We hope to keep it that way, and our immediate task is to add to our tally of points at the expense of our good friends from Nottingham today.

WOLVES BEATEN

We would not pretend that our display against Wolverhampton Wanderers here last Saturday was Spurs at their best, but a 4-1 win was highly satisfying, and we might even have won more convincingly.

Alan Gilzean quickly atoned for an earlier lapse by giving us the lead following a menacing cross by Alan Mullery, and Wolves, showing an uncharacteristic liking for defensive methods, did well to prevent us from adding to our score before half-time.

Martin Chivers stole the scene in the second half with two fine goals to crown a memorable personal week in which he had scored for England in Switzerland.

Between those two spectacular goals scored by Chivers, Wolves gave us more than a little trouble. Pat Jennings made a fine save from Jim

McCalliog only to be beaten a few minutes later by a short-range shot from Mike Bailey.

The second Chivers goal placed us in a strong position, and Jimmy Neighbour added colour to the afternoon by scoring his first-ever League goal with a shot in off the post.

Neighbour had a good match in his first full League outing this season, and before scoring his goal hit an even better shot just wide of Wolves' goal.

LAST SEASON

Last season's visit of Nottingham Forest in the League was on a Wednesday evening in March. The match was squeezed between our two F.A. Cup games with Liverpool, and it was not an occasion we can look back upon with any satisfaction.

The only goal of the match was scored for Forest by Peter Cormack in the 25th minute, when he jumped high to head in a cross by Ronnie Rees.

NOTTINGHAM FOREST

MOST of the players in the Nottingham Forest team today have appeared on this ground against us in the past, but Duncan McKenzie, their young forward, may be making his first appearance at White Hart Lane.

McKenzie, who was born at Grimsby, is a product of Forest's amateur ranks. He was spotted playing for the Notre Dame Boys Club in Grimsby, which also produced Neil Johnson, our former winger. McKenzie made his League debut two seasons ago, made a few more appearances in 1970-71, and now seems set to establish himself at the City ground.

Names much more familiar to southern crowds are Peter Hindley and John Winfield, the Forest full-backs.

Hindley, the club captain, has been a professional with the Nottingham club since June, 1961. He was born at Worksop, and is the son of a Forest forward of pre-war days.

Hindley is a former England Under-23 player. He made his senior debut for Forest against West Bromwich Albion in a fourth-round F.A. Cup-tie in 1963.

Winfield, a Derbyshire man from Draycott, joined Forest's ground staff straight from school in May, 1959. Originally an inside-forward, he switched to wing-half before settling at full-back.

FROM DERRY

Defender Liam O'Kane joined Forest from Derry City, the Irish League club, in December, 1968. O'Kane made his senior debut for Forest against Leeds in an away match in April, 1969, and had the bad luck to sustain a serious injury.

O'Kane has been capped by Northern Ireland, and is now a key player in the Forest set-up.

Bob Chapman, who is also likely to fill a defensive position, is a Walsall man. He left junior football in the Staffordshire town to join Forest in 1962. When Chapman made his debut against Stoke City in January, 1964, he was at that time the youngest-ever forward to play for Forest in post-war football.

He has since switched to the rear with remarkable success.

Doug Fraser usually fills a mid-field role. A Scottish international, he started his professional career with Aberdeen.

In 1963 Fraser was transferred from Aberdeen to West Bromwich, where he became club skipper. Forest signed him from West Bromwich last January.

ANOTHER SCOT

Neil Martin, Forest's centre-forward, is another Scot who has played for his country. Martin comes from Tranent, a mining village near Edinburgh, and played for Tranent Juniors before signing for Alloa.

He played for Queen of the South and Hibernian after leaving Alloa, and first sampled English football with Sunderland. Martin's next club was Coventry City, who transferred him to Forest last February.

MAN IN CHARGE

The referee today is Mr. Tom Reynolds from Swansea. Mr. Reynolds started refereeing in Bristol in season 1957-58. He progressed through junior leagues in Bristol and Cardiff, and then operated at the same level in Swansea. He graduated as a linesman in the Welsh League before establishing himself as a referee in the same competition.

Then came promotion to the Football Combination, and in 1965-66 his appointment to the Football League list of linesmen. In 1968-69 he became a fully-fledged Football League referee.

Referee Reynolds was appointed to the F.I.F.A. List of International Referees for this season, and is also on the U.E.F.A. List. During the last two years he has officiated in Fairs Cup and Nations Cup matches. A few weeks ago he refereed the European Cup match between Sliema Wanderers and Akranes of Iceland in Malta.

Mr. Reynolds follows the occupation of an estate developer.

Barry Lyons is usually listed as a forward, but he often fills a midfield role. He was born at Shirebrook, and made his name with Rotherham.

Lyons, who has made well over 200 appearances for Forest, joined the Nottingham club from Rotherham in November, 1966. He was a member of the team beaten by Spurs in the Semi-final of the F.A. Cup in 1967.

Winger **Ian Moore** is a full English international, who also played for the Under-23s. He was born at Ipswich, but moved to Scunthorpe at a young age, and played a few matches for the Scunthorpe United junior team.

Before signing for Forest he was a trialist with both Blackpool and Grimsby Town. He has been a professional at the City Ground since May, 1962.

EXCHANGE DEAL

Midfield man **Tommy Jackson** joined Forest from Everton in October, 1970 as part of the exchange deal that took Henry Newton in the opposite direction.

An Irish international, Jackson was born in Belfast, and played for Glentoran, the Irish League club, before joining Everton in February, 1968.

Winger **Ronnie Rees** is the Welsh international who was signed from West Bromwich in February, 1969. He started as a junior with Coventry, and later made his mark as a professional with the midland club.

Goalkeeper **Eric Hulme** made his senior debut for Forest in the League Cup at Chelsea earlier this month. He was signed from Spennymoor United.

Midfield man **Paul Richardson** is a local Nottingham discovery, who is a former England youth international.

"Gilzean is superb in the air, and extremely strong for someone of his build. He's one of those cunning lads who can always be relied upon to find good positions. Even when not scoring himself, he lays on chances for others with those deft flicks of his."

Who says this? None other than Gordon Banks, the England and Stoke City goalkeeper in a newspaper feature entitled "The Forward I Fear Most". We hope Gordon will have even more respect for our Scottish international after next Saturday's match at Stoke!

ABOUT FOREST . . .

● Nottingham Forest, founded in 1865, celebrated their centenary six years ago with a match against Valencia. In that season Forest finished fifth in the League.

● Two Spurs players who gained full England international honours played for Forest later in their careers. Eddie Bailey, our assistant-manager, became a star member of the Forest team, and in pre-war days the late Wally Alsford left us for the Nottingham club. Another pre-war Spurs player who later played for Forest was left-winger Colin Lyman.

● When Forest were relegated to the Third Division in 1949, over a third of the matches in which they were defeated were settled by an odd goal.

● Forest can make the remarkable claim of having played a Semi-final in the F.A. Cup on Scottish soil! They lost to Queen's Park in a replay in Edinburgh by 3-0 in the Semi-final in 1885.

● In August, 1968 a fire destroyed the main stand at Forest's ground, causing the abandonment of their match with Leeds United, which was in progress. Happily, there were no casualties. Forest played their home matches on the ground of neighbouring Notts County until the City Ground was reopened.

● Forest have won the F.A. Cup on two occasions—with a long gap in between. Their first win was by 3-1 over Derby County in 1898 at the old Crystal Palace ground, and it was not until 1959, when they defeated Luton Town 2-1, that they again carried off the trophy.

● Forest are the only club in the Football League run by a committee, and not a board of directors.

● Forest have worn red shirts throughout their long existence.

PRESTON AGAIN

Next Wednesday evening we are again engaged in the struggle to retain the Football League Cup.

After away ties with West Bromwich Albion and Torquay United, we now tackle Preston North End on this ground. We have not previously

played Second Division Preston in the League Cup, but a whole chapter could be written on our past clashes with them in the F.A. Cup.

Nine times in the past have we been paired with Preston, and as two ties were drawn, we have actually played them in 11 F.A. Cup matches.
