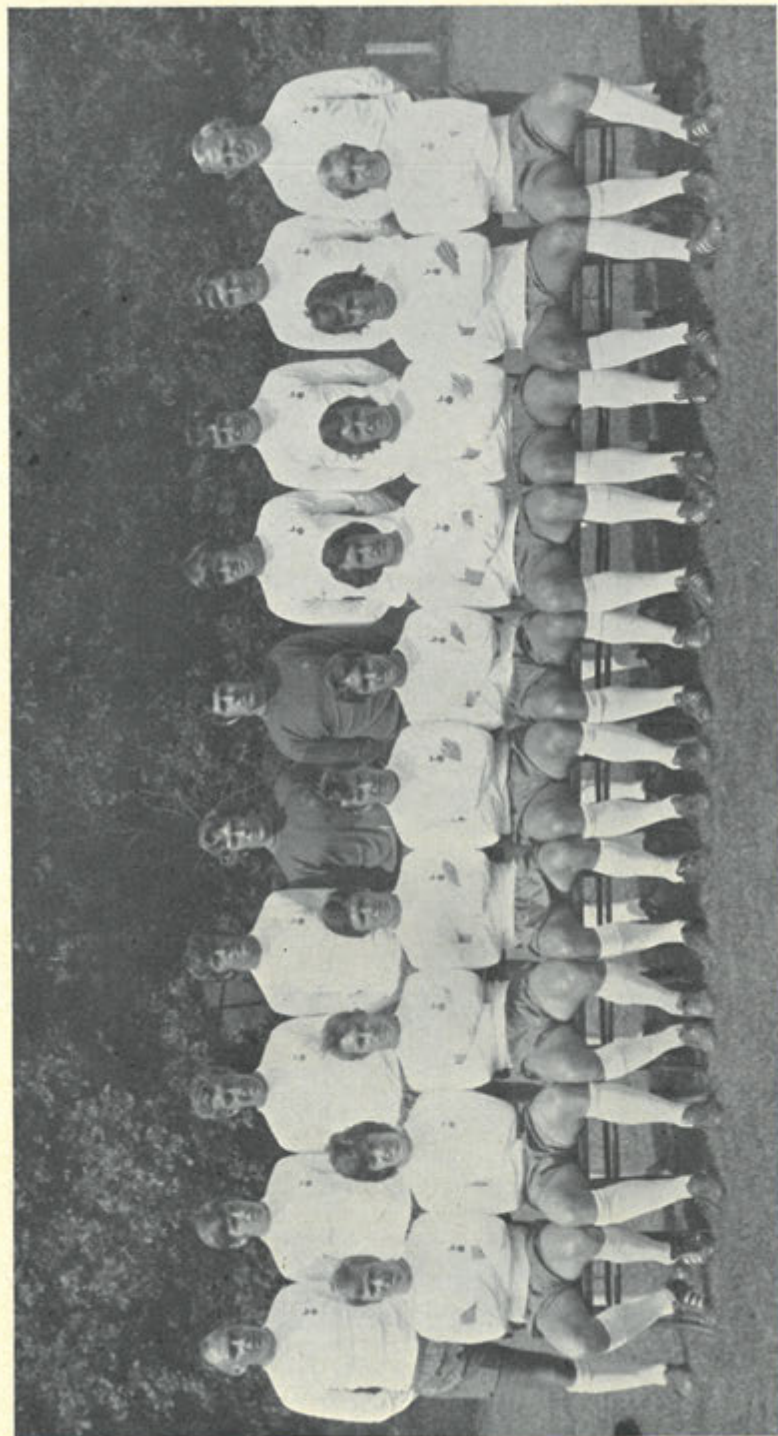

TOTTENHAM

SPURS SEEKING GLORY

ARE SPURS SET to regain some of their former glory this season? It's early days yet, but the pride of North London are certainly showing signs of being capable of winning something. They handed Manchester City their first defeat, 2-0, at White Hart Lane last Saturday to move into third place in the table on goal average.

Tottenham themselves have lost twice—2-0 to Leeds United, at home, and neighbours Arsenal, away, but they have won twice and drawn twice in other away matches.

Manager Mr. Bill Nicholson severed the last link with the palmy days of the early Sixties, when Spurs did the League and Cup double, retained the F.A. Cup and then won the European Cup-Winners' Cup and finished runners-up in Division 1 in successive seasons (1961-2-3), when he let Jimmy Greaves go in March of this year.

Greaves, one of the great post-war goal-scorers, and cash were exchanged for Martin Peters, who reportedly thus became Britain's first £200,000 player. He has settled in at No 10, and Tottenham are now beginning to click.

They have full international stars in Pat

Jennings, Joe Kinnear, Cyril Knowles, skipper Alan Mullery, Mike England, Alan Gilzean and Peters. Two others who are making a big difference to the team are little inside-forward Steve Perryman, rated an outstanding prospect, and big centre-forward Martin Chivers. Chivers, a £125,000 buy from Southampton, has fought back after breaking a leg, and already has six League goals to his credit this term.

Since that greatest of all Spurs sides started to break up, Tottenham have won only one trophy, the F.A. Cup in 1967, when they were led by the incomparable Dave Mackay. Now they're in business again . . . and out to show that last season's 5-0 September thrashing before a record Baseball Ground crowd was an isolated disaster.

Mullery on way to 500-up

Pat JENNINGS (Goalkeeper): Capped 27 times by Northern Ireland. He started with his hometown club, Newry, was spotted by Watford when he played for the Irish Youth team in a tournament at Bognor Regis, and was bought by Spurs for £30,000 in June, 1964. 6ft. 0in., 12st. 6lb.

Joe KINNEAR (Full-back): Born Dublin, lived in Watford since seven. Signed as amateur from St. Albans City in 1963, became pro. in February, 1965, with debut following year. Eight appearances for Eire, just passed 100 League outings for Spurs. 5ft. 8½in., 11st. 6lb.

Cyril KNOWLES (Full-back): Comes from Fitzwilliam, near Pontefract, and had extended trials with Manchester United and Wolves before Middlesbrough spotted his potential. Bought from Middlesbrough in May, 1964, and a regular virtually ever since. Six Under-23 appearances, four full caps. 6ft. 0in., 11st. 13lb.

Tony WANT (Full-back): Hackney-born, joined Spurs after leaving school in 1963 and a pro. since 1965. England Youth regular 1966-67, First Division debut against W.B.A. in March, 1968. 5ft. 8in., 11st. 1lb.

Alan MULLERY (Wing-half): Skipper Mullery, England's No. 4, cost £72,500 from Fulham in March, 1964, and he's repaid the fee twice over. This season should take him to nearly 500 League appearances with his two clubs, almost 300 of them for Spurs. 31 full caps. 5ft. 9in., 12st. 4lb.

Mike ENGLAND (Centre-half): Was captain of Tottenham and Wales at one time, but found the extra responsibility affecting his play. A £95,000 buy from Blackburn in August, 1966, big Mike is one of the best headers of the ball in the game. 6ft. 2in., 13st. 2lb.

Phil BEAL (Wing-half): One-club man, and Tottenham's longest-serving player, arrived at White Hart Lane as an amateur in 1960. England Youth player, with first-team debut in 1963. Never an automatic choice, but always dependable. 5ft. 10in., 11st. 9lb.

Ray EVANS (Wing-half): Started as apprentice pro. in 1965, became full-time man in 1967 and represented England at Youth level. Debut v. Arsenal in March, '69. 5ft. 10in., 12st. 4lb.

Alan GILZEAN (Outside-right): Started with Dundee, who let him play for Aldershot during National Service. Joined Spurs in December, 1964, since when he has established a reputation of ball skill added to scoring ability. A Scotland cap 21 times. 5ft. 11in., 12st. 4lb.

Steve PERRYMAN (Inside-forward): Born at Ealing, and played for Middlesex, London and England Boys. Signed as apprentice in July, 1967, upgraded in January, 1969. League debut against Sunderland last September, regular appearances since and three for England Youth. 5ft. 8in., 10st. 4lb.

Martin CHIVERS (Centre-forward): Scored winner at Sheffield Wednesday a few days after his transfer from Southampton, and goals are his forte. Record number of England Under-23 caps (17), also played for Young England and the Football League. 6ft. 1in., 13st. 0lb.

Martin PETERS (Inside-forward): 'Ten years ahead of his time', said Sir Alf Ramsey once—nobody, Sir Alf apart, knows quite what he meant, but Peters is instantly recognisable as the finished product . . . scheming, heading and shooting ability, all cloaked with class. 42 full caps, many more to come. 6ft. 1in., 11st. 10lb.

Roger MORGAN (Outside-left): A six-figure capture from Q.P.R., with whom he gained a League Cup winner's medal. England Youth and Under-23 caps, with two goals on debut for latter against Bulgaria in April. Speedy, direct. 5ft. 9½in., 11st. 0lb.

Neil JOHNSON (Outside-right): Grimsby-born, started as an apprentice in 1963 with first-team debut two years later. 5ft. 9in., 10st. 11lb.

Dennis BOND (Inside-forward): Debut for Watford, after representing London and England Boys, at age of 17. Moved to White Hart Lane in March, 1967, with debut v. Liverpool following month. 5ft. 6in., 10st. 10lb.

Jimmy PEARCE (Forward): Became apprentice in 1963, with debut delayed until opening day of 1968-69 season. Ten goals in 57 League outings. 5ft. 10in., 11st. 6lb.
