# **Third Attempt**

THIS evening we make a further attempt to settle our Third Round Football League Cup-tie with Middlesbrough. After drawing the first match 1—1 at Middlesbrough, and playing a goalless draw after extra time in the replay on this ground, we have come to respect our Second Division visitors from Tees-side.

We therefore acknowledge our good fortune in enjoying the benefit of a second replay on our own ground. When the first replay ended all square, it was decided to toss for choice of venue in the second replay.

Middlesbrough's captain, Nobby Stiles, tossed the coin, and Martin Peters, Spurs' captain, called correctly. The advantage is therefore with Spurs, and it is up to our players to see that it is not wasted.

The draw for the Fourth Round of the League Cup gave the winners of tonight's match a home tie with Millwall, and this is due to be played on Wednesday evening. Tonight's winners are therefore in for a hectic week, but we will have no complaints about that if we find ourselves a step further along the road to Wembley.

If the scores are level yet again at the end of 90 minutes' play this evening, an extra half-hour will again be played.

#### FIRST TIME

This is the first time we have been called upon to play a second replay in the League Cup. This tie is, in fact, only the second we have drawn since entering the competition for the first time in 1966.

The Semi-finals of the League Cup are, of course, two-leg ties, but our only previous draw in this competition was against Preston North End last season.

The two-leg system cuts out replays in European competitions, but we have, of course, been involved in more than two meetings with clubs in the F.A. Cup in the past.

Even so, it is many years since Spurs were engaged in a third meeting in the F.A. Cup. The last time was in 1953, when we defeated Birmingham City in a second replay in the Sixth Round at Wolverhampton.

BRUM NEXT...Our next League engagement is away to Birmingham on Saturday . . . After beating Birmingham here in August, we are keen to pull off our first "double" . . . Birmingham have strengthened their defence by signing defender John Roberts from Arsenal . . The match at St. Andrew's will be refereed by Mr. Walter Johnson . . . Spurs' last away match to Birmingham was in January, 1965, when we lost 0-1 . . . Birmingham were relegated at the end of that season . . . Spurs' last win at St. Andrew's was by 2-1 in February, 1964 . . . Tony Want, our former full-back, is a member of the Birmingham team . . . Birmingham have won only three of their seven home League matches to date this season.

# Men of Middlesbrough

IF MIDDLESBROUGH field the same team against us this evening as in the first replay, their line-up will include four players who were signed from other clubs in the Football League.

The best-known of these is, of course, Nobby Stiles, the club captain, who has made 28 appearances for England, and is well remembered for his part in the World Cup triumph at Wembley in 1966. Stiles is a Manchester man, who was a highly successful and popular performer in midfield for Manchester United. He left Old Trafford for Middlesbrough in May 1971.

Defender John Craggs was secured from Newcastle United in August, 1971. A former England Youth international, Craggs had First Division experience with Newcastle, and his polished play had a lot to do with Middlesbrough's draw here in the first replay.

Centre-half Stuart Boam was signed from Mansfield Town in June, 1971, and therefore arrived at Ayresome Park during the same summer as Stiles and Craggs.

Boam was born at Kirkby-in-Ashfield, and supported Nottingham Forest as a schoolboy. He joined Forest as an amateur, but was given only an odd game or two in the "A" team.

Striker John Hickton, scorer of the goal against Spurs in the first match, established himself with Sheffield Wednesday. He was born in Birmingham and was transferred from Wednesday to Middlesbrough in 1966.

Goalkeeper Jim Platt, who played so well against us in the last match, and forward Eric McMordie both played for Irish clubs before joining Middlesbrough.

Platt, who made his League debut for Middlesbrough last season, was born at Ballymoney and played for Ballymena. He was reserve to the Northern Ireland team against Russia last season.

McMordie is a Belfast man who joined Middlesbrough from the Dundella club in 1964. He is a full Irish international, who first appeared in Middlesbrough's League side in season 1965-66.

#### HOME PRODUCED

The rest of Middlesbrough's players are home produced. Defenders Frank Spraggon and Willie Maddren both developed through the junior ranks at Avresome Park.

Spraggon made his League debut for the Tees-side club as long ago as season 1963-64, and now ranks with their most experienced players. Maddren, formerly an apprentice professional, was born at neighbouring Billingham.

Gordon Jones and Bill Gates, both of whom can be described as midfield players, are well-established Middlesbrough names.

Jones, born at Sedgefield, joined Borough's ground staff in 1958. After gaining England Youth honours, he made several appearances in the England Under-23 team. He has now made well over 400 League appearances.

Gates, a Ferryhill man, is another long-serving Borough player. He joined Middlesbrough from Spennymoor in 1959, and is another former England Youth international.

Gates, who reached the 250 mark in League appearances last season, was at one time a full-back.

Striker David Mills was born at Whitby in Yorkshire, and is a product of the apprentice staff at Ayresome Park. He has been a professional since December, 1968, and made his League debut during season 1969–70.

David Armstrong is one of Middlesbrough's younger prospects. Only 17 he comes from Durham. He was recalled to the team against Huddersfield last Saturday week in place of McMordie.

### THE STORY SO FAR! . . .

OUR THIRD ROUND League Cup-tie with Middlesbrough started on the evening of 3rd October at Avresome Park.

Spurs had played some excellent football in the early stages, and our prospects looked bright when Jimmy Pearce drove in a fierce left-footed shot that bounced back into the field with such force that many people on the ground did not realise immediately that a goal had been scored.

At this period of the first half, Middlesbrough were struggling to hold Spurs, but in the 39th minute the whole complexion of the game changed.

It was then that John Hickton took full advantage of a mis-timed back-pass from Philip Beal to Pat Jennings to put his team on even terms.

This goal had a tonic effect on Middlesbrough, and they put us under pressure until half-time. In the second half Spurs came back into the game, and over the second 45 minutes, we seemed more likely to score than Middlesbrough.

A draw, however, was a fair result to the match. The teams at Avresome Park were:

MIDDLESBROUGH: Platt; Craggs, Spraggon, Stiles, Boam, Maddren, McMordie (sub. Vincent), Gates, Mills, Hickton and Jones.

#### DEADLOCK

In the replay here on the evening of 11th October, both teams reached deadlock in the art of scoring.

The first half was remarkably devoid of incident. In the 17th minute Jim Platt turned a shot from Alan Gilzean around the post for a corner and nine minutes later a long, swinging pass by Willie Maddren was headed over by Hickton, who afterwards forced Mike England to concede a corner. The rest of the play was mainly confined to the midfield area.

Spurs were much more menacing in the early minutes after the restart. A move by Terry Naylor and Gilzean ended with Chivers stabbing the ball wide. Then Gilzean back-heeled the ball only inches wide.

There was much more incident in this half, and after Pearce had replaced John Pratt, Chivers headed wide following a move by Cyril Knowles and

Hickton shot wide from a good through ball from John Craggs, and Martin Peters went as close at the other end from a pass by Pearce.

#### BOROUGH SPIRIT

There was no doubt that their success in keeping our forwards from scoring was adding considerably to Middlesbrough's confidence and spirit, and towards the end of normal time Hickton had a shot saved by Jennings, and a menacing drive by Frank Spraggon skimmed off the head of Steve Perryman.

In the 84th minute Nobby Stiles left the field to be replaced by Peter Brine.

During the first period of extra time Gilzean had a header well saved by Platt after Peters had laid on the cross, and in the closing minutes of the second period Middlesbrough's goal survived miraculously during a concentrated Spurs assault.

# MISFORTUNE SHARED

IT is much easier to look back on triumph than it is on failure. Yet there was an occasion when Spurs and Middlesbrough made history as companions in misfortune.

It was so long ago that we feel the facts can be revived without creating any air of depression. The season was 1927-28, and many of the older supporters of both Spurs and Middlesbrough will remember the remarkable end of that League campaign.



On Christmas Eve Spurs stood fifth on the table and Middlesbrough were in eighth position.

Middlesbrough slumped as the season wore on, but on Good Friday Spurs were still in the top half. Sheffield Wednesday were bottom, and they were our opponents in the two Easter matches.

Wednesday won both those games, and started us on the slippery slope. It was an incredible escape by the Sheffield club, who finished the season in 14th position.

FAIRLY SAFE

Arthur Grimsdell Middlesbrough looked fairly safe even in the closing weeks of the season. A fortnight before the campaign closed, there were four clubs below them, and they were four points ahead of the bottom club.

Middlesbrough picked up only one point, however, from their last three matches. Spurs did the same, and with the other clubs scrambling to safety, finished as relegation companions to Middlesbrough.

Our total of points was 38, a record for a relegated club, and Middlesbrough finished with one less. Last season Ipswich Town finished in 13th position with 38 points!

On the day of our last home match, against Bury, we stood 12th, and our programme notes that day included the comment—"The Spurs need not now worry about the relegation bogey." It was false optimism encouraged by the fact that Spurs had drawn the previous match at Burnley.

Bury beat us here 4-1, we lost the final match away to Liverpool and were on tour in Holland when the grim news of our relegation was received.

#### **GREAT PLAYERS**

Reviving memories of that remarkable season is no reflection on the ability of the players of that time.

Some of the finest players in the histories of both clubs were in action that season, and the captains-Arthur Grimsdell (Spurs) and Jackie Carr (Middlesbrough)-are names that have never lost their lustre.

George Camsell, Middlesbrough's centre-forward, finished with 33 First Division goals to his credit, only to find himself heading for the Second Division. That's something to ponder!

Regulars in Spurs' team that season in addition to Grimsdell were Jimmy Dimmock, Taffy O'Callaghan, Harry Skitt, Frank Osborne, Matt Forster and Arthur Lowdell.

For the benefit of supporters planning to watch our League match away to Birmingham City on Saturday, we have reproduced the above map showing the route into Birmingham, together with the following directions, compiled by the R.A.C. for those travelling by road.

Follow M.1 Motorway northward to Intersection No. 19 and continue by the M.6 to Intersection No. 5. Continue by the A.452—Newport Road and Coleshill Road—to the Birmingham Ring Road (A.4040). Bear left on to Alum Rock Road and continue by Belchers Lane to Bordesley Green. Bear right to Cattell Road, then take the fourth on the right—Kingstone Road. Take the first on the right—Robert Road—to Emmeline Street and the ground is on the right.

The distance from the Tottenham area is approximately 117 miles. Street parking is allowed but controlled by the police, so watch for any signs, including diversions.

BRITISH RAIL will run a special train for this match at the specially reduced return fare of £1.50 (Adults) and 75p (children between 3 and 14). The departure time from Euston Station will be 12.18, arriving Birmingham (New Street) at 13.48. The return time from Birmingham (New Street) is 17.30, arriving Euston at 19.26.
