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## A Happy Habit

WHEN MANCHESTER CITY, our very welcome visitors this afternoon, were here in the corresponding League match last September, we offered them our congratulations on having won the F.A. Cup at the end of the preceding season.

This year they visit us as the holders of both the Football League Cup and the European Cup-winners' Cup, and we hasten to congratulate them once more on their successes.

City, it seems, have acquired the happy habit of winning cups, and their achievement in carrying off two major trophies in one season tells its own story of skill, consistency and determination.

City are not only cup-minded. They have made a good start in the League this season, and we have no illusions over the quality of the opposition we face.

Our own record has been improved by victories over Blackpool and Coventry City in our last two home League games, and away to Crystal Palace last week-end, and we hope to add to our points total today.

We are not at all proud of our home record against City in recent years. Their last four visits have produced two wins for City and two drawn games.

We have not beaten our Manchester visitors here since they returned to the First Division in 1966. We last defeated them on this ground in September, 1962, and it was at the end of that season that City were relegated. We therefore have good reason to strive that extra bit harder to change the tide of events today.

### IMPRESSIVE RECORD

There is an impressive look about City's away record to date. In four League matches on opponents' grounds, they have won three times, in each case by the only goal of the match, and drawn once.

In the light of this record away from home, City's fall at Carlisle in their first match this season in the League Cup was a shock result. They lost 2-1 to the Second Division club, Francis Lee scoring their goal.

Last week City were again engaged in Cup football, when they played Linfield, the Irish League club, at Maine Road in the first leg of the first round of the European Cup-Winners' Cup.

Colin Bell scored the only goal of the game for City, who now take their narrow lead to Belfast for the second leg next Wednesday.

The man in the middle today is Mr. Danny Lyden from Birmingham, who started refereeing in 1954, and graduated to the Football League List via the Birmingham Works F.A. and the West Midlands Regional League. This season he has been promoted to the F.I.F.A. panel of International Referees.

Coincidentally, his last match on this ground was our League fixture with Manchester City last September!

In his playing days Mr. Lyden was a goalkeeper. He played for Yorkshire Amateurs, and also as an amateur for Walsall and Bradford City. He was capped eight times by the West Riding County F.A.

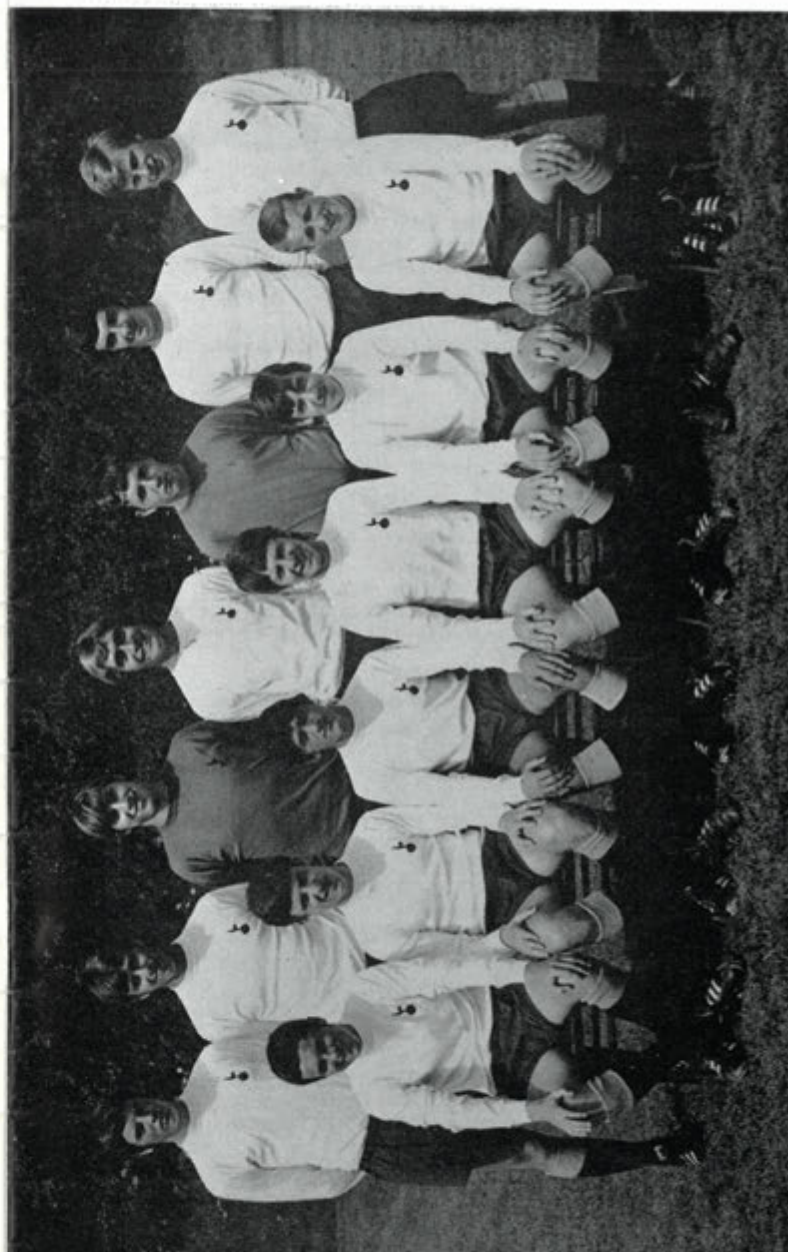

## TODAY'S VISITORS

### MANCHESTER CITY

**M**ANCHESTER CITY'S team is unlikely to show much change from the line-up against us here in the corresponding match last season.

There is one newcomer of exceptional interest on City's staff this season, however. He is Freddie Hill, the former England inside-forward, who served Bolton Wanderers so well for so many years.

Hill, who was inside-left for Bolton when they last played on this ground in April, 1964, was transferred to Halifax Town in July, 1969, and played regularly last season in Third Division football. He could hardly believe his good luck when City restored him to the First Division circle by securing his transfer from Halifax last May.

With Hill in that same Bolton forward line here in 1964 was **Francis Lee**, now a star of England, and member of the World Cup team in Mexico this summer.

Lee was born in Bolton, and it was from the Wanderers that City signed him in October, 1967.

#### STILL SHINING

Right-back **Tony Book**, City's captain, continues to shine, and his recent form suggests that retirement is still a long way away.

Book's story is well known to every close follower of the game. He was 29 when he left Bath City, the Southern League club, for Plymouth Argyle in August, 1964.

Tony proved himself the champion of late starters, and after moving to City from Plymouth in July, 1966, he leapt to stardom.

Big names abound in City's ranks. Inside-right **Colin Bell** is another England World Cup player. He comes from the North-east, and started his career with Bury, who transferred him to City in March, 1966.

#### LOCAL FIND

**Joe Corrigan**, City's goalkeeper, is a local find, who has made great strides over the last two years. He developed through City's nursery system.

Left-back **Glyn Pardoe**, scorer of the extra-time goal that won the League Cup last season, comes from Winsford in Cheshire. He made his League debut for City at the age of 15 in April, 1962.

Wing-half **Mike Doyle** has also played for the England Under-23s. He was born in Manchester, developed through City's junior ranks, and has been a pillar of defence in recent years.

Centre-half **Tommy Booth** is a more recent discovery. He, too, was born in Manchester, and joined City as a youngster.

Booth made his First Division debut two seasons ago, but has made tremendous impact in quick time.

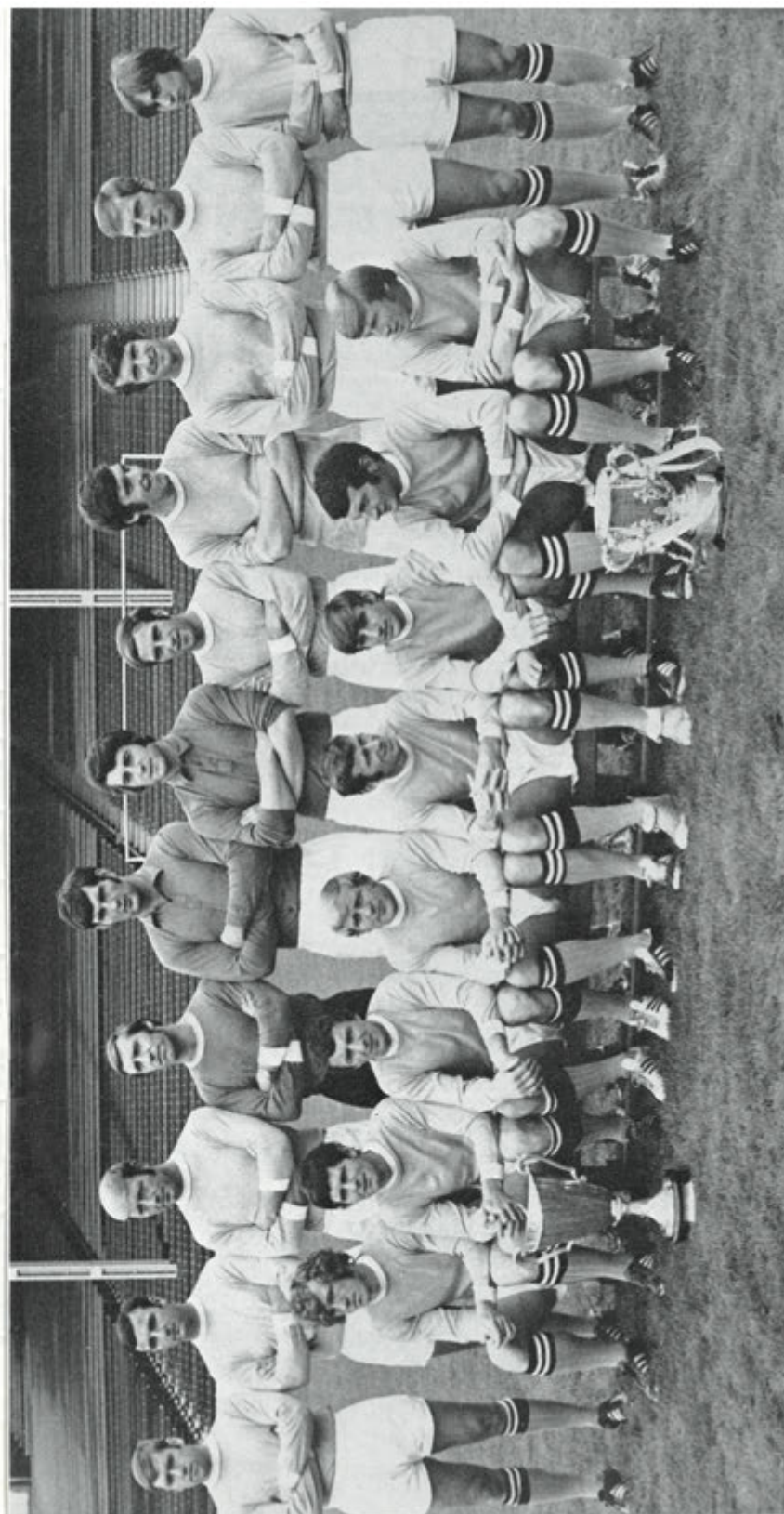
#### LONG TIME

**Alan Oakes**, best described as a midfield player, has been a City regular for a long time. A Winsford man, he has been a professional at Maine Road since 1959, and in March, 1969 was honoured by selection for the Football League against the Scottish League.

Right-winger **Mike Summerbee** has three full England appearances to his credit. He started his career with Swindon Town, and was signed by City in August, 1965.

Inside-forward **Neil Young** is another of City's own products. He showed exceptional promise in the youth team before signing as a professional when he was 17. Young, who is a former England Youth international, scored City's Cup-winning goal in 1969.

Winger **Tony Towers** is one of the younger school. Born in Manchester, he too is a former England Youth international. Towers was a member of the team that beat Gornik Zabrze in the Final of the Cup-Winners' Cup last season.

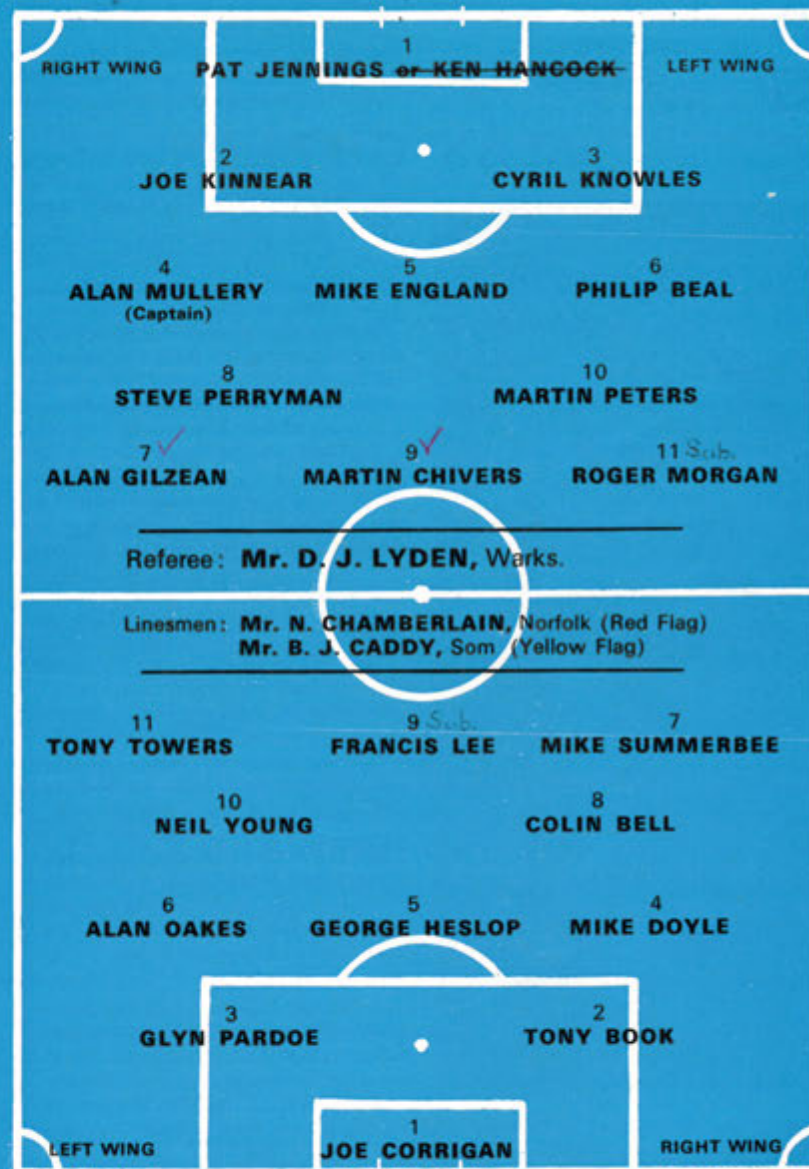

# PERSONALITY

## AGE

Presenting . . .

### ALAN GILZEAN



**T**HE date was 11th April, 1964 . . . the setting was Hampden Park . . . the occasion was the great International clash between Scotland and England.

Scotland's centre-forward was Alan Gilzean, then a Dundee player. He rarely talks about it, but Alan will never forget that match before a crowd of 133,253.

Scotland won by the only goal of the match, and Alan scored it. Over came the ball from a corner-kick, and Alan managed to head through in spite of the close attentions of Maurice Norman, our former player, who was centre-half for England.

Alan was the toast of Scotland that night. And although he has scored many other goals in League, Cup and international football, that match-winner at Hampden stands out as his most memorable.

In December, 1964 Alan was transferred from Dundee to Spurs, and made his debut in a home match against Everton the same week. Alan did not score, but he opened his account against Nottingham Forest in the next match.

Alan comes from Coupar Angus in Perthshire and quickly made his mark with Coupar Angus Juveniles.

#### CHOSE DUNDEE

Hibernian, Cowdenbeath and Dundee were all keen on Alan. Not unnaturally, he chose the club nearest home. Dundee is only 15 miles from Coupar Angus.

Once national service in the Army was

behind him, he returned to Dundee to play a big part in their League Championship triumph of season 1961-62.

In 1963 Alan made his first appearance in the full Scottish side against Norway. Now his total of full international appearances is 20, plus two as substitute.

Alan and his wife, Rena, who also comes from Coupar Angus, live in Enfield. They have two sons, three-year-old Kevin John, and 12-month-old Ian Roger.

**STATISTICS.**—Alan's total of League appearances for Spurs is 211 plus 4 as substitute. To this total can be added 41 appearances in F.A. Cup, League Cup, European Cup-Winners' Cup and Texaco Cup. He has scored 67 League goals for Spurs, and 12 in the four Cup competitions.

##### TO 20 YEARS AGO THIS WEEK-END

Spurs, reduced to 10 men for most of the game, were held to a 1-1 draw by Sunderland on this ground.

Sid McClellan, who was making his League debut for Spurs at centre-forward, was knocked out midway through the first half, and taken to hospital with a head injury.

There were no substitutes in those days, but Spurs coped well with their handicap, and were a goal up at half-time. The scorer was Eddie Bailly, from a pass by Denis Uphill.

Sunderland equalised early in the second half with a goal from Ivor Broadis, but only great goalkeeping by John Mapson prevented Spurs from scoring the winner.

The gate figure was 59,190.

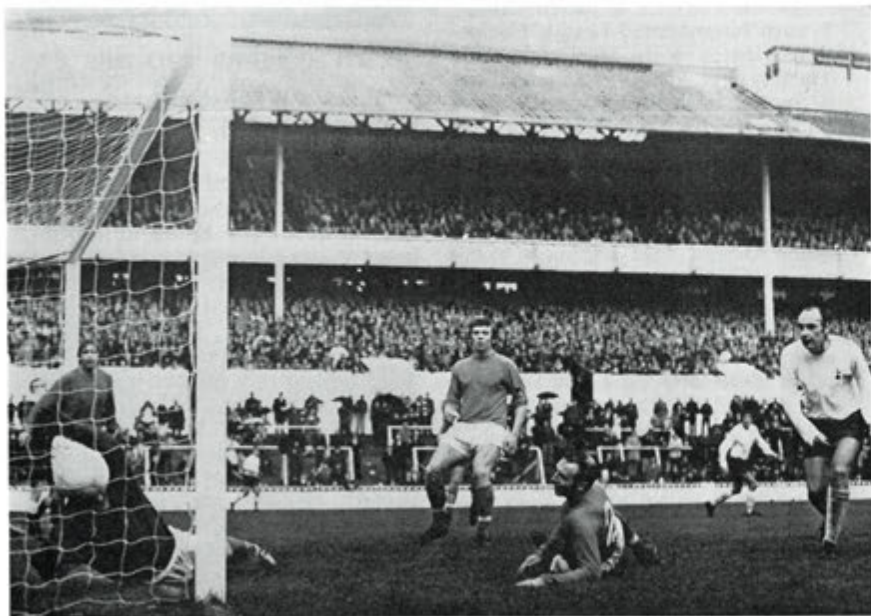

## SPURS SHINE

Crystal Palace 0, Spurs 3

That convincing 3—0 win over Crystal Palace last week-end was just the tonic we all needed. It's true we had beaten Blackpool in our previous League match, and had also won well against Swansea and Dunfermline in Cup matches, but a visit to the improved Palace team was a much sterner test.

Spurs emerged from it well, and although we had to fight hard for a time early in the second half to hold our one-goal advantage, there was no doubting our superiority. When Alan Mullery drove home a great shot half-way through the half to give us a 2—0 lead, there seemed little chance of Palace staging a recovery.

Each of our three goals was brilliantly executed. The first, after half-an-hour's play, was a great header by Martin Chivers from a skilfully flighted centre by Cyril Knowles.

The third goal that really wrapped the game up a few minutes from the end started with a thrown clearance by Ken Hancock to Alan Gilzean, deep in our own half.

Steve Perryman moved the ball on, and Martin Peters slipped a through pass to Chivers, who hammered in another fine goal.

It was a thoroughly efficient and workmanlike performance by Spurs, and considering the exhausting effect of the hot sun, the standard of play reached a high level.

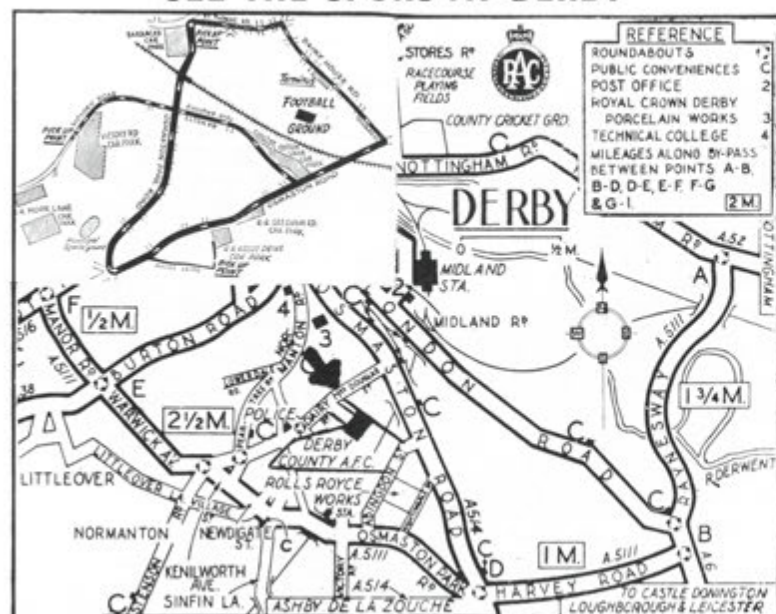
