COMMENT

IT has long been said that football's glory is its uncertainty. If results of matches could be forecast with any real measure of confidence, the game would lose much of its appeal.

The catch-phrase applies, of course, only in the wider sense or perhaps more specifically to the neutral onlooker. All of us in football derive considerable interest from unexpected results of matches that do not involve our own club. Our interest gives way to depression when we are on the losing end of an unexpected result, and conversely we are elated when the situation is in reverse.

There has been an element of surprise in each of our last three results. We did not expect to be beaten by three clear goals in our last home match with Manchester City.

Yet that rebuff was followed by our success away to Arsenal a few days later. Certainly we travelled to Highbury hoping to win, but frankly we must confess we did not expect to find ourselves holding a 3—0 lead late in the game.

It's true Arsenal hit back with two late goals to make us fight hard to the last tense moment. Another example of football's uncertainty.

Our morale was given a great boost at Highbury. We felt the Manchester reverse could be regarded as just one of those slip-ups that come from time to time to all clubs.

HUMBLED

Which brings us to the story of our humiliation at Derby last Saturday. Derby are riding high in their first season back in the First Division, and we knew we faced one of our hardest away matches.

We did not expect to be humbled, however, by a five-goal defeat. Again the element of surprise asserted itself.

Almost anything, it seems, can happen in football. And it is timely that we should be sharply aware of the fact on a day when we are at home to the bottom team in the First Division.

In extending a cordial welcome to Sunderland, we have no wish to embarrass our visitors by emphasising their lowly position on the chart. As our Wearside friends will agree, however, the

After the crash at Derby, we are eager to regain the winning trail to-day, and naturally hope this match will not be one to underline the uncertainty of football! The fact that Sunderland turned the corner by winning their first match, by 2—1 against Nottingham Forest last Saturday, suggests they will take the field with more confidence than for weeks.

BIG OCCASION

Derby County 5 Spurs 0

Our visit to Derby was, of course, a really big occasion. It is unlikely that we shall play another League match this season in such an electric atmosphere.

The crowd figure of 41,826 was a record for the Derby ground, and spice was added to the match by Dave Mackay's appearance against us, and the unbeaten record of his team.

Derby are a really good team, but we have to admit that defensive errors paved the way for our big defeat.

After Alan Durban and Kevin Hector had scored for Derby, we had a chance to get back into the game. Jimmy Greaves hit a brilliant shot that brought a tremendous save by 'keeper Les Green.

Jimmy has netted scores of goals with less worthy efforts. Unfortunately, we never came as close again to a goal.

Willie Carlin headed the third, and in the second half, when Tony Want replaced Roger Morgan, who damaged an ankle, Derby rubbed it in with further

goals by John O'Hare and Durban.

When Durban scored the fifth, John Pratt left the field injured, and as our substitute had been called into service at half-time, we played the last 23 minutes with 10 men.

Our defeat was the first by a five-goal margin since we lost 2—7 at Burnley in April, 1964.

MAN IN CHARGE

Referee for to-day is Mr. Gordon Kew of Leeds. He was, in fact, born at South Shields, but from the age of two he lived in Scotland.

Mr. Kew has been resident in the Leeds area since 1951, and his path to the top as a referee was via local amateur football and later the Yorkshire and Central Leagues.

After six years as a League linesman he was promoted to the middle in 1966.

Mr. Kew is married, with two sons and a 23-day-old daughter. Both his sons are keenly interested in football, which is not surprising in view of the strong family connections with refereeing.

Mr. Kew's father-in-law was a top referee, and a brother-in-law reached League status as a linesman.

He is employed as an insurance claims official. His spare-time interests include welfare work and and classical music.

TODAY'S VISITORS

In the ranks of the Sunderland players now faced with the demanding task of improving the club's fortunes are some famous names.

One of the best-known is Joe Baker, the former English international centreforward, who is in his first season as a Sunderland player. His transfer from Nottingham Forest was secured in July.

Baker, who played for Forest here almost exactly a year ago, was born in Liverpool, but when he was only two years of age, his family moved to Motherwell.

He was capped for Scotland as a schoolboy, but his place of birth qualified him for England. He was, in fact, playing for Hibernian when he gained his first full international cap.

WEMBLEY ECHO

Another Sunderland forward well-known to us is Gordon Harris, who played against Spurs for Burnley in the F.A. Cup final at Wembley in 1962. He, too, is a full English international, and a player with years of experience behind him.

Other Sunderland forwards who may line up against us to-day are Billy Hughes, Bobby Kerr, and Dennis Tueart.

Hughes is a Scot from Coatbridge, who joined Sunderland straight from school. Last season he made 24 First Division appearances, and scored four goals, one of them on this ground against Spurs.

Kerr, a player of small physique, is also a Scot. He comes from Alexandria, and is a product of the Sunderland Youth team. He made his League debut in season 1966–67.

Tueart is another product of Sunderland's Youth scheme. He was born in Newcastle, and joined Sunderland from Tyneside junior football. He first appeared in Sunderland's League team last season.

NOTED NAMES

Martin Harvey, Colin Todd and Jim Montgomery are all noted names in Sunderland's defence.

Wing-half Harvey is a Belfast man who has made many appearances for the Irish international team, and both halfback Todd and goalkeeper Montgomery have played for the England Under-23 team.

Todd, who comes from Chester-le-Street, is another of Sunderland's own discoveries. He joined the Wearsiders straight from school.

Montgomery is in the same category. He was born in Sunderland, made a name in youth football, and has been the regular senior goalkeeper these last few years. Last season he was everpresent in Sunderland's League team.

Full-back Len Ashurst is one of Sunderland's long-serving players. He is a Liverpool man, who was on the books of Liverpool as an amateur for four years.

WELL-TRAVELLED

Half-back Calvin Palmer, who has been troubled with a groin strain this season, is a well-travelled player. He was born at Skegness, and made his name with Nottingham Forest.


From Forest Palmer moved to Stoke City, and in February, 1968 he made the further move to Sunderland. Last season he made 23 First Division appearances, and scored four goals.

Sunderland names with an unfamiliar ring to Southern football followers are Michael McGiven, and Bobby Park. Both are products of Sunderland's nursery system, and are new to League football this season.

McGiven, a half-back, is Newcastleborn, and a player who joined Sunderland's professional staff on leaving school. Park, also a half-back, is another Scot from Coatbridge, who turned professional last January.

Brian Heslop, who is named as No. 5 in Sunderland's team today, is the former Carlisle United player. Carlisle is Heslop's home town, and he developed through the Cumberland club's apprentice ranks. Sunderland secured his transfer from Carlisle in May, 1967.

Right-back Cecil Irwin is, of course, one of Sunderland's better-known players. He comes from Ashington, was a first-team player at 16 and has played for the England Under-23 team.

COMMON NAME . . . UNCOMMON PLAYER

It was with the deepest regret that we received the news of Bert Smith's death. Bert was a member of our 1921 Cupwinning team, and to the older generation of Spurs' supporters he was both a personality and a character.

Bert remained with Spurs until 1930, and many spectators here today will have vivid memories of his play. He had a common name . . . but he was an un-

common player.

"Smudger"—as he was popularly known—was a demon for hard work. "A 90-minute man" was the description frequently applied to him. The term "work-rate" was not in vogue in Bert's day. If it had been, eyebrows would have been raised if Bert's had dropped to 99 per cent!

To emphasise Bert Smith's capacity for hard running and hard work—and how he left them panting even when the mud was thickest!—is, perhaps, to

under-rate his skill.

There was a great deal more to Bert's repertoire than industry. He was a right-half of exceptional skill, and was honoured by England. Yet he never quite matched the glamour of other stars in that dazzling team of the 1920s.

TIRELESS WORK

If Tommy Clay, a full-back in the classic mould, were alive today, he would be among the first to acknowledge the debt he owed to the unflagging Smith. Bert's tireless work gave Tommy those precious split-seconds to place his clearances to advantage.

One was the perfect foil to the other. We saw the same effective understanding in the early 1950s, when Bill Nicholson's hard work at wing-half left Alf Ramsey with time to make good use of almost

every ball.

Bert Smith played for Huddersfield before joining Spurs at the end of the first World War. He made two full appearances for England—versus Scotland and Wales—and also played for the Football League.

In 1930 he took over as player-coach at Northfleet, then our nursery. In 1937 he joined Hitchin Town as trainer-coach. Later he became groundsman, a post he filled for Hitchin until 1966, but over the last three years had been in poor health.

The Club was represented at his funeral last week at Stopsley, near Luton.

In paying tribute to the memory of Bert Smith, we reproduce a photograph

Bert Smith has passed on . . . but his contribution to Spurs' successes of the early twenties has a permanent place in the club's history.

Barry comes from Witham in Essex, and as a schoolboy he played for Chelmsford, Mid-Essex and Essex County. Last season he played regularly in the Metropolitan League team, and also made two appearances in the Combination. We wish him every success.




TO 20 YEARS AGO THIS WEEK-END
