FOREWORD

This time last year I had the privilege of writing the Foreword to the Club Handbook for the first time, and I did so in a spirit of hope and optimism. Now, with the events of 1980-81 behind us and the challenge of a new season stretching ahead, I feel the confidence I expressed has been fully justified.

Our success in winning the F.A. Cup for the sixth time in our history set the seal on an exciting and eventful season, and once more we have had a triumph to celebrate in a year ending with the figure "1". Moreover, it was in the one hundredth season in which the F.A. Cup competition has been staged.

Manager Keith Burkinshaw and the players earn our hearty congratulations for adding a fresh chapter of success to our history, but I know their thoughts and efforts are now directed to the immediate future rather than on the past, especially as we are now back in European competition.

With the F.A. Cup now in our possession, I feel we have made the right start to what I regard as a new era, both on and off the field, in which we aim to maintain the great traditions that have been built in the past. Success has been achieved, but we have not yet reached the summit.

After winning the Cup in its hundredth season, nothing would be more fitting than to win one of the game's top honours in 1982, the year in which we celebrate our Club Centenary. We are already making plans to celebrate the Centenary, and further success on the field would give the momentum we need.

Much as we rejoice over Cup success, the real target has to be the League championship, and a good start to the new season is essential to our ambitions in that direction. Last season we finished in tenth position, but for a large part of the campaign there was a firm prospect that we would finish higher up the table.

When the season finally ended, our players retained their winning touch on tour. They played three matches in the United Arab Emirates and two in Turkey, winning all five. Details of these games are given on pages 42 and 43 of this Handbook.

We were strengthened last summer by the signing of Steve Archibald and Garth Crooks, and my belief, expressed in my Foreword last year, that they would give us the striking power we needed, was fully borne out by the performance throughout the season of both players.

It was also pleasing to see the progress of the younger players drafted into the team. Graham Roberts and Garry Brooke both established themselves at League level, and George Mazon and Gary O'Reilly both came through their first-team baptism with credit.

Last season's success was not confined to the performance of the first team. The Reserves finished runners-up in the Football Combination after filling the top position for a large part of the season. Their failure to stay at the top was undoubtedly influenced by the departure during the season of a number of our experienced players to other clubs, and the need to promote young players to the senior team.

Tangible success came the way of both the senior and junior youth teams.

The senior team won the South East Counties League in convincing style, finishing with six points more than Watford, and the goals total for our 30 League games played was 96, a figure not remotely approached by any other club in the competition.

It was nearly the "double" for the senior youth team. They reached the final of the F.A. Youth Cup, only to be beaten 2-1 on aggregate by West Ham United over the two legs in the final.

At junior level we finished third in the South East Counties League, but succeeded in winning the Cup competition. It was the seventh time our Club has won this particular trophy.

We can therefore look back on a good season all round. Well done, everyone.

It was also a season in which honours came our way in the international field. Steve Archibald (Scotland), Glenn Hoddle (England) and Chris Hughton (Eire) all added to their record of international appearances while Ossie Ardiles returned to Montevideo to play for the Argentine against West Germany and Brazil in mid-season. Prior to leaving us for Vancouver Whitecaps and Watford respectively, Terry Yorath and Gerry Armstrong made further appearances for Wales and Northern Ireland. Now, with the signing of Paul Price, our new defender from Luton Town this summer, we have another Welsh international on our books, and the acquisition of goalkeeper Ray Clemence from Liverpool has, of course, added a current England international to our staff.

The success of our youth players points the way to the future, and it was therefore pleasing that Terry Gibson and Pat Corbett should have been honoured by their selection for the England Youth team. Both these players are at present playing for the GAIS club of Gothenburg, but they are due to rejoin us when the Swedish season ends later this year.

Mark Bowen and Michael McCabe, members of our apprentice staff, were also honoured by selection for the Youth teams of Wales and Eire respectively.

In addition to Yorath and Armstrong, a number of other experienced players left our ranks last season. Jim Holmes also joined Vancouver Whitecaps, Peter Taylor moved to Orient and Terry Naylor signed for Charlton Athletic only a short time after the move of Mark Kendall to Newport County. Each of these players gave us good service, but football is an ever-changing scene, and departures are inevitable.

Earlier in this Foreword I referred to a new era for our Club, and the new West Stand project will be completed around Christmas-time. In addition to providing the modern type of accommodation we feel is so necessary in the present age, there will be provision for good catering facilities, which will also extend to all other parts of the ground.

I want to thank supporters for the patience and co-operation they have shown throughout the period of rebuilding, which must of necessity continue for a few more months.

I cannot allow the opportunity to pass of mentioning the retirement towards the end of last season of Mr. Charles Cox from the board of directors.

Mr. Cox, who had been Vice-Chairman since 1969, joined the board originally in 1961, and during his long period of valued service, has enjoyed the respect and esteem of everyone connected with the Club.

Since his retirement, Mr. Cox has been appointed Life Vice-President, and I hope he will long continue to attend our matches.

Mr. Geoffrey Richardson, who has been a director of the Club since 1970, has now been appointed Vice-Chairman.

Mr. Frank Sinclair, who has been a shareholder and supporter of the Club for many years, has been appointed to fill the vacancy on the Board of Directors.

THE MANAGER ...

KEITH BURKINSHAW has been manager of Spurs since July, 1976, when he was promoted from the position of coach, a post he had filled since joining us in the summer of 1975.

A fully-qualified F.A. coach, he had spent seven years on the coaching staff of Newcastle United, four of them as coach to the senior team. It was in his Newcastle days that he had his first taste of Wembley, the Tynesiders finishing runners-up to Liverpool in the F.A. Cup in 1974.

A Yorkshireman from Higham, near Barnsley, Keith played as a schoolboy for the Barnsley District team. As a young player he was in Wolverhampton Wanderers' nursery team in Yorkshire, but was later spotted by Liverpool when playing for Denaby United in the Midland League.

He gave up his job in the local pit for a career in professional football, and filled the wing-half position. In 1957 he left Liverpool for Workington, then in the Football League, and during his time with the north-western club he was appointed player-manager.

In 1965 he joined Scunthorpe United solely as a player, but in three seasons at the Old Show Ground, he had a ten-month spell as caretaker-manager.

... AND HIS ASSISTANT

PETER SHREEVES, right-hand man to Keith Burkinshaw, was in charge of Spurs' reserve team from 1977 until early last season, when he was promoted to the position of coach to the first team.

Peter originally joined Spurs in 1974, and was formerly our Youth Team Manager. He was born at Neath in South Wales in 1940 at a time when his mother was a war-time evacuee, but was brought up in Islington.

He did well in schools football and gained a place in the Middlesex and London Boys teams. After playing for Finchley, his first senior club, he signed for Reading, and first appeared in their League team in season 1958-59.

His career as a forward with Reading was brought to a premature close by injury in 1966, but he had further spells with Chelmsford City and Wimbledon. He was a member of Charlton Athletic's coaching staff before joining Spurs.



THE IMPORTANT ROLES OF RESERVE TEAM MANAGER AND YOUTH TEAM MANAGER ARE FILLED RESPECTIVELY BY ROBIN STEPNEY AND KEN OLIVER. HERE THEY ARE WITH A FEW FACTS ABOUT THEIR CAREERS AND BACKGROUND.

ROBIN STEPNEY first joined Spurs in a part-time capacity just prior to the opening of season 1977-78. He spent a season each supervising the youth and junior teams and conducting evening training sessions.

At that time Robin was a sports instructor with the Inner London Education Authority. He then gave up that post at the start of season 1979-80 to join our full-time staff with the immediate task of concentrating on schoolboy scouting. Last season he was appointed Reserve Team Manager, and no-one was more disappointed than Robin that we failed to win the Football Combination championship.

Robin was born at Horsham in Sussex and spent his League career as a half-back with Aldershot. After leaving the League circle he played for Dartford, Ramsgate, Dover and Cambridge City, and also had a successful spell as manager of Maidstone. He lives at Rainham in Essex.



KEN OLIVER, who has overall control of both the Senior and Junior Youth teams, joined us as Youth Team Manager last February.

A north-easterner from Chester-le-Street, he played as an inside-forward for Sunderland, Barnsley, Watford, Workington and Bournemouth, and has been on the coaching staffs of Bradford City, Newcastle United, Birmingham City and Walsall.

Ken, who holds the full F.A. coaching badge, and is also qualified in treatment of injuries, was manager of Crook Town for a time. In his early days at Sunderland, he played as a part-timer in order to finish his time as an apprentice toolmaker.

Sandwiched between his Sunderland and Barnsley service, Ken had a spell with South Shields, who preferred to play him in the wing-half position.



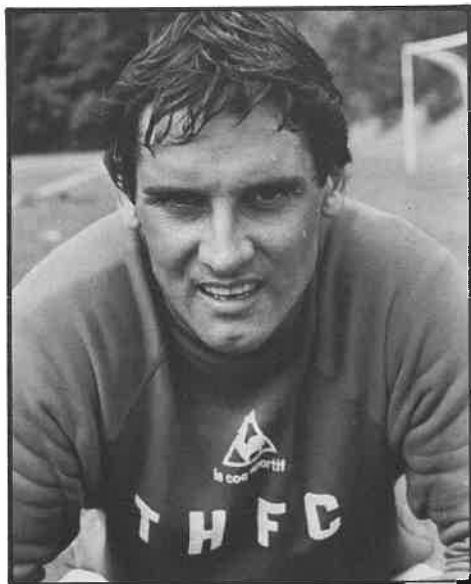

MILIJA ALEKSIC



(Goalkeeper)

Joined Spurs from Luton Town in December, 1978, and has since made 23 League and seven F.A. Cup appearances for us. The son of a Yugoslav father and an English mother, he was born at Newcastle under Lyme and attended the St. Patrick's Secondary Modern School in the Staffordshire town. Played for the district boys' team and Staffordshire County before joining Port Vale as an apprentice. Later signed for Stafford Rangers, and in February, 1973 he became a full-time professional for the first time with Plymouth Argyle. Following a spell on loan to Luton in December, 1976, his full transfer to the Bedfordshire club was completed. Spent a few weeks on loan to Sheffield United from Spurs towards the end of season 1978-79.

STEVEN ARCHIBALD



(Forward)

A current Scottish international who joined Spurs from Aberdeen in May, 1980. Born in Glasgow, where he lived in the Rutherglen district, and attended Gallowflat Secondary and Stonelaw High Schools. Played for local clubs Crofoot United and Fernhill Athletic before signing for Clyde as a part-time professional in 1974. Served a four-year apprenticeship as a Rolls Royce motor mechanic, and after a brief spell running a service station with a business partner in Glasgow, was transferred to Aberdeen in January, 1978. Became a full-time professional at Pittodrie Park for the first time, and first gained international recognition with the Aberdeen club. After leaving school he had played one match for East Stirling, but preferred to sign for Clyde. Finished top scorer for Spurs in his first season with 25 League and Cup goals. His 41 League appearances last season yielded 20 goals, and he netted 5 in 15 Cup games.

OSVALDO ARDILES



(Midfield)

Achieved his much-publicised ambition by playing in our F.A. Cup-winning team last May. Joined Spurs in July, 1978 after playing a big part in Argentina's triumph in the World Cup that year, and has played in many other international matches for his country. Born in Cordoba, where he attended Montserrat School, and later the local university. Had been at law school for four years before leaving the Argentine. Developed his football with the Cordoba Institute team and joined the Huracan club of Buenos Aires in 1975. In the three seasons he has been with us he has made 114 League appearances and 27 in League Cup and F.A. Cup. He has scored 11 League goals and five in the two Cups. In his leisure time he enjoys playing snooker, table tennis and chess. He lives at Turnford in Hertfordshire.



GARRY BROOKE



(Forward)

Born at Bethnal Green, but has lived most of his life in Walthamstow, where he attended the McEntee Senior High School. Played for Waltham Forest and Essex County Boys' teams, and joined Spurs as an apprentice in June, 1977. Upgraded to full professional in October, 1978, and made his League debut for us as substitute at home to West Bromwich Albion last November. Finished last season with 18 League appearances and seven in the F.A. Cup, scoring three League goals and one in the Cup. Spent most of 1980 with the GAIS club of Gothenburg, but returned to us from Sweden last autumn.

RAY CLEMENCE



(Goalkeeper)

Joined Spurs from Liverpool a fortnight before the opening of this season. A current England goalkeeper, whose international appearance against Wales in 1972 was the first of the many now standing to his credit. Born at Skegness and started his career with Scunthorpe United, for whom he made 48 League appearances before moving to Liverpool in June, 1967. Played in the same Scunthorpe team in the Third Division as Keith Burkinshaw, our manager. In a brilliant career with Liverpool, he won five League championship medals in addition to starring in teams that won the European Cup three times; the U.E.F.A. Cup twice; and the F.A. and League Cups once each.



ALLAN COCKRAM



(Midfield)

Born in Kensington, but now lives at Brondesbury Park. Attended Hampstead Comprehensive School and played for the Camden district boys' team. A broken leg cost him his chance of a place in the Inner London Boys' team. Also did well at school at both cricket and athletics. Signed as a full professional for Spurs last January, and made two appearances in our Combination team before last season closed.

JOHN COOPER



(Midfield)

Born at Euston and lives in the Russell Square district. Attended the Sir William Collins School, Euston, and in addition to football did well at cricket, athletics and cross-country running. Played for the Camden district and Inner London schools soccer teams. Signed as an apprentice for us in April, 1979 and was upgraded to full professional status in January, 1980. Made 14 appearances in the Combination team last season.



PATRICK CORBETT



(Defender)

At present playing by special agreement for the GAIS club of Gothenburg, and due to return to us at the end of the Swedish season. Born at Hackney and attended St. Bernard's Secondary School, Bethnal Green. Played for the East London Boys team, and also shone at school as a sprinter. Signed apprentice forms for us in June, 1979, and was upgraded to full professional last October. Played for the England Youth team last season, when he also made eight appearances in our Combination side.

IAN CROOK



(Midfield)

Born at Romford and attended Pinewood and Forest Lodge Schools in Collier Row. Played for the Havering district boys' team and was also an Essex County trialist. Played for Great Danes, a Brentwood Sunday soccer club, before joining Spurs as an apprentice in May, 1979. Upgraded to full professional rank in August, 1980. A keen golfer, he also played cricket for Havering Boys in his schooldays. Made 20 appearances in the Combination team last season.

GARTH CROOKS



(Forward)

Scored the second of our three goals against Manchester City in the replayed F.A. Cup final tie at Wembley last May. Joined Spurs from Stoke City in July, 1980, and in his first season with the club scored 16 League goals in 40 appearances. In 15 League Cup and F.A. Cup matches he scored six. Born in Stoke of Jamaican parents, and attended the local St. Peters School. Signed for Stoke as an apprentice after playing for the Stoke and Staffordshire County Boys' teams, and was upgraded to full professional in March, 1976. Made his League debut for Stoke at home to Coventry City in the following month and was given a further League game at home to Birmingham City that season. An England Under-21 player, he celebrated his first appearance at that level by scoring three goals against Bulgaria at Leicester in November, 1979.

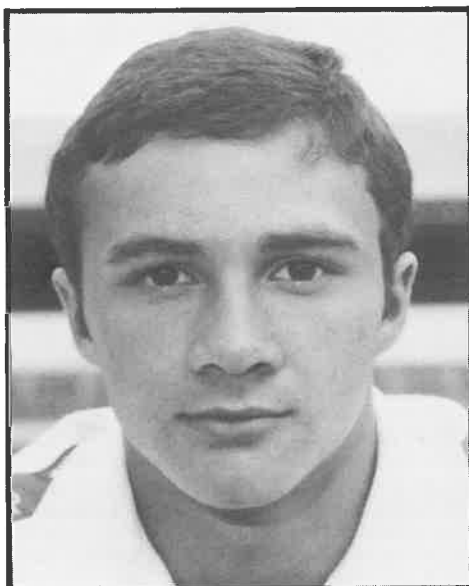
TONY GALVIN

(Midfield)

A current English international, who scored on his first full appearance against Bulgaria at Wembley in November, 1979. Can also claim 12 Under-21 appearances and two for the England "B" team. Born at Hayes in Middlesex, but attended Burnt Mill School, Harlow, and played for Harlow district and the Essex Under-15 and Under-19 teams. Signed for Spurs as an apprentice in April, 1974 and upgraded to full professional in April, 1975. Played for the England Youth team and as a schoolboy also played fly-half in the West Essex rugby team. Made his League debut for us as a substitute at home to Norwich City in August, 1975 and his appearance total now stands at 201, in the course of which he has scored 55 goals. 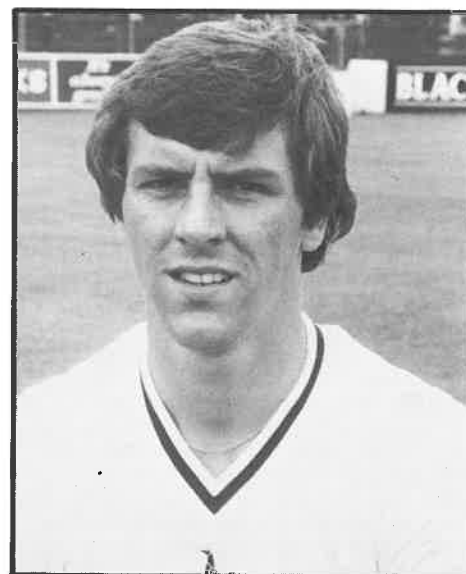
PAUL PRICE

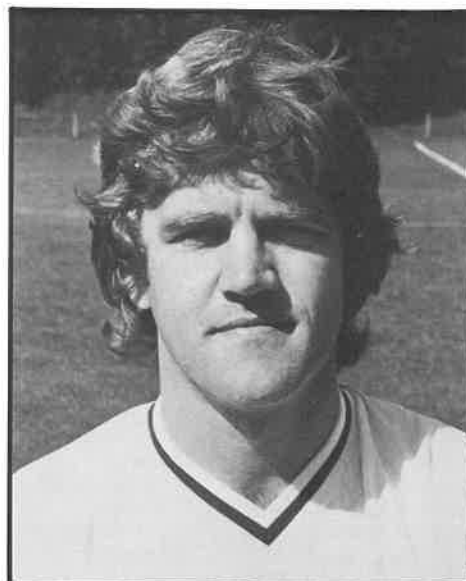
GRAHAM ROBERTS

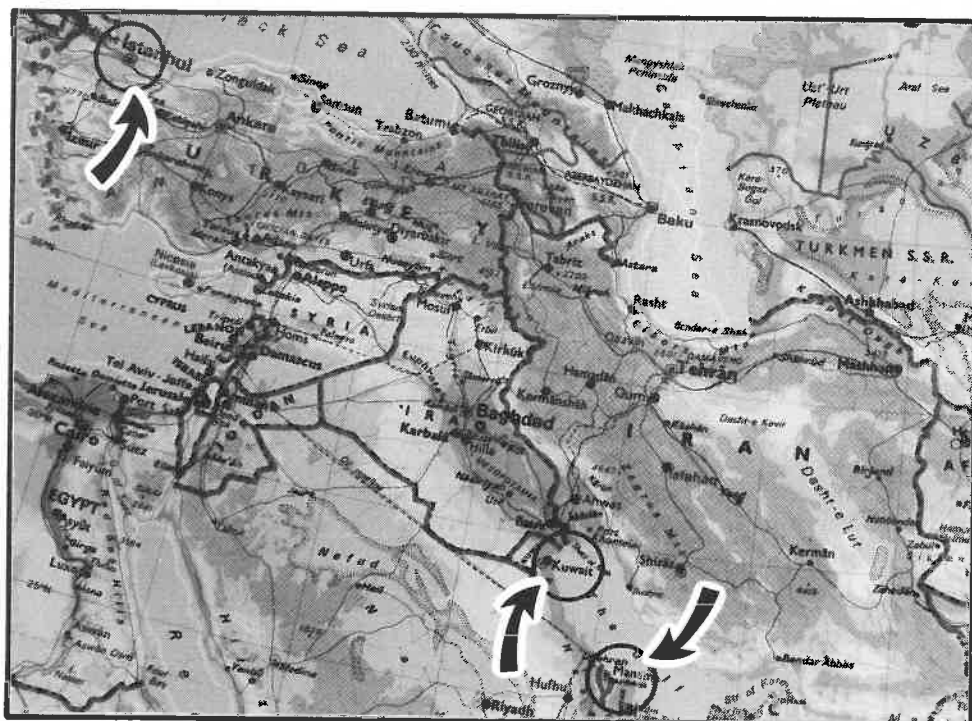

THE MATCHES ABROAD



Spurs played in Bahrain and Kuwait in May, and in June played two matches in Turkey.

The first of the tour matches was against a Bahrain Select XI at the Isa Stadium on Sunday, May 24th. Spurs had a comfortable 3-0 win, and our biggest problems were the heat and playing on astroturf, an experience that was new to some of our players.

GARRY BROOKE scored our first goal shortly before half-time, and TONY GALVIN and PAUL MILLER added to the score in the second half. Our team was Aleksic; McAllister, Miller (sub. Cooper), Roberts, Villa, Perryman

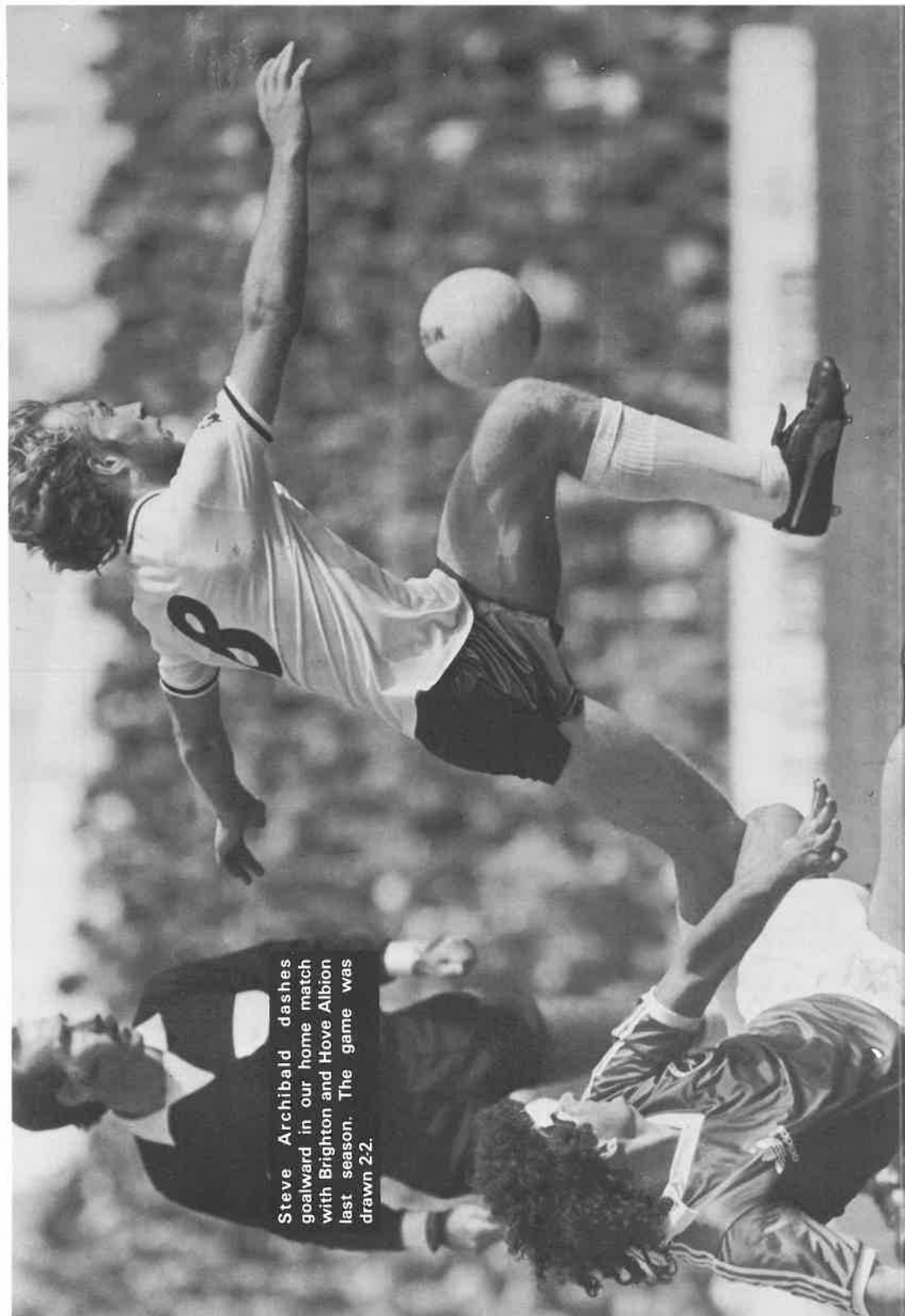

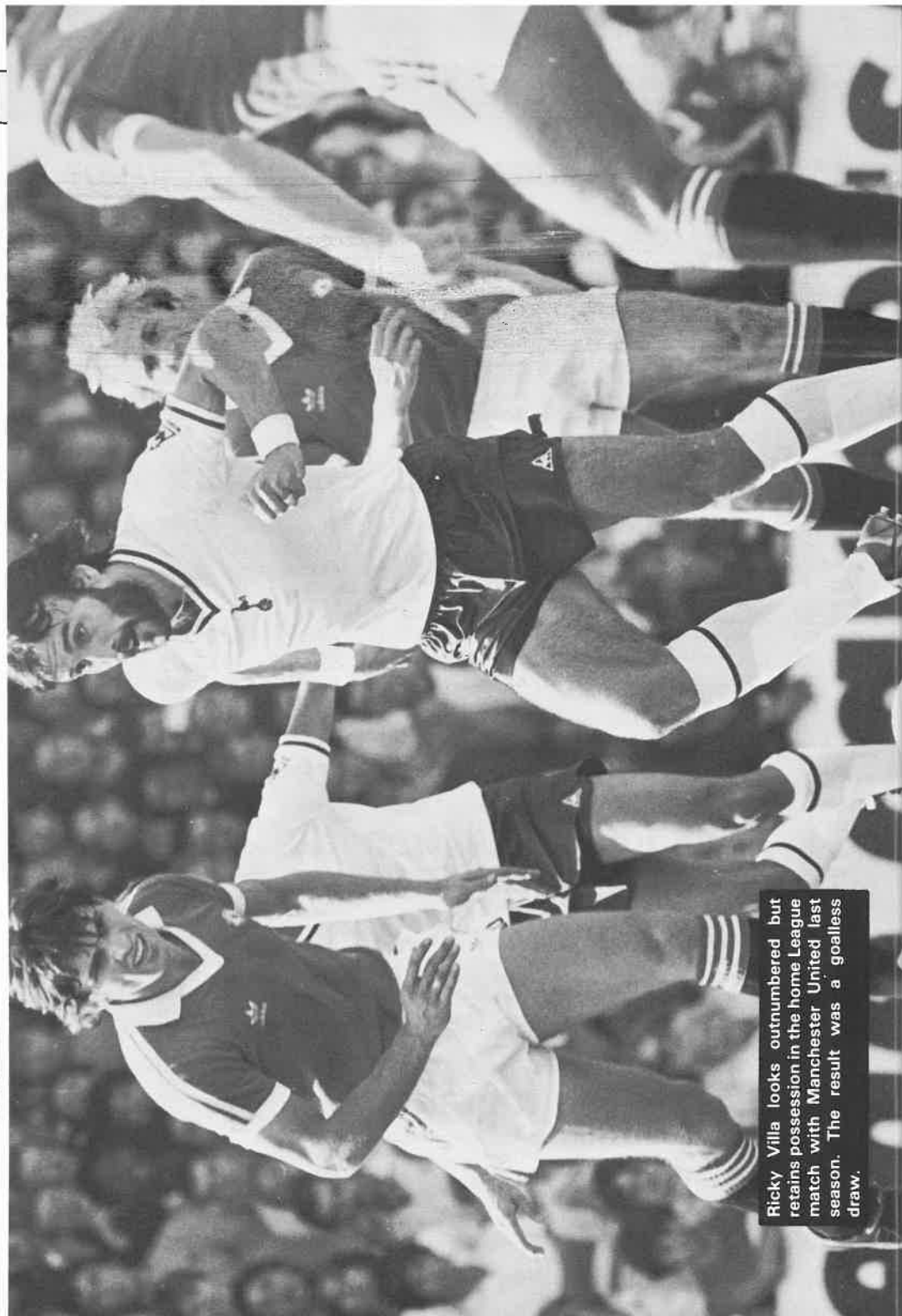

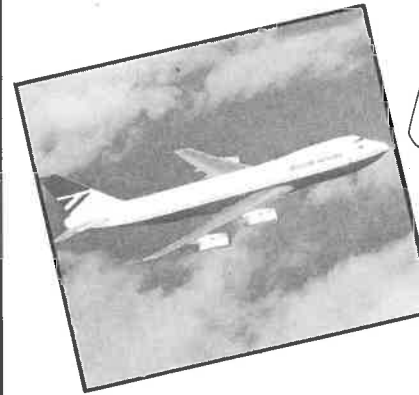

- 1882 Club formed by boys from a local cricket club and from the local Grammar School. The name of "Hotspur F.C." was adopted.
- 1883 Club reorganised under the presidency of Mr. John Ripsher. Club colours—navy blue. Matches played on Tottenham Marshes.
- 1885 First competitive match versus St. Albans in the London Association Cup, Spurs winning 5—2. Colours changed to light blue and white halves. First credit balance 9 shillings.
- 1886 First cup final. Played Caledonians in the East End Cup and lost 1—0. Club re-named "Tottenham Hotspur Athletic Club".
- 1887 First meeting with Arsenal—then Royal Arsenal. Match abandoned 15 minutes from time "owing to darkness", with Spurs leading 2—1.
- 1888 Spurs move to private ground in Northumberland Park, where the first admission charge of 3d. was made.
- 1890 Colours changed to red shirts and navy blue shorts.
- 1895 Spurs adopt professionalism.
- 1896 A record crowd of 6,000 spectators watch the friendly match with Aston Villa.
Spurs elected to the Southern League, Division 1. Club colours changed to chocolate and gold.
- 1898 The Club becomes a limited company and a match against Woolwich Arsenal attracts a record crowd of 14,000 spectators.
- 1899 Final change of colours to the now familiar white shirts and blue shorts.
The Club moves to present site, originally a market garden. Accommodation for 35,000. Ground almost named as "Gilpin Park" but instead gradually became known as "White Hart Lane". First match staged was a friendly versus Notts County—gross receipts £115.
- 1900 Success at last—Spurs become champions of the Southern League.
- 1901 Spurs win the F.A. Challenge Cup to become the only non-League club, following the formation of the Football League in 1888, ever to achieve this honour.
- 1908 Entry secured to the Second Division of the Football League.
- 1909 Promotion to First Division gained at first attempt.
- 1915 Relegation to Second Division.

- 1920 Promoted again at first attempt, this time with a still unsurpassed Second Division record of 70 points.
- 1921 Second F.A. Cup triumph, Spurs beating Wolverhampton Wanderers by 1—0 at Stamford Bridge.
- 1928 Relegation to Second Division with 38 points.
- 1933 Promotion again, this time as Division 2 runners-up.
- 1934 New East Stand completed.
- 1935 Relegation to Second Division
- 1938 The existing crowd record of 75,038 spectators was established for the visit of Sunderland in the Sixth Round of the F.A. Cup.
- 1950 Promotion to First Division.
- 1951 Football League champions for the first time.
- 1961 Football League champions and winners of the F.A. Cup. The first club to complete the "double" since Preston North End and Aston Villa did so in 1889 and 1897 respectively.
- 1962 Winners again of the F.A. Cup.
- 1963 Winners of the European Cup-Winners' Cup. The first British club to win a major European competition.
Jimmy Greaves became Spurs' highest League scorer in one season with 37 goals.
- 1967 F.A. Cup-Winners for the fifth time.
- 1971 Winners of the Football League Cup.
- 1973 Winners of the Football League Cup, the first club to have won the trophy twice.
- 1974 First English club to have played in three major European Finals.
- 1975 Pat Jennings sets a new Club record of League appearances by passing Ted Ditchburn's previous record total of 418. Jennings finished season 1976-77 with 472 League appearances and 118 in the four major cup competitions.
- 1977 Relegation to Second Division.
- 1978 Promotion again secured at first attempt.
- 1980 Old West Stand demolished to make way for new modern structure.
- 1981 F.A. Cup-Winners for the sixth time. Steve Perryman sets a new Club record of League appearances by passing Pat Jennings' previous record total of 472. Perryman finished season 1980-81 with 474 League appearances and 125 in four major cup competitions.

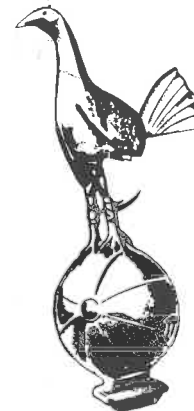
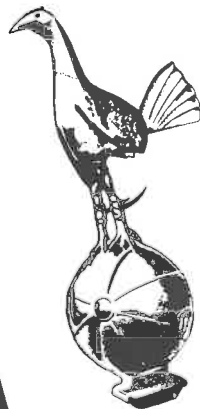

MATCHES AT CHESHUNT

Spurs' home matches in the South East Counties League are played at our training ground at Brookfield Lane, Cheshunt, usually kicking off at 11 o'clock on Saturday mornings.

Home matches in the South East Counties League, Division 2 are also played on Saturday mornings at Cheshunt.

A small brick stand offers protection in bad weather, and some seating accommodation is available. Refreshments are available in the pavilion at half-time and there is ample car-parking space.

The Cheshunt training ground is on the western side of the Great Cambridge Road, a few hundred yards north of the traffic lights at Church Lane, Cheshunt.
