FOREWORD

By SIDNEY A. WALE

Chairman

In my Foreword to last season's Handbook I expressed the hope that further distinction would come the way of Tottenham Hotspur. We had won the Football League Cup in 1970-71, and when last season opened it was natural that we should be eager for further success.

It is, therefore, with a feeling of pride that we can all look back on a season in which further distinction was, in fact, achieved.

I refer, of course, to our feat in winning the U.E.F.A.—Union of European Football Associations—Cup in the first season of its existence.

Details of our path to the Final of this competition, with goalscorers, are to be found elsewhere in this Handbook, but I feel I should make a brief reference here to the two-leg Final with Wolverhampton Wanderers, which had to be won if we were to compete in European football again this season.

It was a memorable Final. Spurs had won the first leg at Molineux by 2-1, and although the system of away goals counting double had given us a distinct advantage, we had no illusions about the nature of the task facing us in the second leg at White Hart Lane.

It is now history that we played the second leg before a near-capacity crowd on 17th May, and drew 1-1 after withstanding tremendous pressure from Wolves, especially in the second half.

The U.E.F.A. Cup was therefore ours, and the presentation

of the trophy to Alan Mullery, our captain, by Mr. Gustav Wiederkehr, President of U.E.F.A., was made in an unforgettable atmosphere of excitement and to the obvious delight of thousands of cheering supporters.

It was a moment of triumph, but in reflecting on that memorable night I feel we should spare a thought for Wolves. They had played well in both legs, and were gallant losers.

In winning the U.E.F.A. Cup, Spurs made football history. We became the first British club to have won two major European competitions. As most of our supporters will be aware, we had won the European Cup-Winners' Cup in 1963.

We also preserved our proud record of winning every major Cup Final in which we have competed.

Our success in winning the League Cup in the previous season qualified Spurs to meet Torino in the Anglo-Italian League Cup-Winners' Cup. The home and away matches with the Italian club were played in September, and Spurs were winners by an aggregate score of 3—0.

The matches were played at a busy time of the season, but there was a lot of satisfaction for everyone connected with the club that a Cup had been won at such an early stage of the campaign.

It is also worthy of note that in winning both the Anglo-Italian League Cup-Winners' and U.E.F.A. Cups, Spurs did not lose a match. Of the 12 U.E.F.A. Cup matches played, eight were won and four drawn with a goal record of 30 scored and only six conceded, while Torino were beaten in both legs.

In the First Division of the Football League we finished in sixth position last season, three places lower but with only a point less than we obtained in the previous campaign. League football is the bread and butter of the game, and we are always conscious of the necessity to do well.

At one stage of the season it seemed we might finish higher up the ladder, but a measure of inconsistency, and the obvious strain of the many matches played, were factors that told against us.

In the light of the heavy match programme we were called upon to fulfil, our final position of sixth was by no means unsatisfactory.

As holders of the League Cup, we came close to another Wembley appearance in that competition. We missed our way at Stamford Bridge in the first leg of the Semi-final, when Chelsea came back to win 3—2 after Spurs had held a 2—1 lead.

By holding us to a 2—2 draw at White Hart Lane in the second leg, Chelsea were Wembley-bound instead of Spurs.

By the time we turned our attentions to the F.A. Cup in January, we had already played 15 matches in other Cup competitions.

It was another trial and another challenge. For the second year in succession we reached the Sixth Round, and were then only beaten by an odd goal in the away match with Leeds United, the eventual winners of the trophy, who were playing at the peak of their form.

When consideration is given to the fact that Spurs played no less than 70 matches, including the two pre-season fixtures away to Hearts and Glasgow Rangers, it is to the credit of the players and management that two trophies were won, and such a good performance put up in League, League Cup and F.A. Cup.

The Reserve team also deserve congratulations. They won the Football Combination championship in convincing fashion. When the final table was made up, Spurs were 15 points in front of the runners-up, and had lost only two matches throughout the season.

I feel the Youth team players also earn a measure of praise. They finished runners-up in the South-East Counties League, Division 1, and for the second year running finished winners of the International Youth Tournament staged by the Feijenoord Club of Rotterdam in May.

So much for performance in the Club sense. On the individual front I am happy to congratulate Alan Mullery, Martin Chivers, Martin Peters, Mike England, Pat Jennings and Joe Kinnear, all of whom have added to their already impressive list of international appearances since the last Handbook was published.

Since last season ended another Spurs player has forced his way into the international limelight. I refer to Steve Perryman, who played for the England Under-23 team in each of the three tour matches this summer. May many more honours come Steve's way.

International honours were also achieved by John Field, our

Youth team player, who was selected for the England amateur Youth team, and also captained the side.

Football is essentially a team game, but I feel special mention must be made of the splendid goalscoring record last season of Martin Chivers.

He finished top scorer for the second season in succession with no less than 44 goals in League and Cup matches.

The departure of familiar faces is inevitable in football, and this summer, Alan Mullery, Tony Want, David Jenkins, John Cutbush, Roy Woolcott and Les Boughey have all left the service of Spurs. To each of them we extend our best wishes for success in their new colours.

After such an exhausting season in 1971-72, it was decided to limit our touring activities this summer. The only match played was against the Maccabi Club in Tel Aviv. Maccabi, Israeli League champions, included a number of full and Under-23 internationals, but Spurs won the match 3-2, Martin Peters, Jimmy Pearce and Alan Gilzean scoring our goals.

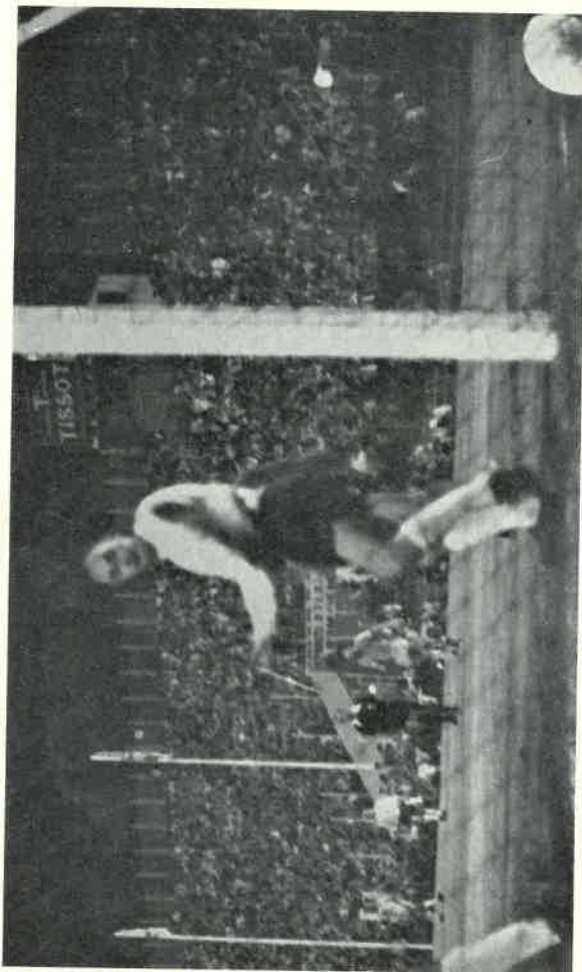
Our return to European competition last season was a great stimulant, and our success in carrying off the U.E.F.A. Cup was ample compensation for the regrettable incidents that occurred in the tie with Rapid Bucarest, particularly in the second leg in Rumania.

Apart from the prestige gained by winning the trophy, the financial rewards were substantial, and it is an inescapable economic fact that for a club such as ours, success in a major competition is now essential.

The strength of the team is our prime concern, but as a club we are also mindful of the necessity to maintain off-field facilities and spectator comforts at the highest possible level.

The additional ball court and gymnasium was not completed in time to be used last season, but will be fully operational during 1972-73. New floodlighting has been installed this close season at a cost of £26,000, and we hope work will commence next summer on the linking-up of the West and South Stands, thus providing an additional 700 seats.

It only remains for me to thank all who supported the Club last season, especially those who travelled to away matches either in this country or abroad, and to express the hope that even more success may come the way of Spurs in season 1972-73.

INTERNATIONAL YOUTH TOURNAMENT MAY 1972

FOR the second year in succession Spurs were winners of the International Youth Tournament staged by the Feijenoord club of Rotterdam.

Our party left Liverpool Street Station on the morning of 11th May for Harwich, travelling by sea to the Hook of Holland. It was a pleasant trip on a calm sea, and on arrival in Holland, we were met by two officials of the Feijenoord club, and were conveyed by road to Rotterdam in time to watch the Dutch Cup Final between Ajax and A.D.O. The Hague.

The youth tournament was split into two groups. The other clubs in our own group were Feijenoord, the host club, and P.S.V. Eindhoven, both of Holland, and Hvidovre from Denmark.

The other group comprised Arsenal, Beerschot of Belgium, and the Dutch clubs Ajax and Sparta.

Spurs' first match was against Feijenoord on the evening of 12th May, and we were off to a bad start. After only five minutes' play we conceded a goal following a deflected free-kick which flashed into the net off the inside of a post, giving Terry Lee no chance.

Conditions were wet, and the ball was not easy to control. Spurs settled down well after this early reverse, however, and although we were still a goal down at half-time, we had begun to exert a grip on the game.

In the second half we were the dominant team, but it was not until about seven minutes from the end that Danny Clapton equalised with a header. Ray Clarke then missed a chance to win the match, but in view of the early goal scored by Feijenoord, we had no complaints over the final score.

Spurs' team for this opening match was: Lee; Boughey, Jones, E., Dillon, Peck, Souness, McGrath, Margerrison, Osgood, Clarke and Clapton.

The following day, Saturday, 13th May, our match with Hvidovre was advanced to the morning. Unlike our experience of the previous evening, it was an early goal to Spurs that opened the scoring.

Mike Dillon headed a beautiful goal in the opening minute, but it was not until the second half that we added to our score with a superb goal by Graeme Souness, who chested down a cross before volleying the ball home. A third Spurs goal quickly followed from Clarke, who headed in a rebound from Gary Mabee's shot that had hit the crossbar.

Just before the end Eddie Jones hammered an unstoppable shot into Hvidovre's net to leave Spurs winners by 4—0. Our team in this match was: Lee; Boughey, Jones, E., Osgood, Peck, Souness, McGrath, Dillon, Mabee, Clarke and Jones, C.

By this time it was evident that the winners of our group would come from either Spurs or Feijenoord, and as the latter had defeated P.S.V. Eindhoven by 1—0 only, our own position was strong.

Our next match, against P.S.V. Eindhoven, was played in the afternoon of 13th May, and as there had been a marked deterioration in the weather, the game was switched from the main stadium to an outside pitch which was in excellent condition.

The only change in our team from the line-up against Hvidovre was Clapton for Mabee in the No. 9 shirt.

Chris Jones headed us into an early lead, and this goal was quickly followed by a second from Souness, who beat four players in a mazy dribble before shooting past the goalkeeper. A third from Chris Jones enabled Spurs to cross over with a 3—0 lead, and a second-half goal by Eddie Jones gave us another 4—0 win.

As Feijenoord had only drawn 1—1 with Hvidovre, Spurs were now in the final. Arsenal had finished at the head of their group, and we therefore had a North London "derby" in Rotterdam!

The Final was played on Sunday, 14th May, and as the rain had ceased the match was staged on the main Feijenoord pitch.

As this game followed the First Division League fixture between Feijenoord and Excelsior, it was watched by a big crowd, and the setting and atmosphere were in keeping with the occasion.

The previous matches had been of 50 minutes' duration, but for the Final the period was extended to 30 minutes for each half.

Spurs missed two good chances in the early play, but we took the lead when Dillon headed in from a corner by Souness halfway through the first half. Only three brilliant saves by Graham Horn, Arsenal's goalkeeper, limited us to a single-goal lead at half-time.

Arsenal played with greater spirit in the second half, but the issue was settled by another excellent header by Dillon, and Spurs were good value for a 2—0 win. Our team for this match was the same as against P.S.V. Eindhoven, except that Clarke suffered a recurrence of a back injury and was replaced in the 35th minute by Mabee.

Our team, who had been quartered in a Naval Cadet School in Rotterdam, were popular winners, and had looked favourites for the trophy from the opening match.

On Monday, 15th May, Dillon and Souness left on the first stage of their journey to Canada to spend the summer weeks playing for Montreal Olympic, and the remainder of our party moved on to Amsterdam for a well-earned rest.

The return journey, again by sea via the Hook of Holland and Harwich, began on the evening of 16th May, enabling our officials and players to be back in good time to see our senior team win the U.E.F.A. Cup against Wolverhampton Wanderers at White Hart Lane the following night.

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PLAYING STAFF

Season 1972-73



BEAL, Philip (defender). 5 ft. 9½ in.

The longest-serving player on Spurs' books. Born at Godstone, Surrey, and signed as an amateur in May, 1960. Upgraded to full professional status from apprentice rank in January, 1962. Won County honours with Surrey Boys in his schooldays, and Youth honours for England in season 1962-63. Made his League debut away to Aston Villa in September, 1963.

CHIVERS, Martin (forward). 6 ft. 1 in.

Now an established member of the England team. Born at Southampton, and played for Southampton and Hampshire Boys. Turned professional with Southampton, and made his League debut in the Second Division in season 1962-63. Left Southampton for Spurs in January, 1968, and scored the winning goal in his debut on Sheffield Wednesday's ground a few days later. Finished last season with 44 goals in League and all Cup competitions.



CLAPTON, Daniel (forward). 5 ft. 10 in.

Born in Hackney, and attended Morpeth School. Played for East London, London, Middlesex and England Boys' teams. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in May, 1970 and was upgraded to full professional last February. Played regularly in the Youth team last season, and made one appearance in the Combination side. A nephew of the former England and Arsenal outside-right of the same name.

CLARKE, Raymond (forward). 5 ft. 11½ in.

Finished top scorer in the Combination team last season with 19 goals. Born at Hackney, and attended the Central Foundation School, Finsbury. Played for London, Middlesex and Islington Schools, and was an England trialist. Signed for Spurs as an apprentice professional in May, 1968, and became a full pro. in October, 1969. Played for the England Youth team during season 1970-71.



COATES, Ralph (forward). 5 ft. 7 in.

Joined Spurs from Burnley in May, 1971, and made 32 League appearances last season. Born at Hetton-le-Hole, County Durham, and was playing as a striker for Eppleton Colliery Welfare Juniors before Burnley offered him a trial. Signed as an apprentice for Burnley, became a full professional and made his First Division debut in 1964. Made eight appearances in the Under-23s, and has played four times for the full England team.

COLLINS, Peter (defender). 6 ft. 1 in.

Joined Spurs from Chelmsford City, the Southern League club, in January, 1968. Comes from Chelmsford, and attended the local Westlands Junior and Moulsham Secondary Schools. Spotted by Chelmsford while playing for Crompton Parkinson Youth team, and had previously played for Chelmsford Boys. Made his senior debut for Spurs against Glasgow Rangers in July, 1968, scoring two goals. Made his League debut, at home to Arsenal, 10 days later.



DAINES, Barry (goalkeeper). 5 ft. 11 in.

Born at Witham in Essex, and still lives there. Played for Chelmsford, Mid-Essex and Essex County Boys before joining Spurs as an apprentice in July, 1968. Upgraded to full professional rank in September, 1969, and gained two England Youth International caps in season 1969-70. His only appearance in Spurs' League team to date was at home to West Bromwich Albion last season.

DILLON, Michael (defender). 5 ft. 11 in.

Born in Highgate and attended Holloway School. A Schoolboy International, who also played for Islington, London and Middlesex Boys' teams. Became an apprentice with Spurs in May, 1968, and was upgraded to full professional in December, 1969. A former England Youth international, who held a regular place in our Combination team last season. Has spent most of this summer playing for Montreal Olympic in the North American League.





ENGLAND, Michael (defender). 6 ft. 1½ in.

Made a successful return to the team last season after missing half of 1970-71 through a broken ankle sustained in the League Cup Semi-final against Bristol City. Born at Greenfield, near Holywell, in North Wales. Was an inside-forward at school in Holywell, and joined Blackburn Rovers as a 15-year-old ground-staff boy. Filled various positions before settling at centre-half. Joined Spurs from Blackburn in August, 1966, in time to make his debut in the opening match of the season at home to Leeds United. Has made many appearances for Wales, including all three home internationals at the end of last season.

EVANS, Raymond (defender). 5 ft. 9¼ in.

His total last season of 37 League and Cup appearances was his best to date. A product of Edmonton Schools football, who first signed for Spurs as an apprentice professional in July, 1965. Became a full professional in May, 1967. Played for the England Youth team on several occasions in season 1967-68. Made his League debut away to Arsenal in March, 1969.



GILZEAN, Alan (forward). 5 ft. 11 in.

Notched 22 goals in League and Cup matches last season, and was voted "Player of the Year" by the Spurs Supporters Club of Norway. Comes from Coupar Angus in Perthshire, and joined Spurs from Dundee in December, 1964. Dundee had spotted him playing for Coupar Angus Juveniles. Gained his first cap for Scotland against Norway in season 1962-63, and has since made many more appearances for his country. Missed only four League matches last season.

HOLDER, Philip (midfield). 5 ft. 4 in.

Made his First-team debut last season. Born at Kilburn and attended the local Percy Secondary Modern School. Spotted while playing for the Brent District Boys team. Signed as an apprentice in April, 1967, and as a full professional in February, 1969. Played in the same Middlesex Boys team as Steve Perryman. Gained England Youth honours during season 1969-70.



JENNINGS, Patrick (goalkeeper). 5 ft. 11½ in.

An automatic selection for Northern Ireland, and now generally accepted as one of the finest goalkeepers in the world. Joined Spurs from Watford in June, 1964, and has been first choice for the position for the last six seasons. Born at Newry, and spent half a season with the Newry Town club. Selection for the Irish Youth team in a tournament at Bognor Regis brought him to the notice of Watford. Won his first full cap for Northern Ireland against Wales at Swansea in April, 1964, when he was 18.

JONES, Edward (defender). 5 ft. 8 in.

Made his Combination debut last season, and went on to complete 23 full appearances. Born at Finchley, but attended Belmont School, Tottenham, and Huxley School, Edmonton. Played for Edmonton Boys and was a Middlesex Schools trialist. After leaving school he signed as an amateur for Spurs, and played in the team that won the F.A. Youth Cup in May, 1970. Before signing as a professional in October, 1970, he worked for two years as a carpenter.



KINNEER, Joseph (defender). 5 ft. 7½ in.

Born in Dublin, but lived in Watford from the age of seven. Joined Spurs as an amateur in August, 1963 after playing for St. Albans City, and signed as a professional in February, 1965. Made his League debut at home to West Ham United in April, 1966. Gained his first full cap for Eire against Turkey in season 1966-67, and has since made several more international appearances.

KNOWLES, Cyril (defender). 6 ft.

A Yorkshireman from Fitzwilliam, three miles from Pontefract. After playing for the South Emsall District Boys' team, he spent a season with Manchester United, but returned home to play for the local Hemsworth club. Then had a spell in Wolverhampton's nursery before turning professional with Middlesbrough. Transferred from Middlesbrough to Spurs in May, 1964. Has played for the full England team, the Under-23s and the Football League.





LEE, Terry (goalkeeper). 5 ft. 11 in.

Made his Football Combination debut last season, and finished with 18 appearances to his credit. Born at Stepney, but emigrated to New Zealand in 1964. Played at inside-forward for North Island versus South Island in a Schoolboy international trial while living in the Auckland district. Returned to Essex, and signed for Spurs as an apprentice professional in April, 1968. Has been a full professional since May, 1970.

MABEE, Gary (forward). 5 ft. 10 in.

Born at Oxford and attended the local Redefield School. Played for both Oxford and Oxfordshire County Boys before signing as an apprentice for Spurs in July, 1970. Comes from Belfast, where he attended the Dunlambert Secondary School. Captained the South Belfast and Northern Ireland Boys' teams. MORGAN, Roger (forward). 5 ft. 8 $\frac{3}{4}$ in.

Returned to the First Team last season after sustaining a serious knee injury early in the previous campaign. Born in London, and made his name, with his twin brother Ian, in the Queen's Park Rangers team. Joined Spurs from Rangers in February, 1969. NAYLOR, Terence (defender). 5 ft. 10 in.

Born at Islington and played for Islington Boys. Trained for a while with Arsenal and also had a brief association with Millwall before joining Spurs on trial. After service as an amateur, signed professional forms in July, 1969. Made his League debut at West Bromwich at Easter, 1970. Finished last season with 16 full appearances in League and Cup matches to his credit.

NEIGHBOUR, James (forward). 5 ft. 7 in.

Born in Chingford, where he attended Heathcote Secondary School. Played for Waltham Forest, Essex and London Boys' teams. Signed as an apprentice for Spurs in April, 1966, and became a full professional in November, 1968. Was a member of our Football League Cup-winning team against Aston Villa in 1971. Last season made 19 full appearances in League and Cup matches.



OSGOOD, Keith (defender). 5 ft. 11 in.

A former English Schoolboy international, who also played for London and Hounslow Boys. Born at Isleworth and attended Syon School. Signed for Spurs as an apprentice in June, 1971, and has been upgraded to full professional this summer. Played regularly in the Youth team last season, and made one Combination appearance.

PEARCE, James (forward). 5 ft. 9 in.

A local Tottenham boy, who made his mark in Schools football, and played in the England Boys' team. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in May, 1963, and became a full professional two years later. PETERS, Martin (midfield). 5 ft. 11¼ in.

Signed from West Ham United in March, 1970. Born at Plaistow, but attended Fanshawe School in Dagenham, and played for Dagenham Boys. Graduated to Schoolboy international rank, and also played for London and Essex. Made his League debut for West Ham in 1962, and his first appearance for Spurs in the home match against Coventry City a few days after joining the Club. Has an impressive international record, and was a member of England's World Cup teams in 1966 and 1970. His last appearance for England was as substitute against Northern Ireland in May of this year. Has captained England.

PRATT, John (midfield). 5 ft. 7¾ in.

Born at Hackney and attended Clark's College, Enfield. Played for the London F.A. Boys' team, and spent a year in Brentford's Youth side. Joined Spurs as an amateur after a recommendation by Terry Medwin, our former winger. Signed as a full professional in November, 1965, and made his League debut away to Arsenal in March, 1969. Keen on both cricket and table tennis.



SOUNESS, Graeme (midfield). 5 ft. 10 in.

Born in Edinburgh, and attended the same school, Carrickvale, as Dave Mackay, our former skipper. Played for Edinburgh Boys, and was a Scottish Schoolboy international. Signed as an apprentice for Spurs in April, 1969, and became a full professional in May, 1970. A Scottish Youth international, he played regularly in the Combination team last season. Has spent most of this summer playing for Montreal Olympic in the North American League with Mike Dillon.

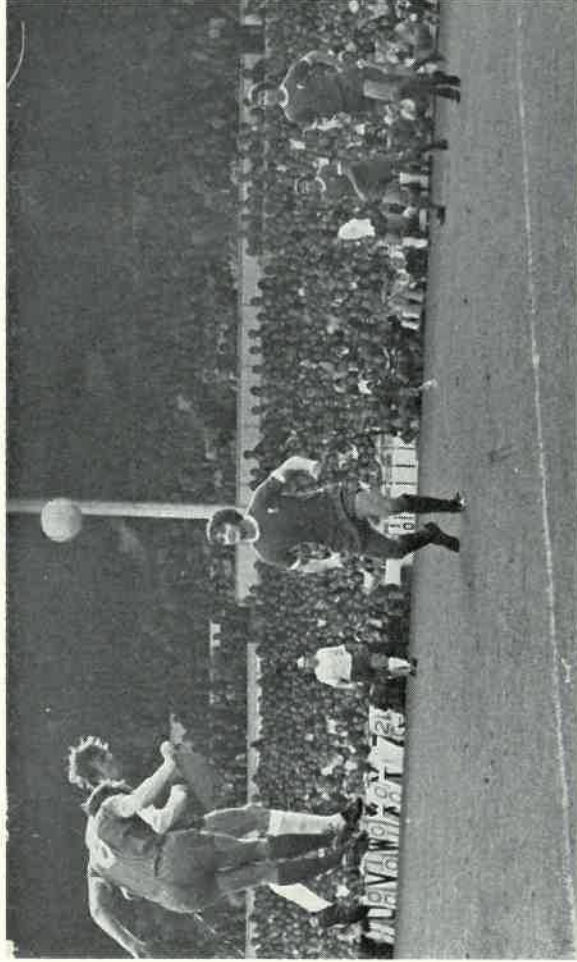

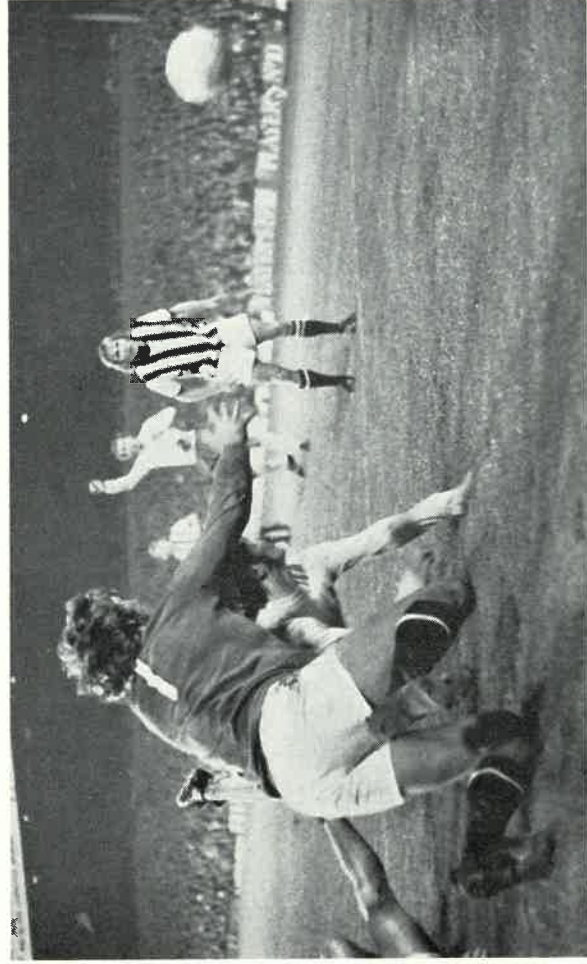

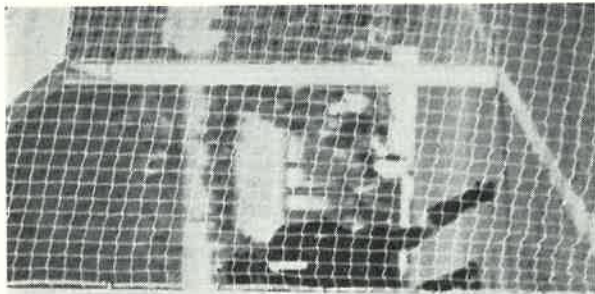
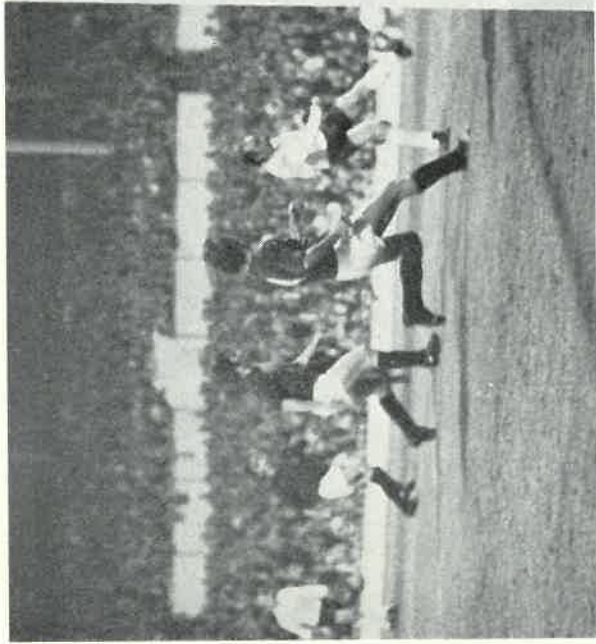
Cyril Knowles crosses the ball from the far touchline for Martin Peters to head Spurs' second goal in the home match with Liverpool.

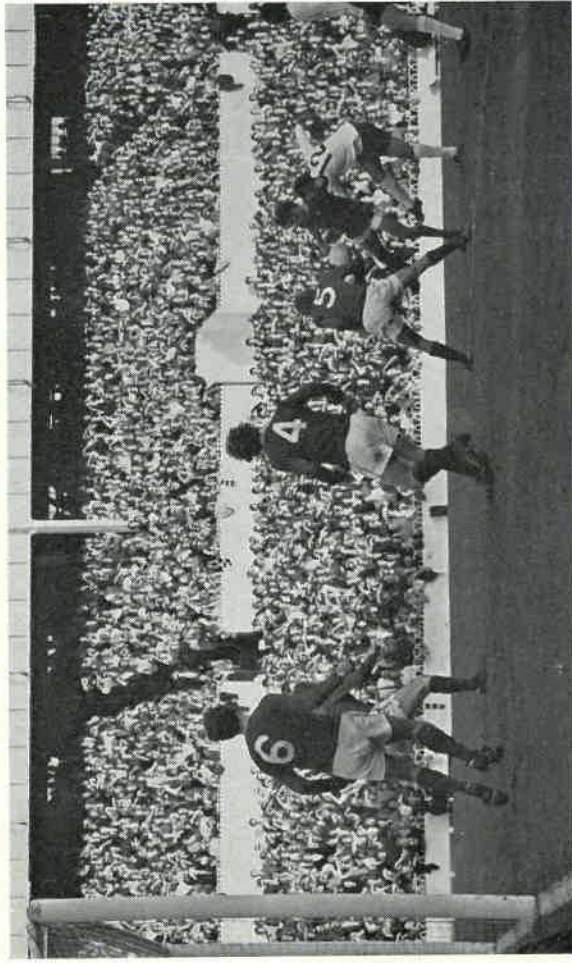

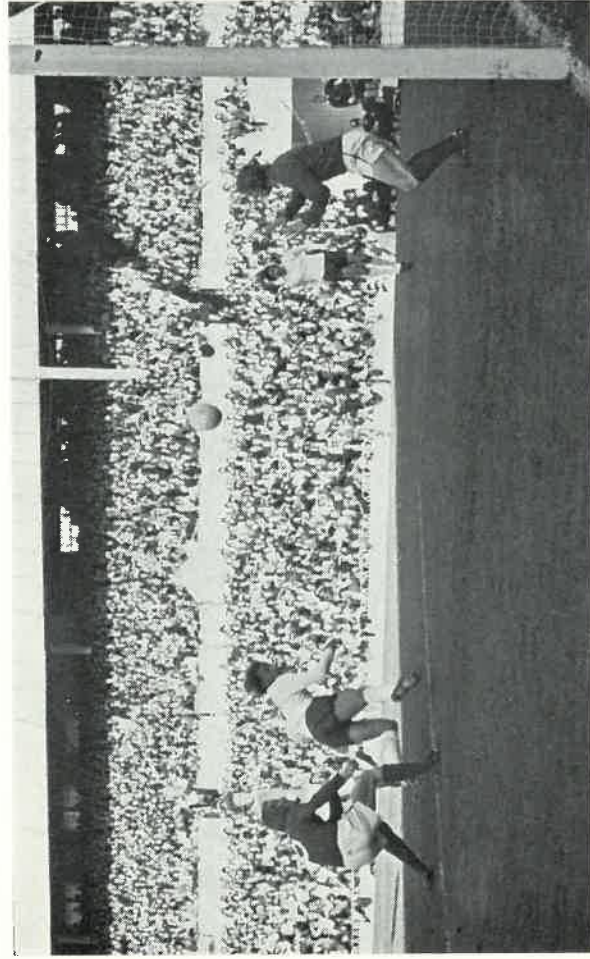

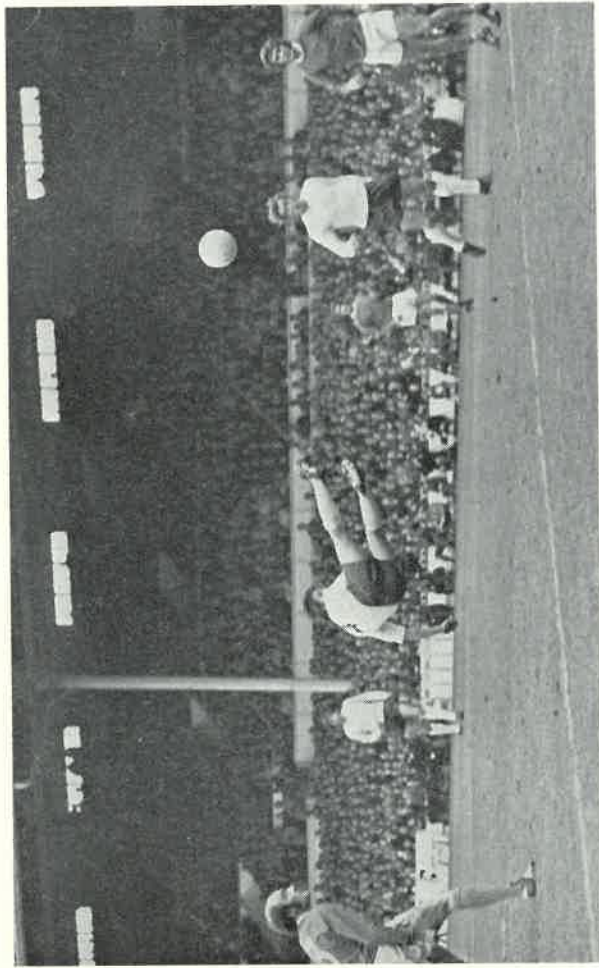

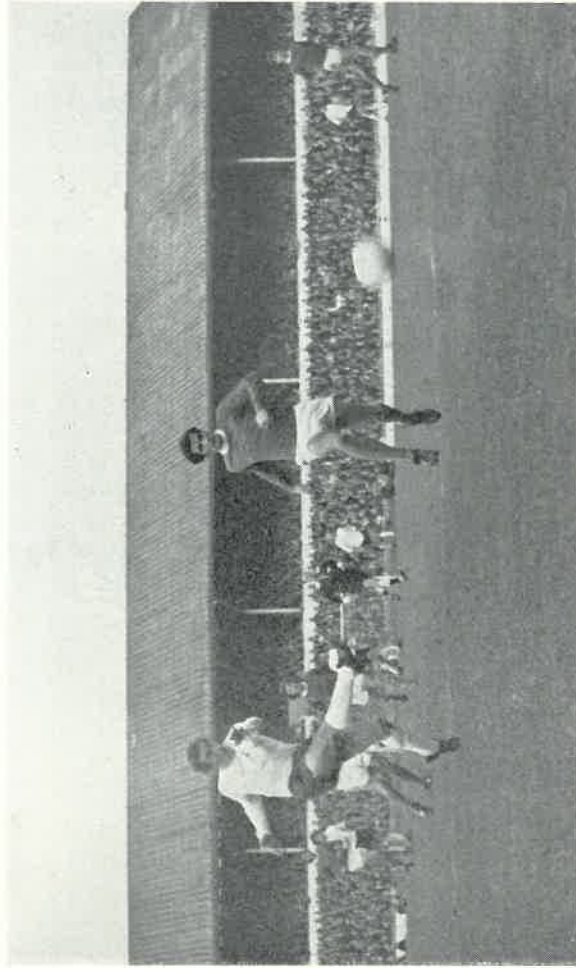


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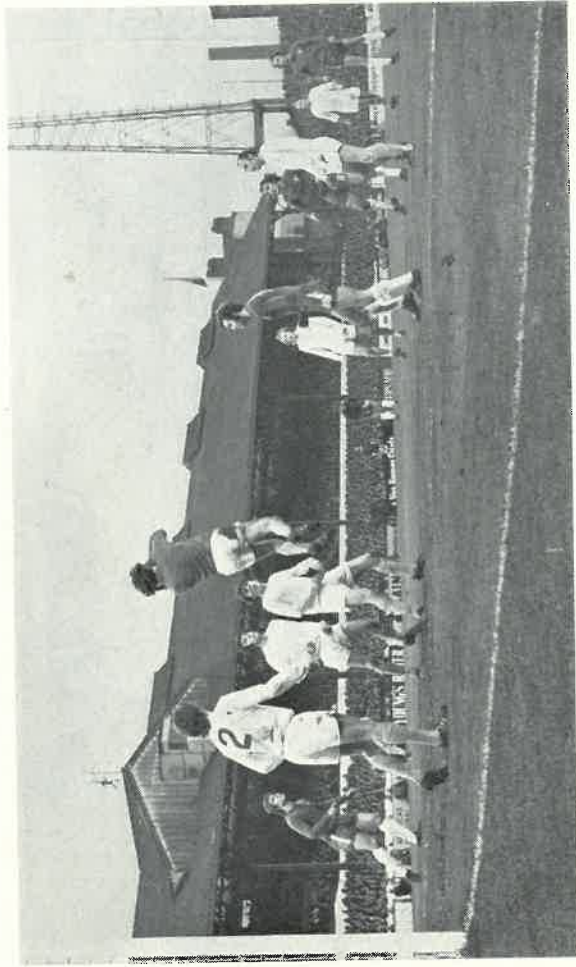

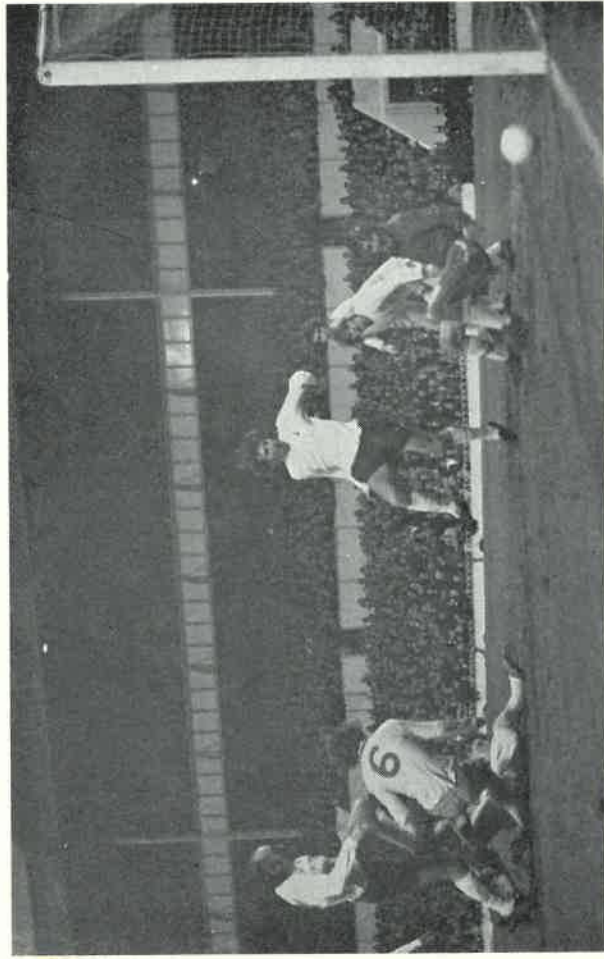
John Pratt appears to be defying all the laws of gravity as he heads Spurs' first goal in the home match with Everton.

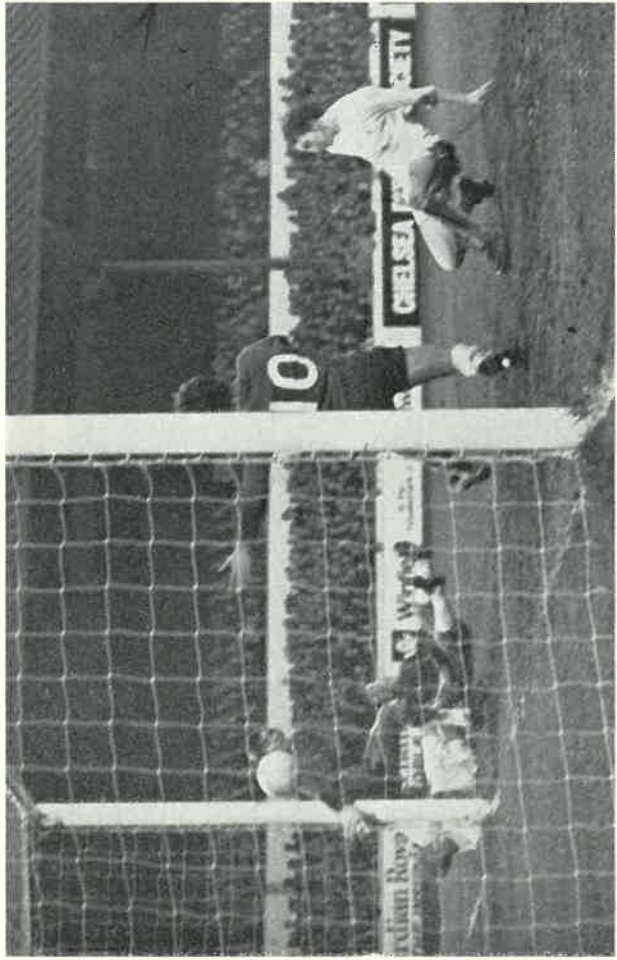

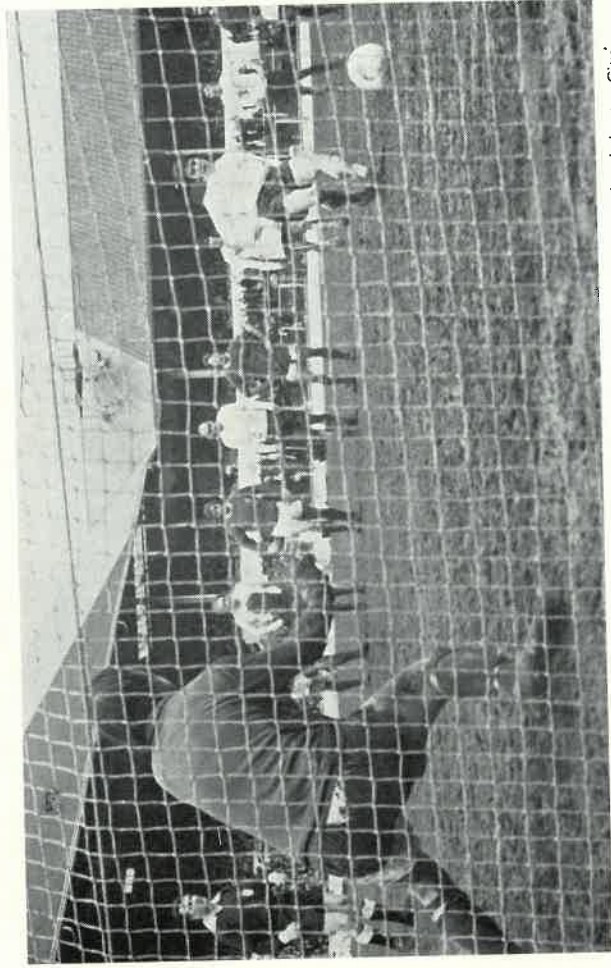

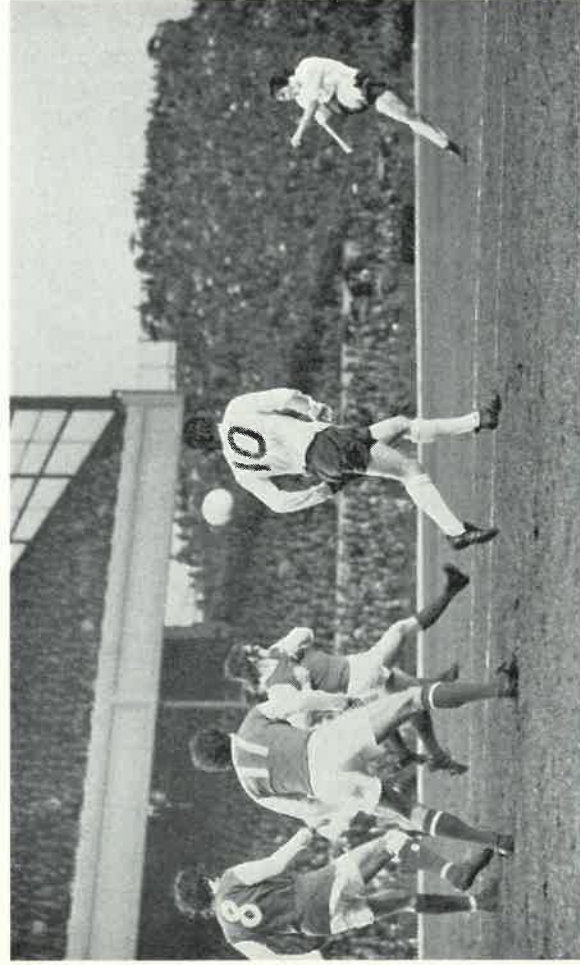

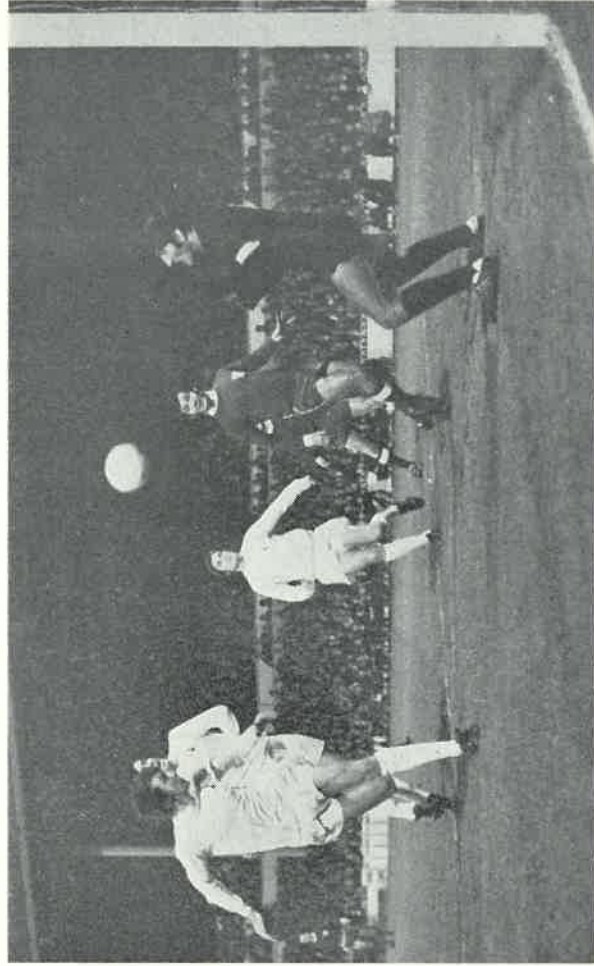

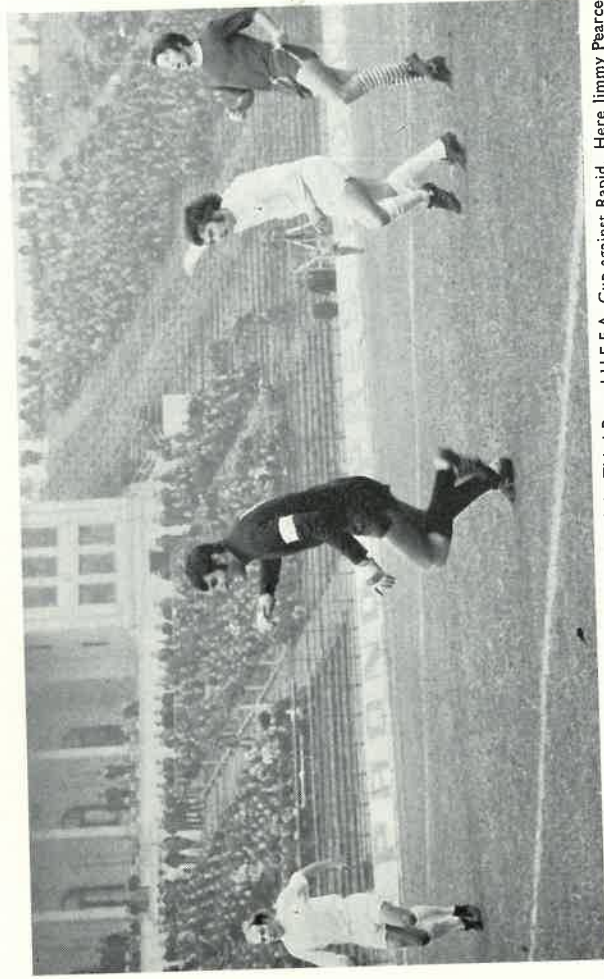

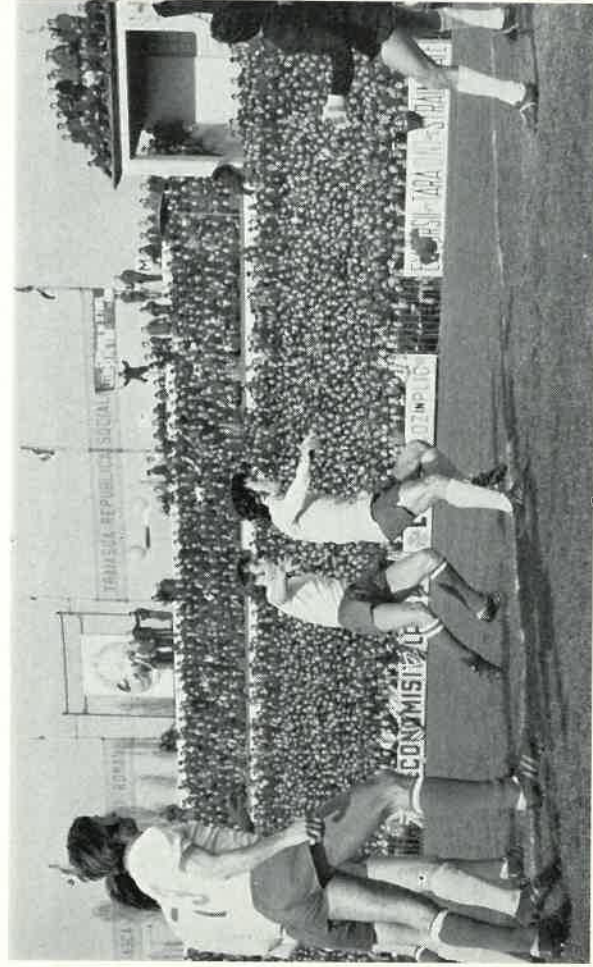

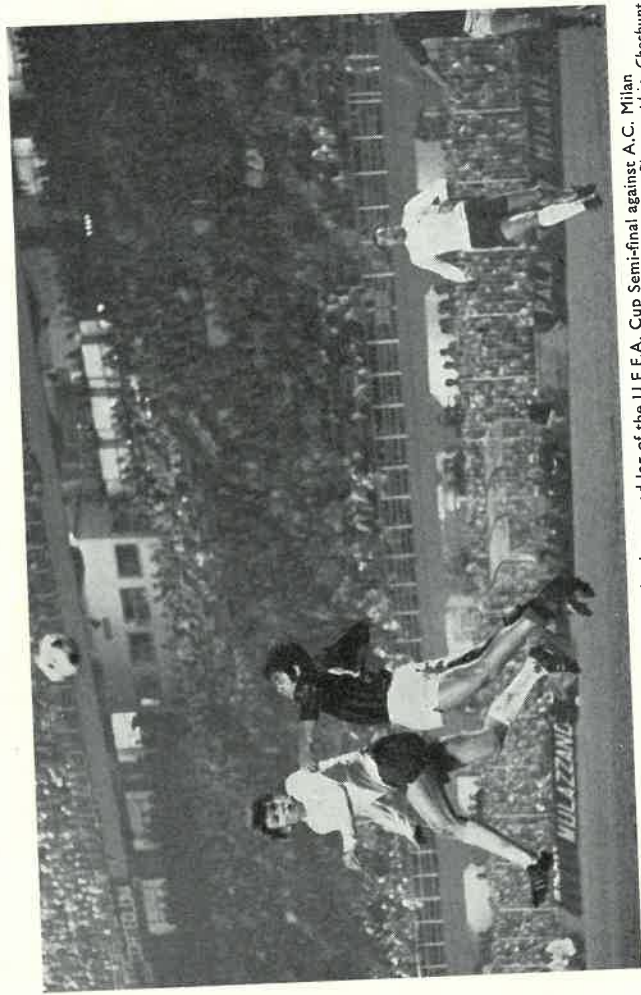

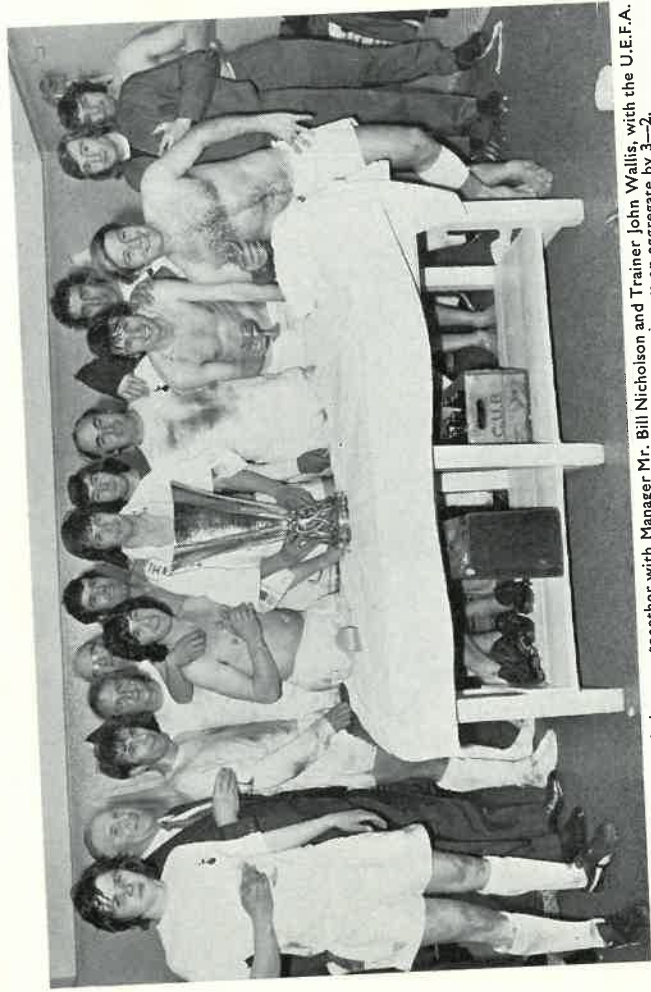

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TOTTENHAM HOT-SPOTS

- 1882 Club formed by boys from a local cricket club and from the local Grammar School. The name of "Hotspur F.C." was adopted.
- 1883 Club reorganised under the presidency of Mr. John Ripsher. Club colours—navy blue. Matches played on Tottenham Marshes.
- 1885 First competitive match versus St. Albans in the London Association Cup, Spurs winning 5—2. Colours changed to light blue and white halves. First credit balance—9s.
- 1886 First cup final. Played Caledonians in the East End Cup and lost 1—0. Club re-named "Tottenham Hotspur Athletic Club".
- 1887 First meeting with Arsenal—then Royal Arsenal. Match abandoned 15 minutes from time "owing to darkness", with Spurs leading 2—1.
- 1888 Spurs move to private ground in Northumberland Park, where the first admission charge of 3d. was made.
- 1890 Colours changed to red shirts and navy blue shorts.
- 1895 Spurs adopt professionalism.
- 1896 A record crowd of 6,000 spectators watch the friendly match against Aston Villa. Spurs elected to the Southern League, Division 1, and finish in fourth place. Club colours changed to chocolate and gold.
- 1898 The Club becomes a limited company and a match against Woolwich Arsenal attracts a record crowd of 14,000 spectators.
- 1899 Final change of colours to the now familiar white shirts and blue shorts. The Club moves to present site, originally a market garden. Accommodation for 35,000. Ground almost named as "Gilpin Park" but instead gradually became known as "White Hart Lane". First match staged was a friendly versus Notts County—gross receipts £115.

- 1900 Success at last—Spurs become champions of the Southern League.
- 1901 Spurs win the F.A. Challenge Cup to become the only non-League club, following the formation of the Football League in 1888, ever to achieve this honour.
- 1908 Entry secured to the Second Division of the Football League.
- 1909 Promotion to Division 1 gained at first attempt.
- 1915 Relegation to Division 2.
- 1920 Promoted again at first attempt, this time with a still unsurpassed Second Division record of 70 points.
- 1921 Second F.A. Cup triumph, Spurs beating Wolverhampton Wanderers by 1—0 at Stamford Bridge.
- 1928 Relegation to Second Division with 38 points.
- 1933 Promotion again, this time as Division 2 runners-up.
- 1934 New East Stand completed.
- 1935 Relegation to Second Division.
- 1938 The existing crowd record of 75,038 spectators was established for the visit of Sunderland in the Sixth Round of the F.A. Cup.
- 1950 Promotion to Division 1.
- 1951 Football League champions for the first time.
- 1959 Ted Ditchburn completes 452 League and F.A. Cup appearances, a Club record, between 1946 and 1959.
- 1961 Football League champions and winners of the F.A. Cup. The first club to complete the "double" since Preston North End and Aston Villa did so in 1889 and 1897 respectively.
- 1962 Winners again of the F.A. Cup.
- 1963 Winners of the European Cup-Winners' Cup. The first British club to win a major European competition. Jimmy Greaves becomes Spurs' highest League goal-scorer in one season with 37 goals.
- 1967 F.A. Cup-Winners for the fifth time.
- 1971 Winners of the Football League Cup.
- 1972 Winners of the U.E.F.A. Cup in its first season and the first British club to have won two different major European competitions. Another record created, when gross receipts amounted to £48,360 in the home leg of the U.E.F.A. Cup Final against Wolverhampton Wanderers.

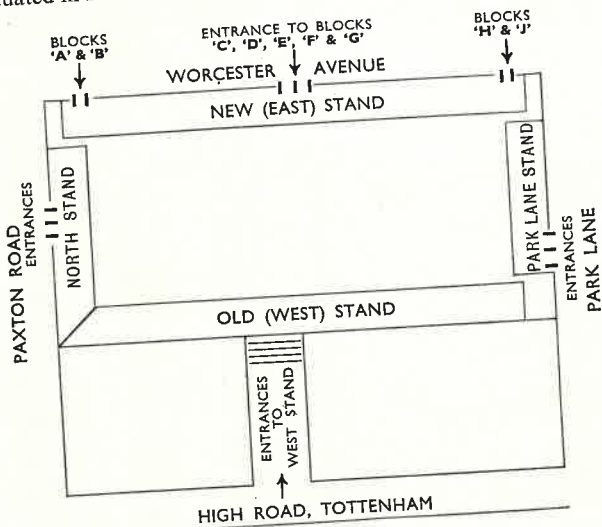
