Foreword

IN last season's Handbook I concluded my Foreword on an optimistic note. I expressed the belief that the Club would climb back into the limelight.

Certainly, a good measure of progress has been made, and many people have commented to me that Spurs enjoyed a much better season in 1975-76.

As the record shows, we finished in ninth position in the First Division, and it is gratifying that we should have commanded a final placing in the top half of the table.

Looking at the situation realistically, however, we could scarcely have done worse than in season 1974-75, and we look to the playing staff for even greater effort in the struggle to steer the Club back to its old position of prominence.

We were let down last season by our form in home matches. If we had played as well at White Hart Lane as in many away games, Spurs would have figured in the championship race, and would now be looking forward eagerly to a return to European competition this season.

I am well aware of the disappointment and frustration this must have caused our many thousands of loyal supporters. We were so tantalisingly near to tangible reward, and it is ironical that we should have missed our way by slipping up in so many home matches.

Nevertheless, it is to the credit of the management and staff that the need for dedication and hard work was instilled into the team, and these qualities undoubtedly contributed to the improvement shown in the later stages of the season.

The arrival of Willie Young from Aberdeen last September had a stabilising effect on the team. He has proved himself a dominant and popular figure in our defence and is now a key player in our plans. Two months later Gerry Armstrong joined us from Bangor, the Irish League club, and this well-built forward has now had time to adjust to English football.

During the close season, Keith Burkinshaw, who joined us as first-team coach in July, 1975, was appointed Manager following the resignation of Terry Neill. At the same time, Pat Welton, who has been with us since August, 1969, was appointed Assistant Manager.

Keith played a very positive part in our improvement last season, whilst Pat, who was the England Youth Team Manager before joining Spurs, was responsible for our Youth team for a number of years, and many of the present first-team players were developed by him.

I know they will carry the good wishes of all supporters in the days ahead, when they will have the benefit of the long experience and advice of Bill Nicholson, whom we are delighted to welcome back in an administrative capacity.

We look back on a moderate season by our reserve team, but the players representing us at this level were exceptionally young. We like to achieve success in the Football Combination, but the development of younger players is even more important than results in the long-term interests of the Club.

Viewed in this light, it was pleasing that so many of our reserve players were given their chance in the League team, and acquitted themselves so well.

Positive success came the way of our Youth team. I know the first team matters most, but it is more important than ever in present-day football that a good assembly line of young players should be fashioned and maintained.

Spurs' Youth team did particularly well in Cup football. We were winners of the International Youth Tournament organised by the Racing-Jet Club of Brussels in April, and had reached the final of the South East Counties League Cup (Senior Section) a month earlier. We were beaten in that final by Ipswich Town, who also finished convincing champions of the South East Counties League. A full report of the Brussels tournament appears on page 14 of this Handbook.

In terms of positive achievement in domestic competition, the honours go to our Junior team. They finished equal on points in Division 2 of the South East Counties League with Peterborough United, who beat us to the title only on goal average. The Juniors were, however, winners of the Division 2 Cup. The latter trophy had also been won by Spurs in season 1974-75.

In the individual sense, Pat Jennings can reflect on the last twelve months with considerable pride. In May he made a record 61st appearance in a full international match for Northern Ireland. Jennings also had the distinction of setting

up a new all-time record of Football League appearances for Spurs early last season, and his total now stands at 449.

In February he was elected "Player of the Year" by the Professional Footballers' Association, and this summer has received the award of the M.B.E. in the Queen's Birthday Honours List.

All our supporters will join me in congratulating Pat on such a memorable year of personal achievement, and we rejoice over the distinction he has earned for both himself and our Club.

Chris McGrath added to his international record with a substitute appearance for Northern Ireland against Israel in March, and early in the season Alfie Conn had made Scottish Under-23 appearances against Denmark and Rumania. Conn spent much of the season on the injured list, and I wish him better luck this term.

Even in the field of international recognition we had good reason to feel pleased with our Youth players.

Glenn Hoddle and Steve Walford both played for England, Terry Boyle played for Wales and Roger Wade for Eire. Mark Kendall also played one half for Wales against England as a substitute last March. Walford, Boyle and Wade all had the distinction of captaining their respective youth international teams.

Since last season ended Cyril Knowles has retired from League football on medical advice. He gave Spurs splendid service for many years, and we wish him well in the future.

Cyril played in Spurs' F.A. Cup-winning team of 1967, in our League Cup-winning teams of 1971 and 1973 and also in the side that won the U.E.F.A. Cup in 1972. He will always have an honoured place in Spurs' history.

Martin Chivers, another player with a highly distinguished record in Spurs' colours, is also missing from our ranks this season.

Servette, the Swiss club, came along with an offer this summer that at the present stage of his career, Martin felt he would be wise to accept. Martin scored both the goals in our 2-0 win over Aston Villa in the final of the League Cup in 1971 and a year later netted two of the three goals in the two-legged final of the U.E.F.A. Cup against Wolverhampton Wanderers.

As he was also in Spurs' team that won the League Cup a second time in 1973, and made 24 appearances in the full England team, all during his time with us, he can look back on his career in English football with considerable satisfaction. We now wish him every success in Swiss football.

Ian Smith, the young full-back who played twice in our

League team last season, has moved to Rotherham United this summer, and goalkeeper Ian Cranstone has signed for Colchester United. Winger Gary Hyams has joined the Urban Services Club of Hong Kong.

Good luck to each of them and to those players who left us but whose new clubs were not definitely known at the time this Handbook was printed.

Immediately last season's League programme was completed, the Club left on a tour embracing Canada, Fiji, New Zealand and Australia. Every match was won by Spurs and it was a matter of pride to me personally that we created such a good impression. The Club's good name was maintained both on and off the field. A full report on the tour, compiled by Mr. Arthur Richardson, appears in pages 8 to 13 of this Handbook.

As all supporters are aware, we have been engaged in a process of re-building and problems have come our way. Last season the tide began to turn in our favour and we will continue to pursue our policy of providing football that will attract and entertain.

A new season is always a time for hope and optimism. It is in this mood that I look to the new campaign and I see no reason why the improvement shown in 1975-76 should not be maintained.

SPURS' CLOSE-SEASON TOUR

THE most extensive football tour ever undertaken by the Club commenced with our departure from Heathrow on the afternoon of Sunday, 25th April.

Our first stop was Toronto, where it was snowing and the temperature was 1 degree centigrade.

On our first full day in Canada we were pleased to renew acquaintance with Bill Brown, our former Scottish international goalkeeper, who now fills a government post in Toronto. We also met the celebrated Eusebio, who recalled playing against Spurs for Benfica in the European Cup and also in the Costa del Sol competition.

Eusebio had been signed in time to play for Toronto Metros-Croatia against us on 27th April. Cold weather kept the crowd down to just over 5,000, and the only goal of the match was swerved deceptively into the net by Ralph Coates.

Pat Jennings played the first half and Barry Daines, who came on as substitute for him in the second half, made a fine save from a penalty kick by Eusebio in the 49th minute. Daines was one of three substitutes used by Spurs.

This was the first occasion on which Spurs have played a first-class match on artificial turf. The players adapted well to the conditions and were generally agreed that the bounce of the ball was predictable but that it was difficult to control when moving at speed.

Early on 28th April our party flew to Los Angeles, but by this time we were without Jennings, who had returned to England for the home international tournament. We had nine hours to spare in Los Angeles before leaving for Fiji, and part of this time was well spent with a trip to Disneyland.

We made one stop at Honolulu on the flight to Fiji, during which we crossed the International Date Line. We were met at Fiji Airport at dawn on 30th April, and the weather was so warm that some of our players were in the hotel swimming pool by 06.00 hours!

Late in the afternoon of that day, a training session was held on a large expanse of grass in front of the hotel. Many of our party had by this time caught up on lost sleep. With the time difference since leaving for Toronto we had lost a complete day.

Our match against the Fijian Select XI was played at the Lautoka Stadium on 1st May, and Spurs finished winners by

4-0 before a crowd of more than 6,000 spectators. Martin Chivers and Gerry Armstrong scored in the first half, and Chris Jones and John Duncan netted in the second half.

In this match Terry Naylor failed from the penalty spot, and Mark Kendall came on as substitute in the second half, thus making what surely must be Club history as the youngest goalkeeper to have played for Spurs in a first-class match.

A day later we arrived at Auckland after a three-hour flight. On 3rd May the players trained in the morning, and in the afternoon visited the local television studios to watch a re-run of the F.A. Cup final.

That evening we played the Auckland F.A. XI before a crowd of more than 10,000 spectators.

This was rated one of the finest games seen in Auckland for many years, and as Spurs recovered from a 3-1 deficit as late as the 50th minute to win 5-3 with the last goal coming in the 89th minute, interest and excitement stayed at boiling pitch. Our scorers were Keith Osgood from an 18th-minute penalty, John Pratt (52nd min.), and three late goals from Jimmy Neighbour and Duncan 2.

At a reception after the game, Coates was nominated as "Man of the Match" and received an award. At this match there was a lot of support for Spurs by spectators with flags and banners.

The next day we made the one-hour flight to Wellington. We attended a reception in the evening, and after a training session the following morning, our team lined up versus the Wellington F.A. XI on the evening of 5th May.

Spurs won this match 3-2 before a crowd of 8,500. Pratt scored a good early goal but on the half-hour Wellington equalised from a penalty. In the 35th minute the New Zealanders went in front, but Spurs were level with a goal from Armstrong three minutes later. Late in the game Duncan netted the winner after we had applied a lot of pressure.

It was in this match that Don McAllister twisted his knee and was carried off on a stretcher. It was decided he should return to England for treatment as soon as we reached Sydney, where we were changing planes on the trip to Melbourne, our next destination.

In Melbourne, apart from light training, there was a short respite from soccer, but most of our party watched a game of Australian Football, which is a mixture of Gaelic Football and Rugby, played on a pitch approximately twice the size of our own.

A crowd of 35,000 attended this event, a fast, physical

contest. Play continued even while treatment was being given to injured players.

On 9th May we played Victoria and won 3—1. Spurs were a goal down after 28 minutes, but Jones headed a quick equaliser. Pratt scored with another header in the second half, and Steve Perryman was also on the mark to finish off the scoring in the 75th minute. A crowd of 15,000 watched this game at the Olympic Stadium.

A day later we were off again on an early flight to Newcastle, New South Wales, again changing planes at Sydney. We were entertained at the headquarters of the Cardiff Football Club that evening and were interested to learn that the income of the Australian club is mainly obtained from "fruit machines", of which there were approximately one hundred. The gaming laws in New South Wales permit clubs to collect a lot of revenue from this source.

On the following day many of our party enjoyed a swim in the Pacific Ocean in spite of a warning about the action to be taken if sharks were sighted!

On 12th May we played Northern New South Wales and morning rain, plus a bus strike, had their effect in restricting the crowd, which was estimated at about 7,000.

Spurs were easy winners of this match by 5—1. After Northern New South Wales had conceded an own goal, Glenn Hoddle scored in the 34th minute and Osgood converted a penalty for our third.

In the second half the Australians managed to score, but Chivers and Willie Young took Spurs' total to five. It was reported that the Northern New South Wales team had had hypnotherapy treatment before the game but this form of preparation obviously failed to achieve its desired effect.

At the after-match reception at a working men's club with a membership of 25,000 with more waiting to join, Spurs were introduced from the stage and we were then entertained with a repertoire of songs.

The next morning we left Newcastle to return to Sydney, this time by motor coach. It may interest our older supporters to know that a caller at our hotel was Alf Jennings, a centre-forward with Spurs in the 1920s, and we also met Gordon Nutt, the former Arsenal winger, now also domiciled in Australia.

On 14th May, following a training spell, our party were taken on a trip by private launch around Sydney Harbour. The fine weather, high standard of refreshment provided and the unforgettable spectacle of the setting sun behind the Sydney Harbour Bridge made it a memorable 2½-hour trip.

The next match was against the Australian National XI at the Sydney Sports Ground on 16th May. For this important game before a crowd of 26,561, we were without Duncan, who had returned to London for treatment to his back.

Spurs beat Australia 3—2. Coates again scored with a deceptive cross after beating three opponents only two minutes after Australia had opened the score. Coates was again prominent when Spurs took the lead in the 30th minute, Neighbour scoring with a diving header from his cross.

Five minutes after half-time Jones scored a third goal for Spurs but Australia caught our defence in a tangle in the last minute to narrow the margin to 3—2.

We were off again the next day, this time by air to Adelaide, where we played South Australia. On a good pitch, under excellent floodlights and before a crowd of 15,200, Spurs well deserved a 5—2 win.

Chivers opened the score after five minutes, Osgood headed the second and then shot wide from the penalty spot in the 24th minute. He made amends by scoring with a good cross shot in the 33rd minute.

South Australia reduced our lead early in the second half, but Jones netted with a tremendous shot from 30 yards in the 75th minute. Coates then beat four players to score Spurs' fifth, and South Australia netted a late second goal from a free-kick.

Then came a 2,000-mile flight to Perth on 20th May. The following day we had the memorable experience of visiting Parliament House, where we were met by Mr. John Williams, M.P., who conducted us over the Upper House.

We were able to sit on the front benches of the Chamber while Mr. Williams gave us a most enlightening talk on the functions of the West Australian Government. We were then joined for lunch by Mr. Ross Hutchinson, the Speaker of the Parliament. We were informed during the speeches of welcome that we were the first soccer club to have been entertained in this manner.

On Sunday, 23rd May we played the last game of the tour against Western Australia, who had just returned from Asia after winning an international cup tournament in which they had competed with six other countries.

Chivers put Spurs in front after 30 minutes by heading through following a free-kick and just on half-time Jones headed our second. In this match Steve Walford and Hoddle came on in the second half for Osgood and Pratt, and Armstrong took over from Mike Stead in the 55th minute.

Chivers scored a third goal for Spurs and then headed his

own third and the team's last goal for a 4—0 win. This match was watched by a crowd of 18,000.

We left Perth Airport at 19.30 hours that evening and arrived at Heathrow at 08.00 on 24th May after a flight lasting 19½ hours—allowing for a seven-hour time difference en route—and making one stop at Bombay.

The players are to be congratulated on winning all the nine tour matches with a goal record of 33 scored and 11 conceded.

Throughout the tour the press were enthusiastic and appreciative over the visit of Spurs. Their match reports showed how much they were impressed by the all-round skill and ability of our players.

The experience was of benefit to our younger players, each of whom enhanced his reputation. The size of the crowds attending our games was well above the average recorded for previous touring clubs, and a large proportion of them appeared to have strong leanings towards Spurs.

Some of this support is obviously due to the frequency with which our team is seen on television in Australia.

The distance of approximately 35,000 miles represents the longest tour ever undertaken by the Club. It became a little strenuous at some stages owing to the time difference.

This report would be inconclusive if we did not express our sincere thanks to all the officials and clubs who extended so much generous hospitality to us at all times during the tour. We returned with a full appreciation for everything that was done for our pleasure and comfort.

YOUTH TEAM TRIUMPH

SPURS' Youth team won the international youth tournament organised by Racing-Jet de Bruxelles in Brussels in April. It was a knock-out competition comprising eight clubs. The other competing teams were Racing Jet, the host club, and R.S.C. Anderlecht, K.S.C. Lokeren, Videoton S.C., Polish National XI, Charleroi S.C. and Royal Lierse S.K.

Our party left by hovercraft from Ramsgate on 20th April, completing the journey to Brussels by coach. The duration of the matches was 40 minutes each way, and in our first game, on 21st April, we were paired with Royal Lierse. Martin Robinson scored in Spurs 1—0 win. We fielded the same team in this and the two following matches, namely Markwick; Wade, Cavanagh, S., Keeley, Boyle, T., Barwick, Brotherston, Bacon, Stead, K., Beavon and Robinson. The only substitutes used were Phil Holyoak for Terry Boyle and Barry Pace for Robinson for the last 10 minutes of the second match in which we faced Charleroi, the Belgian Youth champions.

This was the semi-final and Spurs were three goals ahead in the first 20 minutes. We scored a fourth 15 minutes from time, and Charleroi netted a late consolation goal. Noel Brotherston scored our first and third goals, and Kevin Stead netted the second and fourth. This 4—1 win qualified Spurs to meet Videoton S.C. of Hungary in the final. We led at half-time by an own goal, deflected in following a corner by Robinson. Soon after half-time Robinson scored two and a few minutes later Garry Bacon converted a penalty.

The Hungarians then reduced our lead, but Robinson restored Spurs' three-goal margin with a brilliant goal that nearly earned him the award of the "best goal of the tournament". This honour, in fact, went to the Hungarian captain, who swerved a 25-yard free-kick into our net to spark off a rally that produced a further late goal. Spurs held out to win 4—3, and we were presented with a handsome cup.

Noel Brotherston was elected "Player of the Tournament" and was presented with an elegant cup. The return journey on 25th April was also made by coach and hovercraft. A high level of hospitality was extended to our party, and it was a most enjoyable and successful trip.

Played Gaelic before deciding to concentrate on football. As a Bangor player, he combined part-time professionalism with his job as a senior clerical officer with the Northern Ireland Housing Executive. Was included in Spurs' touring party this summer.


BARWICK, Frederick (defender). 5 ft. 7¾ in.

Upgraded from apprentice to full contract status last October. Born at Hendon, attended Edgware School and played for the Barnet Boys team. Signed as an apprentice for Spurs in April, 1974. Had supported Spurs in his schooldays, when he had also played rugby. Made 18 appearances in the Football Combination team last season, scoring 5 goals.


BEAVON, Stuart (midfield). 5 ft. 6½ in.

Has been upgraded from apprentice to full professional rank this summer. Born in Wolverhampton but brought up in Oxford, where he attended the Northway School. Played for Oxfordshire Boys before signing as an apprentice for Spurs in March, 1975. His father is Cyril Beavon, the former Oxford United full-back. Made 6 appearances in our Combination team last season.

BOYLE, Terence (centre-half). 5 ft. 10½ in.

Captained the Welsh international youth team last season. Born at Llanelli, Dyfed, where he attended Llanelli Grammar School, and had captained the Welsh schoolboy international team before signing apprentice forms for Spurs in April, 1975. He also represented his school at rugby, and Carmarthenshire at javelin-throwing. Last season he was a regular member of our Combination team, making a total of 33 appearances. Upgraded to full contract status last November.





BROTHERSTON, Noel (midfield). 5 ft. 8 in.

A Northern Ireland Youth international, who also played for his country as a schoolboy. Comes from Dundonald, near Belfast, and also played for the North Down Boys' team. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in September, 1972 and was upgraded to full professional status in April, 1974. Played regularly in the Combination team last season, and has made one League appearance, at home to Aston Villa last March.

CAVANAGH, Steven (defender). 5 ft. 7½ in.

Born at Hackney, where he still lives. Attended Upton House Secondary School, and played for Hackney and Middlesex Boys. Also played in a London representative XI. Trained with Orient and Queen's Park Rangers before signing for Spurs as an apprentice in July, 1974. Upgraded to full contract status last January, and made 16 Combination appearances last season. Keen on golf and tennis.



COATES, Ralph, (forward). 5 ft. 7 in.

Born at Hetton-le-Hole, County Durham, and played as a striker for Eppleton Colliery Welfare before joining Burnley. Transferred from Burnley to Spurs in May, 1971. Has made four appearances in the full England team, one of which was as substitute. Scored the goal against Norwich City that won the League Cup for Spurs at Wembley in 1973. Has scored 11 goals in 154 League appearances for Spurs, and 10 goals in 57 major cup appearances for us.



CONN, Alfred (midfield). 5 ft. 8 in.

Played twice for the Scottish Under-23s last October and has two appearances in the full Scotland team to his credit. Joined Spurs from Glasgow Rangers in July, 1974. Born in Edinburgh and attended Preston Lodge Secondary School, Prestonpans, a rugby-playing school. Played rugby on Saturday mornings and juvenile soccer for Musselburgh Windsor in the afternoons! Spotted by Rangers while playing for Musselburgh Windsor and joined the Ibrox ground staff. Was injured for much of last season, and his total of League appearances for Spurs stands at 24, in which he has scored 6 goals. In F.A. Cup and League Cup he has made 4 appearances for Spurs, scoring one goal at Crewe last October. He is the son of the former Scottish international and Hearts inside-forward of the same name.



DAINES, Barry (goalkeeper). 5 ft. 11½ in.

Born at Witham and played for Chelmsford, Mid-Essex and Essex County Boys before joining Spurs as an apprentice. Upgraded to full professional rank in September, 1969. Played for the England Youth team and was a member of Spurs' side that won the F.A. Youth Cup in 1970. Kept in the background by Pat Jennings, he has played only 11 League games for Spurs. Has also made two appearance each for Spurs in the League Cup and U.E.F.A. Cup.

DUNCAN, John (forward). 5 ft. 10 in.

In scoring 20 League goals last season he finished top goalscorer for the second year in succession. Born in Dundee, where he attended Clepington Road School and Morgan Academy. Played for Dundee Schools Under-15s and after Dundee had signed him on a provisional form, he was "farmed" out to Broughty Athletic for development. Transferred from Dundee to Spurs in October, 1974 and made his debut in our colours at Luton on the last Saturday of that month. Has scored 32 goals in his 63 League appearances for Spurs and in 11 F.A. Cup and League Cup matches for us he has scored 5 times. Played for the Scottish League against the Football League in 1973.



HODDLE, Glenn (midfield). 6 ft. 0 in.

Made his League debut for Spurs as a substitute at home to Norwich early last season, and went on to make six full appearances, scoring one goal. Comes from Harlow and played for Harlow District and Essex Under-15 and Under-19 teams. Attended Burnt Mill School and signed for Spurs as an apprentice in April, 1974. Upgraded to full professional in April, 1975. Has played for the England Youth team, and as a schoolboy also played fly-half in the West Essex rugby team.



JENNINGS, Patrick (goalkeeper). 6 ft. 0 in.

The record breaker. Passed the previous record of appearances for Northern Ireland of 59 when he played against England at Wembley last May. Three nights later, against Wales at Swansea, he made his total 61. Has also played for the Rest of the U.K., the "All Ireland XI" and the Three against the Six in the Common Market match. Last season he passed the record of 418 League appearances for Spurs previously established by Ted Ditchburn, and now holds the all-time Club record of 449. Has also played in 116 major cup-ties for Spurs. Last February was elected "Player of the Year" by the Professional Footballers' Association. In season 1972-73 he was elected "Footballer of the Year" by the Football Writers' Association. Born at Newry and joined Watford after playing for the Irish Youth team. Left Watford for Spurs in June, 1964, and made his first League appearance for us at home to Sheffield United on the opening day of the following season. Awarded the M.B.E. in the Queen's Birthday Honours List this summer.





JONES, Chris (forward). 5 ft. 11 in.

Born in Jersey and established himself in schools football in the Channel Islands. Signed for Spurs as an apprentice in May, 1971 and was upgraded to full professional in May, 1973. Made his League debut for us on the opening day of season 1974-75 at home to Ipswich Town. Has now made 50 League appearances, in the course of which he has scored 6 goals. Has also played in six F.A. Cup and League Cup matches, scoring once.

KEELEY, Andrew (defender). 5 ft. 9½ in.

Comes from Basildon and played for Basildon Boys. Signed as an apprentice for Spurs in September, 1972 and was upgraded to full professional in January, 1974. A former England Youth international, he made 36 Combination appearances last season, scoring one goal. Brother of Glen Keeley, the Newcastle United defender.



KENDALL, Mark (goalkeeper). 6 ft. 0¼ in.

Was a member of our touring party this summer, and was upgraded to full contract status after his return. Comes from Blackwood in Gwent, and played for Wales as a schoolboy in addition to his county and district teams. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in April, 1975. Made 5 appearances in our Combination team last season. Played as a second-half substitute for Wales against England Youth last season.

McALLISTER, Donald (defender). 5 ft. 10 in.

Joined Spurs from Bolton Wanderers in February, 1975 and made his debut in our colours at Coventry. Born at Radcliffe, near Manchester, and played for Lancashire County and the combined Prestwich, Radcliffe and Whitefield District Boys team. Graduated through Bolton's apprentice ranks to sign for them as a full professional in June, 1970. As a teenager with Bolton, he attended the local technical college and gained his City and Guild certificate in Motor Vehicle Maintenance. Has made 43 League appearances for Spurs, scoring 2 goals. Has also played 8 League Cup and F.A. Cup matches for us, scoring once in the former competition. Was forced through injury to return home midway through our close-season tour.



McGRATH, Chris (forward). 5 ft. 9 in.

Has made 5 appearances in the full Northern Ireland international team. Comes from Belfast, where he attended Dunlambert Secondary School. Captained the South Belfast and Northern Ireland Boys teams. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in July, 1970, and was upgraded to full professional in January, 1972. Made his League debut for Spurs at home to Arsenal in October, 1973 and now has 38 First Division appearances to his credit. Has also played in 9 major cup-ties, scoring 5 goals in the U.E.F.A. Cup. His total of League goals for Spurs also stands at 5. Spent the closing weeks of last season on loan to Millwall but returned in time to play in our final Combination match at Cardiff.



McNAB, Neil (midfield). 5 ft. 7¼ in.

Joined Spurs from Morton in February, 1974 and after reverting to amateur status for the rest of that season, signed as a professional in June of that year. Has played for the Scottish international youth team and is a former schoolboy international. Made his League debut for Spurs as substitute at home to Chelsea in April, 1974 as a 16-year-old. Had played in Morton's Scottish League team at 15. Has now made 18 League appearances for Spurs. Last season also made 2 appearances in the League Cup. Born at Greenock.



NAYLOR, Terence (defender). 5 ft. 10 in.

Born at Islington and played for Islington Boys. Trained for a while with Arsenal and also had a brief spell with Millwall before joining Spurs as an amateur. Gave up his job in Smithfield Market to sign as a professional in July, 1969, and made his League debut at West Bromwich at Easter, 1970. Has made 137 League appearances and 45 in major cup-ties. His only goal for the first team was against Chelsea in the semi-final of the League Cup at Stamford Bridge in 1971.

NEIGHBOUR, James (forward). 5 ft. 7 in.

Born at Chingford, where he attended Heathcote Secondary Modern School. Played for Waltham Forest, Essex and London Boys. Signed full professional forms for Spurs in November, 1968, having joined us as an apprentice in April, 1966. Was a member of our Football League Cup-winning team against Aston Villa in 1971. Has made 112 League appearances, scoring 8 goals. Has also appeared in 35 major cup-ties, scoring twice.





OSGOOD, Keith (defender). 5 ft. 11 in.

Spurs' only ever-present player last season. Born at Isleworth and attended Syon School. Gained schoolboy international honours and also played for London and Hounslow Boys. Also played for the England Youth team. Signed for Spurs as an apprentice in June, 1971 and was upgraded to full professional in June, 1972. Made his League debut as substitute at Newcastle in the final League match of season 1973-74. His total of League appearances now stands at 53, in the course of which he has scored 3 goals. Has also played in 10 F.A. Cup and League Cup matches.

PERRYMAN, Stephen (midfield). 5 ft. 8 in.

Club captain. Born at Ealing and played for Middlesex, London and England Boys. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in July, 1967 and was upgraded to full professional in January, 1969. Made his League debut against Sunderland in a home match in September, 1969, and now has a total of 266 First Division appearances to his credit, in the course of which he has scored 20 goals. Has also played in 86 major cup-ties, scoring 7 goals. In making his 17th appearance for the England Under-23 team two seasons ago, he equalled the record set up by Martin Chivers.



PRATT, John (midfield). 5 ft. 8 in.

ROBINSON, Martin (forward). 5 ft. 7¼ in.

Comes from Chadwell St. Mary, near Grays. Attended Quarry Hill and Torells Schools, Grays, and played for the Thurrock District Boys team. Signed apprentice forms for Spurs in July, 1973 and was upgraded to full professional in May, 1975. Finished top scorer in the Combination last season with 23 goals. Made his League debut at home to Leicester City last February, and also played as a substitute at home to Aston Villa in March, scoring one of Spurs' five goals.



STEAD, Kevin (forward). 5 ft. 8½ in.

Made 30 Combination appearances last season.



WADE, Roger (defender). 5 ft. 7½ in.

Captained the Eire international youth team last season. Had played for England as a schoolboy, but as both his parents come from Tipperary, he declared his qualification to play for Eire. Born in Kennington and played for both Blackheath and Kent Boys. Joined Spurs as an apprentice in April, 1974 and was upgraded to full contract status last October. Made 6 Combination appearances last season.

WALFORD, Stephen (centre-half). 6 ft. 1 in.

Made his League debut for Spurs at home to Liverpool as substitute last December, and also played in the away match with Ipswich. Comes from Islington and played for Islington Boys. A former pupil at Holloway School, he signed for Spurs as an apprentice in April, 1974 and 12 months later was upgraded to full professional rank. Had a cartilage operation last March but was playing again before the season ended. Captained the England Youth team last season.





YOUNG, William (defender). 6 ft. 3½ in.

Joined Spurs from Aberdeen last September. Born at Heriot, near the Berwickshire border, and attended Ross High School, Tranent, on the outskirts of Edinburgh. Played for Seton Athletic before joining Aberdeen and gave up a job as a laboratory assistant to become a full-time footballer. Before joining Aberdeen he was given a trial by Falkirk and Hearts also showed interest in him. Made his debut for Spurs at Leeds last September, and had played 35 First Division matches, scoring 2 goals, when the season ended. He also played in 8 League Cup and F.A. Cup matches, scoring one goal at West Ham. Has played for the Scottish Under-23s.

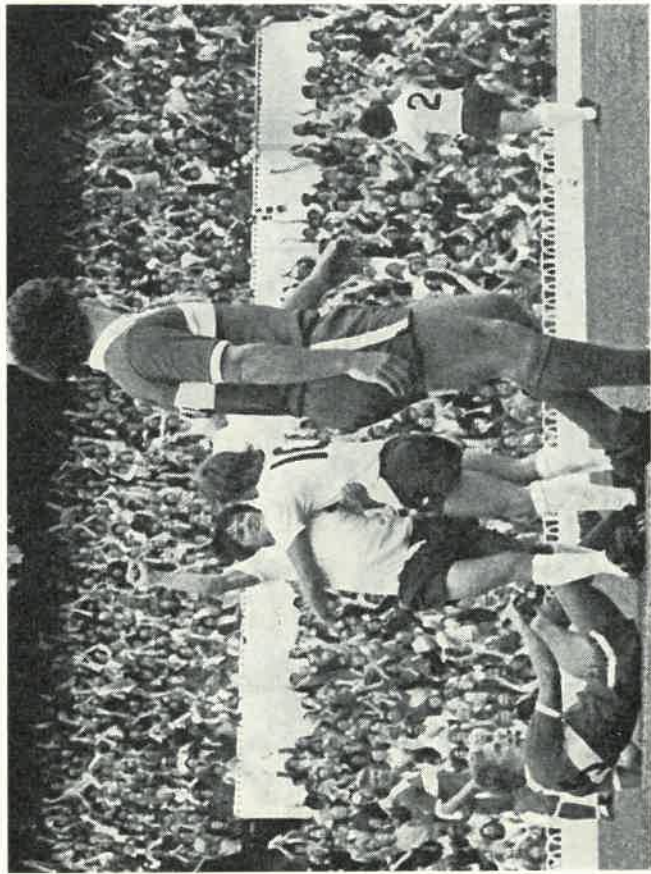

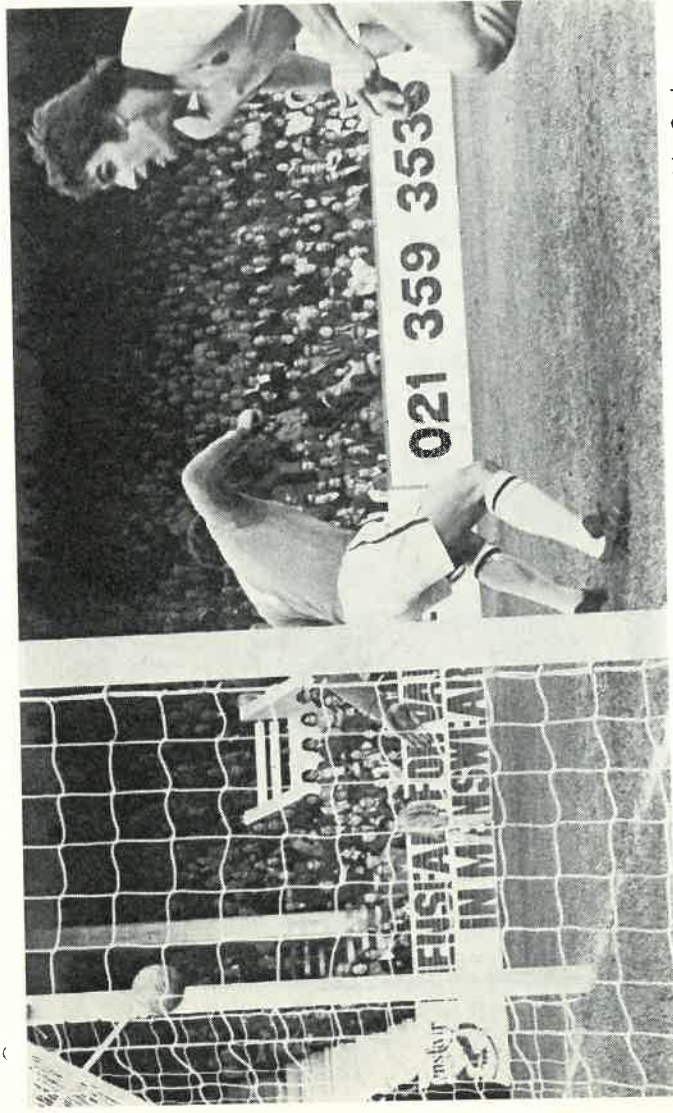

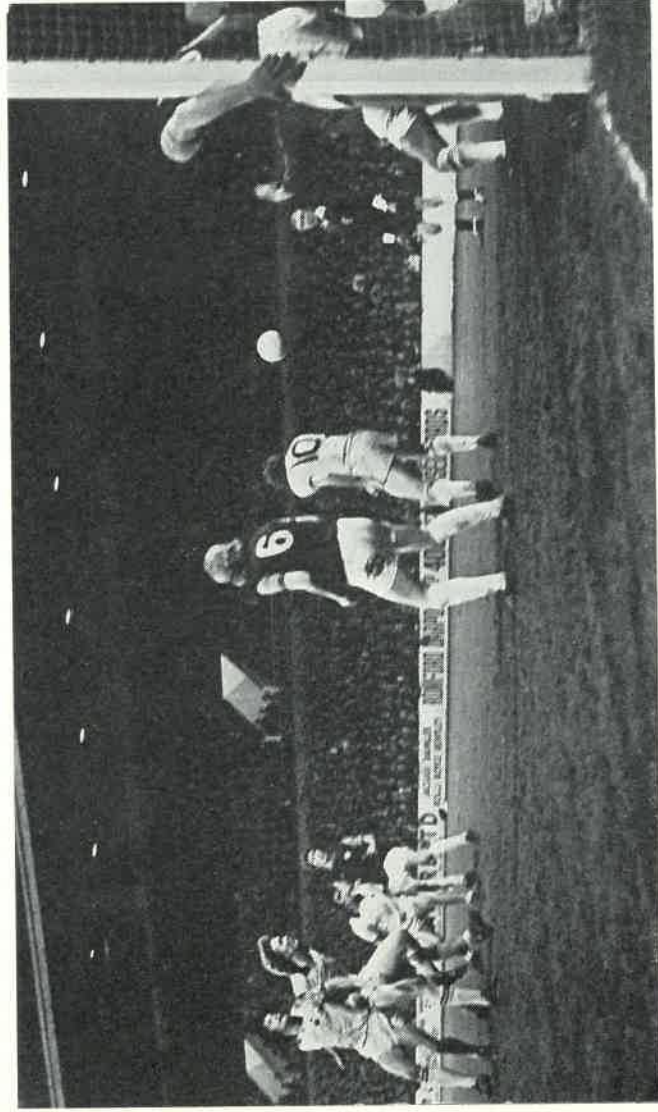


It's there! John Pratt's equaliser enables Spurs to leave Aston Villa's ground with a 1-1 draw in the League match last October.

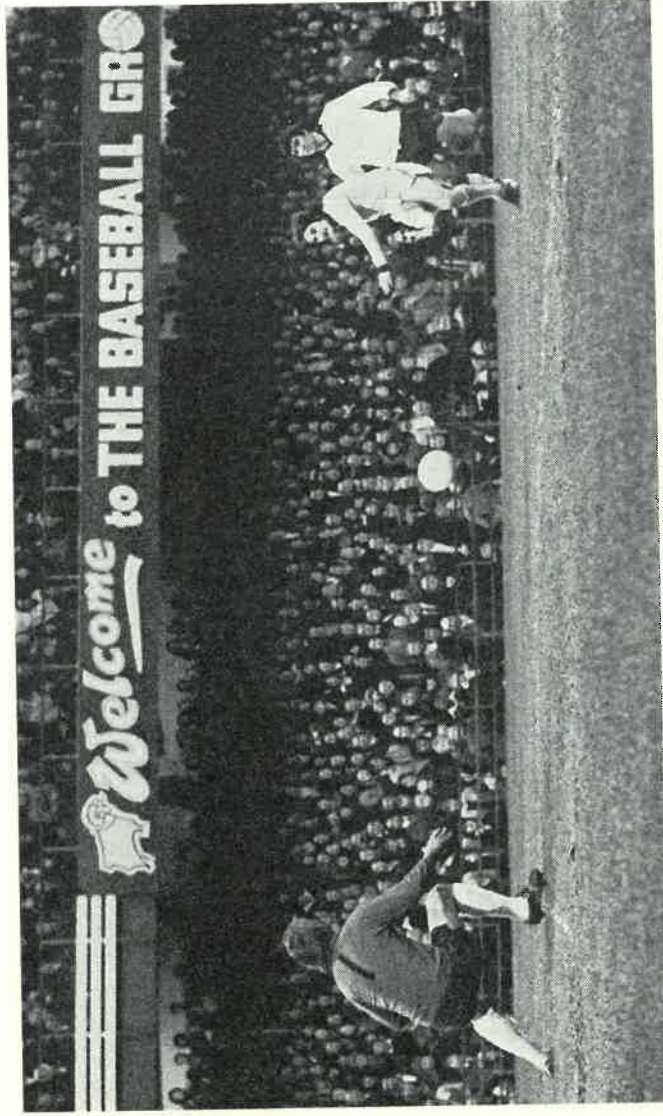
Willie Young's header gives Spurs a 2-0 win in extra time over West Ham United at Upton Park in the replayed fourth-round Football League Cup-tie last November.

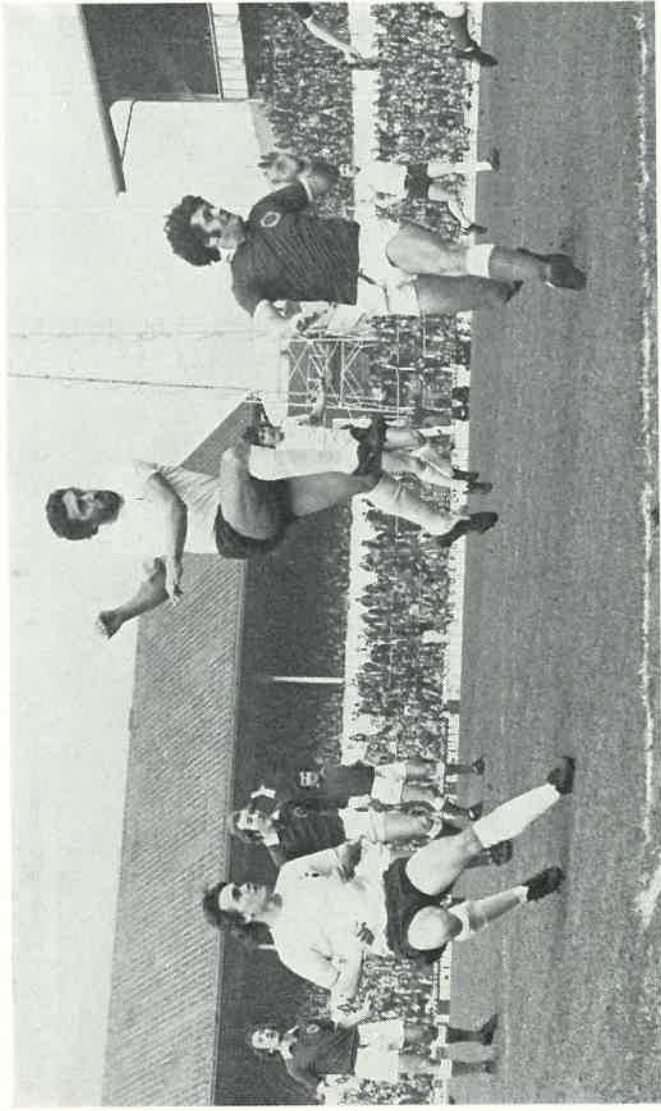

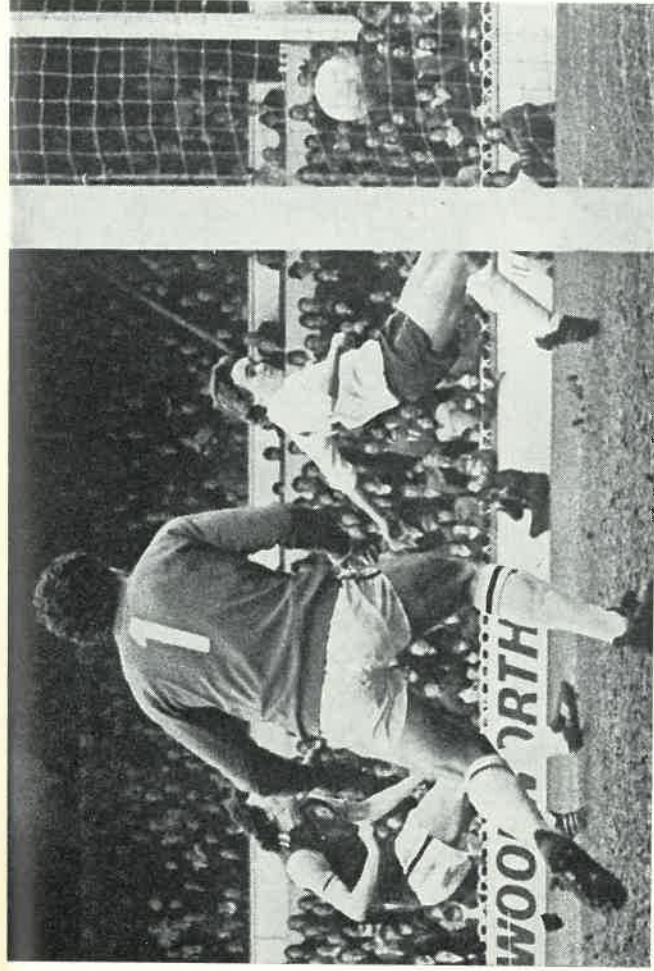

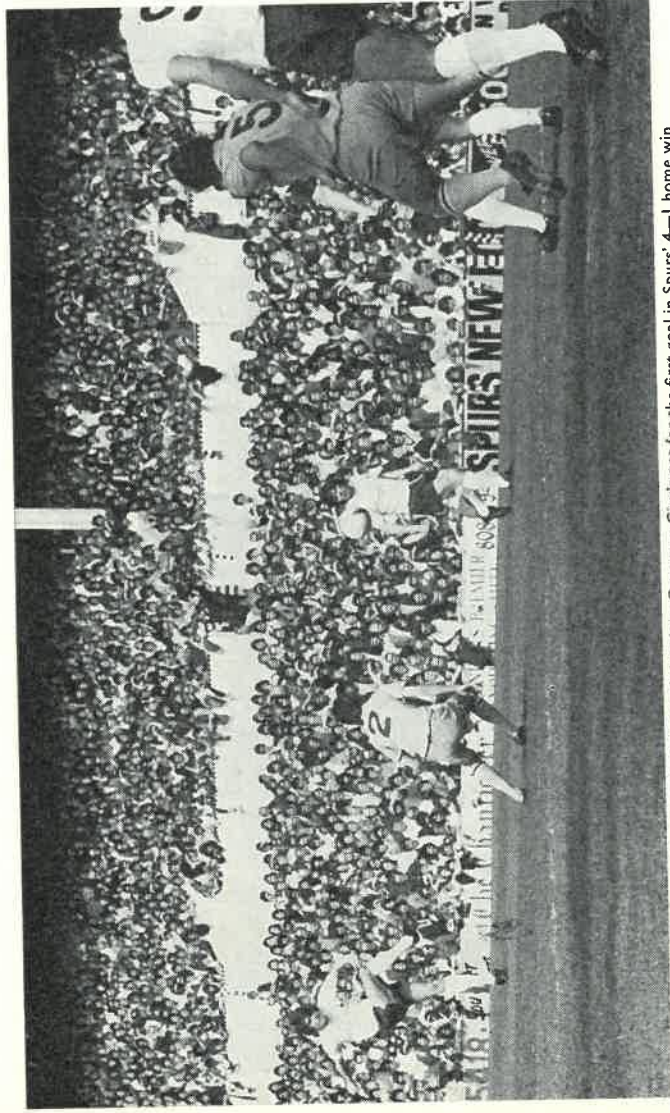
Martin Chivers scores Spurs' goal in last season's 1—1 home draw with Leicester.

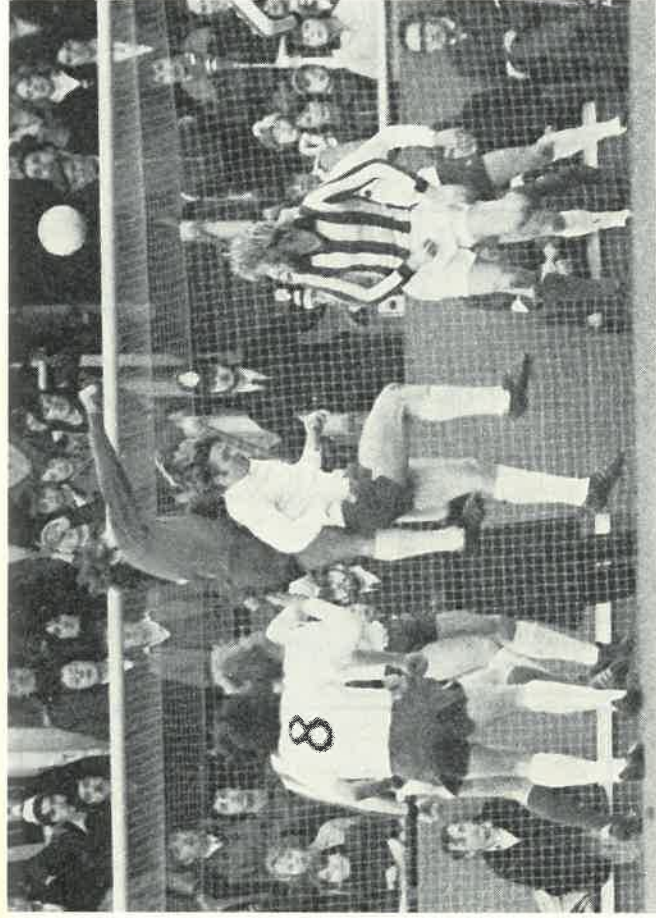

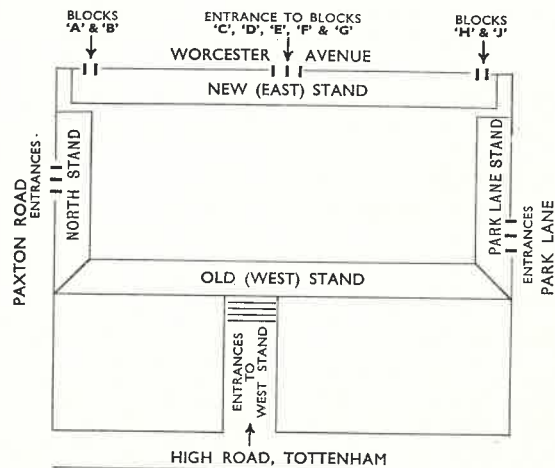

HOTSPUR HISTORY

- 1882 Club formed by boys from a local cricket club and from the local Grammar School. The name of "Hotspur F.C." was adopted.
- 1883 Club reorganised under the presidency of Mr. John Ripsher. Club colours—navy blue. Matches played on Tottenham Marshes.
- 1885 First competitive match versus St. Albans in the London Association Cup, Spurs winning 5—2. Colours changed to light blue and white halves. First credit balance—9 shillings.
- 1886 First cup final. Played Caledonians in the East End Cup and lost 1—0. Club re-named "Tottenham Hotspur Athletic Club".
- 1887 First meeting with Arsenal—then Royal Arsenal. Match abandoned 15 minutes from time "owing to darkness", with Spurs leading 2—1.
- 1888 Spurs move to private ground in Northumberland Park, where the first admission charge of 3d. was made.
- 1890 Colours changed to red shirts and navy blue shorts.
- 1895 Spurs adopt professionalism.
- 1896 A record crowd of 6,000 spectators watch the friendly match against Aston Villa. Spurs elected to the Southern League, Division 1. Club colours changed to chocolate and gold.
- 1898 The Club becomes a limited company and a match against Woolwich Arsenal attracts a record crowd of 14,000 spectators.
- 1899 Final change of colours to the now familiar white shirts and blue shorts. The Club moves to present site, originally a market garden. Accommodation for 35,000. Ground almost named as "Gilpin Park" but instead gradually became known as "White Hart Lane". First match staged was a friendly versus Notts County—gross receipts £115.
- 1900 Success at last—Spurs become champions of the Southern League.
- 1901 Spurs win the F.A. Challenge Cup to become the only non-League club, following the formation of the Football League in 1888, ever to achieve this honour.

- 1908 Entry secured to the Second Division of the Football League.
- 1909 Promotion to Division 1 gained at first attempt.
- 1915 Relegation to Division 2.
- 1920 Promoted again at first attempt, this time with a still unsurpassed Second Division record of 70 points.
- 1921 Second F.A. Cup triumph, Spurs beating Wolverhampton Wanderers by 1—0 at Stamford Bridge.
- 1928 Relegation to Second Division with 38 points.
- 1933 Promotion again, this time as Division 2 runners-up.
- 1934 New East Stand completed.
- 1935 Relegation to Second Division.
- 1938 The existing crowd record of 75,038 spectators was established for the visit of Sunderland in the Sixth Round of the F.A. Cup.
- 1950 Promotion to Division 1.
- 1951 Football League champions for the first time.
- 1961 Football League champions and winners of the F.A. Cup. The first club to complete the "double" since Preston North End and Aston Villa did so in 1889 and 1897 respectively.
- 1962 Winners again of the F.A. Cup.
- 1963 Winners of the European Cup-Winners' Cup. The first British club to win a major European competition. Jimmy Greaves becomes Spurs' highest League goalscorer in one season with 37 goals.
- 1967 F.A. Cup-Winners for the fifth time.
- 1971 Winners of the Football League Cup.
- 1972 First winners of new U.E.F.A. Cup and therefore the first British club to have won two major European trophies.
- 1973 Winners of the Football League Cup, the first club to have won the trophy twice.
- 1974 First British club to have played in three major European Finals. Net Receipts of £49,920, at U.E.F.A. Final (home leg) is Club record.
- 1975 Pat Jennings sets a new Club record of League appearances by passing Ted Ditchburn's previous record total of 418. Jennings finished season 1975—76 with 449 League appearances and 116 in the four major cups.
