COMMENT

THE CURTAIN rings down this afternoon on season 1969-70, and we could not end our match programme with a more attractive fixture than a visit from our near neighbours and rivals, Arsenal.

This match was, of course, scheduled originally for the evening of Wednesday, 15th April, but Arsenal's progress in the Fairs Cup caused a postponement. A season that was expected to end earlier than usual has instead extended into May, and it has fallen to us to stage the final First Division match of the campaign.

There is always something extra special about a clash between Spurs and Arsenal, and today's game loses little by the midtable position occupied by both clubs.

Today's game is, in fact, the 68th meeting of the two clubs in the Football League, and an interesting fact emerges from the record of all those matches. Spurs and Arsenal, in the course of the 67 League games played, have each scored 115 goals.

Today we sign off with a match against Arsenal. Last season we opened the League programme with a visit from our friends from Highbury. We have therefore had a long wait since Arsenal's last League visit, although they were here in the League Cup Semi-final last season.

BUSY SEASON

Their success in the Fairs Cup-and we offer them our hearty congratulations on winning the trophy this week-has made this a busy season for Arsenal. In addition to the F.A. and League Cups, in which they played six games, including three replays. Arsenal have been involved in 12 matches in the Fairs Cup.

OLD RIVALS

Huddersfield Town and Blackpool, who have been promoted to the First Division, are old rivals of ours, and we have had many fine matches with both clubs in the past.

Huddersfield have not played on this ground since April, 1956, a few weeks before they were relegated to Division 2, but Blackpool were still in Division 1 up to three seasons ago.

As Sheffield Wednesday and Sunderland, the relegated clubs, are also from the North, our travelling mileage in the League next season will show little change.

Spurs Youth 4, Millwall Youth 1

In beating Millwall here last Saturday by 4-1, the Youth team carried off the Southern Junior Floodlit Cup in convincing fashion.

The first leg of the Final had ended in a goalless draw on Millwall's ground, and we suffered an early rebuff when the Lions took the lead with a goal by Steve Brown, their outside-right, in the seventh

minute.

It was not until a few minutes before half-time that Spurs equalised, Graeme Souness running through to score a fine goal. It was Souness again who put us in front halfway through the second half.

In the closing minutes Ray Clarke added two more, the first from the penalty spot after John Oliver had been

brought down.

MAN IN CHARGE

Referee for today is Mr. Jim

Finney of Hereford.

Mr. Finney, who has been on the F.I.F.A. panel of referees for nine of the 12 seasons he has been on the Football League List, was in charge of the 1962 F.A. Cup Final, when we beat Burnley at Wembley. He still retains the match ball as a souvenir of the occasion.

Mr. Finney has controlled matches all over Europe, and in North and South America, and his record establishes him as one of the most experienced referees in football. He was born at St. Helens in Lancashire, and is married with three children.

Referee Finney, who is employed as a representative, gained his early experience in the Southern and Birmingham Leagues.

His last match on this ground was the League fixture with Derby County in January. Last Saturday he refereed the international match between Wales and Ireland.

MARATHON

Coventry City Youth 2, Spurs Youth 2 (after extra time)

A draw after extra time on Tuesday evening at Coventry turned the F.A. Youth Cup Final into a marathon tie. We are, of course unable to make reference to the fourth match between the teams here last night.

Steve Perryman put Spurs in front in the ninth minute on Tuesday, but Alan Green equalised for Coventry a minute

In the second half John Stevenson scored for Coventry following the regrettable incident that led to the sending-off of Graeme Souness.

Spurs fought back in great style for John Oliver to snatch the goal that forced a further replay last night.

JUNE WEDDINGS

Three of our players will be married in June. On the 6th of that month. Terry Naylor will marry Miss Linda Fitzgerald, a 19-year-old typist, at Holy Trinity Church, Sydenham, and on the 20th Peter Collins marries Miss Sabina Kaluza, a 23-year-old secretary, at the village church at Wickford in Essex.

Third of the trio is Ray Evans, who marries Miss Sandra Thomas, a 19-yearold comptometer operator with the Eastern Gas Board, at All Saints' Church, Edmonton.

Ray and his bride are bound for the Costa Brava, and Peter and Sabina will spend their honeymoon at Ibiza.

Peter will set up home at Little Waltham, near Chelmsford, Terry will live at Sydenham and Ray will stay in Edmonton.

Arsenal's visit on the opening day of last season drew a crowd of 56,280. Our biggest this season was for the visit of Liverpool, when the figure was 50,474. Our lowest home gate was 27,693 for the visit of Southampton.

The biggest away crowd was Arsenal's 55,251, and the smallest for a match against Spurs was 13,993 at Sunderland.

WELCOME TO ARSENAL . . .

THE COMPOSITION of Arsenal's team has not changed a great deal since they were last here in the Semi-final of the League Cup in December, 1968.

Two young players in half-back Eddie Kelly and centre-forward Charlie George have emerged this season at League level, and winger Peter Marinello was signed at a big fee from Hibernian in January. The rest of the Arsenal players expected to appear today have performed in First Division football on this ground in the past.

George is a local who played for Islington Schools. He signed for Arsenal as an apprentice in May, 1966, and as a full professional in February, 1968.

Kelly is a Scot from Glasgow, who joined Arsenal soon after his 17th birthday. He has been a professional at Highbury since February, 1968.

Marinello, whose signing was accompanied by a blaze of publicity, had established himself as one of the outstanding forwards in Scottish football. He joined Hibs from a Scottish minor club in 1966.

WOLVES AMATEUR

Goalkeeper Bob Wilson was an amateur with Wolverhampton Wanderers before he signed as a professional for Arsenal. That was in March, 1964, but he had joined Arsenal as an amateur during the previous year. Wilson was born in Chesterfield.

Right-back Peter Storey was a Schoolboy International. He comes from Farnham in Surrey, joined Arsenal as an apprentice in May, 1961, and became a full professional in September, 1962.

England full-back Bob McNab made his name with Huddersfield Town, his home-town club. Arsenal secured his transfer from Huddersfield in October, 1966 in face of stern competition from other clubs.

Half-back Frank McLintock, Arsenal's skipper, is also a player in the international limelight. He was recalled to Scotland's team against Northern Ireland last month.

McLintock is a Glasgow man, who joined Leicester City as a junior, and was transferred to Arsenal in October, 1964.

OWN PRODUCT

Half-back Peter Simpson is one of Arsenal's own products, and a highly successful one judged on his form over the last couple of years. He comes from Gorleston in Norfolk, and joined Arsenal's ground staff in May, 1960.

Centre-forward George Graham has also been in top form this season, and has commanded the attention of the Scottish selectors. Graham started his career in English football with Aston Villa, and in July, 1964 moved to Chelsea.

Arsenal secured Graham's transfer in October, 1966 as part of the deal that took striker Tommy Baldwin in the opposite direction.

Winger George Armstrong has played more League games for Arsenal than any other current player on the club's books. He comes from County Durham, and arrived at Highbury as an insideforward trialist in August, 1961. He has played for the England Under-23 team.

VITAL GOALS

We have good reason to remember John Radford for the vital goals he scored against us last season. It was Radford who scored the last-minute goal against us for Arsenal in the first leg of the League Cup Semi-final last season.


In the second leg, on this ground, it was Radford again who scored in the closing minutes to put Arsenal level at 1—1, and so take his team to the Final.

When we beat Arsenal at Highbury last September, Radford again scored.

John is a Yorkshireman from Hemsworth, near Pontefract. He has been with Arsenal as a full-time professional since February, 1964. Radford is a full international, and has also played for the Football League.

Jon Sammels is another of Arsenal's experienced forwards. He comes from Ipswich, joined Arsenal as an apprentice in January, 1961, and has been a full professional since July, 1962.

Ray Kennedy, who scored Arsenal's goal against Anderlecht in Brussels last week, is a young forward who was upgraded from apprentice to full professional in November, 1968. He comes from Seaton Delayal in Northumberland.

No Spurs player has been ever-present this season, but Pat Jennings and Alan Mullery have missed only one League match each.

Five players have made their League debut for Spurs this season, namely Steve Perryman, Martin Peters, Terry Naylor, Roy Woolcott and Ken Hancock. Of the three matches played by Naylor, two of them away, none was lost.

This is the third season in succession in which Jim Finney has refereed our home League match with Arsenal.

The last seven goals conceded by Spurs in League matches on this ground have all been scored at the Edmonton end. The last goal scored by the opposition at the Park Lane end was Willie Carlin's for Derby in January.

Next week the contractors will move in to start work removing the top soil from most of the playing pitch. The pitch will then be covered with a new layer of soil prior to the annual re-seeding.

Last week the death was announced of Donald Finlay, the former champion hurdler. We wonder how many Spurs' supporters remember him playing outsideright for us while on R.A.F. service during the war.

Unless we score from a spot-kick this afternoon, this season will be the first in which Spurs have not scored on this ground from the 12-yards mark since 1948–49.


