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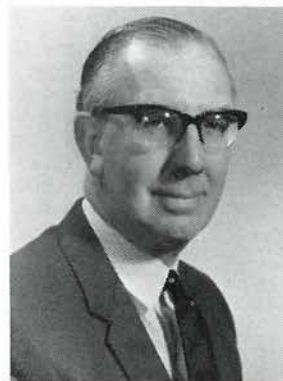

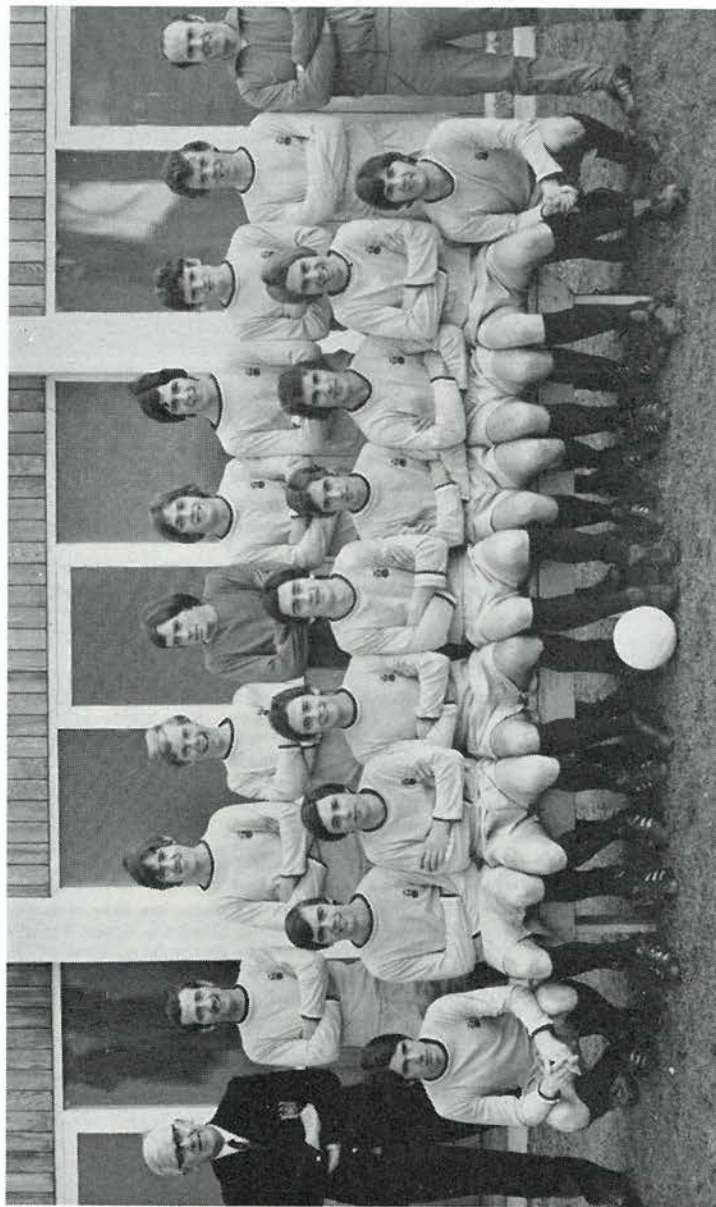
The results speak for themselves, and I am also heartened by the excellent team spirit shown by the entire Youth squad throughout the season.

PEN PICTURES OF COVENTRY

DAVID ICKE (Goalkeeper)

Born in Leicester, and joined Coventry as an apprentice professional on leaving school in July, 1967. Signed as a full professional at the beginning of this season. Spent two weeks in training with England and Stoke City goalkeeper Gordon Banks earlier this year, and regards it as the most enlightening fortnight of his life!

IVAN CROSSLEY (Full-back)

Joined Coventry in August, 1968, and has matured considerably since his arrival. Now has the ability to distribute the ball quickly but usefully. The only player in the side who also appeared in the 1967-68 Final against Burnley.

JIMMY HOLMES (Full-back)

Joined Coventry in preference to several other First Division clubs. Hails from Dublin, where he played for Bosco Boys' Club. An Eire Youth international, he is equally effective at full-back and centre-half. Rated one of the best young players produced by Ireland for years.

DENNIS MORTIMER (Midfield)

Played in the Coventry team that beat Spurs here in the First Division last month. An England Youth international, he scored against Wales at Leyton last month. Born in Liverpool, and joined Coventry straight from school.

ALAN DUGDALE (Defender)

Born in Kirkby, Liverpool, and has made great strides since signing as an apprentice in April, 1968. Has had a lot of Central League experience, and seems certain to make a name for himself. Equally at home at full-back or centre-half.

BOB PARKER (Defender)

Another local, born and bred in Coventry. Developed through schools football, and joined the Sky Blues as an apprentice on leaving school. Has established himself in Central League football, and has also played in Coventry's First Division team.

LES CARTWRIGHT (Winger)

Born in Aberdare in South Wales, and joined Coventry last October. Has played regularly in the Welsh Youth team this season. Has made a lot of progress in quick time.

ALAN GREEN (Striker)

Born in Worcester, and joined Coventry as an apprentice in April, 1969 after playing for Worcestershire County Boys. Has acquired a reputation as a goalscorer, and has already graduated to Central League level.

COLIN RANDELL (Midfield)

Born at Skewen, near Neath in South Wales. Joined Coventry as an apprentice straight from school, and has captained the Welsh Youth team this season. Basically a midfield player, but may appear today in the role of striker.

MICHAEL MCGUIRE (Midfield)

Born in Blackpool, and was signed by Coventry in face of stiff competition from other First Division clubs. Has already done well in Central League football, and is regarded at Highfield Road as a great prospect.

TREVOR SMITH (Winger)

Born in Birmingham, and signed for Coventry as an apprentice last August. Has played a key part in his team's progress to the Final, and scored the winning goal in the second leg of the Semi-final against Manchester United at Old Trafford.

JOHN STEVENSON (Forward)

Comes from Uddington in Lanarkshire, and signed as an apprentice last August, a year after joining Coventry as an amateur. Plays on either wing, and also looks the part as a midfield player.

BARRY DAINES (Goalkeeper)

Has gained England Youth honours this season. Born at Witham in Essex, and still lives there. Played for Chelmsford, Mid-Essex and Essex County Boys' teams before joining Spurs. Upgraded from apprentice to full professional rank last September. Has made two Football Combination appearances this season.

BOBBY ALMOND (Full-back)

Comes from Forest Hill in South London. Played for the London Federation of Boys' Clubs, and is an England Boys' Clubs trialist. Was recommended to us by former Spurs winger Micky Dulin. On amateur forms.



PHIL HOLDER (Midfield)

Captains the Youth team. Born at Kilburn, and played in the Brent District and Middlesex Boys' teams. Has been a full professional since February of last year. Made his first appearance for the England Youth team against Wales on Orient's ground last month. Has made six appearances in the Combination team this season.

MICHAEL DILLON (Half-back)

Born at Highgate and attended Holloway School. A Schoolboy international, who has also played for Islington, London and Middlesex Boys. Has been a full professional since December, and has one Combination appearance to his credit this season.



BILL EDWARDS (Half-back)

Comes from Paddington and played for the Paddington District Primary Schools team. Signed apprentice professional forms in September, 1967, but reverted to amateur status in January of this year.

GRAEME SOUNESS (Midfield)

Born in Edinburgh and played for Scotland as a schoolboy. Attended the same school as Dave Mackay, our former skipper, and also played for Edinburgh Boys. Signed apprentice forms last April.



JOHN OLIVER (Winger)

Comes from Barking. Played for Collier Row Colts, and represented the Barking Youth League. Has played for the England Amateur Youth team this season, and is still an amateur.

BRIAN TURNER (Forward)

An Australian from Newcastle, New South Wales. Arrived for trials prior to the opening of this season on the recommendation of Tommy Dawson, the former Charlton Athletic forward. Was later signed as a professional for the rest of the season.



RAY CLARKE (Centre-forward)

Born at Hackney, and attended school in Finsbury. Played for London, Middlesex and Islington schools, and was an England trialist. Has been a full pro. since October.

STEVE PERRYMAN (Midfield)

Has established himself as a First Division player this season. Born at Ealing, and played for Ealing, London, Middlesex and England Boys. Signed as an apprentice in 1967, and has been a full pro. since January, 1969. A full England Youth international.



BOBBY WILES (Striker)

Comes from Walthamstow, and is a product of the Waltham Forest Boys' team. Played for Walthamstow Rangers, and represented the Forest League. On amateur forms.

GARY PLACKETT (Midfield)

Comes from Hoddesdon, and has played for the Hertfordshire County Boys' team. Trained regularly here during the evening sessions, and has made several appearances for the Youth team this season. On amateur forms.

To qualify for the F.A. Youth Cup, a player must be under 18 years of age on 1st September of the current season.

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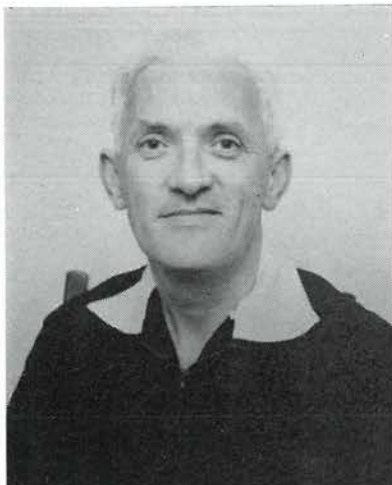

MAN IN CHARGE

Referee for today is Mr. John Osborne of Ipswich.

Mr. Osborne's interest in football extends beyond his activity as a League referee. His route to the Football League list in 1962 was via the Ipswich and District, and Eastern Counties Leagues, and the Football Combination.

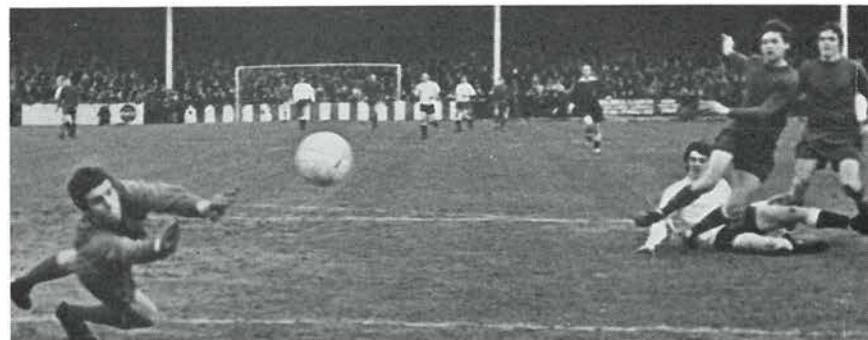
His last match on this ground was our League fixture with Stoke City in February.

MATCH BY MATCH . . .

FOR SPURS, the path to the Youth Cup Final started on an evening at the end of October, when West Ham United were our visitors in the First Round.

At that time West Ham were in a mid-table position in the South-East Counties League, but the match looked evenly balanced. In the event it proved a run-away win for Spurs and our 6-1 margin of victory turned out to be easily the biggest on our route to the Final.

At half-time we were leading by three clear goals. The first goal was scored by Graeme Souness, Ray Clarke followed with a second and Clive Charles, the West Ham left-back, put the ball in his own net for our third.

Spurs maintained their grip in the second half, Bobby Wiles and Steve Perryman taking the score to 5-0 before Charles atoned for his earlier lapse by scoring for the Hammers. A further goal by Clarke took our total to six.

"NO MATCH"

In their next match programme West Ham were honest enough to record that they had been "no match" for Spurs.

It was a most encouraging start, and we were fortunate enough to be drawn at home in the next round. Orient were our opponents on an evening in early December, and they put up stouter resistance than we had encountered against West Ham.

It was a memorable night for John Oliver. He gave Spurs the lead in the first half with a brilliant shot from the edge of the penalty area, and later scored a second goal to give us a 2-0 win.

Our luck in the draw for Round 3 again held good. We were again given a home tie, this time against Arsenal. The match was dated for the last day of the old year, but the unfit state of the ground caused a postponement.

It was on the first Monday of January that the game was played, and again we finished winners against London opponents. It was a splendid game and the only goal was scored by Wiles, following a downfield pass by Mike Dillon, in the 32nd minute.

AWAY WIN

In the Fourth Round we were away

from home for the first time. The draw decreed that we should visit Reading late in January, and in winning 2-0, Spurs were not flattered by the score.

We were soon in the lead with a goal from Clarke following a 30-yard shot by Phil Holder that the Reading goalkeeper failed to hold. Our second goal was netted just after half-time by Brian Turner, who finished off a good move by Bill Edwards, Oliver and Dillon.

For the Fifth Round regionalisation had ceased, and we were drawn at home to Stoke City. The match was played in February, and Spurs were again worthy winners by 2-0.

Oliver netted in the first half, and Clarke ensured victory with a second goal after half-time.

TWO-LEG SEMI-FINAL

The win over Stoke brought immense satisfaction to everyone connected with the Club. We were in the two-leg Semi-final of the Youth Cup for the first time, and found ourselves paired with Bristol City.

The gap between the Fifth Round and the first leg of the Semi-final was longer than between any of the other ties. It was played here last month, and it was disappointing that the weather was so wintry on the evening of the match.

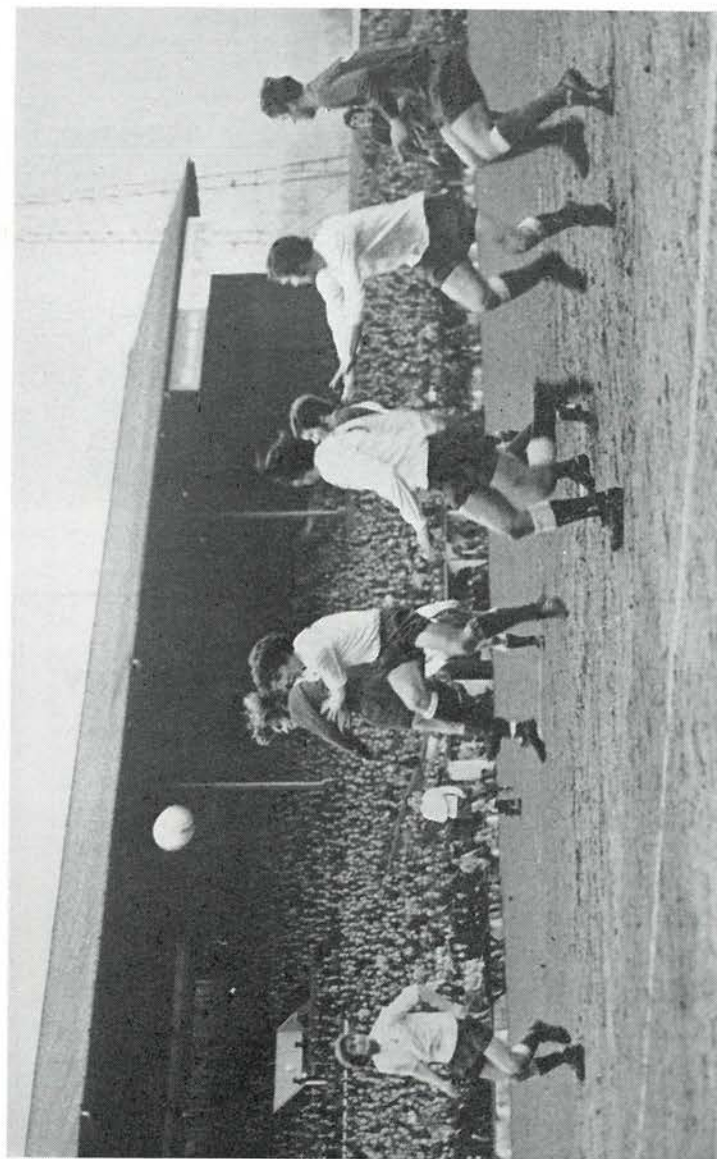
There was a warm glow about the performance of our team, however, and when the final whistle blew we were winners by 2-0.

After Clarke had scored in the first half, Spurs always shaped like winners, and a second goal from Dillon in the second half underlined our superiority.

No team can afford to be complacent with a two-goal lead in the away leg, and Spurs took the field at Bristol in determined mood. The game produced only one goal, by Oliver in the 59th minute.

We were in the Final . . . a just reward for the splendid efforts of the players throughout the competition, and for the backstage organisation necessary in running the team.

Defensively, our record in the Youth Cup is remarkable. In seven matches to date, we have conceded only one goal.
