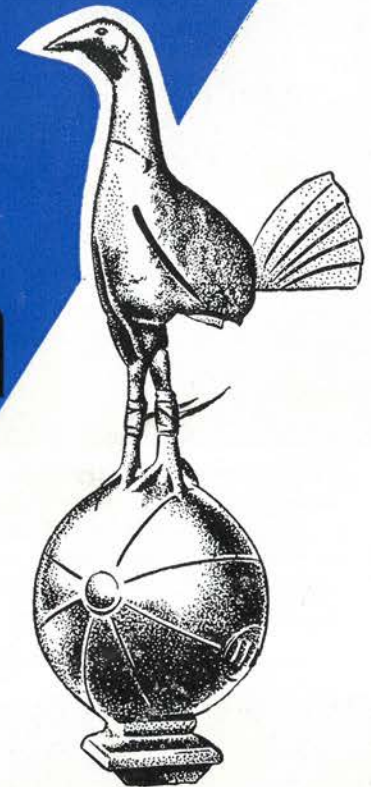

Lead Lost

AT Nottingham on Saturday Spurs were in the lead from the 35th to the 68th minute. From the moment that Martin Chivers finished off a fine move in which several Spurs players participated, until David Jones cracked home his great left-footed shot from a short free-kick by George Lyall, there seemed a really good chance that we would beat Nottingham Forest at the first attempt.

Encouraged by their equaliser, however, Forest played with renewed spirit, and Pat Jennings made a good save from a header by Barry Butlin a few minutes later.

Tension mounted as the game moved towards the closing stages. In the 80th minute Butlin hit a shot on the half-turn over the bar. Then came a late spell of Spurs domination. Chivers broke away only to shoot over, and in the closing minutes John Pratt had two shots saved, Liam O'Kane kicked desperately behind to concede a corner and in our last attack Ralph Coates fired over the bar.

STUBBORN OPPONENTS

We feel we should have won this tie at the first attempt. Forest, to whom we extend a warm welcome to White Hart Lane for this evening's replay, were stubborn opponents, however, and they had been quick to demonstrate their sharpness in the opening minutes.

Jennings was in action with a save from Butlin in the 5th minute, and the Forest striker followed this effort with another shot that cleared the bar.

A couple of minutes before Chivers scored, John Duncan found himself in a good shooting position, but he placed the ball wide. Forest were quick to retaliate after we had taken the lead, and only a great acrobatic save by Jennings from Butlin robbed them of an earlier equaliser.

Our goalkeeper also had to be smart to hold a sharp shot from Miah Dennehy five minutes after the restart. In the 60th minute Forest lost Viv

THE MEN OF FOREST

JOHN MIDDLETON (Goalkeeper). Played for the England Youth XI here against Spurs' Under-19s last month. Comes from Skegness and was recommended to Bill Anderson, Forest's assistant-manager. Middleton is new to League football this season.

VIV ANDERSON (Defender). Left the field injured in the second half on Saturday. Born in Nottingham and has been given his senior chance this season. A product of Forest's apprentice ranks.

PADDY GREENWOOD (Defender). Played under the management of Terry Neill at Hull. Born in Hull, and left the Hull City club for Barnsley in November, 1971. Joined Forest from Barnsley last October. A product of the Hull Boys' team, who attended Ainthorpe High School, Hull.

DAVID JONES (Defender). Scored Forest's all-important goal on Saturday. Born in Bristol but made his name with Bournemouth. Transferred from Bournemouth to Forest just before this season opened.

LIAM O'KANE (Defender). A Northern Ireland international who was born at Derry. Joined Forest from Derry City, the Irish League club, in December, 1968. Was Forest's only ever-present player in the Second Division last season.

GEORGE LYALL (Midfield). An experienced player who joined Forest from Preston North End in May, 1972. Born at Wick, and played for Raith Rovers before moving into English football with Preston.

REFEREE FOR TONIGHT

The referee tonight is Mr. Keith Styles of Barnsley, who was in charge of the first match in Nottingham on Saturday.

Mr. Styles who has been on the League list of referees since 1965, and had been on the linesmen's list since 1960, began refereeing in local leagues and graduated through the Yorkshire League. He played as an amateur with Sheffield Wednesday and is now a qualified F.A. coach.

He refereed a League Cup quarter-final tie in 1971, and on the 22nd of this month he controls the second-leg semi-final League Cup-tie between Aston Villa and Chester. In 1971 he also refereed the England v. Holland schoolboy international at Wembley. The following year he was on the line for a Nations Cup match between Spain and Russia.

A schoolmaster by profession, he is keen on tennis, gymnastics, gardening and the coaching of schoolboys.

THREE FOR JONES

Chris Jones scored a hat-trick in the 3—2 win by the Reserves over Plymouth Argyle in the Football Combination here on Saturday.

He gave us an early lead following a corner on the right, when he finally stabbed the ball home following a scramble in the Plymouth goalmouth. Spurs were in good form, and showing improvement on the previous Combination display at Bournemouth, even though we also won that game.

Plymouth equalised before half-time, but Barry Daines had been inactive in our goal for much of the half. Early in the second half Jones regained the lead for Spurs following good work on the left by Gary Anderson. Chris glanced the ball home in a manner reminiscent of Alan Gilzean.

Spurs were now playing in confident mood and Jones completed his hat-trick by moving in quickly to head home a free-kick by Ray Evans. Plenty of other chances got away. Roger Gibbins hit a post, Neil McNab was just baulked by the goalkeeper and Phil Holder was not far out with a couple of shots. Plymouth snatched a late second goal following a defensive slip on our part.

This was a good all-round display by our Reserves. Their standard of play and the result proved they are capable of a good performance when they apply themselves to the job in hand.

TWICE BEFORE . . .

This is the third occasion on which we have clashed with Nottingham Forest in the F.A. Cup. Our first-ever meeting with them in the competition was on no less an occasion than the semi-final in 1967.

We won that match by 2—1 on Sheffield Wednesday's ground and went on to win the Cup by beating Chelsea at Wembley. With tonight's immediate task ahead of us, it might be tempting fate to say too much about omens!

The other occasion on which we met Forest in the F.A. Cup was in a fifth round tie on this ground in February, 1971. That match also ended in a 2—1 win for Spurs, and we will be quite happy, after Saturday's hard game at the City Ground, if we can come off the field with a similar score-line in our favour tonight.

Many supporters of both Spurs and Forest will have clear recollections of those other Cup meetings. The match here in 1971 did not reach the high standard expected of it. A boisterous wind made conditions difficult for the players, particularly when playing towards the Park Lane goal.

Spurs took an early lead, **Martin Chivers** hammering the ball in after Jim Barron, the Forest goalkeeper, had pushed out a shot from Alan Gilzean.

A second Spurs goal, back-headed by **Gilzean** in his own elegant way from a long throw by Chivers, strengthened our position, but the outlook changed when Forest were awarded a penalty halfway through the second half for an infringement by Cyril Knowles on Peter Cormack.

Ian Storey-Moore converted the spot-kick, and only the combined efforts of Knowles and Pat Jennings prevented Cormack from scoring an equaliser in the closing minutes.

The gate figure at that match was 46,366 and the teams were—SPURS: Jennings; Kinnear, Knowles, Mullery, Collins, P., Beal, Gilzean, Perryman, Chivers, Peters and Neighbour. FOREST: Barron; Hindley, Winfield, Chapman, O'Kane, Jackson, Lyons, Fraser, Collier (sub. Rees), Cormack and Storey-Moore.

MEMORABLE MATCH

A semi-final is always a memorable match, and it is with both pleasure and pride that we look back on that 1967 tie at Hillsborough.

At the time of that game Forest were second in the First Division and Spurs stood third. It was not a classic, but it provided plenty of incident and was played at a fast, exciting pace.

Joe Baker, their star centre-forward, was out of the Forest team that day, and this was undoubtedly a handicap to them. The first big incident of the game came after 32 minutes when **Jimmy Greaves** gave Spurs the lead with a scorching shot that flashed into Forest's net off the base of the left post.

That goal knocked some of the spirit out of Forest, but we had a narrow escape just before half-time. In clearing a cross by John Barnwell with his head, Cyril Knowles came within inches of putting the ball in his own goal.

Forest worked really hard in the second half in their efforts to pull level, and tended to leave themselves open at the back. In the 66th minute **Frank Saul** left Terry Hennessey standing to burst through and score Spurs' second goal.

Only nine minutes were left to play when **Hennessey** headed through for Forest from a corner by Barry Lyons, and Forest made an all-out bid to save the game. Spurs' defence held out, and we nearly added to our score in the closing minutes.

The gate at Hillsborough was 55,000 and the teams were—SPURS: Jennings; Kinnear, Knowles, Mullery, England, Mackay (sub. Jones), Robertson, Greaves, Gilzean, Venables and Saul. NARROW WIN

The Youth team pulled off a narrow 1—0 win over Crystal Palace in the South-East Counties League, Division 1 at Cheshunt on Saturday morning.

GOING NORTH?

Supporters planning to travel to Newcastle for our League match on Saturday are advised by the R.A.C. to use the following route.

Proceed via Potters Bar to the junction of the B.650 with the A.6. Turn right into the A.6 and proceed for four miles before continuing by the A.405 to the M.10. Follow the M.10 and then the M.1 northward to the junction with the M.18 and continue by the M.18 to the intersection with the Doncaster By-Pass—A.1(M). Follow the A.1(M), then the A.1 to the Darlington By-pass—A.1(M)—and continue by the A.1 to Newcastle. The approximate distance from the Tottenham area is 283 miles.

Enter Newcastle by Durham Road (A.1) and continue to West Street. Turn right on to Jackson Street, then left on to High Street and proceed to the roundabout. Take first exit—Tyne Bridge—and continue to next roundabout. Take first exit—Mosley Street—and follow one-way system to Neville Street. Turn right on to Clayton Street and continue to St. Andrew Street—keeping right—to Gallowgate. Turn left and the ground is on the right.

There is parking space available near the ground and some street parking is allowed but controlled by the police. Other streets are in the "meter zone", so watch for any special signs, including diversions.

What decision should the referee give?

In this situation the defender has committed two offences. He has played the ball a second time and also has handled it.

His team is therefore penalised for the more serious offence of handling, and a penalty should therefore be awarded.

If he had merely played the ball a second time without handling it, the decision would be an indirect free-kick to the opposing team from the place where the infringement occurred.
