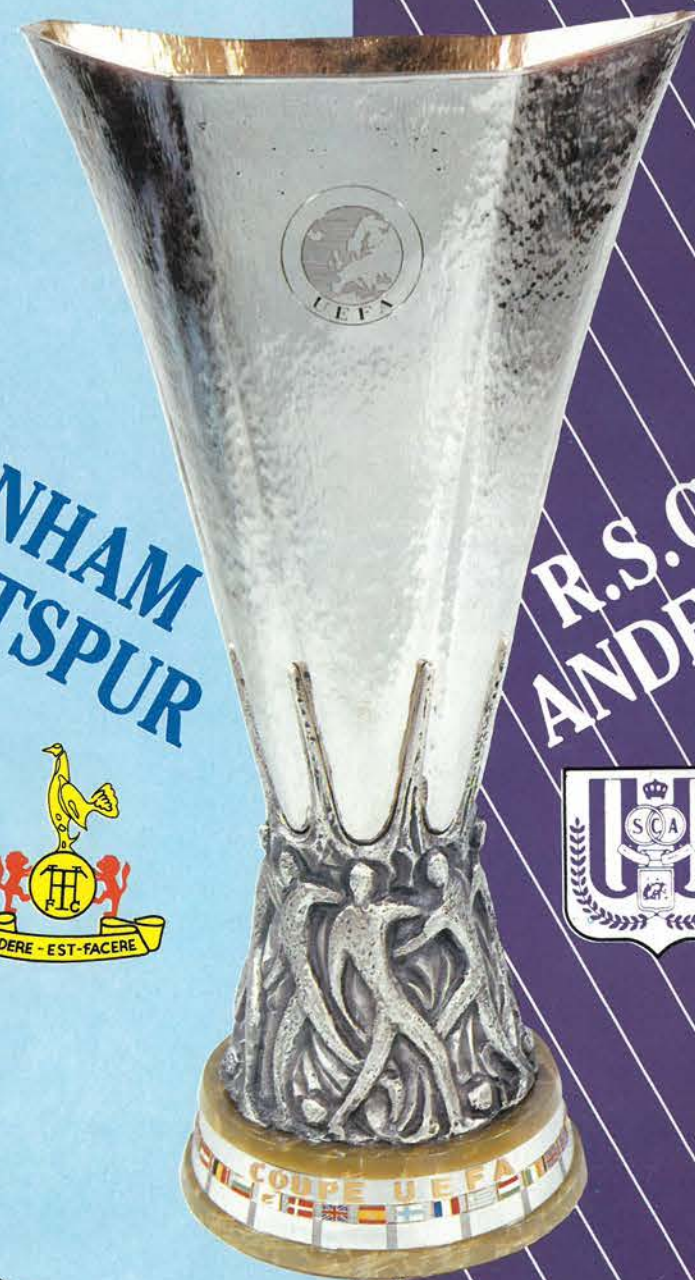

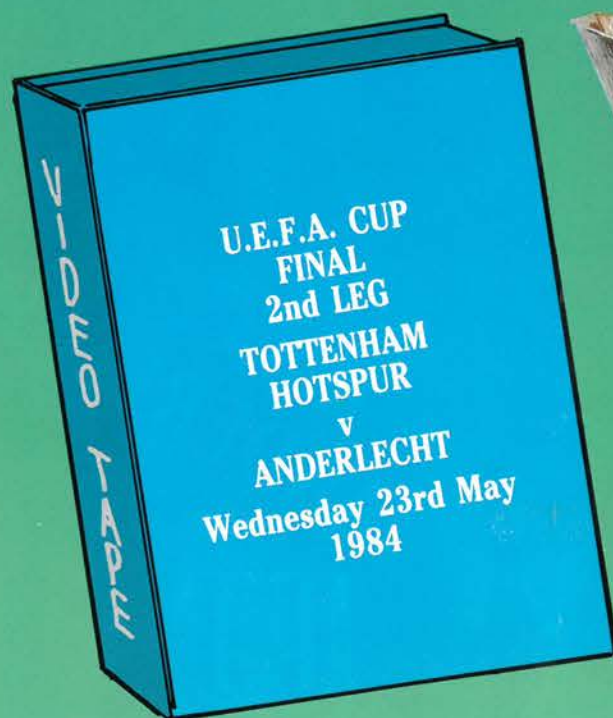

WELCOME TO ANDERLECHT

We finish the competitive season here at White Hart Lane this evening with our most important match of 1983-84, and naturally hope it will pass into Club history as one of the great and memorable occasions for Tottenham Hotspur.

The first leg, away to ANDERLECHT, of our final tie in the U.E.F.A. Cup, resulted in a 1-1 draw a fortnight ago and it is now our great pleasure to welcome our rivals from Belgium to Tottenham for the second leg tonight.

Our pairing with Anderlecht — or Royal Sporting Club Anderlechtois to give them their full title — adds yet another colourful chapter to our story of European cup-ties. Much of the appeal of European competition is the matching of clubs who would not normally meet other than in friendly or exhibition matches.

Spurs have played Anderlecht in Brussels in the past but this two-legged final is the first occasion on which the two clubs have met in competitive football.

Moreover, the tie is given extra colour from our point of view by the fact that we had never, prior to the draw in the first leg in Brussels, played a Belgian club in any of the European competitions.

That's a remarkable statistic for a club with our record of having participated in 39 ties divided between the European Champions Cup, the Cup-Winners' Cup and the U.E.F.A. Cup.

HOLDERS

Like ourselves, Anderlecht are past winners of the U.E.F.A. Cup. They won the trophy as recently as last May by beating Benfica of Portugal on an aggregate of 2-1 and are therefore the current holders.

Anderlecht have also enjoyed success in the European Cup-Winners' Cup, beating West Ham United 4-3 in the final of 1976 and following up two years later with a victory in the final over Austria/WAC by 4-0 in the same competition.

To these successes Anderlecht can add a runners-up appearance in the old Fairs Cup, the forerunner of the present-day U.E.F.A. Cup, in 1970, when they lost on a 4-3 aggregate to Arsenal.

Anderlecht are therefore a club with pedigree and with the character to contest the issue to the last whistle as we found to our cost in Brussels a fortnight ago, and their victims on the road to the present U.E.F.A. Cup final include some powerful opposition.

The Belgians have knocked out Bryne (Norway), Banik Ostrava (Czechoslovakia), Lens (France), Spartak Moscow (Russia) and Nottingham Forest in the earlier rounds.

We therefore have good reason to respect Anderlecht, especially in the light of their semi-final performance against Forest, when they turned a 2-0 deficit from the first leg into a 3-2 win on aggregate in the second, and their display against us in Brussels.

The stage is now set for a tremendous encounter tonight, and we hope the many supporters of Anderlecht who have travelled from Belgium for the match will be rewarded by a display of football worthy of such an important sporting occasion.

ANDERLECHT, NOUS VOUS SOUHAITONS LA BIENVENUE

Nous terminons ce soir la saison sportive ici à White Hart Lane par notre match le plus important de l'année 1983-84 et bien sûr, nous espérons qu'il fera date dans les annales du Club en tant qu'événement important et mémorable pour Tottenham Hotspur.

La première manche de notre dernier match éliminatoire de la Coupe des Villes de Foires à Anderlecht, se termina il y a quinze jours en un match nul 1-1 et c'est maintenant avec grand plaisir que nous accueillons ce soir nos adversaires de Belgique à Tottenham pour la deuxième manche.

Notre jumelage avec Anderlecht — ou plutôt le Royal Sporting Club anderlechtois pour lui donner son nom complet — représente un nouveau chapitre pittoresque de notre histoire de matchs européens éliminatoires. L'attrait principal des compétitions européennes est le jumelage des clubs qui ne se rencontrent normalement que lors de matchs amicaux ou de représentation.

Spurs a déjà joué contre Anderlecht à Bruxelles mais c'est la première fois que les deux clubs se rencontrent en finale de compétition de football.

De plus, pour nous, ce match éliminatoire a d'autant plus d'attrait que nous n'avions jamais joué contre un club belge dans des compétitions européennes avant le match nul de la première manche à Bruxelles.

Ceci est d'autant plus remarquable étant donné notre record de participation à 39 matchs éliminatoires tant dans la Coupe Européenne des Champions que dans la Coupe des Coupes et la Coupe des Villes de Foires.

DETENTEURS

Anderlecht, tout comme nous mêmes, ont gagné la Coupe des Villes de Foires. Ils ont gagné le trophée en mai dernier en battant Benfica du Portugal par un total de 2-1 et en sont donc les détenteurs actuels. Anderlecht ont également gagné la Coupe des Coupes en battant West Ham United par 4-2 dans la finale de 1976 et deux ans plus tard ils ont remporté la victoire dans la finale contre l'Autriche WAC par 4-0 dans la même compétition.

A part ces victoires, Anderlecht étaient arrivés second lors du match de l'ancienne Coupe des Foires, précurseur de la Coupe actuelle des Villes de Foires (UEFA) en 1970 lorsqu'ils perdirent par un total de 4-3 contre Arsenal.

Anderlecht est donc un club qui a de la classe et qui a le courage de se battre jusqu'au dernier coup de sifflet comme nous nous en sommes rendu compte à nos frais à Bruxelles il y a quinze jours. Il faut ajouter qu'ils ont rencontré une forte opposition sur le chemin de la finale de la Coupe des Villes de Foires.

Dans les manches précédentes, les Belges ont battu Bryne (Norvège), Banik Ostrava (Tchécoslovaquie), Lens (France), Spartak Moscou (Russie) et Nottingham Forest.

Nous avons donc bien des raisons de respecter Anderlecht compte tenu de leur performance contre nous à Bruxelles et surtout de leur performance lors de la demi-finale contre Forest lorsqu'ils sont remontés de 2-0 à la première manche à 3-2 à la deuxième manche.

La scène est prête ce soir pour une rencontre palpitante et nous espérons que les nombreux supporters d'Anderlecht qui sont venus de Belgique pour le match, seront récompensés par une démonstration de football digne d'une manifestation sportive aussi importante.

WELKOM, ANDERLECHT

Het laatste deel van ons competitie seizoen wordt hier vanavond in White Hart Lane gespeeld met de belangrijkste match in 1983-84 en we hopen natuurlijk dat dit in de annalen van de Club zal gaan als een van de grote en gedenkwaardige gebeurtenissen van Tottenham Hotspur.

Het eerste gedeelte van onze beslissende wedstrijd in de U.E.F.A. Beker die in Anderlecht twee weken geleden gespeeld werd, eindigde in een 1-1 gelijkspel en het is nu ons groot genoegen om onze Belgische rivalen hier in Tottenham vanavond te verwelkomen voor het tweede gedeelte van de match.

Ons paren met Anderlecht, of Royal Sporting Club Anderlechtois om de club zijn rechtmatige titel te geven, brengt weer een kleurrijk hoofdstuk in onze geschiedenis van Europese bekerwedstrijden. Wat vooral bijdraagt tot de aantrekkingskracht van Europese wedstrijden is het paren van clubs die elkaar normaal niet zouden ontmoeten anders dan in een vriendschappelijke- of vertoningswedstrijd.

Spurs heeft Anderlecht reeds vroeger in Brussel ontmoet maar in deze twee-delige finale is het de eerste maal dat de twee clubs elkaar in een competitiewedstrijd ontmoeten.

Bovendien heeft de wedstrijd, wat ons betreft, nog een extra aantrekkingskracht door het feit dat wij nooit eerder, voor de onbesliste wedstrijd tijdens het eerste gedeelte in Brussel, een Belgische club in een der Europese wedstrijden ontmoet hebben.

Dit is wel een opmerkelijke statistiek in een club als de onze die reeds deelnam in 39 wedstrijden verdeeld onder de Europese Kampioen Beker, de Beker-winnaars Beker en de U.E.F.A. Beker.

HOUDERS

Zoals wij, is Anderlecht ook vorige houders van de U.E.F.A. Beker. Zij wonnen de trofee verleden jaar nog in mei door Benfica van Portugal te verslaan met een aggregatie 2-1 en zijn dus de huidige beker-houders.

Anderlecht heeft ook succes gekend in de Europese Beker-winnaars Beker, waar zij West Ham United in de finale in 1976 versloegen met een 4-2 overwinning en twee jaar later vervolgden ze dit met een zege in de finale over Oostenrijk /WAC met 4-0 in dezelfde wedstrijd. Bij deze overwinningen telt Anderlecht nog een optreden in 1976 in de oude Fairs Beker, voorloper van de huidige U.E.F.A. Beker, waar ze als tweede geklasseerd werden door een 4-3 aggregatie overwinning door Arsenal.

Anderlecht mag dus zeker een club met "pedigree" genoemd worden, een club die met kracht tot op de laatste seconde het resultaat zal bekampen, zoals wij veertien dagen geleden in Brussel tot ons nadeel moesten ondervinden. Hun slachtoffers op de weg naar de huidige U.E.F.A. Beker finale vertegenwoordigen sterke oppositie-clubs.

De Belgen versloegen Bryne (Noorwegen), Banik Ostrava (Tsjechoslovakië), Lens (Frankrijk), Spartak Moscow (Rusland) en Nottingham Forest in de voorgaande rondes.

We hebben daarom grondige reden Anderlecht te respecteren, vooral in het licht van hun halve-finale prestatie tegen Forest, waar zij een 2-0 verlies in hun eerste gedeelte wisten te wijzigen naar een 3-2 zege op aggregatie in het tweede gedeelte, en hun sterk spel tegen ons in Brussel.

Alles is nu gereed voor een fantastische ontmoeting vanavond, we hopen dat de vele supporters van Anderlecht die van België gekomen zijn voor de match beloofd zullen worden door een voetbalwedstrijd te zien waardig aan zulk een belangrijke sportieve gebeurtenis.

FRIENDLY WITH ANDERLECHT . . .

The first leg of this Cup final was not the first occasion on which Spurs had flown to Brussels to play Anderlecht.

On the morning of Tuesday, April 27th, 1965 the team left for a match with Anderlecht that evening and returned the following morning.

The match was played in heavy rain, and in a goalless first half, JACQUES STOCKMAN blasted over the bar with Spurs goalkeeper BILL BROWN beaten and chances were also missed at the other end by ALAN GILZEAN and JIMMY GREAVES.

Anderlecht finished winners by 4-2 in a more eventful second half. Greaves scored five minutes into the second half but PAUL VAN HIMST, now the Anderlecht coach, netted an immediate equaliser. Then Gilzean regained the lead for Spurs with a spectacular header.

Again it was Van Himst who squared matters for the Belgians, and from that point Spurs were thrown on the defensive. GEORGE HEYLENS and Stockman rounded things off for Anderlecht with two late goals. The gate figure was 10,000 and the team fielded by Spurs was Brown, W.; Norman, Henry; Mullery, Brown, L., Clayton; Weller, Greaves, Saul, Gilzean and Jones.

BELGIAN VISITORS . . .

The last Belgian club to visit White Hart Lane was Royal Antwerp for a pre-season friendly in August, 1976. A crowd of 9,880 then saw a 1-1 draw, GERRY ARMSTRONG scoring Spurs' goal. Two years later Spurs were away to Royal Antwerp in another pre-season friendly. Spurs won 3-1 with two goals from IAN MOORES and a penalty by GLENN HODDLE.

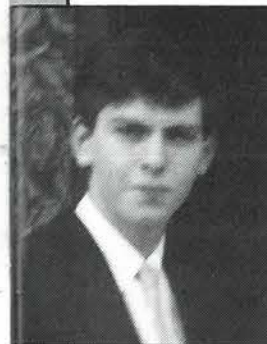
ENGLISH WINNERS . . .

If Spurs win the U.E.F.A. Cup, it will be the fifth occasion it has been won by an English club. We were the first winners in 1972, and Liverpool (1973 and 1976) and Ipswich Town have since carried it off.

The Fairs Cup, the forerunner of the U.E.F.A. Cup, was won by three English clubs. Leeds United were winners in 1968 and Newcastle United and Arsenal won it respectively in the following two years.

THREE FOR OSBORNE . . .

When England defeated Belgium 5-3 in Antwerp in May, 1926, three of the goals were scored by FRANK OSBORNE, then Spurs' centre-forward. In the same England team that day was JIMMY DIMMOCK, Spurs' famous old outside-left.

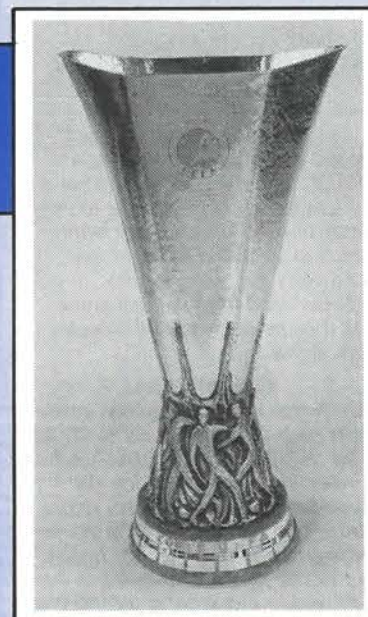

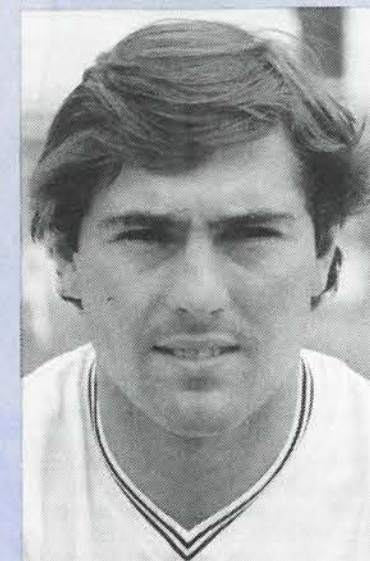
There was heavy rain prior to the start of the first leg at the Constant Vanden Stock stadium a fortnight ago, but fortunately it ceased just prior to the kick-off.

It was a fast, entertaining game which produced plenty of goalmouth incidents, and Spurs were on the attack from the start. Anderlecht also showed plenty of enterprise and a dangerous run by Georges Grun earned a corner.

The first half-hour was fairly even but Anderlecht had some anxious moments, notably when Mark Falco went close and when Gary Stevens had a shot well saved by Jacques Munaron. At the other end Tony Parks did well to save at the feet of Kenneth Larsen.

Spurs had an escape early in the second half when Alex Czerniatinski burst through but Anderlecht had their own moment of relief when Falco just failed to connect with a ball in the goalmouth

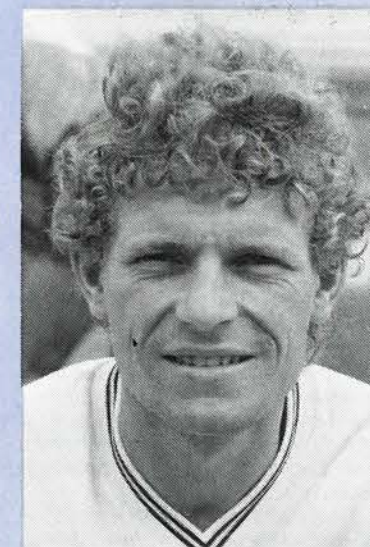
THE FIRST LEG

following a defensive lapse by the Belgians.

The highlight of the game was, of course, PAUL MILLER's goal, headed powerfully into the net from a well-judged corner on the right by Mike Hazard in the 59th minute. It was Paul's

first goal of the season, but its value is obvious.

OFFSIDE

Larsen then had the ball in the net but offside was the referee's decision, and it was soon after this incident that Munaron saved a free-kick by Hazard.

Both teams were maintaining a fast pace and Falco shot over from a dangerous cross on the right by Steve Archibald. Then Graham Roberts moved up to shoot and brought out the best in Munaron before Anderlecht had their great moment five minutes from time when MORTEN OLSEN scored from close in.

Gary Mabbutt had replaced Stevens in the 81st minute and Anderlecht made two substitutions. Frank Vercauteren came on for Czerniatinski in the 64th minute and Frank Arnesen replaced Erwin Vandenbergh in the 83rd.

The most regrettable incident from our point of view was the booking of Steve Perryman, which accounts for the absence of our Club skipper from tonight's second big clash.

Spurs' line-up is given on the statistics page. Anderlecht's team was — Munaron; Grun, De Greef, Czerniatinski (sub. Vercauteren), De Groote, Scifo, Vandereycken, Hofkens, Vandenbergh (sub. Arnesen), Olsen and Larsen.

THROUGH THE ROUNDS

For Spurs the route to tonight's second leg of the U.E.F.A. Cup final started on a wet afternoon at Drogheda in Southern Ireland.

Spurs romped away with a 6-0 win and were not flattered by the big margin of victory. MARK FALCO opened the score after six minutes, and further goals late in the first half by GARTH CROOKS and TONY GALVIN flattened any lingering Irish hopes of a giant-killing act.

GARY MABBUTT headed the fourth soon after the restart and also scored the sixth after Falco had netted with a rasping shot for the fifth.

The second leg was a foregone conclusion, Spurs winning 8-0. It was 4-0 at half-time thanks to two goals apiece from Falco and GRAHAM ROBERTS.

In the next round Spurs were paired with Feyenoord of Holland and the first leg was at home. It was a fine match, but Spurs' dominance was confined to the first half, in which the team built a lead of 4-0. STEVE ARCHIBALD and Galvin scored two goals each, but Feyenoord fought back in the second half for JOHANN CRUYFF and IVAN NIELSEN to net late goals that enabled the Dutch team to leave White Hart Lane only two goals in arrears.

HUGHTON SCORES
Spurs were in no mood to give further goals away in the second leg in Rotterdam. The result was a 2-0 win for Spurs, CHRIS HUGHTON scoring midway through the first half and Galvin crashing home the second a few minutes from the end.

In the next round Spurs faced Bayern Munich of West Germany, and the first leg was away. A late goal by MICHAEL RUMMENIGGE gave Bayern victory on the night, but Spurs put things right in the second leg here with a 2-0 win. Both goals, scored by Archibald and Falco, were netted in the second half. Falco was quoted in the following morning's "Daily Mail" as saying — "I have scored a few goals in my time but none more important than this".

The importance of that goal cannot be stressed too highly, and victory over Bayern gave us a tie in Round 4 with FK Austria with the winter break from European competition coming in between.

Thus it was in March that we lined up against the Austrians from Vienna in the first leg of Round 4 on this

ground. Spurs were good winners that night but the scoresheet remained blank until well into the second half when Archibald put us in front.

A few minutes later a precious second goal was scored by ALAN BRAZIL, and the match ended in a 2-0 win for Spurs to give the team plenty of confidence for the return match in Vienna a fortnight later.

An early goal was required to add to Spurs' lead from the first game and it came after only 14 minutes from Brazil.

GREAT GOAL

The home team certainly made a fight of it in the second half, but after HERBERT PROHASKA had converted a penalty kick for Austria, OSSIE ARDILES drove home a great goal for Spurs to extinguish any lingering hopes the home players may have had.

FK did in fact score a second goal in the fading moments through TIBOR NYILASI, but Spurs were comfortably through to the semi-finals on an aggregate of 4-2.

The two semi-final matches with Hajduk Split of Yugoslavia were, of course, played as recently as last month, and are fresh in memory.

Spurs lost 2-1 in Split after Falco had opened the score early in the game. Hajduk hit back after half-time and goals from IVAN GUDELJ and DUSAN PESIC gave the Yugoslavs a 2-1 win and the advantage of a goal lead at the start of the second leg.

Spurs won the tie on the strength of that well-taken free-kick by MIKE HAZARD but with the aggregate score at 2-2, it was the away goal scored by Falco that gave Spurs a place in the final.

THE PREVIOUS FINALS

By **LESLIE YATES**

The current final with **ANDERLECHT** is Spurs' third in only four seasons of participation in the U.E.F.A. Cup. Its an excellent record, especially as the one season in which Spurs failed to reach the final saw the Club knocked out only on the away goal rule by **Liverpool** in the semi-final.

That was in season 1972-73, when Spurs were holders of the U.E.F.A. Cup, having beaten **Wolverhampton Wanderers** in an all-English final the previous season.

Spurs' other final appearance in the U.E.F.A. Cup was in 1974, when **Feyenoord** of Holland emerged winners by 4-2 on aggregate.

In 1971-72 Spurs had beaten **Keflavik** (Iceland), **Nantes** (France), **Rapid Bucharest** and **U.T. Arad**, both of Rumania, and **A.C. Milan** (Italy) on the way to the final with **Wolves**.

The first leg of the final was at **Wolverhampton** and both teams were in the top half of the First Division. Spurs had had the better of the two League meetings that season, drawing 2-2 at **Molineux** and winning 4-1 here at **White Hart Lane**.



MARTIN CHIVERS

The match was played on a drab, damp evening, but the atmosphere was enlivened for Spurs supporters by the two great goals scored by **MARTIN CHIVERS** in the second half.

NARROW ESCAPES

The first of the Chivers goals was very well timed. It came soon after the start

of the second half at a time when **Wolves** were exerting a lot of pressure.

Spurs had a number of narrow escapes during this period, but a counter attack left **Wolves** in arrears. The goal followed a free-kick on the right taken by **MIKE ENGLAND**, Chivers giving goalkeeper **PHIL PARKES** no chance with his header.

That goal quickened the tempo of the match and in the 72nd minute **JIM McCALLIAG** equalised and the stage was then set for a tense finish.

Wolves fought hard for another goal and **DEREK DOUGAN** screwed a shot narrowly wide of the post, but the goal that proved to be the decider was delayed until the closing minutes, when Chivers cracked a thunderbolt of a shot into the net to finish off a move started by **CYRIL KNOWLES**.

Spurs finished winners by 2-1 and were therefore favourites to win the trophy. To their credit, however, **Wolves** put up a great fight in the second leg here a fortnight later.

A crowd of 54,303 spectators was here for what proved to be a tremendous match, full of exciting and thrilling football. **Wolves** were in a determined mood but they were set a task that proved beyond them when Spurs added to the lead gained in the first leg with a 29th-minute goal from a diving header by **ALAN MULLERY**. Spurs' old captain was knocked out in the effort and needed treatment before resuming.

Eleven minutes later **DAVE WAGSTAFFE** cut in to equalise with a shot off the post. The struggle became fierce and only a great save by **PAT JENNINGS** from **JOHN**

RICHARDS prevented **Wolves** from scoring a second goal on the night.

Thus Spurs were winners of the U.E.F.A. Cup in its first season under that title, and with that triumph also became the first British club to have won two major European trophies.

DEMANDING TASK

It was less of a happy story in Spurs' other U.E.F.A. Cup final in 1974.

The first leg against **Feyenoord** was played here at **White Hart Lane**. The crowd figure was 46,281 and it was soon evident that Spurs were facing a very demanding task.

Feyenoord attacked from the start, but the first goal that night was scored for Spurs by **England**, who netted following a free-kick taken by **RAY EVANS** in the 38th minute.

Not surprisingly, in view of the pattern of play, **Feyenoord** were level before half-time, **WIM VAN HANEGEM** scoring with a shot that clipped the bar.

Spurs' outlook brightened when **JOOP VAN DAELE**, the **Feyenoord** defender, conceded an own goal in the 63rd minute but the team from **Rotterdam** managed to force a 2-2 draw with an 84th-minute equaliser by **THEO DE JONG**.

It gave Spurs a mammoth task in the second leg in Holland, but that match will be remembered more for trouble in the crowd than for the 2-0 victory that gave the Dutch club the U.E.F.A. Cup.

Feyenoord scored just before half-time and Spurs were struggling from that stage of the game. **Feyenoord** netted their second goal four minutes from the end.

Spurs' team in the 1974 final was — **Jennings**, **Evans**, **Naylor**, **Pratt**, **England**, **Beal**, **McGrath**, **Perryman**, **Chivers**, **Peters**, **Coates**. **Dillon** replaced **Beal** in the first leg and **Holder** came on for **Pratt** in the second.

The team in the 1972 final was — **Jennings**, **Kinnear**, **Knowles**, **Mullery**, **England**, **Beal**, **Gilzean**, **Perryman**, **Chivers**, **Peters**, **Coates**. **Pratt** replaced **Coates** in the first leg. No substitute was used in the second leg.

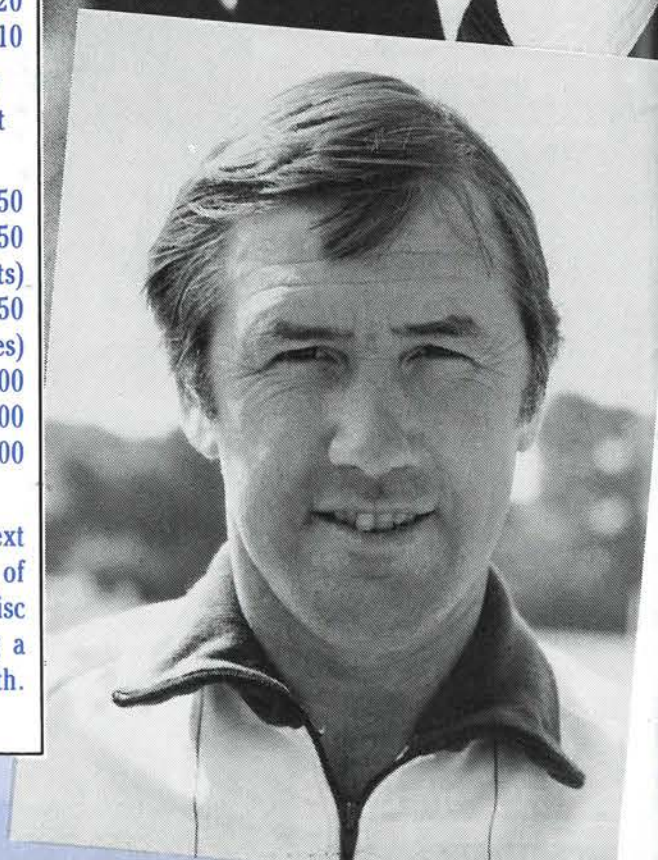
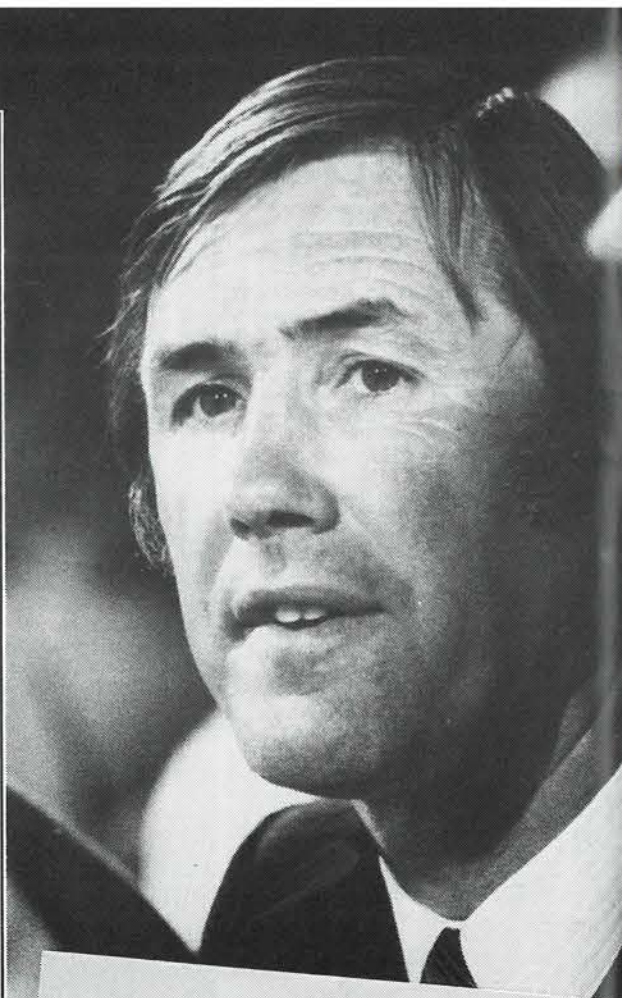

It was in 1908, the year in which Spurs entered the Football League, that the **ANDERLECHT** club of Brussels was formed. Their story is a familiar one. A group of enthusiastic youngsters got together to form a club and their first pitch was covered with meadow grass.

Yet Anderlecht were on their way. Their next ground had a fence! Friendly matches were played for a time before Anderlecht secured admission to the third division of the Belgian national league.

Progress was steady and despite the difficulties created by the First World War, Anderlecht built a new stadium, and by this time were no longer overshadowed by Union St. Gilloise, their powerful Brussels rivals.

Anderlecht now rank with the best clubs on the Continent and their proud record in Belgian football speaks for itself. The Brussels club hold the record for both the Belgian League championship and for winning the national cup. With 17 League titles to their credit they stand way ahead of Union St. Gilloise, who come next, and Anderlecht's five cup

the Cup-Winners' Cup in 1976, they defeated West Ham United in the final at the Heysel Stadium in Brussels. Their own ground, now named Constant Vanden Stock, has a capacity of 40,600 with seats for 11,100.

When Anderlecht played at Highbury against Arsenal in the second leg of the old Fairs Cup final in April, 1970, the gate figure was 51,612. Anderlecht lost 3-0 that night after winning the first leg 3-1 in Brussels.

On the broader national front, it is interesting to note that the Belgian F.A. was formed in 1895 and was an original member of F.I.F.A. on its formation in 1904.

TURNED TO ENGLAND

As in the case of Austria, who did so well under Jimmy Hogan, Belgium have turned in the past to England for a national coach, and it is generally agreed that a splendid job was done for them in that capacity by **BILL GORMLIE** in the early years after the last war.

THE ANDERLECHT STORY

triumphs is also a record.

Anderlecht won the Belgian League three times running in 1954, 1955 and 1956, and their domination was even greater in the nineteen-sixties, when they were champions five seasons running, starting in 1964.

LEADING CLUB

Anderlecht have established themselves as the leading Belgian club since the last war, and they have the distinction of being the only club in that country to have won any of the European trophies.

Anderlecht were winners of the European Cup-Winners' Cup in both 1976 and 1978 and in the season between they were runners-up in that competition.

They were also winners of the U.E.F.A. Cup last season and were runners-up in the Fairs Cup to Arsenal in 1970. Anderlecht also won the European Super Cup in 1977 and 1979.

It's an impressive record of which Anderlecht are justifiably proud, and it is an interesting point that the Belgian club is now facing London opposition in a European final for the third time. When they won

Gormlie, a pre-war goalkeeper with Blackburn Rovers and Northampton Town, did much to enhance the reputation of Belgian football and at one time only one match in twelve was lost under his supervision.

Many star Belgian international players have worn the colours of Anderlecht, who supplied ten players for the Belgian team that opposed Holland in Antwerp in September, 1964. And when **GUY DELHASSE**, the Liege goalkeeper, was replaced for the second half by **JEAN TRAPPENIERS** of Anderlecht, all eleven players were from the Brussels club!

Belgium's only victory over England in international football was by 3-2 in Brussels in 1936. When the teams drew 2-2 at Wembley in 1964, all Belgium's back four players were drawn from the Anderlecht club, who also supplied three of the others, including inside-forward **PAUL VAN HIMST**, scorer of one of the goals and now very much involved with tonight's match.

Spurs supplied two players to the England team that night, namely centre-half **MAURICE NORMAN** and inside-right **JIMMY GREAVES**.

HE'S THE COACH

PAUL VAN HIMST, the Anderlecht coach, holds the Belgian international record with 81 caps, and therefore holds a unique position in football in that country.

Aged 41, he captained Belgium in the finals of the World Cup in 1970, and spent all his playing career with Anderlecht with the exception of one season at its end with RWD Molenbeek.

Van Himst later returned to Anderlecht as youth coach, and in 1982 he succeeded Tomislav Ivic. An inside-forward in his playing days, Van Himst finished Belgium's top League goalscorer in three separate seasons.

ASSISTANT COACH

The assistant to **PAUL VAN HIMST** is **MARTIN LIPPENS**, who was an outstanding wing-half with Anderlecht and a full Belgian international. An Anderlecht man through and through, he is a key member of the club's back-room staff.

THE MEN OF ANDERLECHT

JACQUES MUNARON (Goalkeeper). A Belgian international who joined Anderlecht in 1974 from FC Dinant and served a lengthy apprenticeship as a reserve before establishing himself. Was a member of Belgium's World Cup squad in Spain in 1982. Born 8.9.1956.

DIRK VEKEMAN (Goalkeeper). Leapt to prominence as a youngster, when he gained Belgian youth international honours. Played for F.C. Rhodienne before being snapped up by Anderlecht to understudy Jacques Munaron. Born 25.9.1960.

GEORGES GRUN (Defender). Can also play in attacking positions. He's the only home-developed player currently in the Anderlecht senior squad, and he is rated very highly by the Belgian club. Born 25.1.1962.

WALTER DE GREEF (Defender). An experienced player who wore the colours of FC Paal, Beringen and New York Cosmos before joining Anderlecht in 1981. A former youth international, he is noted for his industry and is one of the Belgian club's tallest players. Born 12.11.1957.

MORTEN OLSEN (Defender). Has made many appearances in the Danish international team. Began his career with the BK 1901 Nykøbing club and in 1974 turned professional with Cercle Bruges. Two years later he joined

RWD Molenbeek and in 1980 he signed for Anderlecht. Born 14.8.1949. Scored Anderlecht's goal against Spurs in Brussels a fortnight ago.

MICHEL DE GROOTE (Defender). Another Belgian international who started his career with Anderlecht, but was loaned out to FC Liege for two years from 1977 but then returned to the Brussels club. His success enabled Anderlecht to sell international defender Paul Renquin to Servette, the Swiss club. Born 18.10.1955.

LUCA PERUZOVIC (Defender). Has played many times for Yugoslavia, and is highly regarded in that country. Formerly played for Hajduk Split, the Yugoslavian club who played Spurs in the semi-final of this season's U.E.F.A. Cup competition. Was brought to Anderlecht by Tomislav Ivic, his former coach with Hajduk. Born 26.2.1952.

WIM HOFKENS (Defender/Midfield). Has appeared for the full Dutch international team but has played most of his football in Belgium. Began his senior career in Holland with Willem II and later moved to the Beveren club in Belgium. Joined Anderlecht in 1980. Born 27.3.1958.

VINCENZO SCIFO (Midfield). His recent form has been a revelation. His parents are Italian and his father moved to Belgium to find work in the mining industry, having previously

lived in Sicily. At the tender age of seven he joined the youth section of La Louviere, a second division club and was credited with 432 goals in four seasons! Scored Anderlecht's first goal in the second leg of the semi-final at home to Nottingham Forest. Born 16.2.1962.

RENE VANDEREYCKEN (Midfield). Has made many appearances in the Belgian international team. Made his name with Bruges for whom he played in the finals of the U.E.F.A. Cup in 1976 and the Champions' Cup in 1978. Born 22.7.1953.

DIRK GOOSSENS (Midfield). Signed for Anderlecht last summer and has done well in his first season with the Brussels club. A former youth international, he previously played for FC Wilrijk and Beerschot VAV. Born 26.9.1962.

FRANKIE VERCAUTEREN (Midfield). Has many international caps for Belgium. Has played only for Anderlecht and was in their teams that won the Cup-Winners' Cup in 1976 and 1978 and also in the U.E.F.A. Cup-winning team of last season. Born 28.10.1956.

HENRIK ANDERSEN (Midfield). Joined the Anderlecht club from Fremad Amager of Denmark in 1982. Born 7.5.1965.

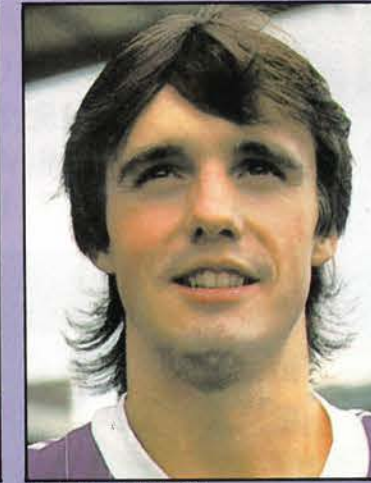

Had two years in Spain with the Valencia club, and joined Anderlecht last summer. Made his name with Ajax of Amsterdam, who signed him as a teenager from Denmark. Born 30.9.1956.

PER FRIMANN HANSEN (Midfield). Another Danish international who now has many admirers in Belgian football. Left KB Copenhagen for Anderlecht three years ago. Born 4.7.1962.

ALEX CZERNIATINSKI (Forward). Son of an immigrant Polish mine-worker, who wore the colours of Charleroi and Antwerp before joining Anderlecht after the World Cup finals. Has been restricted by injury and national service but has done well in recent matches. Equally effective both in attack or midfield. Born 28.8.1960.

ERWIN VANDENBERGH (Forward). A former "Footballer of the Year", he has been described as one of "Europe's most effective goal-grabbers". Joined Anderlecht after the 1982 World Cup finals. His goalscoring record makes him one of the most-feared strikers in Belgian football. Scored the third of Anderlecht's goals against Nottingham Forest in the semi-final to settle the tie for his club. Born 26.1.1959.

KENNETH BRYLLE LARSEN (Forward). A Danish international who is expected to appear for his country in the European finals in France next month. Joined Anderlecht from Vejle, Alan Simonsen's club, in the middle of season 1979-80. Scored Anderlecht's second goal against Nottingham Forest in the second-leg of the semi-final from the penalty spot last month. Born 22.5.1959.

AWAY GOALS

In the U.E.F.A. Cup competition, away goals have extra value if the aggregate score is still level after the home and away matches. If this system fails to provide a winner, extra time of 15 minutes each way is played, during which period an away goal still has extra value.

If there is still no decision after extra time, the winners are determined by a series of penalty kicks, taken alternately by the two teams.

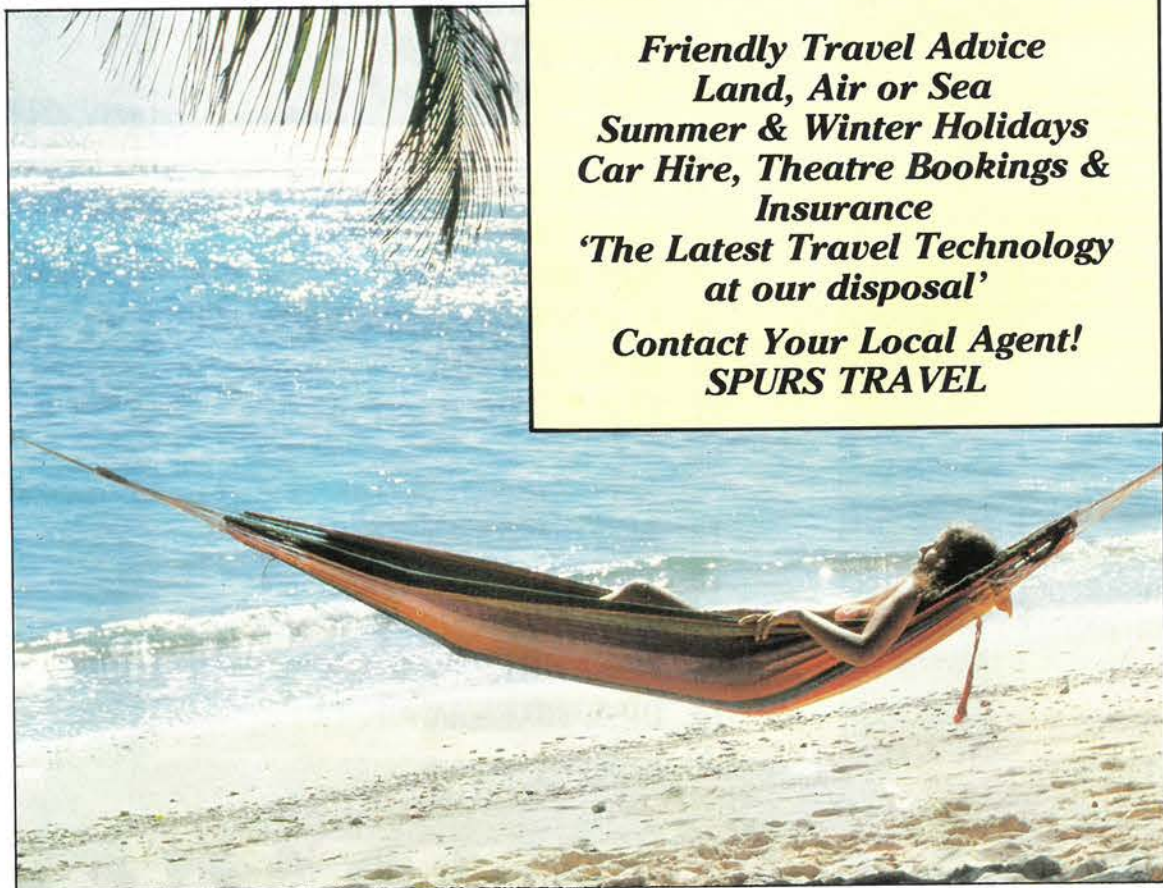

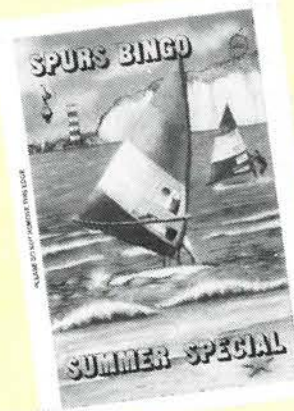

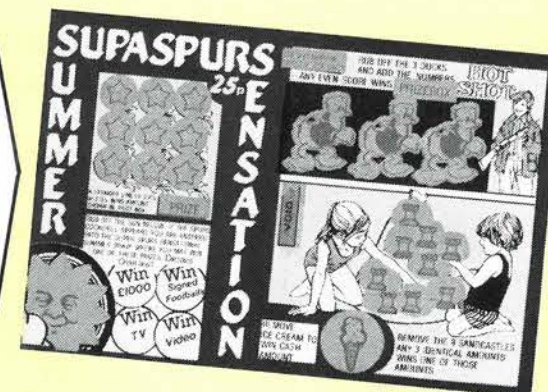

Flashback

Here are extracts from our match programme for the second leg of the U.E.F.A. Cup final against WOLVERHAMPTON WANDERERS in May, 1972. Spurs had won the first leg 2-1 at Wolverhampton, and as the match here was drawn 1-1, we were winners of the trophy for the first time. Fuller details of that match are given elsewhere in this programme.

Occasion Without Precedent

SPURS and Wolverhampton Wanderers share the distinction of contesting the Final of the U.E.F.A.—Union of European Football Associations—Cup in its first season, and in staging the second leg this evening, we extend a cordial welcome to our old friends and rivals from Staffordshire.

For the first time in football history, two English clubs are in opposition in a major European Final, and tonight's occasion is also without precedent in our own Club records. Never before have we staged a Final tie of a major competition on our own ground.

Each of our past triumphs in the F.A. Cup, European Cup Winners Cup and Football League Cup were achieved on neutral ground.

When the U.E.F.A. competition opened last September, it embraced 64 clubs, some from countries as far away as Russia, Bulgaria and Cyprus. Yet the Final is being contested by two English clubs whose grounds are only 132 miles apart!

Only four English clubs were in the original 64—the other two were Leeds United and Southampton—and whatever the result of the Final, we feel that an all-English tie has added to our national soccer prestige.

Naturally, we are hoping Spurs will be the first winners of the trophy. We have been successful in every major Final in which we have played. It is a record, listed at the head of this page, of which we are justly proud, and we are anxious to preserve it. This evening we start with a 2-1 lead from the first leg, played on Wolves' ground a fortnight ago. It was a valuable win which gives us an advantage from the first whistle this evening, but we cannot afford to let it lull us into a sense of security.

It is up to our players to exploit the advantage they already hold by going all out to increase their lead. Wolves are a fine team, capable of playing excellent football. We have the utmost respect for their ability, and know they will make a tremendous effort to make up the leeway.

There is every prospect of a great match tonight.

THE FIRST LEG

THE first leg of our U.E.F.A. Cup Final with Wolves was played on a drab, damp evening at Molineux, but there was no lack of sparkle about either of the two vital goals scored for us by Martin Chivers in the second half.

The first of the two could not have been scored at a better time. In the opening minutes of the second half, Wolves exerted considerable pressure, and we conceded four corners in quick succession.

Spurs had more than one narrow escape during this period, and it was not until the 56th minute that we launched the counter attack that produced the first goal.

Mike England took a free-kick out on the right, and Chivers headed us into the lead in great style. A few minutes later Martin Peters placed another free-kick in the goalmouth, but this time Chivers headed over, and when by this time the tempo of the game had quickened considerably, and when Jim McCalliog equalised for Wolves in the 72nd minute, the stage was set for a tremendous struggle.

PRATT FOR COATES

John Pratt replaced Ralph Coates and within minutes he had nearly turned a cross from the right into his own goal. Pat Jennings, who had just previously made a fine save from Frank Munro, did well to keep the ball out of the net. Wolves were fighting hard, and in one menacing raid, Derek Dougan screwed the ball just wide of the far post. The big moment was reserved, however, for the 87th minute when Chivers cracked a thunderbolt of a shot into Wolves' net to finish off a move started from defence by Cyril Knowles.

There had been a lot less incident in the goalless first half, although Chivers had hit the angle of the woodwork after his downfield kick had been deflected promptly on target by Danny Hegan from close to the centre line.

Our large contingent of supporters made themselves heard at Molineux, and their encouragement was much appreciated by the players.
