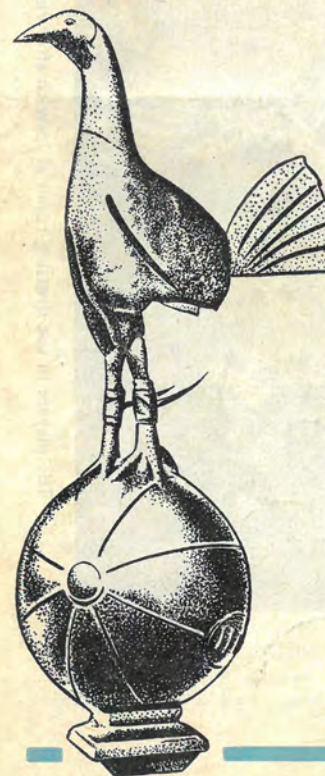

TOTTENHAM NEWS AND COMMENTS



THIS evening we give a cordial welcome to Aston Villa, who are always popular visitors to our ground, and rightly so, for we recall many stirring games with them in the past. Tonight's match is the return for that played at Villa Park on August 20th, when we were the losers by 2 goals to 1—incidentally our first defeat at Villa Park in the League since 1938. In the second encounter this evening we look forward to a keen and enjoyable match with our players no doubt anxious to restore the balance after their reverse at Villa Park.

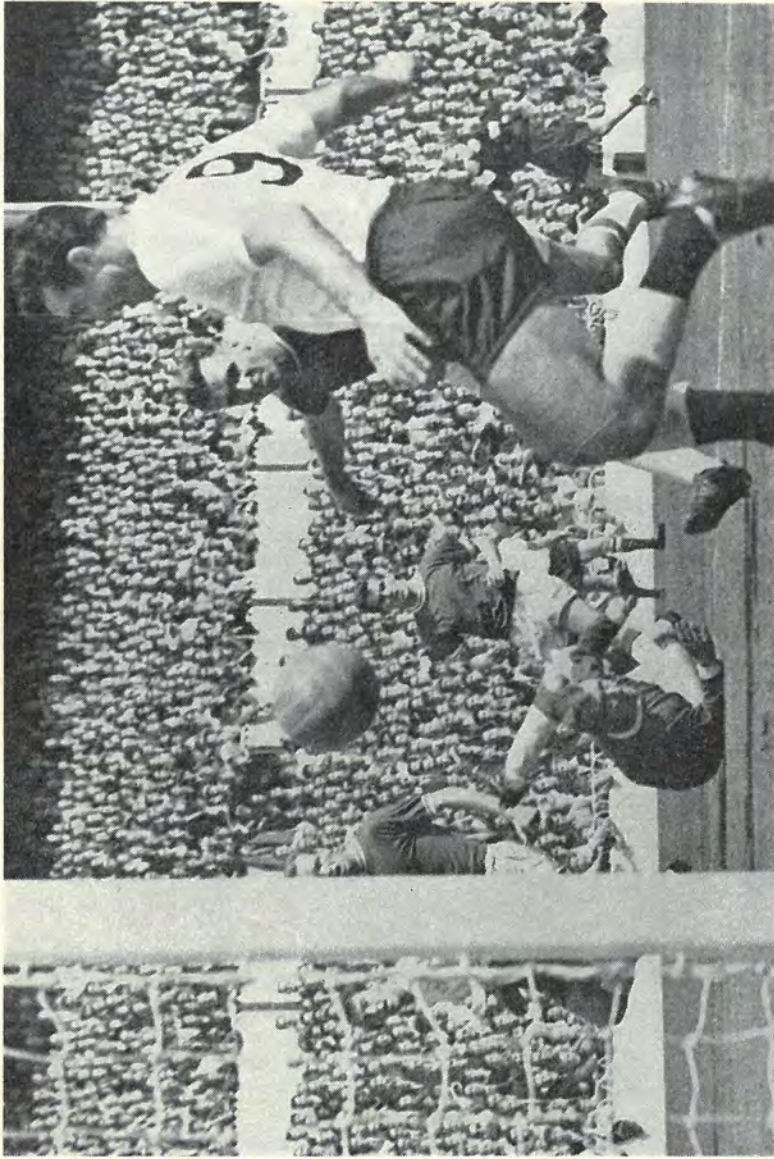
So far as the first-team regulars are concerned, the Villa playing staff shows no material change from last season. Several of their younger players who were given their chance in the senior side last season have gained in experience, and in addition to those who have already been introduced to First Division football Villa have several more waiting for their big chance.

Among the younger element who took the eye last season were centre-half John Sleuwenhoek, inside-forward Alan Baker and left-winger Harry Burrows. After the transfer of Irish International Peter McParland to the Wolves, Burrows speedily reached top form, and had the satisfaction of finishing the season as leading scorer with 13 goals from 34 League games.

Sleuwenhoek, who is of Dutch parentage, has developed into one of the best young defenders in the country, while Baker has displayed considerable potential as a tactician in the front line. Two other consistent members of the Villa rearguard last season were left-half Alan Deakin and left-back Charlie Aitken, who have gained "Under 23" honours for England and Scotland respectively.

Into the more experienced category come players like goalkeeper Nigel Sims, Welsh International right-half Vic Crowe, right-back Gordon Lee, and forwards Derek Dougan, Bob Thomson, and Scottish International Tommy Ewing. Early last season Thomson and Dougan had the misfortune to be injured in a car accident, but before long both were back in the Villa attack, and playing useful parts in helping the club to finish in seventh position in the League table.

Ewing, who was signed from Partick Thistle on February 1st of this year, played on both wings on occasions, but with Harry Burrows settling down on the left flank, he moved to the right wing to partner Alan Baker. Jim MacEwan is also an experienced player, having spent several years with Raith Rovers before coming to Villa Park in the summer of 1959.

If Aston Villa's away record last season had matched their home performances they would have finished several places higher in the table. At home their record was 13 wins and five drawn games, whereas on opponents' grounds they collected 13 points from five wins and three drawn games. When they visited White Hart Lane on September 30th last year we were the winners by 1 goal to nil, and the match at Villa Park in February resulted in a goalless draw. Villa were also here in the Sixth Round of the Cup when we won 2-0, so that last season our defence did not concede a goal to them in three encounters.

In addition to Harry Burrows, three other players reached double figures as marksmen, Bobby Thomson scoring 12 League goals, Peter McParland 11, and Derek Dougan 10. Dougan, formerly with Portsmouth and Blackburn Rovers, joined Villa from the latter club in the summer of 1961.

Prior to their home game with us on the Monday of last week, Villa had opened the season with a visit from West Ham United, whom they defeated 3-1 with goals from Dougan, Thompson and MacEwan. Dougan also scored his club's two goals against us at Villa Park. In their 2-0 win at Maine Road last Saturday Thomson and Burrows were the marksmen.

Original members of the League at its inception in 1888, Aston Villa have spent all but three seasons in the First Division. They have been Champions six times and runners-up

on eight occasions. They have topped the Second Division twice and have won the F.A. Cup seven times, which is a record. They have also been defeated Finalists twice.

It is just over 30 years ago that Tommy Waring, one of the most famous centre-forwards of his day, set up an individual goal-scoring record for Aston Villa with 49 goals from 39 League games. In that season, 1930-31, the Villa scored 128 goals which is still the highest total for a Division One club. In 1960-61 this figure was exceeded by Peterborough United when in the Fourth Division.

LAST SATURDAY'S MATCHES

At Upton Park last Saturday our League side put up a sparkling performance in winning 6 goals to 1 in the first of our local derbies of the season. Our team was: Brown; Baker and Henry; Blanchflower, Norman and Mackay; Medwin, White, Allen, Greaves, and Jones. Les Allen, appearing at centre-forward in place of injured Bobby Smith, made his first League appearance since March of last season, and has made a full recovery from his injury. Our goalscorers were: Lyall (own goal), Medwin, Greaves (2), Jones, and White. Woosnam was the scorer for West Ham.

In the Football Combination match at Tottenham last Saturday our Reserves were the winners by 5 goals to nil against Bristol Rovers Reserves. Three of our goals came from Terry

Dyson, and the other two from Frank Saul. Our team was: Hollowbread; Barton and Hopkins; Smith (J.), Smith (A.), and Marchi; Aitchison, Collins, Saul, Clayton, and Dyson.

Our other two teams met with reverses, the "A" team losing 2-1 at Bury St. Edmunds in the Eastern Counties League, and our Youth side were the losers

to Fulham "Under 18s" 5-3 at Cheshunt in the South East Counties League.

EUROPEAN CUP WINNERS CUP

In the Preliminary Round of the European Cup Winners Cup we have drawn a bye and will not be called on to play until the

First Round Proper, which has to be completed by November 30th. The ties in the Preliminary Round have to be completed by September 30th.

The following is the complete draw for the Preliminary Round. It will be noted that in some countries the winners of the National Cup competitions have still to be determined.

GROUP ONE. Byes: Tottenham Hotspur, West German winners (when decided), Portadown (N. Ireland), Shamrock Rovers (Eire).

Ties: Bangor City (Wales) v. Naples (Italy); Lausanne Sports (Switzerland) v. Sparta Rotterdam (Holland), Vitoria (Portugal) v. St. Etienne (France), Odense (Denmark) v. Alliance de Dudelange (Luxembourg), Glasgow Rangers (Scotland) v. Seville (Spain).

GROUP TWO. Byes: Graz (Austria), Czechoslovakian Cup winners (when known).

Ties: O.F.K. Belgrade (Yugoslavia) v. Chemie Halle (East Germany), Rumanian Cup winners v. Bulgarian Cup winners, Oyapest (Hungary) v. Polish Cup winners, Hibernian (Malta) v. Olympiakos (Greece).

Atletico Madrid (Spain) and Fiorentina (Italy), who drew 1—1 after extra time in the Final at Hampden Park last May, have still to re-play, and the winners will go into the First Round Proper, giving a total of 16 clubs in this Round.

All ties are on a home and away basis up to the Final, and the competition follows closely on the lines of the "European Cup" in which we took part last season. We recollect having met one of the above clubs in a previous friendly, that being St. Etienne, whom we played in the summer of 1947 when on tour in France, winning by 2 goals to nil.

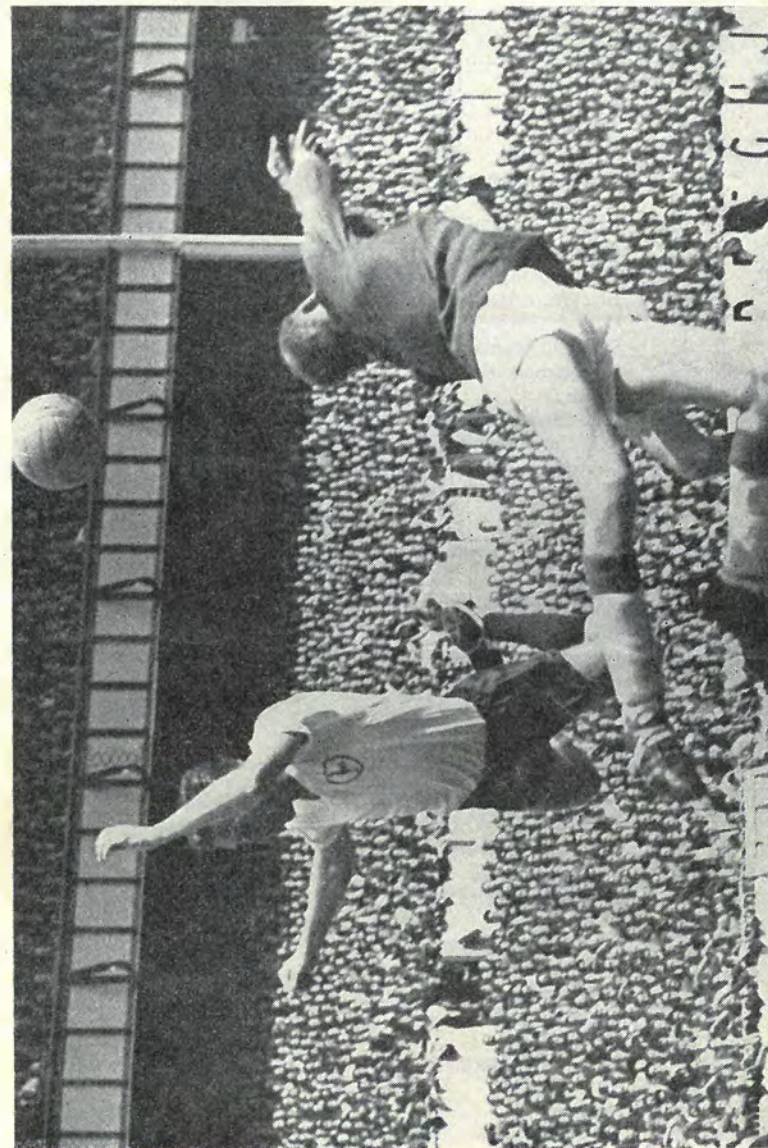
