Wembley the Target

WE cannot think of a better way of finishing the old year than qualifying for a Wembley final. In meeting Wolverhampton Wanderers in the second leg of the Football League Cup Semi-final today, the opportunity lies open before us.

A place at Wembley will have to be earned, however, and we know from our experience against them in the first leg at Molineux last week that Wolves are as determined as our own players to reach the final. Moreover, Wolves have made it known that they are still smarting from their defeat at our hands in last season's U.E.F.A. Cup Final, and this gives them an extra incentive.

By one of those remarkable coincidences of fixture-making, Wolves were due here in the League today, and we were scheduled to play this League Cup Semi-final on Monday.

This was obviously an unsatisfactory arrangement, and the decision to bring forward the Semi-final and postpone the League fixture was made with the best interests of the two clubs and the two competitions in mind.

We feel sure it has met with the approval of our supporters, and we hope only a very small minority, if any, have been inconvenienced by the change.

It is a matter of pride to us that we are in the Semi-final of the League Cup for the fourth time in five seasons. Two of those semi-finals were lost by Spurs, but we hope to balance the account today.

IF THE AGGREGATE SCORE IS LEVEL AFTER 90 MINUTES TODAY, A HALF-HOUR'S EXTRA TIME WILL BE PLAYED.

WOLVES' PATH

The first leg of the Semi-final is dealt with in detail elsewhere in this programme. It will be seen from Wolves' record in the League Cup that they were drawn at home in all previous rounds.

Last season Wolves were knocked out in the Second Round on the ground of Manchester City, who defeated them 4—3.

MAN IN THE MIDDLE

MEET THE WOLVES

PHIL PARKES (Goalkeeper). Born at West Bromwich, and trained with the local Albion club as a schoolboy. Gained a place in the Staffordshire Boys team, and played for local clubs in both the Handsworth League and West Bromwich Sunday League before turning professional with Wolves.

GERALD TAYLOR (Defender). Born at Hull, and joined Wolves at an early age. Developed in the club nursery in Yorkshire, and was added to the full professional staff at Molineux in November, 1964. Made his League debut in the Second Division during season 1966–67.

DEREK JEFFERSON (Defender). Joined Wolves from Ipswich Town in October. Played against Spurs for Ipswich at Portman Road in September. Born at Morpeth in the North-East, and became a full-time professional with Ipswich in 1966.

JOHN McALLE (Defender). Born in Liverpool and played for Huyton Boys. Joined Wolves straight from school, and after a spell as an apprentice he signed as a full professional in February, 1967. Made his League debut during season 1967–68.

BERNARD SHAW (Defender). Born in Sheffield and made a big name with Sheffield United. Transferred from the Blades to Wolves in July, 1969. A former England Under-23 player.

MIKE BAILEY (Midfield). Captain of Wolves and a former English international. Born at Wisbech, and made a big name with Charlton Athletic, who transferred him to Wolves in 1966. Scored for Wolves in the League match on this ground last season.

KEN HIBBITT (Midfield). Born in Bradford, and started his League career with Bradford Park Avenue, then in the Football League. Left Park Avenue for Wolves in November, 1968, and made his League debut for the Staffordshire club in season 1970–71. His brother, Terry, is a forward with Newcastle United. Ken has played for the England Under-23s.

DANNY HEGAN (Midfield). Born at Coatbridge in Scotland and played for Sunderland and Ipswich before signing for West Bromwich. Wolves secured his transfer from Albion in May, 1970.


STEVE KINDON (Striker). Signed from Burnley last close season and a former club-mate of Ralph Coates at Turf Moor. A former England Youth international who made over a hundred first-team appearances for Burnley. Born at Warrington and joined Burnley straight from school.

JOHN RICHARDS (Striker). A rising star. Played in the same England Under-23 team as Steve Perryman last summer against East Germany, Poland and the U.S.S.R. Joined Wolves straight from school, and has been a professional since July, 1969. Another Warrington-born player.

DAVE WAGSTAFFE (Striker). One of Wolves' most experienced players, and a forward who has caused us plenty of trouble in past matches. Born in Manchester and made his name with Manchester City. Transferred from City to Wolves in 1964. Has played for the Football League.

DEREK DOUGAN (Striker). A star who needs little introduction. Born in Belfast, and has played many times for Northern Ireland. Started with Distillery, and played for Portsmouth, Blackburn Rovers, Aston Villa, Peterborough United and Leicester City before joining Wolves in March, 1967.

STEVE DALEY (Striker) is expected to stand by as substitute. Born at Barnsley and a product of Wolves' nursery system.

A STORY OF GOALS . . .


When Liverpool played us here in the replayed Fifth Round tie of the League Cup last month, we emphasised in the programme that we had never faced the Merseysiders in cup competition until 1968. Yet in the comparatively short time that has since elapsed, we have faced Liverpool five more times in cup matches, including replays.

Our experience with Wolves is somewhat similar. Apart from the isolated but memorable F.A. Cup Final clash in 1921, Spurs and Wolves were kept

apart in Cup competition until 1969.

We were then paired in the F.A. Cup, and have since played Wolves twice in League Cup matches and in the two U.E.F.A. Cup Final games last season. Today's second leg of the League Cup Semi-final is therefore our sixth Cup match with Wolves since that 1921 final.

The story of our Cup clashes with Wolves is a story of goals. Good goals. And we do not have to dig deeply into history to bring them to life again.





second leg of the U.E.F.A. Cup Final, and there was drama about the goal headed through by Alan Mullery in the first half.

Alan had been recalled to Spurs' team after a spell on loan to Fulham, to whom he has since returned, and his valuable goal produced an atmosphere of feverish excitement and emotion.

It is with the quality of goals rather than their value that we are concerned on this page, however. That second-leg U.E.F.A. tie finished 1—1, with Spurs overall winners on aggregate by 3—2, and Wolves' goal, scored by David Wagstaffe, was something special.

He cut in from the right and hit a great left-footed shot high into our net from 20 yards.

TWO FOR CHIVERS

At Molineux in the first leg, won by Spurs 2—1, the glory belonged to Martin Chivers. His first goal, in the 56th minute, was a brilliant header from a free-kick taken by Mike England out on the right, and his second, after Jim McCalliog had equalised, was driven home like a thunderbolt to finish off a move started by Cyril Knowles.

So much for the U.E.F.A. Final last season and its memories. Our only previous clash in the League Cup with Wolves was in September, 1969. It was a second-round tie at Molineux, and Wolves won by the only goal of the

match.

McCalliog was also the scorer on that occasion, and it was a truly brilliant effort. The dangerous Wagstaffe put over a cross from the left, and McCalliog hooked the ball into Spurs' net with remarkable delicacy and skill.

Earlier that year we had met Wolves in the Fourth Round of the F.A. Cup on this ground.

WAGSTAFFE AGAIN

It was a fine, well-fought match, and the outlook was not too bright for Spurs when Wagstaffe—the trouble he's given us over the years!—scored one of his high-quality goals.

If you remember that match, you must remember our equalising goal. It was the type of goal that demonstrates the art of passing at its absolute best.

Neil Johnson, who had been promoted to the first team in place of unfit Jimmy Pearce, started it in midfield by slipping a pass to his left. Terry Venables shrewdly allowed the ball to run to Knowles, and while this was happening Jimmy Greaves moved out to the left to gather Cyril's pass.

Over came Jimmy's centre and a touch by Alan Gilzean enabled Johnson to hammer a terrific shot into the net. Then came the winner, stabbed home with typical nonchalance by Greaves.

Omission of Jimmy Dimmock's famous Cup-winning goal in 1921 in this review of matches with Wolves is simply because we have described it in detail in the fairly recent past.

We hope today's match will produce at least one more goal to enrich our

memories . . . providing it is scored at the right end!

THE FIRST LEG

THE first leg of our Football League Cup Semi-final with Wolves was played in excellent conditions at Molineux on Wednesday evening of last week.

In view of the foggy weather that enveloped much of the country last week, and in fact, caused the abandonment of the second leg of the other semi-final between Norwich City and Chelsea on the same night, we were very fortunate to have perfect visibility for our own match.

Spurs had plenty of support at Molineux, and our followers who made

the journey were rewarded by a tremendous start.

An early goal is always valuable. In a tie as important as this, it is doubly so. And that first, morale-boosting goal from Martin Peters came in the third minute.

It finished off a good move involving several Spurs players, and it was Jimmy Pearce who made the final pass to Peters. Wolves' defenders appeared to be caught flat-footed as our captain drove the ball calmly into the net for his 17th competitive goal of the season.

PRATT'S SWERVER



In the 15th minute Spurs were two goals up. This time it was John Pratt who put the ball in the net, and his was a goal that will be remembered for a long time.

John, who had an extremely good match all round, shot from around the 25-yard mark, and to use his own words, the ball "swerved in flight" beyond the reach of Phil Parkes,

The midfield play had been evenly shared, but Pat Jennings was not called upon to make a save until the 25th minute, when John Richards headed a free-kick by Dave Wagstaffe into the goalmouth.

At this stage Spurs were looking the sharper team, although Wolves were having a good share of the play. In the 39th minute we nearly increased our lead, but Alan Gilzean's shot hit the crossbar and bounced over.

In the closing seconds of the first half Wolves were awarded a penalty kick when Cyril Knowles was alleged to have fouled Alan Sunderland. Ken Hibbitt gave Jennings no chance with his spot-kick.

NEW HEART

The concession of this goal was quite a blow to us. From Wolves' point of view it was an ideal time to pull one back.

Instead of trooping off two goals behind, they entered their dressing-room with the boost of a goal that would obviously give them new heart for the second half.

That, of course, was the pattern of things in the early play after half-time. Wolves knew they were back in the game with a good chance and they showed a measure of thrust that had been missing during the first half.

Much of the play was still in midfield, however, and with tension creeping in it was not a match that produced good moves and flowing football.

CUP-TIE ATMOSPHERE

The home crowd were now roaring Wolves on, and there was no lack of cup-tie atmosphere. We were now under pressure, and Jennings was busier than at any earlier stage of the game.

Spurs' defence survived that spell without conceding a second goal to the now lively Wolves, and we began to fight our way back. Knowles went up

to hit in a low shot that Parkes saved, and Gilzean burst through to shoot wide after gathering a well-measured pass by Martin Chivers.

There was no more scoring, and our 2—1 win was therefore the same as in the first leg of the U.E.F.A. Cup Final on the same ground last May.

It all begins again today, but we have the advantage of a goal lead. It is up to our players to use their advantage to the full, but Wolves' fighting qualities after facing a two-goal deficit early in the game were made clear to us at Molineux. We can expect another hard tussle today.

JIMMY DIMMOCK

It is with the deepest regret that we record the death in North Middlesex Hospital, Edmonton, last Saturday of Jimmy Dimmock, our old-time English international outside-left, who scored our F.A. Cup-winning goal against Wolves in 1921, and we offer our sincere condolences to his family in their sad loss. A tribute to his skill and a survey of his career as one of the greatest Spurs players of all time will appear in our next first-team programme.

PENALTY HABIT

West Ham United 2, Spurs 2

We have developed the bad habit of giving away penalty kicks in away matches. In our last three away games, against West Ham, Wolves and Everton, a spot-kick has been awarded to the home team.

It cost us a point at West Ham on Boxing Day. Terry Naylor was penalised for hands with only nine minutes left, and Bryan Robson made no mistake from the spot.

It was Robson who had headed a fine goal for the Hammers only a couple of minutes earlier after Spurs had scored twice, through Jimmy Pearce and

Martin Peters, early in the second half.

We cannot complain at the result, but it is always disappointing to see a two-goal lead in the second half, away from home, whittled down to a draw.

After grabbing that two-goal lead, we allowed West Ham too much space. They were quick to exploit it, and we were put under a lot of pressure for the rest of the game.
